Dear Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission,

i am a Seattle resident who struggles to keep her electricity bill paid each month. Knowing that shut-offs are currently off the table has been a relief to me during these pandemic times. As well, the idea of shutting off the electricity of millions of people so that utility companies can continue to make a profit during a national emergency is unconscionable! To even consider such a possibility begs the question of ethical awareness and a moral conscience!

I am writing to ask the Utilities and Transportation Commission to extend the moratorium on utility shut offs until at least September.

It is now clear: the moratorium saves lives. A recent study by the National Bureau of Economic Research showed that the coronavirus infection rates last year were 4.4% lower in communities that banned electricity and water service disconnections during the pandemic, while death rates from the disease were 7.4% lower.

Almost a year into the COVID crisis, it is clearer than ever that the effects of the pandemic are not going away anytime soon. We need to act on people's needs rather than on the desires of profitable utility companies to maintain their profits. Right now, up to 2.2 million people in Washington ? almost one-third of the state ? could be struggling to pay for food, according to recent reports. You have the power to ensure that we don't compound their suffering by turning off their electricity, too.

Washington can be a state where everyone -- no matter their race, income, or where they live -- has access to electricity. This is a state where people's health and well being, not corporate profits, can drive policymakers' decisions. Utilities are more essential than ever to keep our communities healthy and safe. Together, we must make sure that Washingtonians can count on essential utilities throughout the pandemic and beyond.

Please, keep the lights on.
