CHAIRMAN DANNER: All right. Good evening. I'm going to call to order the Cascade Natural Gas general rate case public comment hearing. Today is Wednesday, April 4th, 2018, and we're in Kennewick, Washington. My name is Dave Danner. I'm chair of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission. I have two colleagues, Mr. Jay Balasbas and Ms. Ann Rendahl. They are not in attendance tonight, but they will be listening to the transcripts of the comment here as the three of us deliberate on this rate case. The docket number for this proceeding is UG-170929. On August 31st, 2017, Cascade filed a request with the Washington UTC to increase its rates and charges for natural gas service. The company proposed a rate increase of overall 2.71 percent in base rates or $\$ 5,884,984$.

Under Cascade's request, the average customer using 54 therms a month will see a monthly bill increase of $\$ 2.09$, from current $\$ 47.45$ to $\$ 49.54$.

According to Cascade, the request is necessary because of costs of increased capital investments, replacement of aging infrastructure in order to enhance reliability

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1 and meet new federal safety standards and recover the amount in the deferral account for pipeline improvements to maintain Cascade's maximum allowable operating pressure for its natural gas pipelines and replacement of aging pipelines.

In our rate cases, generally, we have several parties. In this case, we have not only Cascade, but also the commission staff, the office of public counsel, Washington Attorney General's office and we have our public counsel here, Lisa Gafken. Raise your hand. As well as utility -- or utility customers industrial gas users and also the Energy Project which represents low income.

In formal proceedings such as this, the commission's regulatory staff operates as a separate party and the commissioners will be making the decision separate from what the staff position may be.

The purpose of these hearings is to hear from members of the public who are not formal parties to a proceeding. Generally, our rate cases are like trials. The parties present evidence. They contest evidence. But those who are not formal parties, nonetheless, are affected by the decisions we make. And so we want to hear from them, as well as from the formal parties in a rate case. So that is why we hold these hearings for

1 every rate case that we do have at the commission.
2 Looking at the sign-in sheet tonight, I see we have just one person signed up. Sometimes we have scores of people and other times we have smaller numbers. So Mr. Cochran, are you here? Let me ask you, generally, when we have larger numbers, we have a short film that we run. It's about five minutes long. This is for our benefit. Would you like to see it?

MR. COCHRAN: Yes.
CHAIRMAN DANNER: So we will go ahead and show the film and then take your testimony.

MR. COCHRAN: Thank you.
CHAIRMAN DANNER: Thank you.
(Video played.)
CHAIRMAN DANNER: All right. I hope you found it informative.

MR. COCHRAN: Sure.
CHAIRMAN DANNER: So at this point, Mr. Cochran, again, you're the only person signed up now, so if you'd like to come forward, I'd like to hear what you have to say.

At the last hearing we had so many people I had to cut people off after two minutes, but I'm going to indulge you with a little more time.

MR. COCHRAN: I don't think it will take a long

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1 time, but, anyway.
2 My name is Michael Cochran. It says here I'm going to
, state my name. Anyway, I came here because of an article in the Tri-City Herald a while back that said this meeting was going to take place. And it kind of started out saying that the new federal tax law may mean lower natural gas rates. So it tells me that this whole drive to lower is based on the tax structure that we have in this country now. And yet I see at the same time that the provider, Cascade Natural Gas, is asking for an increase.

And I understand the infrastructure piece of business and that. But what I also, when I saw this article, I remembered -- you know, I go to Spokane quite a bit. I go to Lewiston, Idaho quite a bit and Vista is their provider. And I remember reading in a paper that Vista not only had one rate decrease, but two rate decreases in a very, very short period of time.

And so I'm sitting there, why is mine asking for an increase when Vista had one that took effect this January, according to the information $I$ got from KXOI, that January 26 th was the effective date of a 6.3 percent decrease, which is following by another decrease that took effect in October of 2017. Now, I didn't get what the percent of that particular

1 decrease was, so I don't have it to quote. But it surprised me -- and this was all based on expected wholesale gas cost. According to the information, it had nothing to do with a decrease in the tax structure, which, according to the Tri-City Herald, said it went from 35 percent to 21 percent.

So it seems a little bit surprising to me that Vista can afford to give their customers what to me appears to be a very significant decrease and Cascade at the same time wants an increase of, according to this, 3 percent.

So that's my question or my comment -- not my question, because you're the one that has to deal with the questions and the solutions as to how all this ferrets out. But it just surprised me that one utility in this state because -- and I'm kind of simpleminded, so I believe everybody gets their gas from the same source. It's called the earth. And I realize there's a zillion wells and whatever and providers and infrastructure and middlemen and all this. But bottom line, all the natural gas comes out of the earth. So I wouldn't expect one to be paying a significant amount than another one. And if they are, then we should be asking why. So that's the end of my comments.

CHAIRMAN DANNER: All right. Thank you. And your

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1 comments will be taken into consideration. My colleagues, Commissioner Balasbas and Commissioner Rendahl, will also review the transcript of this. So we will make those part of the record in this case as we go forward.

Normally in these proceedings, you know -- you asked questions, we have to treat them as rhetorical because I can't engage you in a give and take.

MR. COCHRAN: That's fine. I didn't expect that. I was hoping that I could say why I questioned why this one wants versus what one is getting. I didn't expect the answer because it's a lot bigger than what $I$ know. I understand that. So, anyway.

CHAIRMAN DANNER: Thank you very much for coming out. I do appreciate it. And as I said, this will be made part of the record and we will go forward from here.

MR. COCHRAN: Thank you for the opportunity.
CHAIRMAN DANNER: Thank you, Mr. Cochran. I appreciate it. So let me ask, is there anyone else here who has snuck in who wishes to make public comment? Seeing none, I think we are going to adjourn. So we are adjourned. Thank you.
