| 6 | the record. |
| 7 | My name is Rayne Pearson. I'm an |
| 8 | administrative law judge for the Washington Utilities and |
| 9 | Transportation Commission, and I'm the presiding officer |
| 10 | for today's hearing being conducted at the Commission's |
| 11 | headquarters in Olympia. |
| 12 | Today is Monday, April 18th, 2016, and the |
| 13 | time is 9 a.m. So today's hearing involves a total of five |
| 14 | household goods carriers, so the first thing we will do is |
| 15 | take a roll call to determine who's present. |
| 16 | And as you can see, there is a court reporter |
| 17 | here today creating a record of today's proceeding, so when |
| 18 | I call your name, in addition to raising your hand, please |
| 19 | also identify yourself with a verbal response like |
| 20 | "present" or "here." |
| 21 | So the first docket is TV-160211, Justin |
| 22 | Junell. |
| 23 | MR. JUNELL: Present, Your Honor. |
| 24 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Is that how you |
| 25 | pronounce your last name? Junell? |

| 14 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you. |
| 15 | So there's just one company who has not |
| 16 | entered an appearance today, so that company will be |
| 17 | subject to being held in default and having an order |
| 18 | entered against them without a chance to address the |
| 19 | Commission, so I will take that case up later this morning |
| 20 | if Mr. Willis does not appear. |
| 21 | So you are all here because the Commission |
| 22 | filed a complaint alleging that each of you is performing |
| 23 | or advertising to perform work as a household goods carrier |
| 24 | without the required Commission-issued permit, and the |
| 25 | purpose of today's proceeding is to explain to you what |

your choices are and then hear from you regarding which choice you want to pursue, and you can choose one of two options.

The first is to cease and desist providing, offering, and advertising un-permitted household goods services; and if you choose that option, you will need to demonstrate what you've done to shut down your business either completely or partially to avoid further enforcement action by the Commission.

So I will want to hear and see sufficient proof that you're no longer performing regulated moves; for example, if you can demonstrate that you've taken down your website or other online advertisements for your business.

The second option is to ask for a formal classification hearing to show why you don't need a permit; and if you choose this option, you're contesting the allegations in the complaint and claiming not to be conducting household goods moves at all.

And for that option, we will need to schedule a formal hearing for a date in the near future with a deadline two to three weeks from now for both your company and for Staff to file any exhibits and declare all witnesses. So we will set that hearing up before we take a break this morning if -- if that's an option that any of you wish to pursue.

So because each of you has a right to be heard by the Commission, I will call you up individually to do that, and then Commission Staff will also be heard this morning. Ms. Megan Banks represents the Commission. She's seated over here to my right, and she's a Commission compliance investigator.

So in a few minutes, I'll call each of you forward to make your choice about how you wish to proceed, and at that time, I will swear you in so that anything you tell the Court will be under oath and will be considered sworn testimony.

And once you're sworn in, I'll ask you if you understand your options for today's hearing and then ask you to state on the record which option that you're choosing. And if there's anything else you want to explain to me, you can do that at that time.

In each of the complaints, Commission Staff allege that you are providing household goods moving services without a permit, and they are also seeking to have a penalty imposed for those violations.

So Staff will be making a penalty recommendation as part of any agreed order that gets entered here today, and Ms. Banks will be explaining the recommendation, but the Commission will make the final decision about the amount of the penalty that will be

1 imposed.

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So if you choose to testify about how you're getting out of the household goods business, I will allow you to make a statement explain -- explaining how you plan to do that or how you've already done it; and depending on what proof you can provide, you should be able to reach an agreement with Staff resolving the matter with the Commission completely, and you can speak to Ms. Banks about that during the recess.

And if you choose to contest the allegations, like I said, we will schedule another hearing, so it would help to know your schedule for the next month or so when you come up here and be ready to -- to set that time.

So after I hear from each of you, we'll take a break, and that will provide Commission Staff time to meet with each of you and prepare a final disposition for your case.

And for most of you, I believe that Ms. Banks will be presenting agreed orders, and that will essentially say that you agree that you were operating without a permit, that you advertised without a permit, and that you agree to stop operating and -- and advertising until you get a permit should you decide to apply for one.

Once you're satisfied that you understand all the terms of the order, you and Ms. Banks will both sign

- 20 you know, I don't own a truck.
- 21 I want to get the permit, you know,
- 22 eventually, but I'm just so small that I don't own a truck
- 23 or a trailer, anything like that, to get the permit. So,
- 24 like, I wouldn't -- I want to get the permit, but I just
- 25 don't have anything to get the permit. You know what I

1 mean? So --JUDGE PEARSON: I do, yes. I understand 2 3 that. I think that you could discuss these options with -with Ms. Banks during the recess, but part of the 4 5 Commission's complaint against you was that you made an 6 offer to perform the move. You wouldn't be here today if 7 you hadn't made an offer to perform a move that included a 8 truck. So if you --9 MR. JUNELL: Gotcha. 10 JUDGE PEARSON: -- want to contest that, it 11 will be Staff's evidence against whatever evidence --12 MR. JUNELL: Against me. Yeah. 13 JUDGE PEARSON: -- you might have, so just 14 bear that in mind if you -- if you decide that you want to 15 actually schedule a hearing to claim that that never 16 happened. 17 MR. JUNELL: Yeah. But, I mean, that's --18 that's essentially what it is. Yeah. Because, I mean, I 19 don't -- you know, I don't have any trucks or anything like 20 that, so I -- I can't get the household goods move permit, 21 you know? 22 So I just have to go that route to explain, 23 you know, my end of -- you know, my evidence and everything 24 like that furthermore and then, I guess, kind of go from there. You know what I mean? 25

1 JUDGE PEARSON: Yes. And I understand what 2 you're saying; however, we routinely have companies in here 3 who, despite not having trucks, still offer to perform 4 moves, because they will rent their own truck and provide 5 it for the customer, so --6 MR. JUNELL: Yeah. Yeah. No. No, I -- no, 7 I -- I understand. That's a --8 JUDGE PEARSON: Right. So this is -- either 9 option would work for you, because it sounds like you 10 understand the law now and that --11 MR. JUNELL: Yeah, I do. 12 JUDGE PEARSON: -- you would agree to cease 13 and desist until such time that you get a truck and are 14 ready to get a permit. 15 MR. JUNELL: Yeah. And that -- oh, sorry. 16 JUDGE PEARSON: Go ahead. 17 MR. JUNELL: That's just -- yeah. That's the 18 thing is because, like, what I advertise or -- you know, 19 on, like, my Facebook page or my website, after I talked to 20 Ms. Banks, like, a year ago after I learned all the rules 21 and everything, because I'm just so new into the business 22 that I -- as of today and from a year ago, nothing has 23 changed. 24 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. 25 MR. JUNELL: So -- and when I discussed, you

1 know, "Hey, is everything on my website and Facebook page 2 okay, you know, as far as me being a labor-only?" You 3 know, so I just don't -- I don't know what I could show you to show that I've tooken my -- you know, my labor-only, you 4 5 know, moving company, like --6 JUDGE PEARSON: Well --7 MR. JUNELL: -- off, you know. 8 JUDGE PEARSON: -- you can actually show that 9 to Ms. Banks during the break. I would recommend -- rather 10 than us scheduling a hearing at this point in time, I would 11 recommend that you have a chance to speak with Ms. Banks --12 MR. JUNELL: Before --13 JUDGE PEARSON: -- about what your options 14 are before you make that decision. 15 MR. JUNELL: Okay. 16 JUDGE PEARSON: Because, again, you would be 17 alleging and trying to prove that the evidence that Staff 18 has put forward is false, and that would be a pretty large 19 burden for you to overcome --20 MR. JUNELL: Yeah. No. 21 JUDGE PEARSON: -- if she has documentation, 22 you know, of -- of a move offer --23 MR. JUNELL: Yeah. 24 JUDGE PEARSON: -- and previous

advertisements.

You can either agree to cease and desist providing and advertising and offering to provide moving services until you apply for a permit, if you decide to do so, and that would involve showing me documentation that you have taken down any ads or a website that advertises moving services.

Or you can ask for a formal classification hearing, which means you would be contesting the allegations that you're performing or advertising household goods moves and that you would want a hearing to essentially prove that you're not conducting household goods moves.

So right now, I just want to hear from you which option you want to pursue this morning, and then we will take a recess, and each of you will have an opportunity to speak with Ms. Banks about which option you wish to choose.

And if you can reach an agreed order, you know, to cease and desist providing services and then also an agreement on the penalty amount, then we would come back and -- and enter that order after the break.

So do you know which option you would like to pursue?

MR. WILLIS: I think at this time I'd like --

1 is there a way to redo this hearing? Because I had everything that I needed to submit for the permit prior to 2 3 coming here, but I have some other legal issues that I 4 can't really discuss --5 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. 6 MR. WILLIS: -- that precludes me from having 7 any of that paperwork. 8 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So basically the best 9 option in that case would probably be the agreement to 10 cease and desist, because that's not saying that you can't 11 get a permit at some point in the future; it's just saying 12 that you understand that, until you have that permit, you 13 can't advertise or offer to provide moves. 14 MR. WILLIS: Yeah. Yeah. 15 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Does that sound 16 like --17 MR. WILLIS: That's fine. 18 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. That sounds good. Do 19 you have any questions, then, for me? 20 MR. WILLIS: No. 21 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Ms. Banks, do you have 22 a recommendation regarding a cease and desist order? 23 MS. BANKS: Staff would recommend and agree with a cease and desist order. 24

JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you. All right.

1 You can go ahead and take a seat until the recess, and then you'll get called back to speak with Staff. 2 3 MR. WILLIS: All right. 4 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay? 5 Docket TV-160215, Darryl Horne. Good 6 morning, Mr. Horne. 7 MR. HORNE: Good morning. 8 If you could raise your right JUDGE PEARSON: 9 hand and stay standing. 10 11 DARRYL HORNE, witness herein, having been 12 first duly sworn on oath, 13 was examined and testified 14 as follows: 15 16 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Go ahead and have a 17 seat. And if you could state your first and last name for 18 the record and spell your last name for the court reporter. 19 MR. HORNE: Darryl Horne, H-O-R-N-E. 20 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And what is your 21 position with the company? 22 MR. HORNE: Owner. 23 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And how do you want to 24 proceed this morning? MR. HORNE: Cease and desist. I -- I --25

1 understand what you're signing. I will sign the order on 2 the record today, and you will leave here with a copy of 3 it. 4 So anything else before we take a break? 5 MS. BANKS: Nothing. 6 MR. HORNE: Excuse me. 7 JUDGE PEARSON: Yes? 8 MR. HORNE: Are you saying I'm being fined 9 \$5,000? 10 JUDGE PEARSON: Well, the penalty that Staff 11 has recommended at this point is \$5,000, but you'll have an 12 opportunity to meet with Ms. Banks about negotiating that 13 penalty substantially lower than what Staff is asking for. 14 So what we typically do is suspend -- the 15 majority of the penalty would be suspended, so it would be 16 something that hangs out there to keep you from engaging in this business again. It would be a very small portion, 17 18 typically, that's paid today. 19 So I don't know if you had a chance to talk 20 to Ms. Banks about that ahead of time, but Staff typically 21 recommends that a \$4,500 portion of the penalty be 22 suspended and only a \$500 portion be paid. 23 MR. HORNE: That's still a lot to me. JUDGE PEARSON: Well, you can also discuss 24 25 payment plan options with Staff, because we typically offer

1 that to people as well. 2 So any other questions before we go off the 3 record to take a break? 4 Okay. Then we are at recess and, Ms. Banks, 5 you can call me in my office when you're ready. 6 Thank you. 7 (Off the record from 9:24 a.m. to 11:27 a.m.) 8 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. We will be back on the 9 record at 11:25 this morning. I understand that the cease 10 and desist orders have been explained and presented to each 11 of you, so I will call you back up one at a time in the 12 order that we went in before. 13 So first is TV-160211, Justin Junell. 14 MS. BANKS: May I please approach the Bench? 15 JUDGE PEARSON: Sure. 16 Okay. So you can have a seat. So, 17 Mr. Junell, did you have a chance to read through the 18 order? 19 MR. JUNELL: Yes, I did. Thank you. 20 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And you understand all 21 five pages prior to the signature page? 22 MR. JUNELL: Yes, Your Honor. 23 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And it looks like you 24 and Ms. Banks have both signed it. 25 MR. JUNELL: Yes.

1 JUDGE PEARSON: And just for the record, it 2 looks like, in this case, Ms. Banks, you've recommended 3 that the Commission find two violations, one for offering a 4 move and one for advertising; is that correct? 5 MS. BANKS: We actually changed it so that we 6 only found one violation, and that was for offering a move. 7 JUDGE PEARSON: Oh, I see. Okay. So the 8 penalty will be for 2,500 instead of 5,000 --9 MS. BANKS: That's correct. 10 JUDGE PEARSON: -- for the recommendation. 11 Okay. And a \$2,250 portion will be suspended for a period 12 of two years? 13 MS. BANKS: That is correct. 14 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And it looks like you paid the unsuspended portion of the \$250 today already? 15 16 MR. JUNELL: Yep. 17 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So is there 18 any -- any questions about what we talked about earlier? 19 MR. JUNELL: No questions. 20 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So you are agreeing to 21 shut down operations or perform labor-only moves --22 MR. JUNELL: Correct. 23 JUDGE PEARSON: -- unless you get a permit --24 MR. JUNELL: Yes, Your Honor. 25 JUDGE PEARSON: -- in the future?

1 MR. JUNELL: Yes. 2 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And you understand how 3 the suspension works, which is it's effective for two years 4 from today's date, which means that if Staff finds that 5 you're advertising to conduct moves that involve a truck or 6 that otherwise require a permit, that that remaining \$2250 7 would become immediately due and payable? 8 MR. JUNELL: Yes, Your Honor. 9 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And the order to cease 10 and desist is permanent; that portion doesn't expire, so --11 MR. JUNELL: Yeah. 12 JUDGE PEARSON: -- if sometime after the 13 two-year period Staff were to find that you were conducting 14 moves without a permit, they could bring you back in and 15 ask for -- or they can actually go straight to superior 16 court and seek enforcement of the order --17 MR. JUNELL: Okay. 18 JUDGE PEARSON: -- and substantially higher penalties at that time, so just want to make sure 19 20 you understand --21 MR. JUNELL: Yes. Completely understand this. 22 23 JUDGE PEARSON: -- everything. Okay. 24 And since you've already paid the penalty 25 today, we don't have to worry about that.

1 Do you have any additional questions? You 2 understand legally what you can and can't do --3 MR. JUNELL: Yep. That's correct. 4 JUDGE PEARSON: -- at this time? Okay. 5 MR. JUNELL: And I also -- I mean, any time I 6 want to try and get a permit down the road, that's okay to 7 do, though; correct? 8 JUDGE PEARSON: Yes. 9 MR. JUNELL: Okay. Yeah. No other questions. 10 11 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Great. Then I will 12 sign this and hand it back to Ms. Banks. 13 MR. JUNELL: Awesome. 14 JUDGE PEARSON: Thank you for coming today. You're free to leave. 15 16 MR. JUNELL: All right. Thank you, Your 17 Honor. 18 JUDGE PEARSON: Oh, that's right. She's 19 going to get you a copy of the order, so --20 MR. JUNELL: Okay. Perfect. 21 JUDGE PEARSON: -- wait for that --MR. JUNELL: Okay. 22 23 JUDGE PEARSON: -- and then -- and then 24 you're free to go at that point in time. 25 MR. JUNELL: Thank you, Your Honor.

1 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And next is TV-160212, Nicholas Griffin. 2 3 And, Mr. Griffin, you had a chance to look 4 over the order, and you understand --MR. GRIFFIN: Yes, I do. 5 6 JUDGE PEARSON: -- what you're signing today? 7 Okay. 8 So this does look like Staff has recommended 9 two violations here, one for offering and one for 10 advertising; is that correct? 11 MS. BANKS: That is correct. 12 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And it looks like you 13 both signed the order and have agreed to a payment plan. 14 You made a \$100 payment today? 15 MR. GRIFFIN: Mm-hmm. 16 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And you do understand 17 that if you fail to --18 MR. GRIFFIN: That's get paid. Trust me --19 JUDGE PEARSON: -- make those payments --20 MR. GRIFFIN: -- it'll get paid. 21 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. 22 MR. GRIFFIN: I -- I pay my bills. 23 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And if -- if for some 24 reason your payment's going to be late, just contact Staff. It's always best to let them know if something comes up so 25

JUDGE PEARSON: Well, if Staff is satisfied 9 10 with that arrangement, then it's fine with me, so I will go 11 ahead and sign the order. 12 And do you have any questions? 13 MR. WILLIS: No, ma'am. 14 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And you understand about how the -- the penalty works? That you need to make 15 16 those payments or you --17 MR. WILLIS: Yeah. 18 JUDGE PEARSON: -- face imposition of the 19 full amount? 20 MR. WILLIS: (Nods head.) 21 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And the payment plan, 13 it looks like you made a \$100 payment today --14 MR. HORNE: Yes. 15 JUDGE PEARSON: -- and that you have a 16 payment due on May 18th and June 17th. And you do 17 understand that you need to make those payments timely 18 or -- or contact Staff if you're unable to to avoid the 19 imposition of the full penalty; correct? 20 MR. HORNE: Yeah. 21 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And you understand the 22 requirement to cease and desist --23 MR. HORNE: Yes. 24 JUDGE PEARSON: -- unless and until you get a 25 permit from the Commission?
