NOTICE OF PENALTIES INCURRED AND DUE FOR VIOLATIONS OF LAWS AND RULES

PENALTY ASSESSMENT: TV-240672 PENALTY AMOUNT: \$12,900

The Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (Commission) believes John Frank LLC (John Frank or Company) violated Washington Administrative Code (WAC) 480-15-555, Criminal Background Checks for Prospective Employees; and WAC 480-15-560, Vehicle and Driver Safety Requirements, which adopts Title 49 Code of Federal Regulations (49 C.F.R.) Part 391 - Qualifications of Drivers, 49 C.F.R. Part 393 - Parts and Accessories Necessary for Safe Operation, and 49 C.F.R. Part 395 - Hours of Service of Drivers.

Revised Code of Washington (RCW) 81.04.405 allows penalties of \$100 for each violation. In the case of an ongoing violation, every day's continuance is considered a separate and distinct violation.

On September 3, 2024, Commission Motor Carrier Safety Investigator Tracy Cobile completed a routine safety investigation of John Frank and documented the following violations:

- Three violations of WAC 480-15-555(1) Failing to complete a criminal background check for every person the carrier intends to hire. The Company failed to acquire criminal background checks prior to hiring employees Oleksandr Bahrii, Oleh Bychkiv, and Oleksandr Talan.
- One hundred twenty-three violations of 49 C.F.R. § 391.45(a) Using a driver not medically examined and certified. John Frank allowed drivers Oleksandr Bahrii, Oleh Bychkiv, and Anton Korovchenko to operate a motor vehicle without a valid medical certificate on 123 occasions between February 14, 2024, and August 14, 2024.
- Three violations of 49 C.F.R. § 391.51(b)(2) Failing to maintain inquiries into driver's driving record in driver's qualification file. The Company failed to maintain inquiries into the driving record of Oleh Bychkiv, Oleskii Guk, and Anton Korovchenko.
- One violation of 49 C.F.R. § 393.41 Inoperative parking brake. Commission staff (Staff) discovered one motor vehicle operating with a defective parking brake system. The vehicle was placed out-of-service. ¹
- Four hundred twenty-four violations of 49 C.F.R. § 395.8(k)(1) Failing to preserve driver's record of duty status for six months. John Frank failed to retain its drivers'

record of duty status documents to identify when employees Oleksandr Bahrii, Oleh Bychkiv, Oleskii Guk, and Anton Korovchenko were operating a commercial motor vehicle.

The Commission considered the following factors in determining the appropriate penalties for these violations:

- 1. How serious or harmful the violations are to the public. The violations noted are serious and potentially harmful to the public. Household goods moving companies that:
 (1) fail to conduct criminal background checks prior to hiring their employees, (2) use drivers who are not medically certified, (3) fail to maintain inquiries into drivers' driving records, (4) operate motor vehicles in need of repair, and (5) fail to preserve their drivers' record of duty status put their customers, their customers' belongings, and the traveling public at risk. These violations present safety concerns.
- 2. Whether the violations were intentional. Considerations include:
 - Whether the Company ignored Staff's previous technical assistance; and
 - Whether there is clear evidence through documentation or other means that shows the Company knew of and failed to correct the violations.

On February 17, 2023, the Commission received the Company's application for household goods moving authority. In the application, Anton Korovchenko, owner of John Frank, acknowledged the Company's responsibility to understand and comply with applicable motor carrier safety laws and regulations.

On March 23, 2023, Anton Korovchenko attended household goods training provided by Staff and acknowledged receiving training pertaining to motor carrier safety regulations.

The Company knew or should have known about these requirements.

- 3. Whether the Company self-reported the violations. John Frank did not self-report these violations.
- 4. Whether the Company was cooperative and responsive. The Company was cooperative throughout the safety inspection.
- 5. Whether the Company promptly corrected the violations and remedied the impacts. John Frank has not provided Staff with evidence of correction.
- 6. **The number of violations.** Staff identified 19 violation types with a total of 594 occurrences during the routine safety investigation of John Frank. Of those violations, Staff identified five violation types with 554 individual occurrences that warrant a penalty in accordance with the Commission's Enforcement Policy.

- 7. **The number of customers affected**. John Frank last reported traveling 45,690 miles for 2023. These safety violations present a public safety risk.
- 8. **The likelihood of recurrence.** The Company was provided technical assistance with specific remedies to help the Company assess how well its safety management controls support safe operations and how to begin improving its safety performance. In light of these factors, Staff believes the likelihood of recurrence is low.
- 9. The Company's past performance regarding compliance, violations, and penalties. The Company has no history of penalties for safety violations.
- 10. **The Company's existing compliance program.** Anton Korovchenko is responsible for the Company's safety compliance program.
- 11. **The size of the Company.** The Company employs four drivers and operates four commercial motor vehicles. The Company reported \$405,996 gross revenue in 2023.

The Commission's Enforcement Policy provides that some Commission requirements are so fundamental to safe operations that the Commission will issue mandatory penalties for each occurrence of a first-time violation.² The Commission generally will assess penalties by violation category, rather than per occurrence, for first-time violations of those critical regulations that do not meet the requirements for mandatory penalties. The Commission will assess penalties for any equipment violation meeting the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration's "out-of-service" criteria and also for repeat violations of critical regulations, including each occurrence of a repeat violation.

The Commission has considered these factors and determined that it should penalize John Frank \$12,900 (Penalty Assessment), calculated as follows:

- Three violations of WAC 480-15-555(1) Failing to complete a criminal background check for every person the carrier intends to hire. The Commission assesses a penalty of \$100 for each occurrence of these first-time critical violations, for a total of \$300.
- One hundred twenty-three violations of 49 C.F.R. § 391.45(a) Using a driver not medically examined and certified. The Commission assesses a penalty of \$100 for each occurrence of these first-time critical violations, for a total of \$12,300.
- Three violations of 49 C.F.R. § 391.51(b)(2) Failing to maintain inquiries into driver's driving record in driver's qualification file. The Commission assesses a \$100 "per category" penalty for these first-time critical violations.

- One violation of 49 C.F.R. § 393.41 Inoperative parking brake. The Commission assesses a penalty of \$100 for this out-of-service violation.
- Four hundred twenty-four violations of 49 C.F.R. § 395.8(k)(1) Failing to preserve driver's record of duty status for 6 months. The Commission assesses a \$100 "per category" penalty for these first-time critical violations.

This information, if proven at a hearing and not rebutted or explained, is sufficient to support the Penalty Assessment.

Your penalty is due and payable now. If you believe the violations did not occur, you may deny committing the violations and contest the penalty through evidence presented at a hearing or in writing. Alternatively, if there is a reason for the violations that you believe should excuse you from the penalty, you may ask for mitigation (reduction) of the penalty through evidence presented at a hearing or in writing. The Commission will grant a request for hearing only if material issues of law or fact require consideration of evidence and resolution in a hearing. Any request to contest the violations or for mitigation of the penalty must include a written statement of the reasons supporting that request. Failure to provide such a statement will result in denial of the request. See RCW 81.04.405.

If you properly present your request for a hearing and the Commission grants that request, the Commission will review the evidence supporting your dispute of the violations or application for mitigation in a Brief Adjudicative Proceeding before an administrative law judge. The administrative law judge will consider the evidence and will notify you of their decision.

You must act within 15 days after receiving this notice to do one of the following:

- Pay the amount due.
- Contest the occurrence of the violations.
- Admit the violations but request mitigation of the penalty amount.

If you do not act within 15 days, the Commission may take additional enforcement action, including but not necessarily limited to suspending or revoking your certificate to provide
