- Code compliance issues at Semiahmoo Marina, re-installation of FDC & updates to standpipe system on the dock.
- Sale of Station 71 (Lynden) and relocation of Sheriff's patrol division
- Retiring two of District 21 debt payments on the Lynden Station and Andgar properties
- Working with the County to update its comprehensive plan to include our department's capital facilities plan and adopted response standards
- Completion and refinement of Dept.'s Hose and Ladder testing procedures
- Participation in both the County Firefighter Recruit Academy and our own joint Lynden/NWFR Recruit Academy
- We spear-headed the Emergency Services involvement from the U.S. side in the 9-11 Memorial Service and Ride held annually at the U.S./Canadian Border Peach Arch Park
- Labor negotiations began in October and are continuing into 2015
- Participated in countywide training and preparations for Ebola Virus, identifying Tsunami evacuations routes and crude oil rail shipments
- Applied for and received FEMA Fire Act grant to install vehicle exhaust removal systems in apparatus bays of Station 61 & 63 as well as the shop
- We received Financial & Accountability Audits for 2012/2013, both were clean


Department Overview

North Whatcom Fire and Rescue was formed December 7, 2006, from a vote to merge Whatcom County Fire Protection District #3 and Whatcom County Fire Protection District #13. In January 2007 the Fire District officially changed their name to Whatcom County Fire Protection District #21 and operates as North Whatcom Fire & Rescue.

North Whatcom formed a functional consolidation with Whatcom County Fire Protection District #4 on July 1, 2011.

District Statistics

- Service area including District 4 is one-hundred eighty-two square miles.
- Varied land use that includes forestry, rural and rural agricultural, suburban, urban and some commercial and light industrial.
- The Fire District operates twelve fire stations strategically located throughout the district.
- The City of Blaine includes two marinas, two border crossing stations, and Interstate 5 running parallel to and acting as a feeder into the city.
- The Fire District operates forty-nine pieces of apparatus including fire engines, tenders, two ladder trucks, brush trucks, ambulances and some specialized apparatus.
- The Fire District is classified as a "combination" fire district incorporating both paid and volunteer "on-call" personnel.
- The Fire District has forty-nine full paid firefighters, seventy volunteers including ten support staff members.
- Fire District operations include fire response, emergency medical services including basic life support (BLS) transport, hazardous materials response at the operations level, some limited rescue, and fire prevention and public education activities.











Calls by Station Response

*career stations




Monthly Incident Responses

(district responds to more than one call simultaneously)










Responses by Type

Calls by Day of Week







Calls by Apparatus Response


BLS Aid Unit / Ambulance Responses (basic life support vehicle equipped for taking sick or injured people to the hospital)




Engine Responses (large motor vehicle that carry firefighters and equipment and support extinguishing operations to a fire)

Responses Times

NWFR continues to focus on reducing incident response times. Faster response times mean decreased damage to property and better outcomes in life-threatening medical emergencies.

Even with crews in quarters there are times when a twelve to fourteen minute response time occurs because of long distance travel throughout the one hundred eighty-two square miles the district protects.



Many fire service organizations in the area have entered into automatic aid agreements to improve response times across the county. In 2013, the district entered into an automatic aid agreement to coincide with their mutual aid agreement with the City of Lynden Fire Department to improve response times to the district's area north of the City of Lynden.

The single biggest obstacle to improving response times to the standard adopted by the Board of Fire Commissioners is staffing limitations.

Urban

OPERATIONS

Staying connected to our community is a priority. Career and volunteer staff participated in multiple community events and fundraisers such as the Birch Bay Discovery Days, Blaine Fourth of July parade and fireworks, Pumpkin Carving Party, Pancake Breakfast, Camp Horizon, distribution of Tsunami emergency flyers, the 911 Memorial Ride, Thanksgiving Baskets, and many others.



2014 Highlights

2014 was a busy year for the operations division. Crews ran a total of 3,361 calls which is the highest in District history. Responses were mostly for emergency medical incidents with fires and public assistance calls making up the remainder. Fire District 21 and 4 continued to work together seamlessly under a consolidation agreement.



In 2013, the decision was made to sell Lynden Station 71. The crews were relocated to Laurel Station 69 in July 2013 and the station was sold in May 2014. This move has placed full time crews closer to an urban area and overall decreased

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FF Health and wellness continues to be a priority. Award of a Federal Assistance to Firefighters Grant allowed the installation of a vehicle exhaust removal system at Station 63 (Birch Bay Station) and the upgrading of the existing system at Station 61 (Blaine Station). These systems will reduce the amount of exhaust fumes that firefighters are exposed to.

Firefighters conducted annual hose and ladder testing, began a tool identification and inventory program, conducted business Inspections in the City of Blaine, and participated in annual fitness evalua-



tions. Firefighters also received special training on how to respond to a suspected Ebola case.

Operations continued to foster relationships with our regional partners to streamline and consolidate processes that are a benefit to all. In 2014 North Whatcom Fire Rescue began working with the Northwest Regional Council to refer patients that request assistance with social services. This voluntary program has so far assisted fifteen District residents in connecting with an appropriate social service based on their specific needs.

As I look forward to 2015, my goal is to continue to lead the operations division and focus on achieving the vision and mission of the organization.




Joint Academy Spring 2014

Our two agencies combined resources and successfully trained 11 new volunteer firefighters to join our forces. These recruits will be actively responding to calls early in 2015 both from the City of Lynden as well as Station 72 Northwood.

We also had the opportunity to burn a donated house in the Birch Bay area early in the year. The property owner wanted this old house taken down for new development which provided our crews the chance to gain some valuable live fire time in a real building.

SPECIAL PROJECTS

2014 Highlights

Birch Bay Station 63 / Blaine Station 61 Exhaust Removal System

NWFR was successful in obtaining a 2013 Assistance to Firefighters Grant request for two vehicle exhaust removal systems for Birch Bay Station 63 and Blaine Station 61. The exhaust removal system will reduce soot and exhaust emissions resulting in a healthier work environment for firefighters. Work was completed on Birch Bay Station 63 in December and Blaine Station 61 will be completed in early 2015. The grant requires a ten percent match by the district.

Aid 69 (AP115) Engine Replacement

During a routine brake job, head gasket leaks on the 6.0 liter diesel engine was discovered on Aid 69 (AP115). To save money, NWFR made the decision to have the shop maintenance crew replace the motor. The shop did an outstanding job of completing the difficult repair in eight days.

Bunker Gear

2014 was a busy year for bunker gear at North Whatcom Fire and Rescue. All personal protective equipment (PPE) was moved from Lynden Station 71 and brought to Britton Loop Station 12. Part of building D was retrofitted to store all the incoming gear and all the extra pieces of our structural firefighting ensemble. In 2014 all gear (*new and previously issued*) was inspected, inventoried and data was inputted into our firehouse system in an effort to better track all gear. Once documented the gear is ready to be issued out as replacement gear or to new members.

After reviewing several bids for new bunker gear, North Whatcom purchased 15 sets of globe turnouts to replace turnouts that were failing inspection and would not be cost effective to repair.

Apparatus Upgrade

To help maintain an efficient fleet of support vehicles NWFR replaced a 1986 Chevy Suburban with a used 2005 GMS Passenger Van. This vehicle is a nineteen years newer and also gives the district the ability to transport larger groups of members to trainings or incidents. The Chevy Suburban was sold at auction in September, 2014.











PREVENTION & EDUCATION

2014 Highlights

Fire Safety Education

Fire Safety and Public Education Programs were presented to over 1,400 students in local schools and Senior Community Group members.

Station Tours

North Whatcom Fire and Rescue frequently opens up its doors on request to accommodate large group of students to share their fire safety knowledge. Many of the lessons augment what the students are already learning in school. Groups are given tours of the station, engine and ambulances. Weather permitting students are also given the chance to test their aim with a fire hose. Tours are provided to area schools, local day care facilities, scout troops, church groups and the general public.

Fire Extinguisher Training

Occasionally the District is asked by local businesses to provide specific training. Fire extinguisher training is available upon request.

CPR Training

North Whatcom Fire and Rescue offered free monthly Friends and Family CPR classes at numerous stations within the district. The course was designed for friends and family members of the general community who want to learn CPR but do not need a course completion card.

Blood Pressure Checks

Every Thursday from 11:00 a.m. until 12:00 p.m. the Blaine Station 61 crew can be found providing free blood pressure checks at the Blaine Senior Center. This gives firefighters a chance to meet people in the community and offer safety information. Free blood pressure checks are also available at any of the four career stations.

Home Depot Safety Fair

North Whatcom Fire and Rescue participated in the 2014 Home Depot Safety Fair. NWFR's role was to educate children and their families through the use of the fire safety house.

COMMUNITY EVENTS

Pancake Breakfast / Bike Rodeo

NWFR held a pancake breakfast / bike rodeo on Saturday, September 6 at Britton Loop Station 12. Children of all ages enjoyed a free breakfast, the fire safety house and a bike rodeo. Volunteers and career firefighters along with administration and a few fire commissioners were on hand to ensure everyone had a good time while learning bike safety.

Haulin' Axe Run/Walk

The Haulin' Axe is a 5K trail run or a 2 mile walk from Barkley Haggen to Bloedel Donovan following the Rail-road trail.

The 2014 Run was held on Sunday, May 18. A shuttle was set up for those needing to return to the starting line. District apparatus was set up for tours near the finish line.

Proceeds from this event went to Mountain Rescue and Royal Family Kids. Many local businesses donated prizes for the raffle.

North Lake Loop Block Party

NWFR participated in neighborhood block party hosted by North Lake Community Church on Wednesday, July 30. The event featured a classic car show, live music, face painting and a bouncy house. The Britton Loop Station 12 crew provided fire safety education with the fire safety house and tested the skills of future firefighters as they battled mock smoke and flames with a booster line from Brush 12.

Friends and Family CPR Classes

NWFR offered free monthly CPR classes to the community at various stations around the district. Approximately 455 people ages 13-92 were educated in CPR/AED/Choking for and adult, child and infant.









Community Pumpkin Party

NWFR opened up Britton Loop station 12 on Monday, October 27 for a community pumpkin party. Families were invited to carve pumpkins, make crafts and play games.

Community Assistance Program

Members of NWFR teamed up with the Community Meals of Blaine Program to help serve dinner on two separate occasions at the Blaine Senior Center. Approximately 25 volunteers utilizing over 77 hours served over 100 guests during one meal.

Ramp Build

Local 106 NW Union members often come together to build ramps for community members as the need arises. This year the group was involved in building two ramps.

Blaine Thanksgiving Baskets

Blaine's Community Assistance Program provided Thanksgiving baskets to 338 families. NWFR firefighters donated their time by hanging the banner, transporting the donated foods from local businesses as well as loading baskets into recipients' vehicles.

Santa Run

NWFR supported Whatcom County Project Santa by having a Santa Run on Saturday, December 6 to collect donations for the charity, serve hot chocolate, provide apparatus tours and socialize with the community.

9-11 Memorial Ride

NWFR was instrumental in planning and participating the 9-11 Memorial Ride that began at the Swinomish Casino Resort in Anacortes and ended at Blaine Peach Arch Park where a ceremony took place honoring those who died on the attacks of September 11, 2011.

HEALTH & WELLNESS

- April 2014 marked the beginning of our fitness testing for the year with our VO2 Max testing. The vast majority of the body scored within the Good and Excellent fitness categories.
- In May of 2014 we continued our Air Management Course at Birch Bay station 63 for all career crews as well as an evening training for volunteers. Anaerobic threshold scores from VO2 Max testing and bottle consumption time for Air Management Testing were correlated together.
- Annual physical fitness assessments were conducted in October again this year. The majority of testing scores showed that individuals were maintaining their fitness at appropriate levels. Due to weather conditions in late October, annual physical fitness assessments will be bumped up a month and will be held in September 2015.



• All three annual testing processes were organized for each member on an individual spreadsheet for their personal knowledge as well as to aid with review of progression, maintenance or regression from year to year.

2014 Highlights

Emergency Responder Fitness Challenge: The winning team from this year's emergency responder fitness challenge was a North Whatcom team again with B Shift's "In Schwab We Trust" taking first place. This team was comprised of Rob Mulrooney, Darren Bruya and Brandon Lee. Brandon also took the prize for best male in the challenge.

Lake Padden Tri June 2014: This year Kaleb Bruch jumped in again completing his second Lake Padden Tri, joining him was Troy Freeman for his first triathlon event. Kaleb, Troy and Joel are all signed up to compete in a ¹/₂ Ironman event in June 2015

Lake Padden Half Marathon: In October Joel Sellinger completed this event coming in at 71/210. Great job Joel!
