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### PROCEEDINGS 1 JUDGE MOSS: Good morning, everyone. My name is Dennis Moss. I'm an Administrative Law Judge for the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission. We 5 are convened today in Port Angeles to have our 6 evidentiary phase in the matters styled Heckman Motors, 7 Inc. doing business as Olympic Bus Lines for Extension 8 of Authority Under Certificate of Public Convenience and 9 Necessity Number C-992, and that is Docket Number 10 TC-000676, and in the consolidated matter In Re 11 Application Number D-78916, Jeffrey Lynn Porter doing 12 business as Pennco Transportation, for Extension of 13 Authority Under Certificate of Public Convenience and 14 Necessity Number C-1054, and that is Docket Number TC-000835. 15 16 I have discussed off the record what our 17 agenda today will be, and as I indicated then, the first 18 order of business will be to take appearances, and we 19 will begin with the appearance for the applicant, 20 Heckman Motors, Inc. 21 MR. JACK HECKMAN: I'm Jack Heckman, and my 22 address is 111 East Front Street in Port Angeles. My phone number is area code (360) 452-4774, and I'm the 24 acting president of Heckman Motors, Incorporated.

JUDGE MOSS: We will have to speak up a

00040 1 little bit. There's a little bit of a mechanical noise in the background, and so if everybody will speak up a little bit, that will help the reporter get a good transcript. 5 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: Yourself also, Your 6 Honor. 7 JUDGE MOSS: I'm sorry? MR. JAMES HECKMAN: Yourself also. 8 9 JUDGE MOSS: Are you having a hard time 10 hearing me down there? 11 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: Well, I did during some 12 of your introductory comments. 13 JUDGE MOSS: Okay, well, I typically speak 14 quite loudly, but I think I'm in a softer tone this morning for some reason, so I will do that certainly. 15 And if you do have difficulty hearing anything I say, 17 please do speak up. I sometimes drift. 18 All right, let's have the appearance for 19 Pennco. 20 MR. PORTER: Jeffrey L. Porter, I represent 21 the owner of Pennco Transportation, the address is Post

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1 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: Yes, I am James C. 2 Heckman. I am owner of Heckman Motors, Inc., actually co-owner with my son, and my address is 604 South Ennis, 4 Port Angeles, Washington. JUDGE MOSS: And you're representing Heckman? 6 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: I'm representing Heckman 7 Motors. 8 JUDGE MOSS: All right. Did any of the other 9 interveners, and of course Heckman is one of the 10 applicants here, but did any of the interveners send 11 representatives today? I think not. 12 All right, and for staff? 13 MR. CEDARBAUM: My name is Robert Cedarbaum. 14 I'm an Assistant Attorney General. My business address 15 and phone number have not changed since the prehearing 16 conference. 17 JUDGE MOSS: All right. 18 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: May I ask a question? 19 JUDGE MOSS: Sure. 20 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: Just in understanding 21 your role, what is your role here? MR. CEDARBAUM: Typically the Commission 22 23 likes to have one of its attorneys at the hearing just 24 to make sure that -- well, for two purposes. One is

25 just to help make sure that the record is complete so

1 the Commission can reach the legal questions that it needs to reach in this case. And secondly, if the Commission staff has witnesses that it wishes to put on, 4 then I would do that. At this time, I don't anticipate 5 doing that, so my role here today is really to help with 6 the record. 7 JUDGE MOSS: He's here to help me, as is 8 Ms. Allen. Typically the -- sometimes I do have questions that I like to ask of staff in connection with 10 some prior performance under certificates when we're 11 doing extensions and that sort of thing, so I may call 12 on staff to speak as well, so that's another function. 13 I raised during our off the record comments 14 the subject of waiving the initial decision. The Commission's rules of practice and procedure and the 15 16 statutes under which it operates call for in this 17 circumstance where an administrative law judge is 18 presiding without the Commission on the Bench that the 19 administrative law judge will draft an initial decision 20 in the matter. 21 That initial decision then is subject to a 22 period of 20 days, during which any party to the 23 proceeding may seek Commission review of the order if 24 they disagree with some part of it or would like to see

25 some part it changed, believe it needs to be clarified

1 in some way or what have you, then a party may file a petition for administrative review. And then the Commission will itself take up the matter. The record 4 will be prepared and presented to the commissioners. 5 They will consider the matter, and they will enter a 6 final order in the proceeding.

It sometimes shortens things a little bit and 8 sometimes parties prefer to waive the initial decision, which is their right to do under the law. If you waive 10 the initial decision, then I will prepare the record 11 much in the fashion that I would do on review, present 12 the matter to the commissioners for their determination, 13 and then probably it would be me who would assist them 14 to draft a final order, although it could be someone else who would assist them in that task.

Once the Commission enters its final order 17 either way, then that is subject to petitions for 18 rehearing or reconsideration and ultimately to appeal to the courts.

So the principal I guess I might say 21 advantage of the parties waiving the initial decision is it will probably save two to three weeks in the overall 23 process in terms of getting a final order out of the 24 Commission, which is the authority that you need or will 25 announce that you are not to be given the authority if

00044 1 it comes out that way. The principal advantage I suppose of the initial decision is it gives the parties yet an additional opportunity to present argument on their 5 petitions for review if they don't like something in my 6 decision or think the Commission should change or 7 clarify something that I said in an initial order. 8 So I will ask at this point then whether the 9 parties wish to waive the initial decision, and again 10 I'm just going to follow the order here in the docket 11 numbers, and so I am going to ask Mr. Heckman first 12 whether you would care to waive the initial decision, or 13 if you all wish to discuss it off the record, we can do 14 that so you can decide between yourselves. 15 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: I guess I'm a little 16 confused. 17 JUDGE MOSS: Yes, sir. 18 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: What is the initial 19 decision? 20 JUDGE MOSS: All right, an initial decision 21 would be a decision over my signature, a decision by the administrative law judge. That is not a final action by

MR. JAMES HECKMAN: If we waive it, what

23 the Commission. It is the --

25 happens again?

1 JUDGE MOSS: Then it will go directly to the commissioners, and they will enter a final order in the case. So the initial decision you might view as a step 4 preliminary to a final decision. If there is no initial 5 decision, the commissioners will decide the matter on 6 the basis of the record without the benefit, if that's 7 the right word, of an initial decision by me. If you do 8 not waive, then they will have my initial decision as 9 well as the record. 10 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: Which is what we want. 11 JUDGE MOSS: You would prefer to have the 12 initial decision? 13 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: Yes. 14 JUDGE MOSS: Well, with that, all parties 15 have to waive, so, Mr. Porter, that more or less decides 16 the matter. If either one of you --17 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: I think we're still 18 confused. 19 JUDGE MOSS: All right. 20 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: We want this proceeding 21 to happen. We want to say what we want to say. If we 22 waive, it means we're done? 23 JUDGE MOSS: No, this proceeding will 24 continue. We will have our hearing, we will develop our

25 record. The only difference is whether I will write a

00046 1 decision on the basis of the record, an initial order, MR. JAMES HECKMAN: Well, we want you to 4 write a decision. JUDGE MOSS: -- or whether the Commission 6 itself will write that decision. So it's basically a 7 question of who signs the order. I will sign the 8 initial order. The commissioners will sign the final 9 order. Whether that is a product of two steps or one 10 step is really the issue. 11 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: We want two steps. 12 JUDGE MOSS: That often happens. I have 13 written quite a few initial decisions in these cases. 14 It's basically a matter of a few weeks difference. MR. JAMES HECKMAN: Okay. 15 16 JUDGE MOSS: All right. Well, without waiver 17 by all parties, we can't have a waiver, so I will then 18 prepare an initial decision. 19 That brings us -- well, I did skip over the 20 question of whether there were any -- or did I skip over 21 the question of whether there were any preliminary 22 matters? I'm sure someone would have brought them to my 23 attention.

1 know Mr. Porter has done this with me before so he probably recalls the drill, but Mr. Heckman, I don't recall that we have done this before. Although your 4 company is familiar to me, I'm not sure we have had a 5 live hearing together.

When parties appear pro se, they typically 7 will present testimony on behalf of their own 8 application. And rather than try to go through the 9 formalities of questions and answers and the typical 10 format for developing evidence, testimonial evidence in 11 the record, then parties appearing pro se can simply 12 make a statement for the record that hopefully will 13 cover the essential points.

In the case of the operators or operating 15 testimony, of course, we will typically have presented the application and all of its various attachments, including the financial information and that sort of 18 thing, to make sure that the fitness question is 19 adequately addressed. We're concerned with the, well, 20 in this case, both operators, we're concerned with the 21 operators' financial fitness and otherwise its fitness to provide the service that is being requested, in this 23 case in both dockets an expansion of existing authority.

We're also, of course, and we confront the 25 second question, which is the question of need for the

25

1 service, and that part of the record is developed on the basis of testimony. In this type of proceeding, it will be live testimony from members of the public or perhaps 4 in some cases we have travel agency representatives, 5 types of people who are familiar with the question of 6 whether the service requested is needed in the area 7 requested. 8 And so it's a two step process. I think it 9 will be best if we have the operating witnesses first, 10 and I guess we will just proceed through the one 11 application and then the other in that fashion, unless 12 someone has an alternative suggestion. 13 All right then, Mr. Heckman, two 14 Mr. Heckmans, which of you will be speaking, or will 15 both of you be speaking? 16 MR. JACK HECKMAN: We will both be speaking. 17 JUDGE MOSS: Which one of you prefers to go 18 first? 19 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: We operate a scheduled 20 service between Port Angeles, Sequim, and the greater 21 Seattle area. 22 MR. CEDARBAUM: I'm sorry, we're trying to 23 create a record, and one of the things we need to do is, 24 it seems like a formality, is to swear in the witness.

JUDGE MOSS: Very good point, Mr. Cedarbaum.

              My name is Jim Heckman. I'm the owner of
```

25 Olympic Bus Lines. We operate a scheduled bus service

1 between Port Angeles, Sequim, and the greater Seattle area. We have operated this service now for 18 months, are learning more about it all the time, are learning 4 what we think it will take to make it a viable long-term 5 business. And we have made a lot of mistakes during the 6 first year, running at the wrong time and so on and so 7 forth. And we feel like we're really starting to get 8 our act together figuring out how to make this work. 9 Small market area, not a whole lot of people, 10 although we're carrying as many people now as the prior 11 carrier was carrying some months a few years back. But 12 we realize that, we think anyway, that one of the -- one 13 of the keys to make this profitable and a long-term 14 viable business is to include in a better way than we're doing right now Jefferson County. 15 16 Currently our service runs on Highway 101, 17 directly on Highway 101. We stay there all the way to 18 the bridge. We do service Jefferson County in the sense 19 that if the people want to take the trouble to get out 20 to Highway 101. And so we have currently what we call 21 flag stops, and people who can catch a ride onto Highway

22 101 can -- we will stop for them at certain flag stop 23 locations, and those are indicated on our routing for 24 our current service that we have. I believe it's 25 Smitty's, excuse me, I mean Fat Smitty's and Discovery

1 Bay and also the Hood Canal Bridge, so it's possible to get our service to Seattle if you live in Jefferson County, but not without a substantial amount of trouble. Now we recognize that the Port Townsend area 5 is not nearly as large a marketing area as Sequim and 6 Port Angeles, but nevertheless we know that there is a 7 need for service. We spent considerable time last 8 winter interviewing people in Port Townsend to verify that, in fact, there was a need. And Jack met with the 10 Chamber of Commerce director in Port Townsend, and he 11 was a little bit excited about that possibility, because 12 they have no scheduled bus service out of Port Townsend 13 right now. 14 And so what we -- what we decided to do is to 15 take that step to start the service in Port Townsend on a scheduled basis and run -- purchase an additional bus 17 or two, and run a bus from Port Townsend through 18 Chimicum, through Port Ludlow to the bridge. And at 19 that point, that bus would meet our bus running from 20 Port Angeles Sequim. And then that bus would turn 21 around and come back, a very short run. 22

But since our -- since our load factor in the Port Angeles bus is running around 50%, and I won't -will demonstrate that later on, but since it's running around 40% to 50% on average, we have room and we would

1 love to be able to put a few more people from the Port
   Townsend area on our -- on our buses.
              We have done the arithmetic on it, and we
4 think, you know, we think that that will be not only
5 benefit the people in the area, but we think that that
6 will maybe help our financial situation a little bit.
7 But mostly it's just a completion of a vital link that
8 we had anticipated right along.

17 I would just like to mention too that part of 18 the surveying we did was with Jefferson Transit, Melony 19 Bozack, the director, and we have actually entered into 20 a contractual arrangement to use their Haynes Place Park 21 & Ride in Port Townsend as a terminal pickup service, 22 and I've got that as an exhibit. And they were very 23 excited about the fact that people of Port Townsend 24 would have an alternative form of transportation to the 25 Seattle area.

10 sales manager for Greyhound Bus Lines, that's one of my
11 exhibits also, that shows that we are the only -- we are
12 an agent for Greyhound Bus Lines right now. We are the
   only ones that are allowed to go in and out of the
14 terminal on this route, and we do freight for them also.
              We do the hospitals in the downtown area,
15

   which include Virginia Mason, which is our number one
17
   hospital, about 70% of our passengers go there, Swedish
18 Hospital, Harborview, Polyclinic, the Arnold Medical
19 Pavilion and the Nordstrom Medical Tower. We also
20 service Amtrak, and we go on from there to SeaTac.
21
              And so our basic route starts in Port
22 Angeles. We have a scheduled stop in Sequim, and we do
23 have the flag stops along the way until we get to the
24 Hood Canal Bridge. We take the Edmonds-Kingston ferry
```

25 across into Edmonds, and that's where we head into

- 1 downtown Seattle from there. Stop first at Greyhound,
  2 and then the hospitals, and then SeaTac. Then we
  3 reverse the route coming back home and make two
  4 scheduled trips per day on that route. And with our new
  5 proposed route, the service out of Port Townsend would
  6 be a connection with our existing route that we have
  7 now.
  - Q. All right.
- 9 A. (James Heckman) I want to say just right
  10 now, it's a struggle for the people of Port Townsend to
  11 get to SeaTac, for example. What they have to do is
  12 they have to find a way to get to Bremerton. Bremerton
  13 has a scheduled run, a scheduled service to SeaTac. So
  14 they can have a friend or whatever they can do to, you
  15 know, if they want to get to Seattle now on a scheduled
  16 basis, they got to catch a ride. They've got to catch a

- 2 Q. And you show percentages after each one. Is 3 that  $\ensuremath{\text{--}}$
- A. (Jack Heckman) That's currently the
- 5 percentage of our customer base that is going to each of 6 those individual hospitals now.
- 7 Q. So if I were to add up, basically if I add up 8 all the percentages here, I come up with 100%.
  - A. (Jack Heckman) Correct.
- 10 A. (James Heckman) Do you, does it work that
- 11 way?

- 12 Q. So I guess my question then is, are you not 13 carrying any other passengers in your vans that are 14 going to other places in Seattle?
- 15 A. (Jack Heckman) No, they are going to other 16 places.
- 17 A. (James Heckman) We were just analyzing our 18 hospital business.
- 19 Q. So this isn't total passengers?
- 20 A. (James Heckman) Oh, no.
- Q. Just hospital?
- 22 A. (James Heckman) No, just the hospital.
- 23 Q. And then Exhibit Number 3, this is the
- 24 agreement to use the Park & Ride in Port Townsend that 25 you referenced?

- 1 Α. (Jack Heckman) That's correct.
- (James Heckman) Which is absolutely Α.
- essential for this business.
- Q. Exhibit Number 1 is your application, and it 5 has your proposed schedule and fare structure. Have 6 those remained the same as you would propose to use if 7 this application is granted?
  - Α. (Jack Heckman) Yes.
- 9 Ο. You also included some financial information. 10 Have there been any significant changes to that 11 information since you filed the application?
  - Α. (Jack Heckman) No.
- 13 Α. (James Heckman) When was that filed? Does 14 that include our financial -- our balance sheet? Ιt probably does. We have a current balance sheet. We expected that application to be approved quickly, and it 17 turned out that Shuttle Express in Seattle objected and 18 then -- which held the entire thing back almost a year, 19 so our balance sheet is -- we can update that.
- (Jack Heckman) We have a current balance 20 Α. 21 sheet, if that would be helpful, as of August 2000. 22 JUDGE MOSS: Shall we make that an exhibit? 23 MR. CEDARBAUM: That would be my proposal. JUDGE MOSS: Yeah. 2.4 25

MR. CEDARBAUM: Can we keep this copy?

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- 1 MR. JACK HECKMAN: Yes.
- JUDGE MOSS: What are we up to, 4, all right.
- 3 The current balance sheet of Heckman Motors will be
- 4 Exhibit 4. Any objections? It will be admitted as
- 5 marked.
- 6 BY MR. CEDARBAUM:
- 7 Q. In looking at your application that was 8 filed, the financial statement in that application shows 9 total assets and total liabilities and net worth of 10 about \$1.3 Million. And in Exhibit 4, it's about \$1.75 11 Million. What was the cause of the change there?
- A. (Jack Heckman) Our business goes up drastically this time of year. It includes -- Heckman Motors Incorporated includes not only Olympic Bus Line, but a rental car business, which is a substantial or is the substantial portion of our business. And so our net worth definitely goes up this time of year.
  - Q. So the financial statement includes both --
  - A. (Jack Heckman) Heckman Motors --
- A. (James Heckman) It's Heckman Motors, the financial statement is Heckman Motors, which includes a parking business and several Budget Rent a Car locations throughout the state.
- A. (Jack Heckman) Six Budget Rent a Car locations, Olympic Bus Lines, and Budget Parking, which

- 1 are all included in our corporation.
- Do you know if the certificated part of the 3 business, the van service to Seattle, standing on its 4 own has been profitable?
- Α. (James Heckman) It's been very marginally 6 profitable. We think we have a chance to make a tiny, 7 tiny little bit of money this year depending on what 8 happens October through December. It's a long-term 9 investment for us, but we're pleased with the progress 10 we're making, but we're not there yet.
- 11 In your application on page two, item number Q. 12 12, you show the Port Townsend Park & Ride, that's 13 what's referenced by the contract in Exhibit 3? 14

(Jack Heckman) That's correct.

- You also show the west side of Hood Canal 16 Bridge on Highway 104, so is that the other scheduled 17 stop that you would be making?
- 18 (Jack Heckman) Correct, we have a flag stop A. 19 there currently on our existing route.
- 20 Q. What is that? What is there? What are 21 people, physically, what is there that people flag you 22 down?
- 23 (Jack Heckman) Yeah, we take the reservation 24 in advance, so we know they will be there, so we will 25 know that there will be someone there before we pull

1 over at that point.

- Q. You also show on page three of the 3 application a 1999 Ford van to be purchased at a later 4 date. Did you mean that that would be the van that you 5 would be transporting passengers from Port Townsend to 6 the connection point?
  - Α. (Jack Heckman) That's correct.
- 8 And you're waiting to see if this application 9 is granted as to whether or not to actually purchase 10 that van?
  - Α. (Jack Heckman) That's correct.
- 12 What sort of arrangements have been set up in 13 anticipation of this authority being granted, if it is, 14 for the van purchase to actually occur?
- (Jack Heckman) At this point, the van has 16 now been sold. We didn't expect the length of time to 17 go in between what it did, so we do have to make new 18 arrangements for a new vehicle.
- 19 (James Heckman) I just want to say we are 20 licensed car dealers, and if there's one thing we know 21 how to do, it is to buy a car or a van. Our fleet now 22 consists of approximately 150 vehicles for the rental 23 car business, and we can get a van with a phone call. 24 It's not a problem for us.
  - Q. So you have the financial wherewithal to

- 1 purchase the van?
- 2 A. (Jack Heckman) Oh, yeah, I think our balance 3 sheet indicates that.
- Q. Can you just describe what your maintenance program is for the vans that you operate?
- A. (Jack Heckman) Mm-hm. Our vans go to
  Perry's Tire Service in Port Angeles every 4,000 miles,
  not only for an oil change, but for a complete safety
  inspection on the vehicle, at which time they get
  checked. This is scheduled maintenance, not the
  maintenance on a daily business base. But we have the
  maintenance done an a regular basis. They will check
  everything including the hoses, all the supporting
  undergear of the vehicle, which includes exhaust,
  suspension, brakes are checked at each one of those
- 16 intervals.

  17 We also have daily inspection, which is done
  18 by the attendant we have that works for us. That's all
  19 he is is a maintenance individual. They come in each
  20 day. They're not only washed with all our vehicles, but
- 21 they go through and check all the fluid levels, all the 22 turn signals, visual on tires.
- All of our drivers are instructed at any point if they hear any noise to the vehicle, anything out of the ordinary, to report that right away, and that

16

1 vehicle is flagged so it does not go out on the next scheduled run. That's why we have three vans. Another 3 van will be used for that inspection is done and taken 4 care of to the satisfaction of our maintenance manager, 5 who is Mr. Herb Calkins.

We also do the transmissions every 30,000 7 miles at Tranco Transmissions in Port Angeles, and they 8 service those generally every 30,000 miles on our 9 vehicles. So we feel that we have a very good 10 maintenance program. The records are kept at Perry's 11 Tire so that we've got record on file of all the service 12 that is done to each of those vehicles.

- And the van that you would operate for Port 14 Townsend would be maintained the same?
  - (Jack Heckman) Yes, sir. Α.
- Turning to your employees, can you tell us Q. 17 how many employees you have, whether you will be adding 18 employees to service Port Townsend?
- 19 (Jack Heckman) We have to add two people in Α. 20 Port Townsend. They would be based in Port Townsend. 21 It only makes sense. It wouldn't make sense to drive 22 from Port Angeles to Port Townsend, so we would add two 23 new people to do that.
- 2.4 And what sort of training would you provide Q. 25 them?

- 1 (Jack Heckman) We have to bring them to Port 2 Angeles in order to train them in Port Angeles before we could release them, which would include complete 4 everything that we have to do with our drivers right 5 now, you know, including background check, drug 6 analysis, drug screening, driving tests, which is 7 usually done by myself or by my experienced drivers. 8 And so they would have to go through everything that our current drivers have to go through right now in order to 10 be eligible to drive for us.
- 11 And I assume or am I correct to assume that Q. 12 both your drivers and your vehicles would be properly 13 licensed?
  - Α. (Jack Heckman) Oh, yes, definitely.
- And your company is committed to complying Q. 16 with Commission rules and regulations?

(Jack Heckman) Yes.

MR. CEDARBAUM: Thank you, that's all my

19 questions.

JUDGE MOSS: All right.

20 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: I just want to make one 21 22 final comment regarding this equipment that you bring up 23 is that we have taken this to a different level than 24 anybody else has ever taken it. If you have a chance to 25 look out the window or walk by the kind of vehicle we

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1 have, we purchased three brand new vehicles last year.
   This is equipment that's been started -- we know this
   equipment because we have had it from almost mile one.

   transportation to -- well, within Clallam, Jefferson
14 County over to Seattle area and so on and so forth.
              At that time, we worked together, she got
15
16 input from me, I got some from her, and she spent a
17 great deal of time putting together this book, which has
18 all the transportation providers in Clallam, Jefferson,
19 King, Pierce, all of these counties, so that people
20 could get to and from Seattle for the medical
21 appointments without spending, you know, their savings.
22
              At the time we started working on this, I
23 didn't have the resources to provide this service. We
24 were relatively new and still growing. Now we do have
25 the resources and the means to provide this service.
```

1 There is a big demand for the low income transportation. We're transporting approximately 75 people a month to and from medical appointments in the Seattle area, and 4 they're paying the premium price for our door-to-door 5 service. A lot of these folks are seniors on fixed 6 income as well as people that are on Welfare, Medicaid, 7 so on and so forth. They can't afford the fares that 8 either of us are right now charging, so they're relying 9 on catching a -- if they're Sequim or Port Angeles 10 passengers, they will catch a Clallam Transit to 11 Jefferson Transit to Kitsap Transit and on over to 12 Seattle and a ferry. There's approximately three or 13 four different transfers that they would have to take to 14 get over there on a reasonable fare. So with that in mind, I have proposed this 15 16 fixed route for medical only. And I say only because 17 the vehicle will not be equipped for passengers who want 18 to go to the airport to carry luggage. They will be 19 restricted to one carry-on piece of luggage which has to 20 be in their lap or under the seat. That's not to say 21 that some of the people that might be doing a day trip to SeaTac or what not may, you know, go ahead and hop on 23 the van to go to SeaTac and catch a shuttle from one of 24 the hospitals down in Seattle. 25

I stand to lose a great deal of income by

8

11

1 providing this service as well. The passengers that we're transporting right now are paying a premium 3 service for the door-to-door service. I will probably 4 lose that when I put this service into effect, because 5 they will no longer be using, well, not all of them, but 6 a lot, some will be using the lower cost transportation 7 provided.

And I would like to have Marcie speak on her 9 knowledge of the need and demand for the service since 10 she was -- dealt with it quite a bit.

JUDGE MOSS: Okay, just to make the record 12 perfectly clear, I didn't cut you off there even though 13 we had called Ms. Jaffe as a witness, and I'm going to 14 take your statement as your own testimony with respect to need, and you have been sworn and I know can appear 16 as a witness on your own behalf. And so that's 17 procedurally where we are.

18 And then at this point, if you're through 19 with your statement, then I don't have a difficulty with 20 just a statement from Ms. Jaffe if that will speed 21 things along, or we can proceed in a question and answer 22 format. Is that agreeable to everyone else? Yeah, I 23 think that's easiest when we don't have lawyers 24 participating, just to have the witness statements. 25 then if there are some follow-up questions you have,

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1 that will be fine. And then others will have an
   opportunity to ask questions, including me.

              DIRECT TESTIMONY
12 BY MS. JAFFE:
              I had been working, I don't currently work,
14 for the Olympic area Agency on Aging. They represent
   four counties ringing the Olympic Peninsula. And
   primarily the study that I was working on for a state
17 agency that was created, The Agency Council for
18 Coordinated Transportation, was looking at how do we
19 better coordinate transportation.
20
              My personal experience in working on
21 coordinated transportation included trying to just
   compile everything, and it ended up being this huge
23 binder with lots of pamphlets and fliers, which for most
24 people would be enormously complicated. And on
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25 occasion, I would consolidate the information and try to

25

1 just put it on one piece of paper. And as Jeff was saying, there's quite a handful of transfers. The statement that there's no 4 scheduled service from Port Townsend to Seattle is not 5 true. There is scheduled service, it's just complicated 6 to get there. My discussions with Jeff at various times 7 were how can we provide additional service, because the 8 numbers of seniors that were contacting the Office on Aging knew of both Olympic Bus Line, which they would 10 have to shuttle the 10 or 15 miles out to the main road 11 and get on, or possibly the Pennco service as it 12 existed, but it was a bit too costly for them. 13 Jeff said that he could provide a lower cost 14 service into Seattle but needed to go through the application process, so now we're some number of years 15 later continuing the discussion. And it looked to me 17 the fixed route that Jefferson Transit offers and the 18 one that Olympic Bus Lines is looking to offer are 19 different. So there's some coordination in that they're 20 not entirely overlapping. They would get people into 21 Seattle early in the morning and then pick them up 3:00ish or 4:00ish and return them back to the peninsula 23 if they were able to meet all of their business in one 24 day.

# EXAMINATION

# 2 BY JUDGE MOSS:

- Q. Let me interrupt half a second. You mentioned Jefferson Transit, and I'm not sure who Jefferson Transit is.
- A. Jefferson Transit is the public transit provider that offers fixed route service between Jefferson County and then the adjacent county into Kitsap.
  - Q. Okay.
- 11 A. And yes, there would be a transfer, but it 12 would be fixed route service at a lower cost. And part 13 of the issue here is cost.

# DIRECT TESTIMONY

17 BY MS. JAFFE:

I speak for the numbers of seniors that were calling in to me at the Olympic Area Agency on Aging.
Roughly 25% of the population in Jefferson County is over the age of 65, and some very large number of them are active and able to drive themselves. Quite a few of them as I would learn more of their story were having to ask family members to drive them on these longer

1 I'm excited to see as much fixed route service as is possible, because it could be lower cost, people could start to schedule their medical 4 appointments based on a fixed route service. And if it 5 were lower cost, they could possibly afford it. On behalf of Medicaid transportation, that is 7 a separate issue, and those are provided separately, so 8 I wouldn't necessarily think that this would meet a 9 Medicaid need, although it might be less expensive than 10 what the Medicaid providers are charging right now and 11 so could save the State quite a bit of money. If this 12 route were allowed at this rate, then when the Medicaid 13 broker were being asked to consider which route to get 14 someone to that medical appointment in Seattle, then perhaps this one would be toward the top of the list, because it would get people from their origin to their 17 destination at the hospital. I could speak to that a 18 little bit more. I tried to understand as much as I 19 could about Medicaid transportation. 20 But in the range of \$30ish, I think we're 21 being able to meet a growing demand on the Olympic 22 Peninsula that people can not get the medical need that 23 they have met at Jefferson Hospital, and so they are 24 transporting themselves in very cumbersome ways to 25 Seattle. The ferry costs alone are nearly \$15 round

10

1 trip, so a very big portion with gas costs going up would be affordable to quite a few of the seniors and persons with disability that I was speaking to. On a personal note, I have had challenges,

5 and I have never had a chance to speak to either of the 6 Heckman family, but their sense that they're giving us 7 that this is only their first year and things have 8 changed, you know, on their flier, they say they have 9 been here since 1989.

And I had quite a few people call me with 11 concerns about the quality of the service. Ideally the 12 quality is improving and they're concerned about that as 13 well, but I am not here to say that their service is 14 not, in fact, a decent one, but I have had concerns raised by individuals, so I would like to see as much competition or as many opportunities for providers to 17 survive in this marketplace rather than keep one as sole 18 source and then lock out another one, where if this sole 19 source goes down, we haven't kept the Pennco option 20 available to folks.

21 I would be happy to answer questions. You 22 know, I can stay for another ten minutes. From the 23 little I see, it looks as if a public bus could connect 24 with their fixed route service already at the Hood Canal 25 Bridge. I don't know if that has been discussed. I

23

1 don't know whether Melony Bozack as a representative of Jefferson Transit offered that. I like to see coordination where services are done as efficiently as 4 possible so that no additional costs are incurred and 5 people can save money and time. That would be my 6 encouragement, that to whatever extent someone can look 7 at the best use of the resources if somebody juggles a 8 little bit here or there, they might be able to go with 9 public transit's already existing connections and not 10 add another service. It's just a bit of marketing and 11 information out there.

12 I had a very hard time getting information 13 from this group. Jeff on the other hand saw my 14 intention and was very helpful in trying to get me whatever I needed to put a book together so that seniors 16 and other agencies would have all the information they 17 need. That was my personal experience. I even traveled 18 with my dog on Pennco Transportation, and I had a 19 perfectly wonderful experience using it. As an 20 individual from Jefferson County, I did drive all the 21 way from Port Townsend on Jeff's behalf to be a witness 22 today.

JUDGE MOSS: We thank you for appearing. 24 Just to make the record perfectly clear, you referred a 25 couple of times to their service, and I believe you are

           Ms. Jaffe, did Jeff tell you that the Olympic
        Q.
23 Bus Lines permit changed about a year and a half ago?
        A. I tried working with a group down at the
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25 Budget rental car office. I have gone to your office to

1 try to get information. So if that's the group that it has changed to, I personally have gone down there to work with them.

Did you know that Budget Rent a Car as a part Q. 5 of this does own that permit right now and that it's 6 been a year and a half ago we did buy the permit? We understand that the prior operator did have some older 8 equipment, although probably not as bad as perhaps you 9 thought, especially in the last several years. But a 10 year and a half ago, we purchased this permit, and we 11 put brand new equipment in, and we have an absolutely 12 impeccable record right now. If you were going to be 13 around a little longer, you would hear that.

JUDGE MOSS: Mr. Heckman, I'm going to stop 15 you now. This is your opportunity to ask this witness questions. Now if you want to make a statement later 17 on, I will allow for that. But right now, I would like 18 you to focus on asking any questions you have about this witness's testimony.

- Q. Did you know that the ownership had changed?
- I had heard the ownership had changed. Α.
- 22 Since the ownership has changed, have you 23 heard anything derogatory about our service?
- A. I haven't been in the position to hear 25 updates, so I will trust that things have gotten better.

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- 1 I'm thrilled to hear that.
  - Q. But you have heard nothing bad about us?
- 3 A. I haven't been in the position to hear 4 anything on anyone's behalf.
- 5 Q. Did you not then have any interest in finding 6 out about our service?
- 7 A. I had my own experience over a year and a 8 half, and that's where I stopped.
  - Q. Would you explain that?
- 10 A. I worked for the Olympic Area Agency on
  11 Aging, and then the grant ended, and so I stopped being
  12 in the role of listening day to day to people's concerns
  13 and experiences. I know that others here either hear or
  14 they don't hear complaints. It's not my role right now
  15 to take an interest in that particular issue. I'm just
  16 saying what my long-term experience had been.
- 17 Q. So I hear you saying that you have heard --18 that your experience with Olympic Bus Lines was prior to 19 the change of the application?
  - A. Yes, that's true.
- 21 Q. So you have never heard one nasty or
- 22 uncomfortable word about our service; yes or no?
- 23 A. I haven't been in the role that I was at that 24 time, and so --
- Q. I understand that, but I just want you to

1 answer the question. Have you heard anything derogatory about our service since we took it over?

- Α. I haven't been in a role to hear anything on 4 either side.
  - Q. I quess that's no.

JUDGE MOSS: I think she has answered the 7 question adequately. Go ahead.

Do you have any concerns about the delay in 9 Seattle of this service for these people?

JUDGE MOSS: When you say this service, which 11 service are you referring to?

- I'm sorry, the proposed service has a 13 schedule that drops people off at -- let me pull that 14 out here. The proposed service drops people off in Seattle -- it picks them up at about 5:00 in the morning, drops them off around on the average hospital 17 say 9:00, and does not pick them up again until 4:20 in 18 the afternoon. Did you know that?
- 19 I see about 3:30. My understanding is most 20 people if they can fit in a medical appointment would be 21 able to relax, get to their appointment, go and have a 22 lunch, and then return in the afternoon trip. That 23 would be ideal. Because if we tighten it any more, then 24 any delay in their appointment would not allow them to 25 fulfill that appointment. Then they would freak out

- 1 that they can't get back to the Olympic Peninsula. So 2 it looks like a reasonable amount of time, and at least 3 they're safely in a hospital. They're not being left on 4 the side of the road. These facilities would be open to 5 them during the day.
- 6 Q. Did you know that they have a seven and one 7 half hour wait?
- A. Ideally they're there for an appointment, and they can have a lunch. And so within that six or seven hour period of the day, they can experience what they need to experience and then return. If they're feeling well enough, maybe they could take a little stroll on the avenue. But at this point, it does allow them to return, or if they wanted to consider, they could come back on one of your services that's earlier in the afternoon.
- 17 Q. Then they're not going to get the money 18 saved.
- 19 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: I don't know what her 20 answer is. I asked her if she --
  - A. I'm not concerned about a delay of --
- Q. Of seven and a half hours?
- 23 A. I don't think it's a full seven and a half
- 24 hours. What I see is arrival at University of
- 25 Washington Hospital at 8:45 a.m. They would then be

- 1 picked up at 3:30 p.m. and returned to the Olympic Peninsula. So if it's in and out of one hospital, not in one hospital and out a different hospital, then it's 4 not as long as you're proposing, and I'm not as 5 concerned, because medical appointments take time. And 6 they're in a safe location while they're at their 7 medical appointment.
- 8 Were you aware -- have you examined our 9 schedule as far as the arrival time and return time at 10 the hospital system?
- 11 I had one that I was given, and then I had Α. 12 that newer one at one point. 13
  - Ο. Did Jeff give you the old schedule?
- 14 No, your company gave me the old schedule. I Α. begged at the Budget Rent a Car for new schedules. I 15 had to start making copies of the one that they handed 17 me, because you weren't able to provide me extra copies 18 when I went in to the office.
- 19 Are you saying that we were passing out the Q. 20 old schedule at Budget Rent a Car?
- No, it was the best I could do, and then you 21 22 weren't able to give me -- I prepared 200 binders.
  - Q. Ms. Jaffe, where did you get that schedule?
- 2.4 From your offices or from the phone book Α.
- 25 because I wasn't able to get any from your offices.

Did you know that we have had brochures from the moment we opened the business, current brochures? I have had a hard time getting them, but 4 that's a different issue. If you want to talk about the 5 schedule in and out of Jefferson County, I would be 6 happy to. Have I examined your current schedule, I 7 thought it was quite similar to what this is. 8 apologize for offending you that this is the old one. 9 It is different, and if you would like me to suggest 10 that people could possibly get into a medical 11 appointment at 9:00 in the morning and out by noon or 12 1:00, that would be ideal for some people, but perhaps 13 not for all. 14 JUDGE MOSS: Let me interject myself here and 15 just say, let's all remember where we are and what we're doing here and that nobody needs to be taking any of 17 this personally on either side. 18 And I will caution you, Mr. Heckman, in your 19 role as interrogator here that you don't want to be 20 argumentative. Just ask your questions, get your 21 answers, and Ms. Jaffe I think is making an effort to

22 answer your questions. Perhaps it doesn't always elicit

the answer that you would prefer or perhaps not as directly, and I certainly would give you an opportunity to follow up in that event, but there's no need for

- 1 either the witness or the interlocutor to take the
  2 matter personally. We're just trying to get the facts
  3 into the record.
- 4 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: That's all I'm trying to 5 do. I'm trying to get some yes, no answers if she was 6 aware of our service and if she ever had our brochure, 7 and she apparently never had our brochure.
- 8 JUDGE MOSS: Well, why don't you proceed with 9 your questions.
- 10 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: Okay, yeah.
- 11 BY JAMES HECKMAN:
- 12 Q. Are you aware of the delayed -- the wait time 13 that we have in Seattle with our hospital service and 14 that we have two runs per day during office hours?
- 15 A. I had seen that schedule, yes. I'm aware of 16 it.
- 17 Q. Did you note on that schedule that the wait 18 time -- that our first run drops people off at the 19 hospital at 9:40 and picks them up at 1:45 for return?
  - A. I appreciate your reminding me of this.
- 21 Q. And that we currently -- hundreds of people 22 use this service?
- 23 A. That's ideal. I think there is a need for 24 your service. I have no problem with that.
- Q. With only a few hour wait.

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- 1 Α. That's great. Q. Twice a day. Α. Okay, great. I would say on behalf of the 4 seniors that I spoke with, 9:45 may be a little bit late 5 as a start time for some medical appointments and 6 procedures, that some people are asked to get into the 7 doctor's office by 9:00ish a.m. Not to say that 9:45 is 8 an outrageous delay, but many people are very hesitant 9 at my suggestion to call and change their medical 10 appointment so that they could use your fixed service. 11 Providing an additional fixed service would allow those 12 people to get to their appointment using this rather 13 than dragging a family member back and forth for a 14 separate trip. So that's what I can say on behalf of 15 the timing. 16 And I would be thrilled if people could use 17 different services to get back earlier if they needed 18 to, and maybe they wouldn't save as much, but that time 19 saving could be a value to them. And ideally we could

20 publish a schedule showing all the different routes,
21 when they're going back and forth to those destinations,

              I apologize, I'm confused as to who you are

              At this moment, I'm not employed by the
11 Olympic Area Agency on Aging. I had done the study, and
12 I may be doing some consulting work for the Agency
13 Council on coordinated transportation. But at the
14 moment, I work privately on other projects.
15
              And when did you do the study?
        Q.
16
        Α.
              The study was from June of '99 through
17 September of -- no, June of '98 through September '99.
18 I finished last September.
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19 Q. And the geographic area that the study 20 covered was what?

- A. Jefferson and Clallam Counties, looking at all the transportation resources available for those counties and looking at trying to coordinate them better.
  - Q. Do you have any rough idea or solid idea as

17

1 to what sorts of numbers of people need the kind of
2 service that, for example, Mr. Porter would be offering
3 on a weekly basis or a monthly basis or whatever?

- A. What I did understand is that the 25% of these aging population, so of the roughly 18,000 Jefferson County residents, 25% are in that 65 and up. Another roughly 5% are in their 80ish age bracket. That 80ish age bracket I would say should not be driving themselves to those appointments. I don't have exact numbers for you, but I would say in the range of about 10% of the population in each of these counties more or less would be individuals that I would think would be using this service for medical appointments.

  O. And my last question is, if I were a senior
  - Q. And my last question is, if I were a senior citizen and I came to you and said, recommend to me between Mr. Porter and Mr. Heckman a way to get to Seattle, who would you recommend and why?
- 18 A. I would make no recommendation except to show 19 them the phone numbers of all of the transportation 20 providers. Ideally if this was a fixed route service, I 21 could say that both this and the other are fixed route, 22 and these are the costs. I would mention that there is 23 a public transportation option for them to take. And 24 were any other services available, I would identify them 25 as well.

I built a data base, which is the other piece of what I did, and it didn't make any recommendations except to show cost. And it was a Web based data base 4 and didn't give stars or neon lights for any of the 5 transportation providers. It just identified who is 6 available to make the trips between various origins and 7 designations. 8 So based on the study that you did, do you 9 think it's your opinion that there would be a need for 10 both services, but it would just depend on schedule and 11 a person's ability to pay as to which they might take? 12 Absolutely. 13 MR. CEDARBAUM: Thank you, those are all my 14 questions. 15 JUDGE MOSS: Thank you, Mr. Cedarbaum. 16 I don't have any questions for you, 17 Ms. Jaffe. 18 MS. JAFFE: Okay. 19 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: Your Honor, might I just 20 -- I have a concern about presenting -- about not having 21 a real study. Tell me, what is the validity of the 22 kinds of thoughts that she just mentioned about the

market size and the potential and so on and so forth?

Because our numbers are entirely different than what her

thoughts would suggest. We have a very good feeling for

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1 the size of that market, and we believe it to be significantly smaller to what she's stating, and so how much weight will be given in your decision to something 4 that is not validated by any kind -- any study 5 whatsoever? JUDGE MOSS: Well, that's not a question I 7 can answer in the abstract. I will weigh the testimony 8 when I have the full record before me. But if you have other evidence that you wish to present, we will 10 certainly have that as part of the record, and it will 11 all be given what I hope will be the appropriate weight 12 in terms of the decision that is ultimately rendered. But we have the witness here live testifying. 14 If you have questions for her, this is your opportunity to ask them. That's the purpose of cross-examination is 15 to question the assumptions and conclusions. 17 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: Can I ask another 18 question, Your Honor? 19 JUDGE MOSS: I will allow it because of the 20 informality of the procedure that we follow in these 21 cases, but I will ask you to try to be fairly succinct. 22 23 CROSS-EXAMINATION

24 BY JAMES HECKMAN:

25

Q. Was there a funded study done to determine

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- 1 this market?
- A. Not specifically the medical market. We did speak to 300 seniors about their transportation experience.
- 5 Q. Do you have a -- could you provide a copy of 6 the questions asked on that?
  - A. Sure.
  - Q. To see if they're appropriate?
- 9 A. Sure. But it wasn't a study to look at 10 exactly who should be providing service. It was just to 11 look at people's transportation experiences.
- 12 Q. But this was not a statistically valid study 13 that would show here's the market for low cost -- here's 14 the potential market for low cost transportation that 15 can not afford the current service; it was not that 16 specific?
- A. It's very difficult to ask people their
  income so -- and we asked the question, but I can't say
  in all cases that people answered that. Personally,
  people continue to come up to me as a member of the
  community in Port Townsend and they say, what are
  options available, and I mention as many as I can, and I
  do include yours, I do mention that they have to get out
  to Highway 104 to the Hood Canal Bridge in order to

25 start taking that, and I'm constantly asked the

1 question. But does that mean I know exactly what the statistical validity of how many people are asking me 3 and who they're representing. I do know, however, there 4 are individuals who can not fund themselves on these 5 trips. And another group that you might contact if 7 you're interested would be the Volunteer Tour Services, 8 because they are making a lot of these trips right now 9 for seniors from these communities into Seattle for 10 those who can not afford it, they're above the Medicaid 11 cut off and they're somewhere above, and based on that, 12 they have no other options. JUDGE MOSS: Okay, I believe that completes 14 our questioning of Ms. Jaffe. We certainly appreciate 15 you being here. Apologize for taking you beyond your appointment hour, but it's always a treat to have our 17 public witnesses, and we do appreciate it. 18 MS. JAFFE: Thank you, and thank you to the 19 other witnesses for letting me go first, and thanks for 20 letting my dog in. 21 JUDGE MOSS: Not a problem. 22 All right, Mr. Porter, do you have another

23 witness to call?

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this matter, as you suggested prior to the hearing. And
we didn't come to any resolution, partly because he
would prefer that I don't serve Sequim on this
application, which means that I end up dead heading 45
miles to my first stop, which makes absolutely no sense
whatsoever. The only reason that our authority would
overlap is because there's one road in, one road out.
And there are a great deal of people in the Sequim area
that would benefit from this service.

Commenting on his concern about the long
layover for our customers, there are a great deal of the
passengers that we take over to the Seattle area
hospitals who require all day service. They go over for
extensive testing, they go over for chemotherapy, they
go over for day surgery, so on and so forth. And then
again, it's the customer's choice if they prefer to go
with Pennco service at our time frame or with Olympic's
at their time frame or their cost or 50/50. So I don't
think that's really a factor, as to how long they have
over there before they're picked back up.

Another reason why I'm proposing this is because as of right now, all of our medical passengers are being incorporated with our airport runs, which gets extremely -- it's a logistical nightmare, a scheduling nightmare. Doctor's appointments don't start on time,

19 20

and they don't finish on time. So as a result, we get customers coming back that have flown on the trip from hell, flown all day, been up all night. They get to SeaTac only to find out that we're going to go down into Seattle to pick up a hospital release, find out that the hospital release has been delayed because their appointment wasn't done, rush hour traffic, and this happens daily for us. So it would really streamline the operation and be far more comfortable for the passengers to not have to do that together, having the hospital runs tied in with the airport runs.

As far as the Medicaid, and this is one of

As far as the Medicaid, and this is one of the things that Paratransit was trying to -- they weren't divulging their full concern about me offering this service, because being a subcontractor with Paratransit, they are the broker, and they are required by DSHS to use the most cost effective means of transportation available, which this would open up to

And there's a big shake up in the Medicaid program because right now the conflict of interest with Paratransit, they're a broker and a provider, so there's a major conflict of interest there. So this would also open up to Medicaid recipients and save the State a great deal of money. It currently costs for a round

- 1 trip transportation for an individual to go from Port Angeles to Seattle for a medical appointment, it's averaging about \$200, which is paid by Medicaid. This 4 would open it up to a \$30 fare, so it would be a 5 significant savings to the taxpayer by having this 6 service. That's pretty much it. 7 JUDGE MOSS: Let me ask a couple of 8 questions, Mr. Porter.

## EXAMINATION

## 11 BY JUDGE MOSS:

- 12 Q. One, do you currently do an airport run that 13 has a pick up in Sequim?
- 14 Α. Our service is door to door, 24/7, so there's 15 nothing fixed.
  - It's by reservation? Q.
- 16 17 Α. It's all by reservation. They need at least 18 a 24 hour notice for a reservation. We do our 19 scheduling on a day-to-day basis, putting all the 20 reservations together based on who is going where at 21 what time, put that in motion, and then change it every 22 hour. Because planes, trains, boats, and automobiles, 23 they're never on time, so it's a constant juggle,
- 24 dispatching juggle for every run.
- 25 Q. And let me ask you with respect to some of

- the concerns that were raised by the protestants at the prehearing conference, would it be your intention under this application that the closed door restrictions that currently apply to certain geographical areas along your route, would those be unchanged?
- A. It would be closed door service east of the Hood Canal Bridge. We will only have open door service for the passengers coming to or departing from Clallam and Jefferson County, no open door service in King, Pierce, Kitsap.
- 11 Q. And did you see the letter that Bremerton 12 Kitsap sent in in response to the order that was entered 13 on prehearing?
  - A. Yes, I did.
- 15 Q. And let me ask if the concern that they 16 raised, which was the one they raised in their original 17 protest.
- 18 A. Right.
- 19 Q. It was described in somewhat different 20 geographic terms from those you just used, do you see 21 any conflict there?
- A. None whatsoever, and if I remember correctly, their protest just basically wanted some clarification of our application, our service area.
- JUDGE MOSS: And I'm going to just turn to

00112 1 staff and ask if staff has looked at that and if they're comfortable that there's not an issue there. MR. CEDARBAUM: I'm not sure we have seen 4 that. 5 JUDGE MOSS: Okay, this ties back to the 6 original, I will give you a copy, this ties back to the 7 original protest by Bremerton Kitsap. And again, they 8 were concerned about the closed door. 9 MR. CEDARBAUM: What is the -- I've got a 10 letter dated June 7. Is that what you are looking at? 11 BY JUDGE MOSS: 12 Q. That's the protest, and then they sent a 13 follow-up letter on September 25th in the wake of the 14 prehearing order. And it just simply says: Bremerton Kitsap Airporter continues to 15 16 maintain that closed door operations be 17 maintained in Kitsap County for services 18 provided by Jeffrey Lynn Porter, et 19 cetera and so forth. 20

- I didn't see a copy of that, but that's --Α.
- 21 But that's consistent with your existing 22 authority, and your intention is to, as you put it, 23 transport passengers between Clallam and Jefferson 24 Counties and the Seattle area hospitals and return 25 without picking up people in Kitsap County, correct?

ALLEN: We would require a financial 14 statement that had at least the information that's on the form, which would be the balance sheet. 15 16 JUDGE MOSS: Okay, Mr. Porter, are you 17 prepared to submit that? I realize you don't have it 18 with you today. Do you have such a document? 19 MR. PORTER: I can get it from my accountant. 20 JUDGE MOSS: I think you should submit that, 21 and since that would normally be part of the 22 application, then we will consider that as part of the 23 same exhibit.
- MR. PORTER: Okay.

1 receiving that. How quickly can you provide that? MR. PORTER: Within the week. JUDGE MOSS: All right, let's do that. 3 4 MR. PORTER: If my accountant is not 5 overwhelmed. JUDGE MOSS: Okay. You might when you send 7 that in, please indicate the docket number and that it's 8 a supplement to your application. 9 MR. PORTER: Okay. 10 JUDGE MOSS: Anything else, Mr. Heckman, any 11 other questions? 12 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: Not on financial. Yes, I 13 do have one thing. 14 BY MR. JAMES HECKMAN: 15 Jeff, are you concerned about the loss of Q. 16 revenue that will happen when you discontinue the \$85 17 door-to-door and go to the \$30 round trip, not 18 discontinue, but about what percentage of that business 19 do you think you will lose? Well, if I lost all of those customers, all 20 A. 21 together I will lose about \$3,500 a month. That is not 22 my primary concern right now. My primary concern is

23 providing -- is streamlining the operation so to

24 eliminate the inconvenience for our airport passengers 25 as well as provide transportation for the public who is

- So you think you're going to -- it looks like you have a very marginally profitable business. With the loss of that revenue, that doesn't bother you?
- Not at all because of the phenomenal growth 6 that we have experienced since the day I started. Every penny I make goes right back into the business, and I 8 have done it on a shoestring budget.
- Q. But if you do lose that revenue, according to 10 the financial statement, you will be losing money?
- 11 Well, I will lose a certain percentage of 12 that money by the premium fare, but I'm also going to make that back up with the reduced fare.
  - Q. Could you explain that to me?
- Sure. I will lose a certain percentage of Α. fares by the door-to-door service, but a percentage of 17 that would be made back up by the fixed service.
  - Enough to make up the difference? Q.
  - It may not, but I can absorb that.
- 20 Q. But you acknowledge you will be losing money 21 based on your last statement?
- Initially, yeah, we will lose money by not 23 providing -- by losing the fares from the premium 24 service to the fixed service. But in time, I feel very 25 confident that the ridership for the fixed service will

- Q. And can you describe what your maintenance program is for the vans?
- A. Sure. We do a monthly lube, oil, and filter, which we would take those in to the mechanic. They will go from front to back, check out every aspect of the vehicle, and present to me any maintenance that may need to be done on the vehicles. Tires, front ends, brakes, shocks, stuff like that is farmed out exclusively to Les Schwab. The other major stuff will go to the appropriate facility such as Tranco in Port Angeles for transmissions. The main shop that I use is one in Carlsborg close to where the business is located for all the general maintenance. And I do the stuff myself, changing light bulbs, wiper blades, the light
- 16 maintenance. Any of the heavy stuff is farmed out.
  17 Q. I was going to switch topics unless you have
  18 something else to add.
- 19 A. It's kept track of by the drivers do a 20 pre-trip inspection prior to their departure. They also 21 do a post-trip inspection at the return of their trip. 22 They note any discrepancies that need to be addressed, 23 which are sent to me first thing after their run. We 24 address the major stuff that may be, what's the word I'm 25 looking for, not hazardous, but safety sensitive items.

- 1 There is a vehicle maintenance log that is kept on every vehicle, which is every single nut, bolt, screw, bulb, whatever goes into the vehicle is logged in the vehicle 4 log. And there is also a file kept on each vehicle that 5 has every receipt for every bit of maintenance that has 6 been done on each vehicle.
- Q. In terms of employees, will you be hiring new 8 employees for this proposed service?
- I would have to hire probably at least four. 10 I currently have approximately 30 employees right now.
- 11 What is your training program for the new Q. 12 employees? 13
- Α. We have a training officer who will bring --14 who brings in new employees at one shot. They have approximately one hour class time to go over all the 15 paperwork, the business policies and procedures, job 17 related duties. And then they go on a training run with 18 the training officer.
- 19 And your vehicles and employees are all Q. 20 properly licensed?
- 21 Α. Yes.
- 22 MR. CEDARBAUM: Thank you, those are all my 23 questions.
- 2.4 JUDGE MOSS: All right, very good. Now with 25 the exception of the affidavits that we're going to

1 receive from Heckman and the financial statement from Pennco, both of which we expect within about a week, is there any other evidence that either party wishes to put 4 into the record? And since we're finishing with you, 5 Mr. Porter, I will ask you first, did you have any 6 additional evidence you wish to submit to the record in 7 this proceeding? 8 MR. PORTER: No, I don't. 9 JUDGE MOSS: Mr. Heckman, do you have any 10 additional evidence you wish to submit to the record in 11 this proceeding? - Q. And would you tell us about your experience on the day or days that you have used it?
- A. I was really happy with the service. With the 7:00 starting time, I went down and they were ready to go at 7:00. And it was a very pleasant experience. The driver was courteous and friendly, and the bus was

- 1 clean and comfortable. And we got over to Seattle 2 through the various stops, but we got to my destination 3 at quarter to 10:00. My appointment was at 11:30, and 4 it just worked out perfect for me.
  - Q. So your total waiting time then?
    - A. Probably two hours maybe.
    - Q. Mm-hm.
- 8 A. Until they did pick me up, I did get picked 9 up for the 1:15 return trip.
- 10 Q. Now when you found out that our bus arrived 11 in Seattle around 9:40, how did you work that out with 12 the doctor's office?
- 13 A. My appointment was made from town here, so 14 they tell them over there that we have somebody coming 15 over from Port Angeles, and they make sure that your 16 appointment is within a time, a reasonable time frame to 17 get from here to Seattle, so I mean it -- and your 18 schedule is just perfect.
- 19 Q. So you found you were able, once they knew 20 when you were there, you were able to set your 21 appointment so that it worked?
- 22 A. Oh, yeah, yeah.
- Q. Did they tell you that they felt you had to be there at 9:00 or 8:00 or anything like that?
- 25 A. Oh, no.

- 1 Q. They couldn't work with that?
- Α. Oh, no, they -- it was set up for 11:30 and, you know, like I say, we got in at ten to 10:00 or 4 quarter to 10:00, and it was real nice.
- Q. Now where did the bus drop you relative to 6 Virginia Mason; how far did you have to walk?
- 7 A. They drop you right at the -- there is a pull 8 off area at Virginia Mason, and it drops you right off 9 at the front door of the Buck Pavilion. You walk in the 10 door, walk over to an elevator, and go to the floor you 11 have to go to, sixth floor, fifth floor, or something 12 like that. Then you walk around to the North Pavilion, 13 and it was really convenient.
  - So you were very satisfied with the service? Q.
- Oh, absolutely, yeah. In fact, I'm making Α. 16 another trip next week today.
- 17 Did you find -- what were your thoughts about Q. 18 the rate that was charged?
- 19 The rate was from, personally, from my point of view, it was very reasonable, because I couldn't drive over and take the ferry and all of this stuff, 21 park over there, for any place close to that.
- 23 So you would recommend this to anybody? Q.

25 You know, we're not sure how much revenue we

1 would lose on this quite marginal business we have right now, but it will be substantial. The way Mr. Porter has scheduled his business, both of his runs leave an hour 4 or so before our primary runs, and they leave from 5 locations that, make no mistake about it, will pick up 6 our what I call non-hospital people.

He has a run here that is right in front of 8 ours that will, if somebody says, I realize you're going 9 to the hospital, but can I get off at -- I will just get 10 off at the hospital or U of W, and I will walk downtown, 11 I mean his points of delivery even though they are the 12 hospital are downtown Seattle.

If you have some children that are going over 14 to visit their grandparents or if you have somebody that's going over to visit their sister or whatever and 15 you have a service leaving right in front of mine for 17 \$29, well, round trip \$19 less money, there's no 18 question about it that they will take some of our --19 some of our regular customers, some of our customers. 20 Without a doubt, this will make our company 21 unprofitable.

I hadn't even realized when we did these 23 numbers that his Carlsbad pickup location, Carlsborg, 24 excuse me, pickup location is probably as close to the 25 east part of Port Angeles as our downtown location is.

1 Essentially he's offering a scheduled service out of Port Angeles and Sequim right in front of our service, and also there's two runs a day for \$19 less money. I will have two choices, sit and let him take 5 my customers, or meet his price. And so we will have a 6 rate war, which will not benefit the public long-term. 7 One of us will survive. This business is way -- our 8 county is too small, the market is too small to have 9 overlapping authorities with the identical service. 10 It's not even thinly disguised that this is 11 only hospital business. As Jeff stated a few minutes 12 ago, if somebody else gets on because they want to go to 13 Seattle, then jump on. The pretense that it's only for 14 the low cost, welfare, poor, medical person is a great inaccuracy. This is a scheduled service, less money 15 than mine, right in front of mine. 17 And why did we spend all -- why do people 18 spend all this time building up a scheduled service if 19 we don't get the protection of our permit. Sure, you 20 can always parade in people to say, great, you can do it 21 for cheaper. So everything we have gone to build up is 22 gone. 23 And that's why the case law shows that rate

24 is normally not a factor in determining public need, for 25 an obvious reason. As soon as I'm gone, his rates go

00146 1 up. There's no guarantee that these rates will stick long term. According to our calculations, there isn't any way that he can carry enough people to pay for these 4 runs. Granting this application will result in mass 5 chaos and a war. 6 JUDGE MOSS: Did you have some testimony to 7 offer? 8 MR. JACK HECKMAN: I do, and I have one more 9 exhibit. 10 JUDGE MOSS: All right. 11 MR. JACK HECKMAN: We have a concern, as the 12 application is presented, it's from Sequim to the 13 hospitals. And again, it's been brought up that that's 14 not necessarily what may happen. If someone needs to be dropped somewhere else, there's a possibility that that will happen as well. And I have a letter that I would

20 what they please as they please somewhat. Can I read 21 this? 22 JUDGE MOSS: There's no point in reading it 23 into the record. You can submit it as an exhibit, and I

like to present as an exhibit from the agency sales 18 manager for Greyhound Lines Incorporated. And what it 19 pertains to is that Pennco Transportation is and will do

24 will be glad to read it. 25 MR. JAMES HECKMAN: Can you summarize it?

And even at 7 that, and even that we are the only ones authorized, I 8 do know that Pennco Transportation is serving Greyhound currently without authority, and it's even advertised as 10 another exhibit in their Yellow Pages ad, on the side of 11 their buses, and in their brochures. 12 JUDGE MOSS: Did you want to submit this as 13 an exhibit? 14 MR. JACK HECKMAN: I would like to submit 15 that as well. And so I guess what I'm trying to say is that if this permit is granted, even though it says it's 17 only from Sequim to the hospitals, in fact, what's going 18 to happen is it will be from Port Angeles because it's 19 halfway here and Sequim to the hospitals and probably 20 also Greyhound and anywhere else in Seattle. 21 JUDGE MOSS: All right, I'm going to pass 10 22 and 11 down the table here and let Mr. Porter and 23 Mr. Cedarbaum look at those, and we will ascertain 24 whether there is any objection.

                           TESTIMONY
5 BY JACK HECKMAN:
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Well, since there's no need to summarize what 7 we have already talked about and brought up, the only 8 concern, the biggest concern we have is that it appears 9 that Pennco goes forth and does things before authority 10 may necessarily take place. Where I brought up the 11 Greyhound issue that is being done by them without 12 authority through Greyhound. I called Paratransit 13 Services yesterday and was informed by them that the 14 rate is already being offered to customers, the lowered 15 rate that he has. And that was as of yesterday's 16 conversation, and we don't -- obviously we don't have 17 this in place yet. So these are some of the issues that 18 concern us the most, and that if this application is 19 granted, it will go outside the authority of what's 20 actually granted.

And then the obvious thing is that it is 22 overlapping what we have, and we feel that we already 23 take care of the Sequim and Port Angeles market to and 24 from not only the hospitals, but also Greyhound and 25 Amtrak and SeaTac. And that to have another company

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1 come in side by side and overlap us with lesser rates is going to potentially not only put our company out of business, but possibly both companies out of business, 4 because we would in reaction have to lower our rates so 5 that we don't lose our customer base that we have 6 currently. And as a marginal business right now 7 operating, to lower those rates definitely would put us 8 in a red position financially versus in the black, which 9 is what we all strive to do. 10 JUDGE MOSS: All right, thank you very much. 11 Mr. Porter, anything in closing? 12 MR. PORTER: Yes. 13 14 DIRECT TESTIMONY 15 BY MR. PORTER: 16 I do have authority under the Commission to 17 serve Seattle and Tacoma Greyhound, Amtrak, SeaTac, 18 hospitals, and hotels in my existing service. We were 19 unaware of the contract and situation between previously 20 Olympic Van Tours and now Olympic Bus Lines that they 21 have an exclusive contract to be an extension of 22 Greyhound, which we are not allowed on their property.

23 We can not drive onto their property. Our drivers can 24 not go onto their property to pick up our customers. 25 But under my certificate, I do have authority to serve

1 Greyhound in Seattle, which means we pull up at the curb, they get out, that's where we pick them up is at the curb. And like I say, we do have the authority to 4 do that. I have had a call in for the last several 5 months to the corporate office for Greyhound. They 6 refuse to return my calls regarding this matter. As far 7 as I'm concerned, this is not about serving Greyhound. 8 We are serving the medical needs of the area here going 9 to the hospitals. There is no way that we can take 10 passengers down to Seattle Greyhound and stay on 11 schedule and serve our route that we have proposed as a 12 fixed route. That is not my -- that is not my goal. As far as us picking up other customers of 14 theirs, it's the same thing that I dealt with with 15 Olympic Van Tours is everybody has to have a reservation with us to our office before they can ride our vehicles. 17 There won't be the opportunity to pirate Olympic's 18 passengers. 19 Our rates, first of all, in order for us to 20 change our rates, I have to submit an application to the 21 UTC to justify any rate changes, so that wouldn't just 22 happen overnight, and I wouldn't be cannibalizing 23 anybody's passengers.

As far as the Paratransit thing, this has 25 nothing to do with my operating authority with the UTC

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1 or anybody else. I have a contract with Paratransit.
   My operation with them is between them and I. I don't
   know where they got this erroneous information, but we
4 have not offered this service to the Medicaid
5 recipients. And when and if the time comes, then that's
6 between Paratransit and I. That doesn't have anything
7
   to do with my authority with the UTC as far as my rates
8 being offered to the Medicaid recipients. This is part
   of the discussion we had at the last meeting with
10 Paratransit, which I did not want to go into there,
11 because I did not feel it was appropriate at that time.
12
              The Commission is always stating that their
13 main concern is the need of the public, and I believe
14 that the public does need this transportation. There
15 are a great deal of people out here that are low income,
   fixed income, and they can not afford the higher priced
17 transportation. We're currently -- last month we
18 transported almost 1,500 passengers, 215 from the Port
19 Angeles area, 532 from the Sequim area, and 710 from
20 Jefferson County. We're fulfilling the need by
21 providing that transportation. We're a growing
22 business, we're busy, we make mistakes just like anybody
23 else. They are a few passengers that we have dropped
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24 the ball on. If Pennco drops the ball on anybody, we

25 bend over backwards to make it right to them.

1 I think there's plenty of business out there 2 for both companies. My personal opinion is with Olympic Bus Lines being an extension of Greyhound, I think that 4 prices should reflect a fixed bus schedule. For 5 example, Greyhound's fares say from Seattle to Olympia 6 Monday through Thursday is \$8.50 one way, \$15.50 round 7 trip, slightly higher, about a dollar more through the 8 weekend. It's my personal opinion that if it got to be a price war, then if Olympic had reduced their rates or 10 kept their rates when they took over the service as 11 opposed to raising their rates 29%, they would be 12 dealing in a lot more volume, transporting a lot more 13 passengers. 14 The conversation that I had with Mr. Heckman 15 was regarding the condition of Olympic Van Tours'

16 equipment. He was stating that he is now transporting 17 as many passengers as Olympic Van Tours did in the past. 18 And my comment is, if he had decent equipment, he would 19 have been transporting a lot more passengers. He wasn't 20 in agreeance with that, but I -- it's no surprise, it's 21 no secret to the Commission the condition of Olympic Van 22 Tours equipment when they were operating.

So basically in closing, I think there's 24 enough business for both services. I think this is a 25 needed service for the community. I think we presented

1 enough facts that shows there is a demand for the low  $\,$  2 cost transportation for the convenience of the public.

- Q. Thank you. I just want to clarify one point with you, Mr. Porter. You mentioned the reservation basis for your current service.
  - A. Correct.
- 10 Q. Would it be your intention to have any 11 customers of the proposed service to also make advance 12 reservations?
- 13 A. It's all by reservation. Without the 14 reservations, we could end up having vehicles 15 overbooked, have to turn people away, and it's just --16 it's easier to run that operation with reservations 17 knowing who you have coming and going, when and where.

18 JUDGE MOSS: Thank you, I just wanted to be

19 clear on that.

20 Mr. Cedarbaum, did you have anything you

21 wished to say in closing? 22 MR. CEDARBAUM:

MR. CEDARBAUM: No, Your Honor.

JUDGE MOSS: All right. Then subject to anybody telling me to the contrary, I believe that will be adequate for our record considering the materials

1 that are yet to come.
              All right, appreciate you all being here
   today and presenting the evidence that you did to
4 develop our record in this proceeding. I will look
5 forward to receiving the exhibits that we have reserved
6 places for in the next week or so. And once I have that
7 material and I should have the transcript in about two
8 weeks, then I will study the record, consider the
9 applications, and enter an initial order.

              Once that order is entered and it will be
11 notated on that order that you will have 20 days to seek
12 Commission review. And you may choose to seek review or
13 not depending on your satisfaction with the order. And
14 in due course, the Commission will take the matter up
   either on petitions for review or in a final order
   affirming the initial order in the absence of any
17
   petitions for administrative review.
