- 4 JUDGE CHARTOFF: We are on the record.
- 5 Can everyone hear me okay? Okay. Good evening. This
- 6 is a public comment hearing regarding a petition
- 7 Whatcom County filed with the Washington Utilities and
- 8 Transportation Commission to modify a railroad
- 9 crossing.
- 10 Specifically, Whatcom County is seeking to
- install median barriers at the highway rail grade
- 12 crossing on Cliffside Drive in Whatcom County as part
- of a quiet zone improvement. For the record, today's
- 14 date is Tuesday, March 5, 2019. And the time is a
- 15 little after 6:00.
- So I'll start with introductions. Then I'll
- 17 explain the purposes of the hearing and how we're
- 18 going to conduct the hearing. So my name is Laura
- 19 Chartoff. To my left is Rayne Pearson, and we are
- 20 administrative law judges with the Washington
- 21 Utilities and Transportation Commission. And we are
- 22 co-presiding in this case.
- 23 So earlier today we had an evidentiary hearing
- 24 on this case, and the parties to the proceeding are
- 25 seated at the tables in front of me. I'm going to now

- 1 ask the parties to briefly introduce themselves
- 2 starting with Mr. Roberson.
- 3 MR. ROBERSON: My name is Jeff
- 4 Roberson. I'm an assistant attorney general that
- 5 represents the commission staff.
- 6 MR. QUINN: My name is Christopher
- 7 Quinn. I represent the people of Whatcom County and
- 8 the Whatcom County Prosecutor's Office on the civil
- 9 side.
- 10 MS. ENDRES: Good evening. Thanks for
- 11 coming tonight. I'm Kelsey Endres. I represent BNSF
- 12 Railway Company, and with me tonight is Steve
- 13 Semenick, the manager of public projects.
- JUDGE CHARTOFF: Thank you. So our
- 15 hearing tonight is to collect your comments and let
- 16 us, as representatives of the commission, hear from
- 17 you about your concerns or any other views that are
- 18 relevant to the proposed modifications of the crossing
- 19 at Cliffside Drive.
- 20 So please be aware that the commission has no
- 21 jurisdiction over whether we can designate the
- 22 crossing as a quiet zone. The only issue before the
- 23 commission is whether the median barriers will be made
- 24 of concrete or out of composite rubber. So keep in
- 25 mind the commission's jurisdiction, and please limit

- 1 your comments to your opinions on the type of median
- 2 barriers that should be installed.
- 3 So I have in front of me a list that shows
- 4 there are approximately seven people who want to speak
- 5 tonight. There are some public hearing sign-in sheets
- 6 that Mr. Andrew Roberts has collected signatures on.
- 7 So he may have another sheet to bring later with
- 8 additional folks. If you're not on the list and later
- 9 change your mind and want to speak, you can identify
- 10 yourself later. Let me know.
- 11 So I'll just talk briefly about the hearing
- 12 procedure. Because this is a formal proceeding, your
- 13 testimony will be under oath. So for each of you that
- 14 indicated you will speak, I will have you stand in a
- 15 few moments to take an oath. And then I'll call the
- 16 speakers one at a time to speak at the podium.
- 17 As you can see, there's a court reporter who
- 18 will be taking down your comments as well, so please
- 19 speak slowly and clearly. Each of you will have a
- 20 maximum of five minutes to make your comments tonight,
- 21 and that way we can ensure everyone gets a chance to
- 22 speak.
- 23 And if there's a person who speaks and says
- 24 something you agree with, you don't need to repeat the
- 25 same testimony. You can simply indicate you agree

- 1 with what Mr. Smith or Ms. Jones said previously. So
- 2 I encourage you if you're hearing the same comments in
- 3 support or opposition spoken, you know, please feel
- 4 free to just reference that speaker.
- 5 Finally, oh, about written comments, if you
- 6 brought written comments with you today that you're
- 7 reading, you can simply give us the highlights of
- 8 those comments and hand those to Mr. Roberts. Let me
- 9 have -- Mr. Roberts is in the back of the room. Can I
- 10 have him just wave and say hi. Thank you.
- 11 So your written comments will be part of the
- 12 record. And if any of you after hearing testimony
- 13 tonight would like to submit written comments either
- 14 for the first time or additional comments, we will
- 15 accept those so long as they're filed by Friday,
- 16 March 8.
- 17 Finally, this is a chance for you to provide
- 18 us with your comments. This isn't a chance for
- 19 dialogue. So you may be able to stay after and ask
- 20 questions of the rail staff or any of the parties, but
- 21 Judge Pearson and I can't answer questions about the
- 22 project as part of this public comment session.
- 23 So does anyone have any questions about how
- 24 the proceeding will go?
- 25 Yes.

- 1 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Could you go over
- 2 again what is the question we're trying to answer
- 3 here? I'm a little confused. The type of median, you
- 4 said?
- 5 JUDGE CHARTOFF: Sure. Whatcom County
- 6 has proposed a modification to the railroad crossing.
- 7 They're proposing a certain type of median to be
- 8 installed, and BNSF is proposing a different kind of
- 9 median. They're proposing one made out of concrete.
- 10 So that's the issue. I overly simplified it, but
- 11 that's the issue that's before us, the type of
- 12 improvement that will happen.
- AUDIENCE MEMBER: I'm not sure if this
- 14 is a correct question or not. But there's a quiet
- 15 zone installed at Yacht Club Road, which is on the
- 16 south end of Bellingham. Do you know what type of
- 17 median they have, and could you explain that to some
- 18 of us that aren't totally aware?
- 19 JUDGE PEARSON: So we heard today
- 20 earlier at the hearing they're concrete medians
- 21 installed at Yacht Club Road, and if you have more
- 22 questions about that, Mr. Semenick is available from
- 23 BNSF. And you can talk to him after the public
- 24 comment hearing.
- JUDGE CHARTOFF: So at this time I'm

- 1 going to read the names of the -- okay. The people
- 2 who have signed up to speak so far. Okay. I have
- 3 Bill Miers, Thomas Flattery, Margaret Manning, Susan
- 4 Babbitt, Murray Bennett, Teresa Anderson, Bert Webber,
- 5 and Ray Poorman. Did I leave anyone out?
- 6 Okay. So I'm going to swear you all in now so
- 7 we can begin the public comment session. So if I said
- 8 your name or you're intending to speak, will you
- 9 please stand up and raise your right hand.
- 10 Do you swear or affirm that the testimony you
- 11 give today is the truth, the whole truth, and nothing
- 12 but the truth?
- 13 (Speakers sworn in.)
- JUDGE CHARTOFF: For the record,
- 15 everyone gave an affirmative response. Thank you.
- So I'm going to call Bill Miers to please
- 17 stand at, I think, that podium. I'll ask him to come
- 18 up to the podium. And I'm going to ask all witnesses
- 19 to state and spell both your first and last name, give
- 20 us your address, tell us how long you've lived at that
- 21 address or in this community. And if you're
- 22 representing someone other than yourself, please tell
- 23 us that as well.
- 24 MR. MIERS: So my name is Bill Miers or
- 25 William, to be exact. And the last name is spelled

- 1 M-I-E-R-S. I live at 3903 Cliffside Drive, and I've
- 2 lived there for about two and a half years now.
- 3 Anything else that you needed to know?
- 4 JUDGE CHARTOFF: Are you representing
- 5 yourself?
- 6 MR. MIERS: I'm just representing
- 7 myself.
- JUDGE CHARTOFF: Okay.
- 9 MR. MIERS: And maybe even my wife. So
- 10 the hearing today is a little different than what I
- 11 think most of us had expected. We were led to believe
- 12 this was more of a: Are we in favor of the quiet zone
- 13 or not?
- So the type of barrier, we weren't really
- 15 privy to the type of barrier that was being proposed.
- 16 But our understanding is that Whatcom County will be
- 17 paying for a certain type of barrier and that perhaps
- 18 there are ultimate types of barriers that might cost
- 19 more money. So I am in favor of the type of barrier
- 20 that will not cost more money to the residents of
- 21 Cliffside Drive.
- I would like to see the barrier go in that is
- 23 the one that the county is proposing to install that
- 24 won't cost more money than the one perhaps that
- 25 Burlington Northern is installing -- proposing to

- 1 install. So that's my main comment. I am in favor of
- 2 the quiet zone, although I guess that's not really
- 3 part of the question here; is that correct?
- 4 JUDGE PEARSON: Correct.
- 5 MR. MIERS: I think that any type of
- 6 barrier along there, whether it is a concrete barrier
- 7 or whether it is a rubber barrier that's painted
- 8 yellow, is going to do the job in terms of keeping
- 9 most normal traffic from being able to cross into the
- 10 opposite lane. You know, perhaps if you have a big
- 11 four-wheel-drive truck or something, you know, it will
- 12 make a difference, but for the normal, you know,
- 13 Subaru or Prius, it's probably going to be just fine.
- 14 So that's my comments. Thank you.
- JUDGE PEARSON: Thank you.
- 16 JUDGE CHARTOFF: Thank you. So Thomas
- 17 Flattery.
- 18 MR. FLATTERY: Right. Thomas Flattery,
- 19 last name F-L-A-T-T-E-R-Y, 3946 Cliffside Drive. I'm
- 20 here on behalf of myself and my amazing wife as well
- 21 as all my neighbors in the Cliffside community.
- 22 So I'm just going to read something that was
- 23 provided at a recent board meeting which I think maybe
- 24 might pinpoint some of our concerns or questions about
- 25 what's going on and where the process stands, but it

- 1 says: As you may recall, the design for the crossing
- 2 improvements includes the --
- THE REPORTER: Can you please read
- 4 slower.
- 5 MR. FLATTERY: Slower?
- THE REPORTER: Yes, please.
- 7 MR. FLATTERY: The design for the
- 8 crossing improvements includes the installation of
- 9 center curbs. The Federal Railroad Administration
- 10 allows a specific type of mountable curb to be used.
- 11 These types of curbs allow for emergency vehicles to
- 12 drive over them while limiting other cars from doing
- 13 so.
- 14 Because this is a modification to a railroad
- 15 crossing, the Washington State Utilities and
- 16 Transportation Commission must approve the
- 17 application. During that process, Burlington Northern
- 18 Santa Fe Railroad objected to the use of mountable
- 19 curbs, although mountable curbs at your specific
- 20 crossing -- by the way, this is from Ronald Middleton
- 21 to Jeff Dennison who is the president of the board --
- 22 would allow specific crossing at Cliffside would
- 23 clearly address these concerns. BNSF has a company
- 24 policy that objects to their views.
- 25 So where I want to be clear on here is if

- 1 we're just talking about the type of barrier that's
- 2 going to be installed at this location and we're past
- 3 the point of whether or not a barrier is going to be
- 4 installed and a quiet zone is going to be established,
- 5 then that's great news. So am I understanding that
- 6 correctly?
- JUDGE PEARSON: Yes.
- 8 MR. FLATTERY: Okay. Great. Progress.
- 9 I guess the other thing is regardless of the type of
- 10 barrier, as Bill I think just pointed out, if the goal
- 11 is to prevent normal, you know, residential vehicular
- 12 traffic from being able to cross over that divide and
- 13 not restrict emergency vehicles from doing so, then
- 14 whether it's concrete or rubber it seems like the goal
- 15 is still going to be served.
- 16 So thanks for clarifying what type of barrier
- 17 was installed at Yacht Club Road. It sounds like it
- 18 was concrete and not rubber, and I would be curious to
- 19 understand why BNSF has its policy and what the
- 20 difference between those two and why they prefer
- 21 concrete over rubber.
- I think those are my comments just hoping that
- 23 I'm understanding clearly that this application is
- 24 headed, in my opinion, in the right direction and is
- 25 going to be approved. It's just an issue on the type

- 1 of barrier. So thank you.
- JUDGE PEARSON: Thank you. For
- 3 everyone's benefit, I just want to let you know that
- 4 you can go to the commission's website, which is
- 5 utc.wa.gov. You can search this docket number, which
- 6 is 180466, and you can see everything that's been
- 7 filed. You can read all of the testimony filed by
- 8 Whatcom County, by BNSF, so you can understand their
- 9 arguments for the particular type of median barriers.
- 10 And within 30 days, the transcript from
- 11 today's evidentiary hearing will also be available on
- 12 our website. So you can read through that and see
- 13 what they talked about today, so that might be helpful
- 14 for you-all to determine where they're at in the
- 15 process.
- MR. FLATTERY: Thanks for that
- 17 reference, and I know this is a little off topic. But
- 18 it would be fantastic if BNSF could do something about
- 19 the screeching wheels, because those are really loud
- 20 too.
- JUDGE CHARTOFF: Thank you.
- 22 Margaret Manning.
- MS. MANNING: Margaret Manning. Do you
- 24 want first and last name spelled or just last name?
- 25 JUDGE CHARTOFF: Last name.

Page 146 1 MS. MANNING: M-A-N-N-I-N-G, 2 3908 Cliffside Drive, and I'm speaking on behalf of myself and my husband, David Shell. 3 4 We definitely are concerned about the type of barrier that goes up. It is the only access in and 5 6 out of the neighborhood, and so it would be critical that emergency vehicles can easily access the 8 neighborhood. We have many elderly neighbors, and so it seems to me that the more flexible the material, 10 the better in case multiple vehicles are having to come in and out in the event of an emergency because 11 12 it is the only entrance and exit into the 13 neighborhood. Thank you. 14 JUDGE CHARTOFF: Thank you. 15 JUDGE PEARSON: Thank you. 16 JUDGE CHARTOFF: Okay. Susan Babbitt. 17 MS. BABBITT: I'll say I agree with 18 Margaret. I was going to come and say the same 19 things. 20 JUDGE CHARTOFF: Okay. Thank you. 21 MS. BABBITT: I'll pass. 22 JUDGE CHARTOFF: Thank you. 23 Murray Bennett. 24 MR. BENNETT: I misunderstood what the 25 hearing was about, so I'd like to pass too if I could.

- 1 I support what's already been said.
- JUDGE CHARTOFF: Teresa Anderson.
- 3 MS. ANDERSON: Hi. So it's Teresa,
- 4 T-E-R-E-S-A, Anderson with an S-O-N. And I'm
- 5 representing myself and my husband David Anderson and
- 6 our community of 39 homes. I live at 3947 Cliffside
- 7 Drive.
- 8 And like everyone in our community, we
- 9 misunderstood the purpose of this, so I agree with
- 10 what's been stated before and that we're in support of
- 11 what median the county is asking for. And the little
- 12 bit I read regarding discussion of barriers for the
- 13 Yacht Club Road, at that time it seemed like it was
- 14 important to the county to have a barrier that could
- 15 be removed if needed for paving. That's what they --
- 16 so thank you.
- JUDGE CHARTOFF: Thank you.
- 18 Bert Webber.
- 19 MR. WEBER: My name is Bert Webber,
- 20 W-E-B-B-E-R, 3935 Cliffside Drive. Some years ago,
- 21 three or four years ago in wintertime, a Whatcom
- 22 County plow and sanding truck came over the railroad
- 23 tracks and slid off the side of the road. What I'm
- 24 trying to say there is both sides of the road there is
- 25 a dropoff that can cause vehicles to go down.

- 1 It's been mentioned that large vehicles go in
- 2 and out of our community, big, big trucks, sanitary
- 3 trucks, trucks that belong to utility, fire trucks,
- 4 you name it. The biggest trucks that you can think of
- 5 come down that road. And I worry -- because I don't
- 6 have full understanding of what the concrete barrier
- 7 would be like, I'm worried about those times when a
- 8 truck needs to move a little bit to the center of the
- 9 road because the road is not all that wide.
- 10 And so anything that has flexibility that
- 11 allows vehicles to cross over in times of emergency is
- 12 something that is important to me and I think would be
- 13 to the rest of the community. Otherwise, I agree with
- 14 mostly everything that's been said already. Thank
- 15 you.
- JUDGE CHARTOFF: Thank you.
- 17 Ray Poorman.
- 18 MR. POORMAN: Ray Poorman,
- 19 3905 Cliffside Drive, P-O-O-R-M-A-N. I agree with all
- 20 the neighborhood here. I've been here about four and
- 21 a half, five months, and I think whatever is the least
- 22 expensive that's going to make everybody happy,
- 23 whether it be composite or it be concrete, I'm totally
- 24 fine with I kind of figured because of the whole sound
- 25 neighborhood thing. Thanks.

- 1 JUDGE CHARTOFF: Thank you.
- Is there anyone else who would like to speak
- 3 tonight?
- 4 Please step forward.
- 5 Did you take the oath earlier?
- 6 MR. ANDERSON: I didn't, but I will
- 7 now.
- JUDGE CHARTOFF: Okay. Thank you.
- 9 Please raise your right hand. Do you swear or
- 10 affirm that the testimony you give today is the truth,
- 11 the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?
- MR. ANDERSON: Yes, I do.
- JUDGE CHARTOFF: Thank you.
- 14 Please state your name and spelling your last
- 15 name.
- 16 MR. ANDERSON: My name is David
- 17 Anderson, A-N-D-E-R-S-O-N, the same way my wife spells

- 25 important whatever barrier system is in place that
