So I have in front of me a list that shows there are approximately seven people who want to speak tonight. There are some public hearing sign-in sheets that Mr. Andrew Roberts has collected signatures on. So he may have another sheet to bring later with additional folks. If you're not on the list and later change your mind and want to speak, you can identify yourself later. Let me know.

So I'll just talk briefly about the hearing procedure. Because this is a formal proceeding, your testimony will be under oath. So for each of you that indicated you will speak, I will have you stand in a few moments to take an oath. And then I'll call the speakers one at a time to speak at the podium.

As you can see, there's a court reporter who will be taking down your comments as well, so please speak slowly and clearly. Each of you will have a maximum of five minutes to make your comments tonight, and that way we can ensure everyone gets a chance to speak.

And if there's a person who speaks and says something you agree with, you don't need to repeat the same testimony. You can simply indicate you agree

AUDIENCE MEMBER: Could you go over again what is the question we're trying to answer here? I'm a little confused. The type of median, you

JUDGE CHARTOFF: Sure. Whatcom County has proposed a modification to the railroad crossing. They're proposing a certain type of median to be installed, and BNSF is proposing a different kind of median. They're proposing one made out of concrete. 10 So that's the issue. I overly simplified it, but that's the issue that's before us, the type of 12 improvement that will happen.

> AUDIENCE MEMBER: I'm not sure if this is a correct question or not. But there's a quiet zone installed at Yacht Club Road, which is on the south end of Bellingham. Do you know what type of median they have, and could you explain that to some of us that aren't totally aware?

JUDGE PEARSON: So we heard today earlier at the hearing they're concrete medians installed at Yacht Club Road, and if you have more questions about that, Mr. Semenick is available from BNSF. And you can talk to him after the public comment hearing.

Because this is a modification to a railroad crossing, the Washington State Utilities and Transportation Commission must approve the application. During that process, Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad objected to the use of mountable curbs, although mountable curbs at your specific crossing -- by the way, this is from Ronald Middleton to Jeff Dennison who is the president of the board -- would allow specific crossing at Cliffside would clearly address these concerns. BNSF has a company policy that objects to their views.
