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6	CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: The hearing
7	will please come to order. This is a consolidated
8	docket encompassing five contracts between Sound
9	Water Company & Developers for extension of Sound
10	Water Company's water system to provide domestic
11	water service and fire flow to specified
12	subdivisions.
13	The Washington Utilities and Transportation
14	Commission has suspended the operation of the
15	contracts pending a hearing concerning their justness
16	and reasonableness.
17	The Commission has set for this time and place,
18	upon due and proper notice to all interested parties,
19	a hearing on that matter.
20	The hearing is being held at Commission
21	headquarters in Olympia, Washington, on March 11th,
22	1997. The time is approximately 10:45. My name is
23	John Prusia. I am the administrative law judge
24	assigned to this proceeding today.
25	I'll further identify the five dockets as

1	follows: In Docket No. UW-961042 the contract is for
2	an extension to provide domestic water service and
3	fire flow to Capstone Homes/Springwood Estates
4	Division II, consisting of fifty-seven lots.
5	In Docket No. UW-961043, the contract is for an
6	extension to provide domestic water service and fire
7	flow to Horton Meadows consisting of thirty-four
8	lots. In Docket No. UW-961044, the contract is for
9	an extension to provide domestic water service and
10	fire flow to Plum Ridge consisting of 103 lots.
11	The Docket No. UW-961141 contract is for an
12	extension to provide domestic water service and fire
13	flow to Rainier Vista-Chennes Park spelled
14	C-h-e-n-n-e-s consisting of 145 lots.
15	And the Docket No. UW-961546 contract is for an
16	extension to provide domestic water service and fire
17	flow to the Commons Apartments.
18	I'll take appearances at this time beginning
19	with the company, Mr. Lundgaard. Please state your
20	name and who you represent.
21	MR. LUNDGAARD: Robert E.
22	Lundgaard, Lundgaard & Aitken, Attorney at Law,
23	representing Sound Water Company.
24	CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: And for
25	Commission staff?

1 MS. TENNYSON: Mary Tennyson, 2 Senior Assistant Attorney General, for Commission 3 staff. 4 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Thank you. Is there anyone else present who wishes to make 5 an appearance in this matter? Let the record reflect 6 7 that there's no response. Before we went on the record, I marked for 8 9 identification seven exhibits, and I'll identify those now. Marked for identification as Exhibit No. 10 11 1 is the contract between Sound Water Company and Springwood II. 12 Marked for identification as Exhibit No. 2 is 13 14 the contract between Sound Water Company and Horton 15 Meadows. Marked for identification as Exhibit No. 3 16 is the contract between Sound Water Company and Plum 17 Ridge. Marked as Exhibit No. 4 is the contract between 18 19 Sound Water Company and Rainier Vista-Chennes Park. Marked as Exhibit No. 5 is the contract between Sound 20 Water and Bill Barrett Builder, Inc., concerning the 21 22 Commons Apartments. Marked for identification as Exhibit No. 6 is a 23 December 18th, 1996 letter from the Department of 24 Health to the Board of Directors of Sound Water 25

00034 Company. And marked for identification as Exhibit 1 2 No. 7 is a January 7th, 1997 letter from the Department of Health to Mr. Phil Pettit of Sound 3 4 Water Company. Are there any other preliminary matters we need 5 6 to discuss before we hear the testimony? 7 MS. TENNYSON: Yes, Your Honor. 8 The parties have reached a stipulation on the first four contracts, for UW-961042, 961043, 961044, and 9 10 961141. The staff has agreed to stipulate that the 11 amounts and the terms of these contracts are just and 12 reasonable, and we recommend that these contracts be 13 14 approved. CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Did you have 15 16 anything to add to that, Mr. Lundgaard? 17 MR. LUNDGAARD: No. We, of 18 course, would concur with that stipulation. 19 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Did you plan to submit a written stipulation? 20 MS. TENNYSON: If you would 21 22 prefer one, we can do that. We had not planned to do it. 23 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: I would prefer 24 25 if you would follow up your oral stipulation with a

short, written stipulation --1 2 MS. TENNYSON: We can do that. 3 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: --4 memorializing that. And then there is no stipulation concerning the fifth contract --5 6 MS. TENNYSON: That's correct. 7 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: -- which is the 8 Bill Barrett --MR. LUNDGAARD: Yes. 9 10 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: -- Commons 11 Apartment contract. MS. TENNYSON: With regard to 12 that contract, there are some concerns that may be 13 addressed through testimony. I have discussed it 14 15 with Mr. Lundgaard and would like to put some testimony on the record about that; in particular, 16 Exhibits 6 and 7 relate to that contract. 17 There was -- the Department of Health had given 18 19 an approval and has then withdrawn that approval for service to be provided under those contracts. 20 I understand that Mr. Pettit has some additional 21 22 information and may be looking to submit an exhibit before closing the record, but is not -- does not 23 have that exhibit today. 24 25 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: All right. Did

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you have anything else to add in the way of opening 1 2 statement before we hear the testimony? MS. TENNYSON: I do not. 3 4 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Mr. Lundgaard? MR. LUNDGAARD: No, I have none. 5 6 Just ready to proceed. 7 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Very well, then. Mr. Lundgaard, please call -- I understand you 8 9 just have one witness. Is that correct? 10 11 MR. LUNDGAARD: Yes. 12 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Please call 13 that one witness. 14 MR. LUNDGAARD: Phil Pettit, come 15 forward, please. 16 17 PHIL PETTIT, having been first duly 18 sworn, was called as a witness and was examined and 19 20 testified as follows: 21 22 DIRECT EXAMINATION 23 BY MR. LUNDGAARD: 24 Q State and spell your name for the record. 25 A My name is Phil Pettit; P-h-i-l, last name is

2	Q And your business address?	
3	A 9418 204th Street, Graham, Washington 98338.	
4	Q And the name of your business?	
5	A Sound Water Company.	
6	Q Okay. And what is your position with that company?	<b>)</b>
7	A Manager/owner.	
8	Q Okay. And you're familiar with the day-to-day	
9	operations of the company?	
10	A Yes, I am.	
11	MR. LUNDGAARD: I assume the	
12	exhibits have been admitted.	
13	CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: We have not	
14	been moved to be admitted.	
15	MR. LUNDGAARD: I would move for	
16	the admission of Exhibits 1 through 7.	
17	MS. TENNYSON: No objection.	
18	CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Very well. The	
19	exhibits that have been marked for identification as	
20	Exhibits 1 through 7 will be admitted into the	
21	record.	
22	(Exhibit Nos. 1 through 7	
23	admitted.)	
24		
25	Q (By Mr. Lundgaard) Showing you a copy of Exhibit S	5,

00038 is that the contract that was entered into regarding 1 2 the Commons Apartments with Bill Barrett? Yes, it is. 3 Α 4 Q And there has been a portion of that, in paragraph 5 one, under the agreement, that was stricken out and initialed. 6 7 Is that initialed by you and Mr. Barrett? Yes, it was. 8 Α 9 Q And at the time that this contract was drawn up, 10 your contract included Federal Contribution in Aid of 11 Construction Tax; is that correct? 12 А Yes. And that developed a cost figure that's shown in 13 Q 14 paragraph two as being \$190 for each lot connection; 15 is that correct? 16 A That's correct. 17 And in actuality, that tax is no longer in existence Q 18 and so there's no need or justification for 19 collecting the \$65 portion of the \$190; is that 20 correct? 21 A That's correct. 22 Q And the \$65 is the amount of the tax? The tax itself. 23 А 24 Q Okay. Since submitting Exhibit 5 to the Commission 25 for approval, you have prepared a new contract form

which has deleted any reference to the Contribution 1 2 in Aid of Construction Tax; is that correct? Yes, we have. 3 Α 4 Q And the amount that you are asking for approval now 5 is \$125 for the lot connection? Α Yes. 6 And in addition, paragraph three covers the service 7 0 8 meter cost of \$528.50, and that's already built into 9 your tariff which has been approved by the Commission? 10 Yes. 11 Α Okay. You intend to have Mr. Barrett either sign a 12 Q new contract or delete the portion of paragraph two, 13 14 starting with the sentence, This amount includes the 15 Federal Contribution in Aid of Construction Tax; is that correct? 16 17 Yes. Α 18 MR. LUNDGAARD: And we would like 19 to submit a late-filed exhibit, which would be, probably, a brand-new contract that would clean up 20 21 and delete the language relating to the Federal tax, and ask that we be given an exhibit number so that we 22 can submit that to you within the next ten days. 23 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Very well. At 24 the end of the hearing, if you'll remind me, you can 25

1		get a number for that.
2		MR. LUNDGAARD: Okay. Fine.
3		CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: And you said it
4		would be submitted within ten days?
5		MR. LUNDGAARD: Yes.
6		CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: We'll have to
7		give Commission staff an opportunity to take a look
8		at it and see if they have any objection.
9		MS. TENNYSON: Yes.
10		MR. LUNDGAARD: All right.
11	Q	(By Mr. Lundgaard) Mr. Pettit, in the course of
12		getting your approvals, do you obtain an approval
13		from the Department of Health?
14	A	In the very beginning, yes, we do.
15	Q	And explain generally what the process is in getting
16		these approvals.
17	A	Well, normally first it comes to us and wants a
18		subdivision to start, so we get a blueprint drawn up
19		in order to submit to the Department of Health for
20		their approval for construction.
21		Then the Department of Health sends us back a
22		letter saying, Yes, you are approved for
23		construction. At that time, we take that letter we
24		get from the Department of Health and go into a
25		contract with the developer, which we have approved

1 by the Washington State Utilities Commission.

2 And then, after the water line's all been put in the ground and everything, then we resubmit to the 3 4 Department of Health for final approval on the 5 contract, after the water line's been put in properly, and at that time we get final approval of 6 the water system to accept the new customers. 7 8 And so Exhibit 6, the December 18th letter from the Q 9 Department of Health, is a letter that indicates that the project's been completed according to plans and 10 11 specs, and they have indicated their approval by their department? 12 Uh-huh. (Witness answers affirmatively.) 13 Α 14 0 Then, subsequent to that, a letter was sent out to 15 you dated January 7th, which is Exhibit 7, indicating 16 they had withdrawn that approval; is that correct? 17 Α Yes. And could you explain what the problem was? 18 0 19 Α What happened was the Department of Health hadn't notified the Department of -- Pierce County Fire 20 21 Prevention that they were accepting it, and Fire Prevention decided that there was not enough water in 22 the water main to build all these apartments. 23 And when we went back and refilled all of our 24 fire hydrants, we found out that we did have some 25

1 valves turned off by another developer.

2 So we turned them back on, retested, and now they are in good shape. And the Department of --3 4 Pierce County Fire Prevention, they have all that 5 information. So if I understand you, the test was for fire flow 6 Q 7 and the County felt it was not sufficient? 8 Α Sufficient, yes. 9 Q And the reason that you discovered why that test 10 wasn't acceptable was because there were valves that 11 had been shut off which prevented the water to loop through the system? 12 To loop throughout the system, yes. 13 Α 14 0 And fire flow is a requirement for approval of these 15 projects? 16 Yes. This project here happened to be a commercial Α system, and they needed more fire protection than a 17 normal housing development system do. 18 19 0 And so you did, then, run a new fire flow test and the Pierce -- is it Pierce County? 20 21 Α Pierce County Fire Marshal's office does have it. 22 And they, then, approved that test? Q 23 Α Yes. 24 Q And so they have actually allowed the contractor to 25 obtain building permits --

1 A Yes. 2 Q -- which would indicate their approval of the system? А 3 Yes. 4 Q Without their approval of the fire flow testing, they 5 would not have issued the permits, I take it. 6 No, they will not issue a building permit. No, they Α 7 will not. MR. LUNDGAARD: So, Your Honor, 8 9 we would ask for another exhibit to be reserved to be submitted, again, within ten days, which will be a 10 11 letter from the Department of Health correcting their -- so to speak, their January 7th letter will be a 12 letter indicating that fire flow has been approved. 13 14 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Are you 15 reasonably certain that ten days will be sufficient 16 for that? 17 MR. LUNDGAARD: My client thinks he can get that faxed out in a day. I'm not 18 19 certain. So we think ten days will be sufficient. CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: That would be a 20 21 Department of Health letter, then? 22 MR. LUNDGAARD: Yes. CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Very well. The 23 record will be kept open for those late-filed 24 additions. If you need additional time, be sure to 25

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      let us know.

         (By Mr. Lundgaard) Mr. Pettit, showing you a copy of
    Q

      what's been marked for identification as Exhibit 8,
      is this a cost estimate for the main tank three that
23
      was submitted some years ago to the Utilities and
24
25
      Transportation Commission staff for their approval?
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1 A Yes, it was. 2 Q And does that include the bids and the costs that 3 were obtained by your company for the construction of 4 that project? 5 Yes, it is. Α 6 And the last page is a summary of those costs and 0 7 indicating the per-connection charge of \$190 with a breakdown of cost per connection of 125 and the 8 Federal CIA tax of \$65, for the figure of \$190 that 9 10 you had in your contracts? 11 Yes, it is. Α And the new contract, because the CIA tax is no 12 0 longer in effect, the cost per connection will be the 13 \$125 and not the 190? 14 15 Α That's true. Okay. And this is the material that was submitted to 16 0 17 the Department for approval of all of the contracts that you have had previously approved and the four 18 19 that were approved here by stipulation today; is that 20 correct? 21 Α That's correct. 22 MR. LUNDGAARD: Okay. I would offer Exhibit 8. 23 24 MS. TENNYSON: I have no objection. 25

CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Exhibit 8 will 1 2 be admitted. (Exhibit No. 8 admitted.) 3 4 MR. LUNDGAARD: I have no further 5 6 questions. 7 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: I just had a clarification to ask. You said, Submitted to the 8 9 Department. Did you mean to the Commission or --10 11 MR. LUNDGAARD: Yes. To the staff, the Washington Utilities Commission staff. 12 13 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Very well. 14 Thank you. 15 Ms. Tennyson, do you have any cross-examination of this witness? 16 17 MS. TENNYSON: I have a couple of 18 questions. 19 20 21 CROSS-EXAMINATION 22 BY MS. TENNYSON: Mr. Pettit, with regard to the Department of Health 23 Q withdrawing the approval for the Commons Apartments, 24 25 you indicated that you now have approval from the

iceu ll.

1		Pierce County Fire Department.
2	A	We have it from Fire District 21, which does fire
3		flow tests. Yes, I do have that in our office.
4	Q	Okay. And will that information be conveyed to the
5		Department of Health?
6	A	The fire district is supposed to convey it
7		themselves. That's their job.
8	Q	And you're reasonably certain that the Department of
9		Health will provide you with this approval?
10	A	Yes.
11	Q	Can you tell us how close these apartments are to
12		being built and actually needing to have a water
13		system?
14	A	I would say they're probably breaking ground already;
15		close to it.
16	Q	So occupancy would be sometime later this year?
17	A	Yeah.
18	Q	And did I understand you, on your testimony relating
19		to Exhibit 8, that the first four contracts that we
20		have not had testimony about, the cost per connection
21		will be \$125 and not the 190 that's reflected in
22		there?
23	A	Yes, it will 125.
24	Q	I don't have a full copy of the exhibits, but you did
25		submit revised letters, a revised version of that, to

the Commission staff? 1 2 Α Yes, I did. 3 MS. TENNYSON: I have no further 4 questions. MR. LUNDGAARD: I have nothing 5 6 further. 7 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Just following up on the last question, the exhibits that I have --8 9 1, 2, 3, and 4 -- still seem to indicate a charge of \$190 per lot. 10 Was there going to be some sort of revised 11 exhibit? 12 MS. TENNYSON: Stapled to each of 13 14 those exhibits there is a letter. 15 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Okay. Very well. 16 17 MS. TENNYSON: Our written 18 stipulation will reflect the staff recommends 19 approval as revised by the letter. 20 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: And then I also 21 had a question about representations that were made 22 in a declaration that was filed by Mr. Pettit and the answer to a Motion For Reconsideration. 23 Is there any reason the parties see to put those 24 25 representations on the record? There was a

00049 commitment that Rainier View Water Company will have 1 2 no further responsibility for additional supply, storage, et cetera. 3 4 The commitment that Mr. Pettit will perform insulation of the meters at no cost for Rainier View 5 if insulation occurs after the transfer of assets to 6 7 -- from Sound Water to Rainier View, is that matter 8 being handled elsewhere or does that need to -- do 9 those commitments need to be put on the record in 10 this proceeding? Let's be off the record to discuss it. 11 (Discussion off the record.) 12 13 14 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: The parties were examining the language that I referred to, and, 15 again, I would ask for response of the parties 16 whether either feels a need to put that on the record 17 in this proceeding or whether that's being addressed 18 19 elsewhere. MS. TENNYSON: The Commission 20 staff does not believe that this needs to be part of 21 22 the record here. It goes beyond the scope of this hearing and the significant factors contained in that 23 have already been covered in his testimony. 24

25 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Very well.

Thank you. 1 2 Did you have anything to add, Mr. Lundgaard? 3 MR. LUNDGAARD: No. I agree with 4 Counsel. CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Well, 5 6 Mr. Lundgaard, do you have any other witnesses for 7 Sound Water? 8 MR. LUNDGAARD: No. The company 9 rests. 10 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Thank you. Ms. Tennyson, does Commission staff have any 11 witnesses to call? 12 MS. TENNYSON: At this time, 13 Commission staff does not have a need to call any 14 15 witnesses. What we would like to reserve is additional exhibits have been reserved for 16 information to be presented. 17 18 We would like an opportunity to present a 19 written rebuttal or statement with regard to those exhibits, if it is necessary. 20 We anticipate, however, that if those exhibits 21 22 are submitted, as represented to the Commission staff, then the Commission staff would have no 23 objection to the approval of these contracts. 24 25 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Very well.

Then I will reserve Exhibit Nos. 9 and 10 to be the 1 2 next two in order. Exhibit No. 9 will be reserved for the revised contract with Bill Barrett Builder, 3 4 and the Exhibit No. 10 will be reserved for the Department of Health letter. 5 6 And Commission staff will be given an 7 opportunity to respond to the exhibits and indicate 8 whether they have any objections to them. And also, 9 if you feel there's a need at that point to request that the hearing be reopened, I would entertain a 10 11 request at that point. MS. TENNYSON: Okay. 12 13 MR. LUNDGAARD: Okay. 14 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: I quess the 15 other matter would be -- perhaps it's premature right now, but -- the other question would be whether you 16 17 want to waive an initial order and proceed directly 18 to a final order in the proceeding. 19 MR. LUNDGAARD: We would so 20 stipulate. 21 MS. TENNYSON: Yes. 22 CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: I don't know if you want to stipulate to that now or wait until after 23 the final exhibits are in. 24 25 MR. LUNDGAARD: I'm satisfied. I

feel comfortable that we can do that at this time. MS. TENNYSON: Yes, I agree. CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Very well. Then I'll note your waiver of an initial order, and we'll proceed to a final order after the record is closed. Is there anything else to come before us this morning? MS. TENNYSON: I have nothing. MR. LUNDGAARD: We have nothing more. CHAIRMAN PRUSIA: Very well, then. The hearing will be adjourned and we'll be off the record. (Proceedings adjourned at 11:15 a.m.)
