To Management and the Board of Directors:

We have audited the consolidated financial statements of Whidbey Telephone Company and Subsidiaries (the "Company") as of December 31, 2015, and have issued our report thereon dated April 27, 2016. Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our letter to you dated December 1, 2015. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

Significant Audit Findings

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by Whidbey Telephone Company and Subsidiaries are described in Note 1 to the consolidated financial statements. No new accounting policies were adopted, and the application of existing policies was not changed during 2015. We noted no transactions entered into by the Company during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the consolidated financial statements in the proper period. During 2015, the Company's wholly owned subsidiary FiberCloud, Inc. ("FiberCloud") sold all of its equipment, customer contracts, customer lists, marketing information, trademarks and trade names to an unrelated company, which resulted in a material loss. The loss is separately identified in the Company's 2015 Statement of Operations and Comprehensive Income under the caption Loss from Discontinued Operations. A description of the transaction is included in Note 8 to the Company's consolidated financial statements. The Consolidated Statements of Operations and Comprehensive Income report the results of FiberCloud's operations as discontinued operations for all periods presented. The assets and liabilities of discontinued operations are also presented separately on the Consolidated Balance Sheets for all periods presented.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the consolidated financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the consolidated financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. The most sensitive estimates affecting these consolidated financial statements include management's

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estimate of the useful lives of property, plant and equipment, recoverability of long-term assets, fair value of financial instruments and investments, collectability of related party receivables and interstate revenue requirements all of which are based on prior experience with similar assets, liabilities and interstate filing requirements. Also included is management's estimate of the future maturities of long-term debt which are based on minimum required payments at current levels of debt.

We evaluated these estimates and determined that they are reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Certain consolidated financial statement disclosures are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statement users. The most sensitive disclosures affecting the consolidated financial statements were regarding investments (Note 4), property, plant and equipment (Note 5), notes payable and long-term debt (Note 6), discontinued operations (Note 8), leases and service agreements (Note 9) and various related party transactions (Notes 4 and 11).

The consolidated financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent and clear.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are clearly trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Management has corrected all such misstatements. In addition, none of the misstatements detected as a result of audit procedures and corrected by management were material, either individually or in the aggregate, to the consolidated financial statements taken as a whole.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a financial accounting, reporting or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction that could be significant to the consolidated financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated April 27, 2016.

Management Consultations with Other Independent Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the Company's consolidated financial statements or a determination of the type of auditor's opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

Other Audit Findings or Issues

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to retention as the Company's auditors.

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However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not a condition to our retention.

Other Matters

With respect to the supplementary information accompanying the consolidated financial statements, we made certain inquiries of management and evaluated the form, content and methods of preparing the information to determine that the information complies with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the method of preparing it has not changed from the prior period and the information is appropriate and complete in relation to our audit of the consolidated financial statements. We compared and reconciled the supplementary information to the underlying accounting records used to prepare the consolidated financial statements or to the consolidated financial statements themselves.

This information is intended solely for the use of Management and the Board of Directors of Whidbey Telephone Company and Subsidiaries and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
