OCTOBER 13, 2020 1 2 1:34 P.M. 3 ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE: Let's be on the record in Docket UT-200751. Caption: Frontier 4 5 Communications Northwest, LLC, DBA Ziply Fiber versus Kalama Telephone Company. 6 7 I am Administrative Law Judge Gregory J. Kopta 8 who has been assigned by the Commission to preside in 9 this proceeding. And we are here today to have a 10 prehearing conference which we are conducting virtually as we have been since the COVID-19 pandemic began. 11 12 So let's begin this prehearing conference with making appearances, beginning with the attorney from 13 Ziply Fiber. 14 15 Thank you, Your Honor. MR. THOMSON: 16 This is George Thomson. I represent Ziply 17 Fiber. ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE: And for Kalama? 18 19 MR. FINNIGAN: This is Rick Finnigan, appearing for Kalama Telephone Company. 20 21 ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE: Is there anyone 22 else who is wishing to make an appearance? Hearing none, we will proceed with the 23 24 prehearing conference. 25 First order of business is whether there are any

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Page 4 interventions? I've not received any written petitions 1 2 to intervene. And I don't see anyone else on the line so 3 I will presume that there are no requests for 4 intervention. 5 Second order of business is discovery. 6 Do the parties want to have the Commission's 7 discovery rules available? 8 MR. THOMSON: Your Honor, George Thomson. 9 I'm pleased to announce that I think the parties 10 have reached an agreement in principle to settle the 11 dispute. So I'm not sure we need to delve into discovery 12 today. 13 ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE: All right. And the same is true for the need for any protective order? 14 15 MR. THOMSON: I believe so, Your Honor. 16 But if I might have the indulgence of being able to explain a little bit about the parties' agreement in 17 18 principle. Maybe that will help us discover whether or 19 not we need a protective agreement in this situation or 20 not. 21 ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE: All right. 22 Please proceed. 23 MR. THOMSON: As the court knows, this is a 24 boundary dispute about whether or not Kalama and, as a 25 counterclaim, whether or not Ziply Fiber, built into

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areas outside of their ILEC service territory. 1 2 And the parties, after some discussion over the 3 last weeks, have decided that in the interest of the parties, and we also believe the public and commission 4 5 staff and Your Honor, that we settle this matter by essentially swapping service territory to recognize where 6 7 the parties are serving outside of their ILEC service 8 territory. And then in that way, both parties, having 9 agreed to a map, can withdraw their -- well, first, in 10 11 the Ziply's case, their complaint, and in Kalama's case, 12 the countercomplaint, once the -- a map has been agreed 13 upon. 14 Now, I'll pause there and let Mr. Finnigan chime in with anything that he may want to say at that point. 15 16 MR. FINNIGAN: No. That -- that's I think, from my perspective, the solution for 17 accurate. 18 today would be to simply put matters on hold and allow our engineers to work on things and see if we can get the 19 details worked out. 20 And then as Mr. Thomson said, if they are, just 21 22 file our request to withdraw our pleadings. 23 MR. THOMSON: So, Your Honor, I guess that necessitates Ziply, as the complainant, move for a 24 25 continuance of 90 days of this proceeding to allow both

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parties' engineers to get together and to redraw maps 1 2 that will be subsequently filed with the Commission to 3 recognize new service territory boundaries for the ILEC 4 service territory. 5 MR. FINNIGAN: And I would join in that 6 request. ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE: All right. 7 8 Well, that sounds like a reasonable proposal. And I 9 grant that request. At this point I'm not sure that I need to enter 10 an order to that effect. What I will do is send out a 11 12 notice of continuance. How long a period of time do you think would be 13 reasonable for you all to undertake the activities that 14 15 you need to do? 16 MR. THOMSON: George Thomson again. 17 I suggest 90 days should be sufficient for us. 18 At least to understand where we are and at least report 19 back to the court regarding our progress on the 20 settlement. We would hope within those 90 days to actually 21 22 be able to move to dismiss our complaint and 23 countercomplaint. 24 ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE: All right. 25 MR. FINNIGAN: I concur.

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1	ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE: That sounds
2	reasonable. I will issue a notice granting the
3	continuance until 90 days. At which point I will ask for
4	a status report from the parties, at a minimum. And
5	we'll see what happens based on your discussions.
б	MR. THOMSON: Appreciate it, Your Honor.
7	Thank you.
8	MR. FINNIGAN: Thank you.
9	ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE: Is there
10	anything else that we need to take up at the moment?
11	MR. THOMSON: Not from Ziply, sir.
12	MR. FINNIGAN: And not from Kalama.
13	ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE: All right. Then
14	that concludes our business for today. Thank you,
15	gentlemen. And we are adjourned.
