6	JUDGE PEARSON: So let's be on the record.
7	Good afternoon. Today is Friday, December 20th, 2019.
8	The time is approximately 1:30 p.m. This is Docket
9	TG-190672, which is captioned In the Matter of
10	Determining the Proper Carrier Classification of, and
11	Complaint for Penalties Against Westside Waste, LLC.
12	We're here for a prehearing conference today
13	to address procedural and other preliminary matters.
14	My name is Rayne Pearson. I am an
15	administrative law judge presiding over this matter.
16	So let's start by taking appearances for
17	both parties beginning with Commission Staff.
18	MR. ROBERSON: Good afternoon. My name is
19	Jeff Roberson, R-o-b-e-r-s-o-n, Assistant Attorney
20	General, representing Staff, and my contact information
21	is on file.
22	JUDGE PEARSON: Thank you.
23	And for the company?
24	MR. DIETRICH: Yeah, my name is Steve
25	Dietrich. I'm an attorney representing Westside Waste.

1	JUDGE PEARSON: I'll need to stop you for
2	one second. Can I get you to turn on your microphone.
3	If you press the button, it will illuminate green. You
4	need to just wait a second, press it and wait. There
5	you go, and then if you could just start over.
6	MR. DIETRICH: Okay. How is that? Can you
7	hear me?
8	JUDGE PEARSON: Yes.
9	MR. DIETRICH: My name's Steve Dietrich.
10	I'm an attorney representing Westside Waste, LLC.
11	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Have you entered a
12	notice of appearance in this docket?
13	MR. DIETRICH: I did.
14	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay, perfect. So we have
15	all of your information on file.
16	MR. DIETRICH: Yes.
17	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So I don't know how
18	familiar you are with the Commission's processes, but I
19	was just kind of going to give some background about why
20	we're here today and what our options are going forward.
21	MR. DIETRICH: Yeah, that would be great. I
22	mean, just for your information, I was an assistant
23	attorney general for about 25 years.
24	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
25	MR. DIETRICH: So I'm familiar with

1	administrative law processes
2	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
3	MR. DIETRICH: but not UTC in
4	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
5	MR. DIETRICH: specifically.
6	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay, perfect.
7	So this matter was initiated by Order 01 in
8	this docket, which seeks to classify Westside Waste as a
9	solid waste collection carrier and alleges that the
10	company is operating or has operated without the
11	required certificate from the Commission.
12	We typically deal with these matters, which
13	are called classification proceedings, as brief
14	adjudicative proceedings, or BAPs, rather than full
15	evidentiary hearings. And you're probably familiar with
16	what a BAP is, then, I'm guessing?
17	MR. DIETRICH: Yes.
18	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So the way that we
19	conduct our brief adjudicative proceedings, I guess to
20	kind of explain the difference between a full
21	evidentiary hearing and a BAP, in a full evidentiary
22	hearing, parties conduct discovery and are required to
23	file written testimony in advance of the hearing that we
24	refer to as prefiled testimony, and then at the hearing,
25	we conduct cross-examination only. This is a process

1	typically reserved for more complex matters with
2	multiple parties or multiple issues.
3	And historically, the Commission has
4	conducted classification hearings as brief adjudicative
5	proceedings. And if we do that here, we'll set a
6	hearing date a couple of months out, and then parties
7	would file any documents they wish to be considered at
8	the BAP a week before the BAP. And then at the BAP,
9	parties will have an opportunity to testify, present
10	other witnesses to testify on their behalf, introduce
11	evidence, and then cross-examine Staff's witness or
12	witnesses.
13	So my question I guess at the outset for the
14	two of you is if there's any objection to conducting
15	this proceeding as a BAP?
16	MR. ROBERSON: Not from Staff.
17	MR. DIETRICH: Not from the company.
18	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So that brings us to
19	the schedule. I would like to build at least one
20	settlement conference into the schedule because I'm
21	optimistic that the parties will be able to negotiate a
22	settlement that resolves all of the matters that were
23	set out in the complaint, and the Commission always
24	prefers that the parties work together to reach an
25	agreed outcome.

1	So in light of of that fact, and also
2	considering the Commission's scheduling needs at this
3	time, I'm thinking of setting a hearing about 90 days
4	out if that works for the parties, to give you all time
5	to work together and then also just to take into
6	consideration other scheduling constraints that we have
7	here at the Commission.
8	MR. DIETRICH: So you would be looking in
9	March or we would be looking in March?
10	JUDGE PEARSON: That's what I was thinking.
11	MR. DIETRICH: And and that's fine. I
12	would just say, my client has who obviously wants to
13	be here and testify at the hearing, if there is one,
14	he's a in addition to owning this company, he's an
15	over-the-road trucker.
16	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
17	MR. DIETRICH: So he has very limited
18	availability.
19	JUDGE PEARSON: Sure.
20	MR. DIETRICH: And it's basically Monday
21	mornings and Fridays.
22	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
23	MR. DIETRICH: So if if at all we can
24	accommodate that, that would be great.
25	JUDGE PEARSON: We can do that.

1	So what we could do is we could we could
2	pick a date now or I could have my paralegal reach out
3	to you both with a few dates and you could discuss it
4	over email. It's it's up to you all.
5	MR. DIETRICH: I I've got my calendar
б	here.
7	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
8	MR. ROBERSON: As do I.
9	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And you're aware of
10	Staff's availability generally speaking or that are at
11	least in the room?
12	MR. ROBERSON: I brought them with me.
13	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay, perfect.
14	So let me pull up my calendar as well as the
15	hearing room calendar. And you said that you need a
16	Monday or a Friday?
17	MR. DIETRICH: Yes.
18	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
19	MR. DIETRICH: And I'm I'm in a different
20	trial the first week of March, so I guess we'd have to
21	start the second week.
22	JUDGE PEARSON: I'm sorry, what was that?
23	MR. DIETRICH: I'm in a I'm in a jury
24	trial the first week of March.
25	JUDGE PEARSON: So would you prefer to do
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25	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Okay. Go ahead.	
24	MR. DIETRICH: That's fine.

1	MR. ROBERSON: With regard to settlement,
2	the parties have been in contact, and we're continuing
3	to discuss settlement. So I don't I don't know if
4	you want to flag like an official settlement conference,
5	but I think we've pretty much pledged to work together
6	to try to work this out before the hearing date.
7	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So what I think I'll
8	do is put a provision in the prehearing conference
9	order. In the schedule, it'll say settlement conference
10	TBD, but I will, consistent with the rule, have to
11	require you to notify me within a certain number of days
12	of the date that you've selected for the settlement
13	conference.
14	MR. ROBERSON: Okay.
15	JUDGE PEARSON: So how long do you think it
16	will take the two of you to pick a day? Do you think
17	you could do it by January 6th?
18	MR. DIETRICH: Oh, sure.
19	MR. ROBERSON: Definitely.
20	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So I will just ask
21	that you file a letter, just a brief letter on behalf of
22	both parties, either of you can do it, by January 6th
23	just notifying the Commission of when that first
24	settlement conference will take place. And then we will
25	set also in the prehearing conference order the hearing

1	for Monday, March 16th at 9:30 a.m. hoping, of course,
2	that we don't make it that far.
3	And just so you know, in the event that the
4	parties are able to reach a settlement, we'll resolve
5	this matter on a paper record and we'll be able to
6	cancel the hearing.
7	MR. DIETRICH: Okay.
8	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So I also just want
9	to inform you that the Commission requires electronic
10	filing of all documents in formal proceedings, and the
11	Commission's rules provide for service of electronic
12	doc or electronic service of documents. So we will
13	also serve you all electronically and the parties are
14	expected to serve each other electronically.
15	And also, if either of you would like to add
16	names and email addresses of other representatives or
17	support staff who should receive electronic courtesy
18	copies of documents filed in this proceeding, you can
19	email me their contact information. And my email
20	address is rayne.pearson@utc.wa.gov.
21	Okay. Is there anything else that we need
22	to address while we're here today?
23	MR. DIETRICH: I don't think so, Judge. I
24	think we can you know, we're working well together so
25	far. I think, you know, the issues are pretty clear. I
