INTRODUCTION

Puget Sound Energy, Inc. ("PSE" or the "Company") hereby submits its 1. Answer to the Commission's Complaint in this docket dated April 29, 2005. PSE's address for purposes of this proceeding is:

ANSWER

2. Because paragraph 1 of the Complaint contains no legal or factual allegations, PSE neither admits nor denies this paragraph.

I. PARTIES

- 3. Answering paragraph 2, PSE admits that the Commission is an agency of the State of Washington, authorized by Title 80 RCW to regulate in the public interest the rates, services, facilities and practices of all persons engaging within the State of Washington in the business of supplying any utility service or commodity to the public for compensation, and related activities, including gas companies.
- 4. Answering paragraph 3, PSE admits that it is an electrical and gas company subject to regulation by the Commission pursuant to RCW 80.01.040(3), RCW 80.28.210, and chapter 480-93 WAC.

II. JURISDICTION

5. Answering paragraph 4, PSE admits that the Commission generally has jurisdiction over this matter pursuant to the provisions of RCW 80.01, RCW 80.04, RCW 80.28 and chapter 480-93 WAC. With respect to specific provisions cited in the Complaint, paragraph 4 contains legal conclusions to which no answer is required.

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III. FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS

- 6. Answering paragraph 5, PSE admits that the work described therein was being performed by Pilchuck Contractors ("Pilchuck"), a PSE contractor, but states that the work at issue occurred on June 21, 2004, rather than June 22, 2004.
- 7. Answering paragraph 6, PSE admits that a Pilchuck employee was injured. Although no PSE employees were present at the time the incident occurred, PSE admits that Pilchuck reported to PSE that the injury occurred as a result of two Pilchuck employees who failed to communicate, which resulted in their failure to follow PSE's "Purging" standard. This was a case of employee misconduct.
- 8. Answering paragraph 7, although no PSE employees were present at the time the incident occurred, PSE admits that Pilchuck reported to PSE that at the time the incident occurred, the Pilchuck employee was purging into service a newly installed gas main. PSE clarifies that purging into service is the process of introducing natural gas into the pipe in a manner that prevents an explosive air-natural gas mixture from forming in a space where ignition can occur.
- 9. Answering paragraph 8, although no PSE employees were present at the time the incident occurred, PSE admits that Pilchuck reported to PSE that the pipe squeezer was released, allowing natural gas to flow to the purge point, before the vent piping was installed. PSE further admits that the purge vent piping is a vertical pipe allowing vented air/gas to be discharged to the atmosphere in a controlled matter, and that had this been installed, the gas would have been discharged up to the atmosphere.
- 10. Answering paragraph 9, although no PSE employees were present at the time the incident occurred, PSE admits that Pilchuck reported to PSE that a Pilchuck employee jumped into the hole to shut down the flowing gas. PSE further admits that Pilchuck

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reported to PSE that the flowing gas ignited, and the Pilchuck employee was injured and required hospitalization.

- 11. Answering paragraph 10, PSE admits that the work performed was covered by written standards and field procedures for "purging" and "preventing accidental ignition" contained in the 2004 PSE Gas Operating Standard 2525.3400, and that, when followed, these standards and procedures aid the safe performance of the work to be done.
- Answering paragraph 11, PSE admits that the requirements of 49 CFR Part 12. 192 apply to work conducted on PSE's gas system. Such work is typically performed by PSE's service providers—including Pilchuck. These service providers are independent contractors experienced in their fields who perform various kinds of work for PSE under long-term agreements (Master Service Agreements and Individual Service Contracts). Under such agreements, PSE requires these service providers to perform work on PSE's gas system in accordance with PSE's standards and procedures, and PSE has systems in place to monitor and audit such compliance on an ongoing basis. Furthermore, the service providers are required to be qualified per PSE's Operator Qualification Plan, developed in accordance with 49 CFR 192 Subpart N. Any activities at a job site that do not comply with PSE's standards violate PSE's express instructions and are outside the scope of authority granted by PSE to work on its system. PSE denies the implications in this allegation that PSE is responsible for each and every individual's actions at each and every job site at which work involving PSE's gas system is being conducted. The incident at issue in this case involved misconduct by two Pilchuck employees, who failed to follow PSE's standards and procedures.
 - 13. Further answering paragraph 11, PSE states that since the accident occurred, PSE has taken several actions. PSE's Gas First Response organization reviewed the incident at group safety meetings. They discussed the specific details of the incident, reinforced the

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need to follow standards and procedures, and reviewed the proper use of personal protective equipment in gaseous atmospheres. Further, PSE's Contract Management department has confirmed that Pilchuck's safety staff reviewed the elements of this incident with all of their employees during safety meetings.

- 14. Answering paragraph 12, this paragraph states legal opinions or conclusions for which answers are inappropriate and are therefore denied.
- 15. Answering paragraph 13, this paragraph states legal opinions or conclusions for which answers are inappropriate and are therefore denied. To the extent paragraph 13 alleges that PSE is liable for multiple violations when one act violates a standard in Commission rules and/or the CFR that is also a standard contained in PSE's Gas Operating Standards Manual, PSE denies the allegation. Specifically, PSE contends that the allegations by Commission Staff only support one alleged violation, as opposed to the multiple alleged violations enumerated in the Complaint.
- 16. Because paragraph 14 contains no legal or factual allegations, PSE neither admits nor denies this paragraph.
- 17. Answering paragraph 15, this paragraph states legal opinions or conclusions for which answers are inappropriate and are therefore denied. To the extent an answer is required, PSE admits that Pilchuck reported to PSE that one or more Pilchuck employees failed to follow PSE's Gas Operating Standard 2525.3400 relating to purging. PSE denies that the facts alleged by Staff constitute three violations.
- 18. Answering paragraphs 16-18, PSE admits that PSE's Gas Operating Standard 2525.3400, titled "Purging," requires purge connections to be positioned so as to protect the public and personnel performing the purge; requires vent piping to be oriented to direct the purged gas away from workers, public and property; and requires that the pipe be grounded

to prevent the accumulation of a static charge. Although no PSE employees were present at the time the incident occurred, PSE admits that Pilchuck reported to PSE that Pilchuck employees failed to comply with this standard.

- 19. Answering paragraph 19, this paragraph states legal opinions or conclusions for which answers are inappropriate and are therefore denied. Further, PSE denies that three violations of its standards occurred.
- 20. Because paragraph 20 contains no legal or factual allegations, PSE neither admits nor denies this paragraph.
- 21. Paragraphs 21 30 of the Complaint state legal opinions or conclusions or describe procedural matters for the conduct of the hearing into this matter that do not require an answer. Thus, PSE neither admits nor denies paragraphs 21 30 of the Complaint. Generally, PSE denies that the Commission should impose any penalty or other relief against PSE for the violations alleged in the Complaint. If the Commission ultimately determines that any penalties should be imposed, the amount of the penalty, if any, should be much less than \$75,000.

<u>DEFENSES AND AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSES</u>

- 22. Imposition of the total potential penalties of \$75,000 would not be appropriate in this case.
- 23. The incident alleged in the Complaint does not represent knowing or intentional conduct by PSE that was gross or malicious. The incident alleged in the Complaint involved employee misconduct by two employees of PSE's service provider. The incident does not involve violations of multiple standards or repeated violations of a standard. After the incident occurred, PSE reviewed the incident, reinforced the need to follow its standards and procedures, and reviewed the proper use of personal protective

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equipment in gaseous atmospheres. Further, PSE's Contract Management department has confirmed that Pilchuck's safety staff reviewed the elements of this incident with all of their employees during safety meetings. In addition, PSE has procedures in place for monitoring and auditing service provider compliance with PSE's standards on an ongoing basis in an effort to reduce the number of individual incidents in which a service provider's crew violates PSE's standards while working on PSE's system.

CLAIM FOR RELIEF

24. Having answered the specific allegations in the Commission complaint, PSE requests that the Commission enter findings that PSE's policies and procedures were protective of worker health and safety under the facts alleged herein, and that the Complaint be dismissed.
