> But we also wanted to revisit the issue of safety of smart meters in general and echo the fact that there are hundreds of scientists around the world who are sounding the alarm of the dangers of smart meters. And so I wanted to go on the record with that statement and encourage you to look very closely at the data that we have presented.

We submitted over about 1400 pages of research and resources and information for you. Some of the research comes from our own University of Washington, Dr. Henry Lai, and it's spelled L-a-i. I may be pronouncing it incorrectly. But he and his bio-initiative organization have valuable, extremely valuable information that has been studied now for decades, and I would encourage you to take a very close look at that.

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CHAIR DANNER: We have actually received three comments, so your time to speak -- or decide to may be very soon.

MR. MORRIS: Okay. Well, I won't comment at this time.

COMMISSIONER RENDAHL: We've received a number of written comments. I have an entire binder filled with written comments, so it's not that we haven't received comments yet in this docket just to clarify, so...

CHAIR DANNER: All right. So, Teri Sahm, would you come forward, please?

MS. SAHM: Can you hear me?

CHAIR DANNER: No. Is the light on? And you can move that towards you.

In addition, we just had a professor from Washington -- or excuse me, WSU who came out speaking out against the idea of 5G and smart meters as well. And so I would encourage you to look at that.

What is of concern here is that this technology is dangerous to all living things. It is dangerous to all of us people here in the room, it is dangerous particularly to children, it is dangerous to our living plants, it is dangerous to the birds, the bees, the bugs, the sea life. It's dangerous to all living creatures. And we are considering life at the expense of a faster mobile phone or a faster download? I think we need to consider these priorities very carefully.

And so I just wanted to, again, make the statement to please look at the safety of this. We have requested that this rollout be halted until the safety can be accurately assessed. Do you have any questions for me?
