JUDGE DOYLE: Let's be on the record. Good morning. My name is Samantha Doyle, and I'm the administrative law judge presiding over today's prehearing conference.

This is Docket TV-200861. We just took about a 15-minute recess, the time is approximately 9:45, to allow JFS Transport, Incorporated, doing business as Coast Movers time to appear.

So at this time, I see no one has joined the meeting, so let's first take an appearance from Commission Staff and then $I$ will entertain a motion for default depending on how Staff wants to proceed.

Mr. Roberson?
MR. ROBERSON: Good morning, Judge Doyle.
My name is Jeff Roberson, $R-o-b-e-r-s-o-n . ~ I ~ a m ~ a n ~$
assistant attorney general representing Commission
Staff. With me at counsel table is Staff's two witnesses, Ms. Jacque Hawkins-Jones and Ms. Susie Paul. And if you're ready, I'm ready to move for default. JUDGE DOYLE: Okay. Go right ahead.

MR. ROBERSON: The Administrative Procedure Act, RCW 34.05.440, and the Commission's procedural rules, which are at WAC 480-07-450, authorize the Commission to enter an order of default and dispose of the merits of the matter when a party fails to appear at the time and place commanded for hearing.

Order 01 in this matter, $I$ believe it's paragraph 48, provides notice to the company that if it fails to appear, it could be held in default under those two provisions.

The company has failed to appear as
required, so Staff would move to set out a move for an order of default and ask that the Commission allow Staff to present its merits case and dispose of this matter on the merits.

JUDGE DOYLE: Great. Let's walk through Staff's evidence and go ahead and start with how service was accomplished. Thank you. Your motion is accepted.

MR. ROBERSON: I believe the service is in the docket, the affidavit -- the affidavit of service, and I believe the record center would have served an electronic copy on the company.

JUDGE DOYLE: Okay. Great.
MR. ROBERSON: And at this point, Staff would call Ms. Jacque Hawkins-Jones to the stand.

MS. HAWKINS-JONES: Good morning. JUDGE DOYLE: Good morning.

Ms. Hawkins-Jones, can you raise your right hand. (Jacque Hawkins-Jones sworn.) JUDGE DOYLE: Thank you. Go right ahead.
E X A M I N A T I O N

BY MR. ROBERSON:
Q. Would you please state your full name and spell your last name for the record?
A. Yes, Jacque Hawkins-Jones, last name $\mathrm{H}-\mathrm{a}-\mathrm{w}-\mathrm{k}-\mathrm{i}-\mathrm{n}-\mathrm{s}$, hyphen, $\mathrm{J}-\mathrm{o}-\mathrm{n}-\mathrm{e}-\mathrm{s}$.
Q. Who employs you?
A. I am employed by the Washington State Utilities and Transportation Commission.
Q. What position do you hold at the Commission?
A. I am a compliance investigator in the consumer protection division.
Q. How long have you worked for the Commission as a compliance investigator?
A. I have been with the Commission as an investigator for over one year.
Q. What are your duties as an investigator?
A. As an investigator, I investigate the business practices of Commission-regulated utility and

2 carriers who may be operating without a
3 Commission-issued permit.
4 Q. Would you please provide a brief summary of your

JUDGE DOYLE: Okay. Let's just take a brief three-minute recess.

MR. ROBERSON: Thank you.
(Pause in the proceedings.)
JUDGE DOYLE: Let's be back on the record.
It's 9:52. We took a brief recess to open the exhibits that Staff just circulated. I had an opportunity to open and look at them all.

Go ahead, Mr. Roberson.
BY MR. ROBERSON:
Q. So excuse me, Ms. Hawkins-Jones, how did you become familiar with JFS again?
A. I became aware of JFS because I was asked to conduct a follow-up review of the company.
Q. And in the course of that review, did you discover that the Commission had cancelled JFS's permit?
A. Yes, I did.
Q. And when did the Commission cancel the company's permit?
A. In -- I found on March 2nd, 2020, the Commission issued an Order 01 in Docket TV-191046 and notified JFS Transport that its permit was cancelled for failure to file an annual report and pay the associated regulatory fees.
Q. Has JFS filed an application for reinstatement

1 since the cancellation of its permit?
A. Yes, I did.
Q. How did you do that?
A. I visited the company's website and obtained a quote for a move.
Q. What date did you review the company's website?
A. I reviewed the company's website on October 20th, 2020.
Q. So roughly seven months after the cancellation of its permit, correct?
A. Correct.
Q. What did you find when you went to the website?
A. I found that the company still had its UTC permit number listed on its website.
Q. And that permit number was for a household goods carrier, correct?
A. Correct.
Q. And you also mentioned that you obtained a quote from the website; is that correct?
A. That is correct.
Q. Did you take a screen capture of JFS's website when you visited it?
A. I did.
Q. Would you please turn to exhibit marked JHJ-1?
A. I'm there.
Q. Would you please identify this exhibit?
A. Yes, this is the screenshot of JFS Transport's web page that I captured on October 20th, 2020.
Q. Is that a true and accurate copy of the screen capture that you took when you visited the website?
A. Yes, it is.

MR. ROBERSON: Judge Doyle, at this point, Staff would move to admit Exhibit JHJ-1.

JUDGE DOYLE: Thank you. JHJ-1 is admitted.
(Exhibit JHJ-1 admitted.)
BY MR. ROBERSON:
Q. So, Ms. Hawkins, you mentioned that you requested a quote from JFS, how did you do that?
A. Yes. I used the company's free moving quote option available on its web page and requested a quote for a move to occur on October 31st, 2020. I requested the move be between two ZIP codes within the state of Washington.
Q. And what happened after you submitted your request for a quote?
A. I received a call from a gentleman who identified himself as Jason from JFS Transport.
Q. And what did you and Jason talk about on this phone call?
A. He requested additional information regarding the move and said he would provide me a quote via email.
Q. What information did you provide him about the move on that phone call?
A. I provided him the ZIP codes of the apartment buildings that $I$ was attempting to move into, he asked the floors of the apartments that $I$ was moving out of and into, and he asked if the parking spots were large enough to fit a moving truck.
Q. And after that conversation, did JFS provide you with a quote for the move?
A. Yes, he did.
Q. And what terms did that quote contain?
A. He provided me a quote for a three-man crew for $\$ 185$ per hour for a three-hour minimum and it included a \$395 transportation fee.
Q. Would you please turn to exhibit marked JHJ-2?
A. I'm there.
Q. Would you please identify that document?
A. This is the email I received from JFS Transport regarding my quote for a move.
Q. Is that a true and accurate copy of the quote that JFS provided to you?
A. Yes, it is.

MR. ROBERSON: At this point, Staff would move to admit Exhibit JHJ-2.

JUDGE DOYLE: JHJ-2 is now admitted into the record.
(Exhibit JHJ-2 admitted.)
MR. ROBERSON: And I have no further
questions for Ms. Hawkins-Jones, so I would tender her to the Bench if you have questions.

JUDGE DOYLE: No further questions. Thank
you, Ms. Hawkins-Jones.
MS. HAWKINS-JONES: Thank you.
MR. ROBERSON: At this point, Staff would call Ms. Susie Paul.

JUDGE DOYLE: And, Ms. Paul, can you please raise your right hand.
(Susie Paul sworn.) JUDGE DOYLE: Great. Thank you very much. Mr. Roberson, go right ahead.
EXAMINATION

BY MR. ROBERSON:
Q. Good morning. Would you please state your full

1 name and spell your last name for the record?
A. My name is Susie Paul. My last name is spelt P-a-u-l.
Q. Who employs you?
A. I'm employed by the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission.
Q. What position do you hold at the Commission?
A. I'm an investigator for the consumer protection section.
Q. How long have you worked as an investigator for the Commission?
A. I started at the Commission as an investigator in April of 2013.
Q. Earlier Ms. Hawkins-Jones described her duties, would you say that yours are basically identical?
A. Yes, they are.
Q. Would you please provide your educational and vocational backgrounds?
A. Yes. I have a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from St. Martin's University and I'm a Washington State certified investigator. I have taken the core and advanced training sponsored by Washington State. And for most of my years as an investigator, I have taken continuing education courses offered for Washington State investigators by the Pacific Northwest

License Tax \& Fraud Association.
Q. Are you familiar with a company called JFS Transport, Incorporated, which does business as Coast Movers?
A. Yes.
Q. How are you familiar with JFS?
A. I was assigned to assist in the investigation and the follow-up investigation for JFS.
Q. How did you investigate JFS's operations?
A. I reviewed Coast's Facebook page, which is also JFS.
Q. When -- sorry. When did you review that Facebook page?
A. I reviewed that page on September 3rd of 2020.
Q. What did you find when you went to JFS's Facebook page?
A. I found that they were advertising moving services and that they had also displayed a household goods permit number that's typically issued by the Commission.
Q. Did you take a screen capture when you visited JFS's Facebook page?
A. Yes, I did.
Q. Would you please turn to the exhibit marked SP-1?
A. I didn't get the exhibits, but $I$ do have my own copies.
Q. Actually, we should probably all work off the same copies. I will send them again right now.
A. Yeah, $I$ don't know if there was a problem coming through, but...
Q. One second.
A. Okay.

MR. ROBERSON: And, Judge Doyle, I'm going to cc you just so that we all know that we're looking at the same...

JUDGE DOYLE: Thank you.
MS. PAUL: There they are, okay.
JUDGE DOYLE: I have also received them. Go ahead and proceed.

BY MR. ROBERSON:
Q. So, again, would you please turn to the exhibit marked SP-1?
A. Yes, I'm there.
Q. Would you please identify that document?
A. Yes, this is a screen capture that $I$ took from Coast Movers' Facebook page and this is their chat that they have on their Facebook.
Q. Is that a true and accurate copy of the screen capture that you took of JFS's Facebook page?
A. Yes, it is.

MR. ROBERSON: At this time, Staff would move to admit Exhibit SP-1.

JUDGE DOYLE: SP-1 is admitted into the record.
(Exhibit SP-1 admitted.)
BY MR. ROBERSON:
Q. What did you do after reviewing JFS's Facebook page?
A. I -- I -- well, I left them a message. I sent them a chat message and asked about a move, and then $I$ had a phone call from them on the next day, September 4th.
Q. So you sent them a message via Facebook Messenger and they returned that message via phone call?
A. Yes.
Q. And did the person who called you identify himself or herself?
A. Yes, the person -- the caller identified himself as Jason from Coast Movers.
Q. And what did Jason say when he called you?
A. He -- we talked about different dates for moving and he said that the 7 th would work, although it was a holiday, they didn't charge holiday rates, and then asked questions about the move, the locations.
Q. And what locations did you provide to him?
A. I provided him two different locations in Tacoma.
Q. When you say "different locations," what do you mean?
A. They were identified by ZIP code. Jason asked me for ZIP codes, and I gave him two different ZIP codes for the Tacoma area.
Q. Did you describe for Jason the nature of the move?
A. Yes, $I$ told him that $I$ was moving from $a$ one-bedroom apartment to another one-bedroom apartment, both of them on the ground floor. And we talked about the square footage. I said I didn't really have an idea, but $I$ thought it was at about 900 square feet.
Q. Did JFS provide you with a quote after your phone call with Jason?
A. Yes. He provided me a quote of $\$ 165$ per hour and a transportation fee of $\$ 395$. He -- he added that the trucks weren't cheap to run, and then we talked about the different furniture that might be moved, and he said that he could give me a discount of a hundred dollars and he gave me a total of $\$ 1,029$.
Q. When you described the furniture for him, just out of curiosity, what kind of furniture -- I know you

1 mentioned it was an apartment move, but did you list 2 specific examples?
A. I did. I said just regular furniture, a couch, a stressless chair, dining table, four chairs, a buffet, lots of books, a couple end tables, just regular stuff, and a heavy -- heavy bed.
Q. Did you make notes about your conversation with Jason?
A. Yes, I did.
Q. Did you take those notes contemporaneously with your conversation with him?
A. Yes, I did.
Q. Do you take notes like that in the ordinary course of investigating whether a company is operating without a permit?
A. Yes.
Q. Is it important that those notes be accurate?
A. Yes, it's very important.
Q. And were the notes of your conversation with Jason accurate?
A. Yes.
Q. And why is it important that those notes be accurate?
A. It's important it's accurate because it's an investigation on a company, and for both consumer

1 protection and for the company's sake, we want to have accurate information. Oftentimes our investigation could lead to violations that could result in penalties.
Q. Would you please turn to Exhibit $\mathrm{SP}-2$ ?
A. Yes, I'm there.
Q. Would you please identify that exhibit?
A. That is my notes from my telephone conversation with Jason regarding the move.
Q. Is that a true and accurate copy of the notes that you took about your conversation with Jason?
A. Yes.

MR. ROBERSON: Staff would at this point move to admit Exhibit SP-2.

JUDGE DOYLE: $S P-2$ is admitted into the record. Thank you.
(Exhibit SP-2 admitted.)
MR. ROBERSON: And at this point, I have no more questions for Ms. Paul, so I would tender her to the Bench if you have any.

JUDGE DOYLE: I have no further questions for Ms. Paul. Thank you very much.

MS. PAUL: Thank you.
MR. ROBERSON: And at this point, Staff has presented its case and would rest.

JUDGE DOYLE: Okay. Well, thank you. Your

1 motion for default is granted and I will memorialize it 2 in an order.

MR. ROBERSON: Would you like to hear live testimony from Ms. Hawkins-Jones or will the declaration that she submitted with the motion suffice?

JUDGE DOYLE: The testimony that was submitted with the motion will suffice. Thank you. MR. ROBERSON: Thank you. JUDGE DOYLE: Anything else for today? MR. ROBERSON: Nothing from Staff.
