State utility staff recommended deep cuts in Puget Sound Energy's rate increase request

Public invited to comment at February hearings

OLYMPIA, Wash. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates, significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will

make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The UTC regulatory staff recommends the company be provided the opportunity to earn a 7.59 percent overall rate of return, not the 8.42 percent the company originally sought. The company's current target rate of return is 8.1 percent. This accounts for \$85 million of the difference between what the company requested and the UTC staff proposed for combined gas and electric operations.

PSE customers will be able to comment to state regulators at two public meetings scheduled at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 1 at Bellevue City Hall, 450 110th Ave. NE, Bellevue, and 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 15 at commission headquarters, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Dr. SW, Olympia.

The commission has received 62 public comments on PSE's rate-increase proposal – 49 opposed, one in favor and 12 undecided. State utility staff recommended deep cuts in Puget Sound Energy's rate increase request Public invited to comment at February hearings

OLYMPIA, **Wash**. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates,

significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The UTC regulatory staff recommends the company be provided the opportunity to earn a 7.59 percent overall rate of return, not the 8.42 percent the company originally sought. The company's current target rate of return is 8.1 percent. This accounts for \$85 million of the difference between what the company requested and the UTC staff proposed for combined gas and electric operations.

PSE customers will be able to comment to state regulators at two public meetings scheduled at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 1 at Bellevue City Hall, 450 110th Ave. NE, Bellevue, and 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 15 at commission headquarters, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Dr. SW, Olympia.

The commission has received 62 public comments on PSE's rate-increase proposal – 49 opposed, one in favor and 12 undecided. Bainbridge Islanders are using energy conservation to keep the peak load demand below the name plate capacity but conversion of electric heating to natural gas heating would solve the problem for the next several decades.

PSE's current transmission and distribution infrastructure would be sufficient to provide all of Bainbridge Island's electric needs for several decades if the electric heat pumps and electric baseboard heaters were converted to natural gas.

Heating reliability on Bainbridge Island would increase because the natural gas energy delivery system would be underground unlike the current electric delivery system.

Underground natural gas pipes are much less vulnerable to wind, snow, ice and falling trees compared to above ground electric distribution lines.

Currently natural gas is available in Poulsbo just to the West of Bainbridge Island.

Is there some way the WUTC could get a Natural Gas supplier like PSE or Cascade to provide natural gas service on Bainbridge Island.

State utility staff recommended deep cuts in Puget Sound Energy's rate increase request

Public invited to comment at February hearings

OLYMPIA, Wash. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates, significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The UTC regulatory staff recommends the company be provided the opportunity to earn a 7.59 percent overall rate of return, not the 8.42 percent the company originally sought. The company's current target rate of return is 8.1 percent. This accounts for \$85 million of the difference between what the company requested and the UTC staff proposed for combined gas and electric operations.

PSE customers will be able to comment to state regulators at two public meetings scheduled at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 1 at Bellevue City Hall, 450 110th Ave. NE, Bellevue, and 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 15 at commission headquarters, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Dr. SW, Olympia.

The commission has received 62 public comments on PSE's rate-increase

proposal – 49 opposed, one in favor and 12 undecided. Customers who would like to comment on the case are encouraged to write the UTC at: P.O. State utility staff recommended deep cuts in Puget Sound Energy's rate increase request Public invited to comment at February hearings

OLYMPIA, Wash. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates, significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The UTC regulatory staff recommends the company be provided the opportunity to earn a 7.59 percent overall rate of return, not the 8.42 percent the company originally sought. The company's current target rate of return is 8.1 percent. This

accounts for \$85 million of the difference between what the company requested and the UTC staff proposed for combined gas and electric operations.

PSE customers will be able to comment to state regulators at two public meetings scheduled at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 1 at Bellevue City Hall, 450 110th Ave. NE, Bellevue, and 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 15 at commission headquarters, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Dr. SW, Olympia.

The commission has received 62 public comments on PSE's rate-increase proposal – 49 opposed, one in favor and 12 undecided. Customers who would like to comment on the case are encouraged to write the UTC at: P.O. State utility staff recommended deep cuts in Puget Sound Energy's rate increase request Public invited to comment at February hearings

OLYMPIA, Wash. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates, significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The UTC regulatory staff recommends the company be provided the opportunity

to earn a 7.59 percent overall rate of return, not the 8.42 percent the company originally sought. The company's current target rate of return is 8.1 percent. This accounts for \$85 million of the difference between what the company requested and the UTC staff proposed for combined gas and electric operations.

PSE customers will be able to comment to state regulators at two public meetings scheduled at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 1 at Bellevue City Hall, 450 110th Ave. NE, Bellevue, and 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 15 at commission headquarters, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Dr. SW, Olympia.

The commission has received 62 public comments on PSE's rate-increase proposal – 49 opposed, one in favor and 12 undecided. Customers who would like to comment on the case are encouraged to write the UTC at: P.O. Box 47250 Olympia, Wash. 98504, submit comments online at www.utc.wa.gov/comment, e-mail comments to comment@utc.wa.gov or call toll-free 1-888-333-9882. The commission's deadline for accepting public comments is Feb. 17.

Thanks again for the information you have been sending, it will be very helpful. I agree that companies need to increase rates in order to stay in business. As a previous manager for the U.S. Postal Service I know very well how hard it is to justify raising the price of a stamp. However, a company like PSE has the ability to manage the way they allocate the money they receive. It seems to me that if they were the least bit interested in customer satisfaction, they would build those banks card fees into their overall rate increase, and not nickel and dime their customers to death.

Besides, most people who pay on line use an electronic check, not a bank card, so bank card fees wouldn't even come into play. I would think that my electronic check on line would be considerably less expensive to a company than having an employee get the mail, open all the envelopes, separate the recycling from the check and receipt, and then enter the information into the system. So I want to hear how they justify charging me a \$5,00 fee for my electronic check, and will ask them what it costs for one of their employees to do everything by hand when it comes in the U.S. Mail.

I wouldn't have a problem if they increased their general fund to offset the fees, but I don't believe they are interested in doing that. They want to force people into going paperless so they can charge an extra fee for late payments when they forget to check their email, because I would venture to say that there are more late payments with people that go paperless than with people who receive their bill in the mail.

When all is said and done, I would like to pursue the matter if they continue to charge fees. I will ask for detailed information under the Freedom of Information Act and see who is being charge extra fees, and for what.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates, significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The UTC regulatory staff recommends the company be provided the opportunity to earn a 7.59 percent overall rate of return, not the 8.42 percent the company originally sought. The company's current target rate of return is 8.1 percent. This accounts for \$85 million of the difference between what the company requested and the UTC staff proposed for combined gas and electric operations.

OLYMPIA, Wash. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates, significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The UTC regulatory staff recommends the company be provided the opportunity

to earn a 7.59 percent overall rate of return, not the 8.42 percent the company originally sought. The company's current target rate of return is 8.1 percent. This accounts for \$85 million of the difference between what the company requested and the UTC staff proposed for combined gas and electric operations.

Dear Mr. Johnson,

I'll respond in two parts. The first on Staff's audit procedures and the second on current status and conditions.

Audit procedures: There are two component to the annual Purchase Gas Adjustment (PGA) filings. The first component is prospective gas costs. This component is where the rate is set to cover expected gas costs for the upcoming year. The rate is based on actual known prices (fixed price contracts, financial hedges, and storage inventory costs are included) and expected or best estimate pricing of commodity (using forward strips). Staff analyses these projections by reviewing actual supply contracts, storage injection calculations, load projections, hedging strategies and contracts, forward strip information, etc.

The second component of the annual PGA is the deferral amortization. Since the companies do not make or lose many money on gas costs (gas costs are a pass-through) they defer the difference between what is embedded in rates and what they actually pay for gas. This component is where prudence determination is done. Questions such as: were the company's purchasing decisions correct and in the best interest of customers based on the information known at the time the decisions were made? Staff reviews company sales reports to verify volumes sold, they review actual purchases (down to the invoice), they review management decisions regarding capacity management and utilization, off-system sales, basin utilization, storage management, etc. These reviews do not include every single transaction or every single month in the deferral period (12 months). Staff utilizes random sampling in its analysis.

Thank you for interest in the Puget Sound Energy (PSE) general rate case proceeding. The purpose of this letter is to provide you with an update regarding the case. Your name has been added to the commission's interested persons list and your comments are part of the record.

State law requires rates to be fair and reasonable for customers, yet high enough to allow the company a chance to recover reasonable operating expenses and earn a reasonable return on investment. The commission may set service standards, and take action against a company that fails to meet those standards. However, it cannot deny rates that are needed to cover company costs. Rates are based on each company's specific needs. Rates for one company may be higher or lower than rates for another company.

On December 7, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (commission) filed testimony recommending that PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates. This is significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June. The three-member commission, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012. Enclosed is a copy of the commission's press release which provides additional details.

You may comment to state regulators on the proposed increase at two scheduled public hearings. The first meeting is scheduled at 6:00 p.m. Wednesday, February 1, at Bellevue City Hall, 450 110th Avenue NE, Bellevue; and 6:00 p.m. Wednesday, February 15, at commission headquarters, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Drive SW, Olympia.

State utility staff recommended deep cuts in Puget Sound Energy's rate increase request

Public invited to comment at February hearings

OLYMPIA, Wash. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates, significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The UTC regulatory staff recommends the company be provided the opportunity to earn a 7.59 percent overall rate of return, not the 8.42 percent the company originally sought. The company's current target rate of return is 8.1 percent. This accounts for \$85 million of the difference between what the company requested and the UTC staff proposed for combined gas and electric operations.

PSE customers will be able to comment to state regulators at two public meetings scheduled at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 1 at Bellevue City Hall, 450

110th Ave. NE, Bellevue, and 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 15 at commission headquarters, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Dr. SW, Olympia.

The commission has received 62 public comments on PSE's rate-increase proposal – 49 opposed, one in favor and 12 undecided. Customers who would like to comment on the case are encouraged to write the UTC at: P.O. The commission's deadline for accepting public comments is Feb. 17.

In addition to the UTC staff and the company, other parties taking part in the proceeding include advocates for large electricity and natural gas users, advocates for low-income customers, the Attorney General's Public Counsel Section, The Energy Project and the NW Energy Coalition.

Bellevue-based Puget Sound Energy serves more than 1 million electric customers and nearly 750,000 natural gas customers in parts of Snohomish, King, Pierce, Lewis, Thurston and Kittitas counties.

The UTC is the state agency in charge of regulating the private, investor-owned electric companies in Washington. It is the commission's responsibility to ensure regulated companies provide safe and reliable service to customers at reasonable rates, while allowing them the opportunity to earn a fair profit.

the record. You had some specific questions regarding the individual charges you see on your PSE monthly bills (i.e., delivery charge, and basic charge. It has been the general practice in rate design to break out the individual charges in the overall rates into their component parts. This helps the UTC track the separate costs of providing service and allows customers to see which costs are affected during a rate case. Delivery Charge – This usage-based charge reflects the utility's cost to bring service to the door of customers' homes and businesses. The delivery charge covers such things as installing and maintaining the delivery infrastructure (e.g., gas mains, electric transmission/distribution lines, service lines, meters, labor costs, taxes, vehicle maintenance and administrative costs). Basic Charge – The basic charge covers a portion of the costs for billing, meter reading and other related fixed costs. The intent is to allow the utility to recover these fixed costs which do not vary with the amount of usage. I will keep you informed of the status of the rate case. OLYMPIA, **Wash**. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates,

significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The UTC regulatory staff recommends the company be provided the opportunity to earn a 7.59 percent overall rate of return, not the 8.42 percent the company originally sought. The company's current target rate of return is 8.1 percent. This accounts for \$85 million of the difference between what the company requested and the UTC staff proposed for combined gas and electric operations.

PSE customers will be able to comment to state regulators at two public meetings scheduled at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 1 at Bellevue City Hall, 450 110th Ave. NE, Bellevue, and 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 15 at commission headquarters, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Dr. SW, Olympia.

The commission has received 62 public comments on PSE's rate-increase proposal – 49 opposed, one in favor and 12 undecided. and take action against a company that fails to meet those standards. However, it cannot deny rates that are needed to cover company costs. Rates are based on each company's specific needs. Rates for one company may be higher or lower than rates for another company.

On December 7, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (commission) filed testimony recommending that PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates. This is significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June. The three-member commission, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012. Enclosed is a copy of the commission's press release which provides additional details.

State utility staff recommended deep cuts in Puget Sound Energy's rate increase request Public invited to comment at February hearings

OLYMPIA, Wash. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates, significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The Attorney General's Office asked me to respond to your questions about the cost of gas and PSE's latest rate increase request.

It is important to recognize that Puget Sound Energy does not profit from the purchases of the gas itself. PSE earns its profit from the return on the pipes and plant necessary to deliver the natural gas.

Spot market prices are not reflective of gas available for longer term contracts. Spot market prices are for gas purchased and delivered today. Our utilities must purchase gas many months in advance of the delivery date.

Our utilities are discouraged from betting everything on what markets may be at one point in time; and are encouraged to engage in prudent purchasing plans which mitigate the risks of the volatile market.

There are two rates, or tariffs, which work together to set the cost of gas for customers. One is the purchased gas adjustment which sets the base for gas costs for the next year. This tariff is Schedule 101. PSE filed the revisions to Schedule 101 based on the known price of contracts entered throughout the year, on the known price of gas injected into storage, and on unknown, projected prices for gas which has not yet been purchased.

The second rate, the deferral account adjustment (Schedule 106) recovers the difference between last year's projected rate and the actual costs realized over the past year. This difference is passed through to customers, either up or down, with interest.

Audit procedures: There are two component to the annual Purchase Gas Adjustment (PGA) filings. The first component is prospective gas costs. This component is where the rate is set to cover expected gas costs for the upcoming year. The rate is based on actual known prices (fixed price contracts, financial hedges, and storage inventory costs are included) and expected or best estimate pricing of commodity (using forward strips). Staff analyses these projections by reviewing actual supply contracts, storage injection calculations, load projections, hedging strategies and contracts, forward strip information, etc.

The second component of the annual PGA is the deferral amortization. Since the

companies do not make or lose many money on gas costs (gas costs are a pass-through) they defer the difference between what is embedded in rates and what they actually pay for gas. This component is where prudence determination is done. Questions such as: were the company's purchasing decisions correct and in the best interest of customers based on the information known at the time the decisions were made? Staff reviews company sales reports to verify volumes sold, they review actual purchases (down to the invoice), they review management decisions regarding capacity management and utilization, off-system sales, basin utilization, storage management, etc. These reviews do not include every single transaction or every single month in the deferral period (12 months). Staff utilizes random sampling in its analysis.

The second area I'd like to address is more about the current status and conditions. On October 1, 2010, PSE had a substantial increase in rates to cover gas costs. At that time the company had storage reserves full and had finalized its hedges prior to the winter heating season (both creating fixed prices for gas). Then gas prices started falling. The company was only minimally able to take advantage of lower market prices due the level of fixed prices. PSE filed in the fall of 2011 to reflect expected prices for the upcoming year. The commission approved a 4.10% rate decrease for the purchase gas adjustment (PGA).

To reiterate, Puget Sound Energy receives no profit from the commodity sales of gas and any difference between what the projected cost is today and what actual costs are over the next year will be passed on to customers next year.

2/4/2012 Email from consumer Dear Mr Roger Kouchi:

Thank you for your response. While it is true that PSE doesn't earn its profit from the purchase of gas itself, gas price is the largest component of cost. Plant and equipment need upkeep and don't constitute the biggest component of cost per the document that you attached.

The question is straight forward. Despite significant downward draft in the price of natural gas, how is it possible that the price is increased?

Your answer however is not straight-forward. What percentage of the cost is plant, property and equipment? What percentage of the cost is executive compensation? What part of the cost is re-imbursement to people who didnt have power? Now, I know the utilities are a regulated monopoly and get to earn a decent return on investment. It is one thing to earn a decent return on investment and it is another to bloat expenditures and over bill the citizens.

If anything, the downward economic trend should have reduced the cost of maintenance and repair. My city in Sammamish was able to get reduced prices for construction projects after the 2008 recession. Meanwhile the gas prices have

plummeted.

Your department needs to do more before blanketly increasing rates on customers. As this newspaper article shows, prices have been going up in 2010 and 2011 that guarantees 10.8% ROE to the utility.

Dear Thirumalesh Bhat,

I regret that you are dissatisfied with the previous explanations to your issues about the high cost of energy and the number of increases. Here is some additional information regarding frequently asked questions pertaining to the rate making process.

How does the Commission review rates?

Commission staff looks at five main issues:

- 1. The actual cost to provide service based on 12 months of financial information, excluding items for which money cannot be recovered from customers (e.g., political contributions and fines);
- 2. The company's total investment in equipment used to provide service (called rate base);
- 3. The appropriate profit level (called rate of return) the company should be allowed for its investments;
- 4. The appropriate amount that each customer class (i.e., residential, commercial or industrial) should pay;
- 5. The rate design.

A regulated utility may seek a change in rates with 30-days notice to the commission. During those 30 days, the commission can either allow the rate request to go into effect or suspend if for further investigation. If suspended, the commission has an additional 10 months to review the merits of the request.

State law requires that staff be a party to the case with the goal of promoting the "public interest." The Public Counsel of the Office of the Attorney General also is a party to the case, serving as the state-appointed legal representative for the consumer. Other parties with an interest in the case might also be allowed to participate.

During the case, the company must prove that the proposed rate increase is needed by showing what its costs are during a given test year. Often the definition of the test year is a point of contention and adjustments to the test year are considered during the case. For example, if the test year included severe storm-related costs, one party might propose an adjustment that would bring the test year costs more in line with an average year's storm costs. The company's costs and expenditures are reviewed and possibly challenged during this process.

The case will also consider the company's rate-of-return on its investment—its profit.

The various parties will comment on what would be a fair return. Other financing costs, such as construction loans, are taken into account. All these numbers are used to derive the company's annual revenue requirement.

The rates you ultimately pay are intended to give the company a reasonable chance of earning its revenue requirement.

During the rate case, the commission will hear conflicting views on several dozen issues. It's up to the commission through the hearing process and its review of the testimony to settle these disputes and come out with and order, defendable in court. Any of the parties to the case may request clarification or reconsideration of the order. Parties can also appeal the commission's decision to Superior Court.

What are the steps in a rate case?

- 1. Company files for a rate increase.
- 2. The rate increase becomes effective unless the commission suspends the filing at the commission's regular open meeting.
- 3. If the rate increase is suspended, an administrative law judge convenes a prehearing conference. This meeting identifies what groups will actively participate in the case, and sets the schedule for discovery, testimony and hearings.
- 4. The company's request is accompanied by supporting documents and written testimony. These materials are often based on information collected during the discovery process—a period of time when the company must respond to questions and data requests posed by case participants.
- 5. Parties submit written testimony responding to the company's request.
- 6. The company files written testimony rebutting the testimony by the parties.
- 7. All witnesses are made available for cross-examination in a series of hearings that can take from one day to two weeks.
- 8. One or more public hearings are held to hear directly from customers. This information, along with letters and e-mails from customers, as submitted as evidence.
- 9. Final arguments or briefs are presented in writing to the commission.
- 10. Commissioners make a decision and issue an order.

What is rate design?

The two primary goals of rate design are to (1) provide rates that lead to utility revenues matching the revenue requirement and (2) allocate both fixed and variable costs to responsible customers. Rate designs also:

- 1. Minimize complexity, recognizing differing degrees of customer sophistication;
- 2. Maximize cost predictability and stability for customers and revenue certainty for utilities;
- Incent utilities to minimize costs;
- 4. Incent customers to consumer electricity efficiently by minimizing peak demand and/or total consumption;
- 5. Improve electric affordability for poor or vulnerable populations (i.e., "lifeline rates");
- 6. Promote economic development, often by providing lower rates for industrial

customers; and

7. Maximize customer choice.

What does cost recovery mean when you say that utilities are allowed to recover their costs?

The traditional approach to cost recovery is to determine cost recovery at project completion. Until the last quarter of the 20th century, regulators commonly made cost recovery decisions concerning new capital projects when construction was completed and the facility had entered commercial production. Under this traditional approach, referred to as the "prudent investment rule," cost recovery was available only on satisfaction of two conditions: costs were prudently incurred, and the project was "used and useful," i.e., providing actual benefits to the public.

The mechanics of the traditional approach are straightforward: once the plant enters commercial operation, the utility for accounting purposes, puts its construction and associated financing costs into its rate base and books associated depreciation. The utility then seeks a rate increase to pay for the plant. In computing its proposed new rates, the utility includes the net book value (i.e., original investment in its proposed annual expenses. The depreciation expense gives the utility the return of its investment, while the cost of capital applied to the rate base gives the utility a return on its investment.

In connection with the proposed rate increase, the regulator engages in several assessments, the aim of which is to determine whether the costs proposed for inclusion in rates were prudently incurred and whether the resulting utility plant is used and useful for serving the public. Those assessments include: (1) examining the utility forecasts that supported the decision to build the project, thereby satisfying itself that the project was, in fact, needed; (2) assessing the project choice, including reviewing whether potentially less expensive alternatives were considered and, if so, why they were not pursued; (3) evaluating whether the methods and sources of plant financing reflect prudent decision-making; and (4) conducting a review of the reasonableness of construction costs and the timeliness of completion. Upon completing this review, the regulator disallows costs that it finds were caused by the utility's imprudence.

In setting utility rates, the commission typically does not guarantee cost recovery, but rather provides a reasonable opportunity for recovery. That reasonable opportunity exists when the regulator includes the designated costs in the utility's revenue requirement when setting rates. Whether the utility actually collects that full revenue requirement depends on the extent to which its actual expenses and sales volumes match the levels assumed in the commission-approved revenue requirement.

Sponsors of the traditional approach assert that it offers customers important benefits, including encouraging utility management to complete the project on schedule and on budget (if not sooner than forecast and less expensively). Moreover, in an after-the fact cost recovery review, regulators have access to all relevant construction facts before making prudence and rate recovery decisions.

What are the types of increases? Please explain.

- · Renewable Energy Policy (wind, and solar) Initiative Measure No. 937
- ü This measure, approved by voters in November 2006, imposes targets for energy conservation and the use of eligible renewable resources on all electric utilities that serve more than 25,000 customers in Washington.
- ü (1) Energy conservation. By January 1, 2010, utilities are required to identify their "achievable cost-effective conservation potential" through 2019. Each utility will set an annual target consisting of a certain share of this achievable cost-effective conservation potential, and will have to meet that share of conservation.
- ü (2) Renewable resources. Each utility will have to use renewable resources to serve at least three percent (3%) of its load by 2012 through 2015; nine percent (9%) of load by 2016 through 2019, and fifteen percent (15%) of load by 2020 and after. Wind farms, solar panels, and geothermal plants are examples of eligible renewable resources. With limited exceptions, use of fresh water by hydroelectric dams and plants is not included as an eligible renewable resource.
- ü (3) Cost recovery, penalties, reporting and enforcement. Utilities can recover from its customers all costs prudently incurred to comply with the measure. Utilities that fail to comply with either the energy conservation or the renewable energy targets will pay a penalty of \$50 for each megawatt-hour of shortfall, adjusted annually for inflation. Penalty payments will go into a special account, and can only be used for the purchase of renewable energy credits or for energy conservation projects at state and local government facilities or publicly-owned educational institutions.
- ü In each year beginning in June 2012, utilities are required to report to the state Department of Community, Trade, and Economic Development (CTED) on the utility's progress in the preceding year in meeting the targets. Investor-owned utilities will supply the same information to the Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC). Utilities are also required to make these reports available to their customers.
- ü The UTC is authorized to implement and enforce the measure as to investor-owned utilities, and to adopt rules accordingly. For publicly-owned utilities, CTED would be authorized to adopt procedural rules and documentation requirements. The state auditor will audit compliance with the measure and the Attorney General's Office is responsible for enforcement.
- ü The initiative was approved by 1,042,276 (51.73 percent) of the voters.
- · Smart Grid (meters, OMS, GIS, etc.)
- · Aging Infrastructure
- Safety
- \cdot Conservation to include rebates for energy efficient appliances and decoupling (i.e., company is allowed to recover lost revenue due to increased conservation efforts).
- · Weatherization (subset of conservation). Pays for efficiency rebates on various weatherization methods to reduce consumption.
- · Low-income program costs.
- Local taxes
- · Storm damages
- · Wholesale cost of natural gas
- · Increased demand (i.e., increased customer base; new industry; increased consumer demand due to additional energy use). This will include increases in demand due to electric cars. These increases are due to costs associated with new facilities to

increase capacity. In some instances it results in a separate line item on a bill called a "tracker".

Why do I have to pay for the cost to increase capacity to satisfy the needs of new customers?

Every regulated public utility has a statutory obligation to satisfy its customers' needs, reliably and cost effectively. To meet that obligation, the utility must, among other things, forecast demand accurately and commit to appropriate capital projects. Those projects must then be completed on time and constructed in a prudent and cost-effective manner.

Common to these decisions is the commitment of dollars. Using its legal powers to approve projects, sites, and rates, the regulatory commission commits ratepayer dollars to the project. Using its legal powers to enter contracts, the regulated utility condemns lands, borrows money, issues stock, and commits corporate resources—and ultimately shareholder dollars—to the project.

Taken together, these corresponding commitments present a multi-million dollar, multi-part question: When a public utility proposes to undertake a major capital project, at what point in time should a commission provide assurance that the utility will recover its investment? What conditions, if any, should be placed on whatever assurance is provided? Phrased differently, how much ratepayer money should regulators commit, when should regulators commit it, and under what conditions should such commitments be made?

Beginning in the 1970s the combination of inflation, fuel cost, and construction material cost increases meant that internal utility funds were less available for use on construction projects. Moreover, access to needed capital became more difficult as construction projects grew larger, employed new technologies, required longer construction periods, and had to meet new and uncertain regulatory requirements (such as those emanating from the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, and Federal Energy Regulatory Commission). These facts made capital markets less optimistic about whether, and when, ratepayers would pay up. In response, capital—both shareholder capital and debt capital—became more expensive and less available.

I appreciate your concerns over rising energy rates. Energy is an essential part of modern life and the cost of energy has been of increasing concern. The commission's mission is to protect consumers by ensuring that utility services are fairly priced, available, reliable and safe. But, the commission is also required by law to protect the interests of the utility and its shareholders by allowing the utility to recover its costs of doing business and an opportunity to earn a fair profit on its investment. The commission may not prevent a regulated company from requesting an increase in rates. Nor may the commission simply dismiss a company's request for increased rates.

The commission's resolution of these issues occurs through a public hearing process in which extensive testimony is provided by expert witnesses representing a wide array of consumer and company interests, including the regulated company, commission staff,

State utility staff recommended deep cuts in Puget Sound Energy's rate increase request Public invited to comment at February hearings

OLYMPIA, Wash. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates, significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility

originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The UTC regulatory staff recommends the company be provided the opportunity to earn a 7.59 percent overall rate of return, not the 8.42 percent the company originally sought. The company's current target rate of return is 8.1 percent. This accounts for \$85 million of the difference between what the company requested and the UTC staff proposed for combined gas and electric operations.

PSE customers will be able to comment to state regulators at two public meetings scheduled at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 1 at Bellevue City Hall, 450 110th Ave. NE, Bellevue, and 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 15 at commission headquarters, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Dr. SW, Olympia.

The commission has received 62 public comments on PSE's rate-increase proposal – 49 opposed, one in favor and 12 undecided. Customers who would like to comment on the case are encouraged to write the UTC at: P.O. The commission's deadline for accepting public

In addition to the UTC staff and the company, other parties taking part in the proceeding include advocates for large electricity and natural gas users, advocates for low-income customers, the Attorney General's Public Counsel Section, The Energy Project and the NW Energy Coalition.

Bellevue-based Puget Sound Energy serves more than 1 million electric customers and nearly 750,000 natural gas customers in parts of Snohomish, King, Pierce, Lewis, Thurston and Kittitas counties.

The UTC is the state agency in charge of regulating the private, investor-owned electric companies in Washington. It is the commission's responsibility to ensure regulated companies provide safe and reliable service to customers at reasonable rates, while allowing them the opportunity to earn a fair profit.

State utility staff recommended deep cuts in Puget Sound Energy's rate increase request

Public invited to comment at February hearings

OLYMPIA, Wash. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates, significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will

make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The UTC regulatory staff recommends the company be provided the opportunity to earn a 7.59 percent overall rate of return, not the 8.42 percent the company originally sought. The company's current target rate of return is 8.1 percent. This accounts for \$85 million of the difference between what the company requested and the UTC staff proposed for combined gas and electric operations.

PSE customers will be able to comment to state regulators at two public meetings scheduled at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 1 at Bellevue City Hall, 450 110th Ave. NE, Bellevue, and 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 15 at commission headquarters, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Dr. SW, Olympia.

The commission has received 62 public comments on PSE's rate-increase proposal – 49 opposed, one in favor and 12 undecided. State utility staff recommended deep cuts in Puget Sound Energy's rate increase request

Public invited to comment at February hearings

OLYMPIA, Wash. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates, significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The UTC regulatory staff recommends the company be provided the opportunity to earn a 7.59 percent overall rate of return, not the 8.42 percent the company originally sought. The company's current target rate of return is 8.1 percent. This accounts for \$85 million of the difference between what the company requested and the UTC staff proposed for combined gas and electric operations.

PSE customers will be able to comment to state regulators at two public

meetings scheduled at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 1 at Bellevue City Hall, 450 110th Ave. NE, Bellevue, and 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 15 at commission headquarters, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Dr. SW, Olympia.

The commission has received 62 public comments on PSE's rate-increase proposal – 49 opposed, one in favor and 12 undecided. OLYMPIA, Wash. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates, significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

State utility staff recommended deep cuts in Puget Sound Energy's rate increase request

Public invited to comment at February hearings

OLYMPIA, Wash. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates, significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The UTC regulatory staff recommends the company be provided the opportunity to earn a 7.59 percent overall rate of return, not the 8.42 percent the company originally sought. The company's current target rate of return is 8.1 percent. This accounts for \$85 million of the difference between what the company requested and the UTC staff proposed for combined gas and electric operations.

PSE customers will be able to comment to state regulators at two public meetings scheduled at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 1 at Bellevue City Hall, 450 110th Ave. NE, Bellevue, and 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 15 at commission headquarters, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Dr. SW, Olympia.

The commission has received 62 public comments on PSE's rate-increase proposal – 49 opposed, one in favor and 12 undecided. Customers who would like to comment on the case are encouraged to write the UTC at: P.O. It discusses a staff recommendation that the commissioners have not yet reviewed. State utility staff recommended deep cuts in Puget Sound Energy's rate increase request

Public invited to comment at February hearings

OLYMPIA, Wash. – State regulatory staff are proposing to give only a fraction of the revenues Puget Sound Energy (PSE) is seeking in its latest electric and natural gas rate increase request.

In testimony filed today, staff members of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC) are recommending PSE be allowed to raise

electric rates by only \$39 million a year and \$1.5 million for natural gas rates, significantly less than the \$152 million and \$30 million, respectively, the utility originally requested last June.

The three-member UTC, which is not bound by the staff recommendation, will make a final decision on the utility's rate-hike request next spring. The proposed increase is slated to take effect May 2012.

Under the staff proposal, a PSE average residential electric customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours-per-month would see their electric bill increase by \$2.05, for a bill total of \$98.84. The typical natural-gas customer using 68 therms a month would pay \$0.13 more, for a revised bill of \$81.72.

On June 13, PSE filed a general rate case with the UTC requesting an annual \$182 million overall rate increase for both electricity and natural gas service. Commission staff is recommending a \$40 million overall rate hike for both services.

Among the major differences between the company's request and the UTC staff's recommendation are reductions for PSE's development of the Lower Snake River Wind Project, power costs, storm-damage costs, incentive pay, federal income-tax issues and the utility's profit level.

Commission staff also recommends rejecting PSE's request for a Conservation Savings Adjustment representing an additional increase of \$7.4 million or 0.4 percent for electric service, and \$1.5 million or 0.1 percent for natural gas service.

Staff also submitted testimony to address an ongoing problem with inaccurate meters, which has resulted in large retroactive bills for some customers. In 2008, the company was ordered by the commission to identify and correct the meter problems; however, the number of retroactive bills remains high. Staff is recommending that all inaccurate meter problems be resolved within four months for electric meters and six months for natural gas meters from the initial occurrence of the problem.

The UTC regulatory staff recommends the company be provided the opportunity to earn a 7.59 percent overall rate of return, not the 8.42 percent the company originally sought. The company's current target rate of return is 8.1 percent. This accounts for \$85 million of the difference between what the company requested and the UTC staff proposed for combined gas and electric operations.

PSE customers will be able to comment to state regulators at two public meetings scheduled at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 1 at Bellevue City Hall, 450 110th Ave. NE, Bellevue, and 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 15 at commission headquarters, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Dr. SW, Olympia.

The commission has received 62 public comments on PSE's rate-increase proposal – 49 opposed, one in favor and 12 undecided. Customers who would like to comment on the case are encouraged to write the UTC at: P.O. Box 47250 Olympia, Wash. 98504, submit comments online at

In addition to the UTC staff and the company, other parties taking part in the proceeding include advocates for large electricity and natural gas users, advocates for low-income customers, the Attorney General's Public Counsel Section, The Energy Project and the NW Energy Coalition.

Bellevue-based Puget Sound Energy serves more than 1 million electric customers and nearly 750,000 natural gas customers in parts of Snohomish, King, Pierce, Lewis, Thurston and Kittitas counties.

The UTC is the state agency in charge of regulating the private, investor-owned electric companies in Washington. It is the commission's responsibility to ensure regulated companies provide safe and reliable service to customers at reasonable rates, while allowing them the opportunity to earn a fair profit.
