| 5  | JUDGE PEARSON: Good morning. My name is                  |
| 6  | Rayne Pearson. I am an administrative law judge with     |
| 7  | the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission,  |
| 8  | and I'm the presiding officer for today's hearing being  |
| 9  | conducted at the Commission's headquarters in Olympia.   |
| 10 | Today is Tuesday, October 25th, 2016, at                 |
| 11 | 9:00 a.m. Today's hearing involves a total of three      |
| 12 | household goods carriers, so the first thing we will do  |
| 13 | is take a roll call to determine which companies are     |
| 14 | present.   |
| 15 | As you can see, there is a court reporter                |
| 16 | who is creating a record of today's proceeding, so when  |
| 17 | I call your name, please raise your hand and please also |
| 18 | give a verbal response to the roll call like "here" or   |
| 19 | "present" when I call your name.                         |
| 20 | The first company is Docket TV-161076, Anna              |
| 21 | Nemykina.  |
| 22 | MS. NEMYKINA: Here.                                      |
| 23 | JUDGE PEARSON: Did I pronounce your name                 |
| 24 | correctly? It's Anna?                                    |
| 25 | MS. NEMYKINA: Yes.                                       |

| 1  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Next is Docket                      |

| 2  | TV-161077, Jean Assin?                                   |
| 3  | MR. ASSIN: Here.   |
| 4  | JUDGE PEARSON: Did I pronounce your name                 |
| 5  | correctly?   |
| 6  | MR. ASSIN: Yes.  |
| 7  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And finally is Docket               |
| 8  | TV-161078, Dallas Brewster, Pacific North West Moving?   |
| 9  | Okay. Hearing nothing, it appears that                   |
| LO | company is not in the hearing room as of right now. So   |
| L1 | that company will be subject to being held in default    |
| L2 | and having an order entered against it without a chance  |
| L3 | to address the Commission. So I will take that docket    |
| L4 | up later this morning.                                   |
| L5 | Each of you are here because the Commission              |
| L6 | filed a complaint alleging that each of your companies   |
| L7 | is performing or advertising to perform work as a        |
| L8 | household goods carrier without the required permit.     |
| L9 | The purpose of today's proceeding is to formally explain |
| 20 | what your choices are and then hear from each of you     |
| 21 | regarding which option you wish to pursue.               |
| 22 | So you can choose one of two options on                  |
| 23 | behalf of your company. The first is to cease and        |
| 24 | desist providing, offering, or advertising unpermitted   |
| 25 | household goods services. And if you choose that         |

| 1  | option, you will need to demonstrate what you've done to |

| 2  | shut down your business either completely or partially   |
| 3  | to avoid further enforcement action by the Commission.   |
| 4  | The Commission is going to want to see proof that you're |
| 5  | no longer operating regulated services. For example,     |
| 6  | proof that you've taken down or changed your website or  |
| 7  | your other online advertisements for your business.      |
| 8  | The second choice is to ask for a formal                 |
| 9  | classification hearing to show why you don't need a      |
| 10 | permit. So if you choose that option, you're contesting  |
| 11 | allegations in the complaint in claiming not to be       |
| 12 | conducting household goods moves. So for this option,    |
| 13 | we would schedule a hearing for a date in the near       |
| 14 | future with a deadline two to three weeks from now for   |
| 15 | both your company and Commission Staff to declare all    |
| 16 | witnesses and file any exhibits.                         |
| 17 | Each of you has a right to be heard by the               |
| 18 | Commission, and I will call you up to do that            |
| 19 | individually. Commission Staff also has a right to be    |
| 20 | heard, and Ms. Rachel Jones will be representing the     |
| 21 | Commission this morning. If you have not already met     |
| 22 | Ms. Jones, she is seated at the table to my right.       |
| 23 | She's a Commission Compliance Investigator.              |
| 24 | So now that we've gone over the general                  |

options for each of your companies, let me explain the

25

rest of today's procedure. In a few minutes, I will call you each up to make your choice on how to proceed and at that time, I will swear you in. So anything that you tell the Court today will be considered sworn testimony under oath. Once you're sworn in, I will ask if you understand your options and then ask you to state what option you would like to pursue. And if there is anything else you want to explain to me, you can do so at that time.

In each of the complaints, Commission Staff has not only alleged that you are providing household goods moving services without a permit, they are also seeking to have a penalty imposed. The law sets the maximum penalty for each violation at \$5,000, and Staff will be making a penalty recommendation, but the Commission will make the final decision about the amount of penalty to be imposed.

If you choose to testify about how you are getting out of the household goods business, I will allow you to make a statement explaining how you plan to do that and depending on what proof you can provide, you should be able to reach an agreed order resolving the Commission -- resolving the matter with Commission Staff, and you can speak to Ms. Jones about that during the recess.

If you choose to contest the allegations in the complaint, we'll schedule another court appearance for the Commission to present the necessary evidence to prove its case, and I'll explain the types of documentation you would need to bring in order to dispute the Commission's evidence.

So after I hear from each of your companies, we will take a break for probably about an hour, and that will provide Commission Staff time to meet with each of you and prepare a final disposition for your cases. And for most of you, I believe that Ms. Jones will be presenting agreed orders bringing your companies into compliance or agreements to leave the industry.

So, Ms. Jones, I will go ahead and swear you in at this point so you are sworn in for the entire proceeding.

(Rachel Jones sworn.)

JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. You may be seated.

So I will begin with the companies who have made an appearance today, and then after hearing from each of you, we can deal with the company who has not appeared today.

Ms. Jones, when I call on the nonappearance case, you can make a brief summary of the status and present your motion for default at that time.

| 4  | If you would come forward to the table,               |
| 5  | please.   |
| 6  | MR. NEMYKIN: May I come with my wife?                 |
| 7  | JUDGE PEARSON: Sure. Just go ahead and                |
| 8  | have a seat in front of the microphone. And if you    |
| 9  | could pull the microphone towards you close to you at |
| 10 | the table and turn it on. The red light will come on  |
| 11 | when it's on.   |
| 12 | Okay. If you could state your first and               |
| 13 | last name for the record and spell your last name for |
| 14 | the court reporter.                                   |
| 15 | MS. NEMYKINA: Anna Nemykina,                          |
| 16 | N-e-m-y-k-i-n-a.                                      |
| 17 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And what is your                 |
| 18 | position with Kangaroo Movers?                        |
| 19 | MS. NEMYKINA: I own the company.                      |
| 20 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And can we get your              |
| 21 | address and telephone number for the record, please.  |
| 22 | MS. NEMYKINA: 12040 - 28th Avenue                     |
| 23 | Northeast, Seattle, Washington 9125 or 98125.         |
| 24 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you. And your              |
| 25 | phone number.   |

| 1  | MS. NEMYKINA: 206-228-4821.                             |

| 2  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So if you could stand              |
| 3  | and raise your right hand, I will swear you in.         |
| 4  | (Anna Nemykina sworn.)                                  |
| 5  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. You may be seated.                 |
| 6  | And how would you like to proceed this morning?         |
| 7  | MS. NEMYKINA: Actually, if it's allowed, I              |
| 8  | would like my husband to speak because he's more        |
| 9  | familiar with case.                                     |
| 10 | JUDGE PEARSON: Sure. Okay. Could you                    |
| 11 | MS. NEMYKINA: His name is                               |
| 12 | JUDGE PEARSON: I'm sorry, what?                         |
| 13 | MS. NEMYKINA: His name is Nikita Nemykin.               |
| 14 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Can you turn your                  |
| 15 | microphone on? Can you please state and spell your last |
| 16 | name for the court reporter.                            |
| 17 | MR. NEMYKIN: Nikita Nemykin, N-e-m-y-k-i-n.             |
| 18 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. If you could stand                 |
| 19 | and raise your right hand, I will swear you in.         |
| 20 | (Nikita Nemykin sworn.)                                 |
| 21 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Go ahead and be                    |
| 22 | seated.   |
| 23 | MR. NEMYKIN: So what happened, I been in                |
| 24 | this industry already. I have a company with my partner |
| 25 | other than Kangaroo Movers. We've been licensed and     |

| 3  | company?   |
| 4  | MR. NEMYKIN: ABC Movers.                               |
| 5  | JUDGE PEARSON: And it's permitted with the             |
| 6  | Commission?  |
| 7  | MR. NEMYKIN: Yes.                                      |
| 8  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.                                   |
| 9  | MR. NEMYKIN: And I wanted to branch out and            |
| LO | just expand business. And on behalf of my wife, I was  |
| L1 | trying to register Kangaroo Movers in her name and she |
| L2 | agreed as a family business. I'm I guess we miss the   |
| L3 | paperwork that was stating that we apply for the       |
| L4 | licenses, that our paperwork weren't aren't writing    |
| L5 | clearly so we had to apply again.                      |
| L6 | But unfortunately, we didn't understand it.            |
| L7 | And so the last paperwork we've been served, now we    |
| L8 | understand that we did something wrong, and we want to |
| L9 | make sure we will stop the all operations with         |
| 20 | Kangaroo Movers, and we want to make sure we get the   |
| 21 | licenses and all the document that needed to proceed.  |
| 22 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So it sounds like you             |
| 23 | want to enter into an agreed order to cease and desist |
| 24 | all operations of Kangaroo Movers until you're able to |
| 25 | get a permit; is that correct?                         |

| 1  | MR. NEMYKIN: Correct, yes.                               |

| 2  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And have you                        |
| 3  | submitted an application to the Commission yet for       |
| 4  | Kangaroo Movers?   |
| 5  | MR. NEMYKIN: No, we were waiting for the                 |
| 6  | hearing.   |
| 7  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.                                     |
| 8  | MR. NEMYKIN: And just wanted to make sure                |
| 9  | and how to fill it out and make sure we did everything   |
| 10 | the right way.   |
| 11 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So when we take a                   |
| 12 | recess, you will have the opportunity to speak with      |
| 13 | Staff and see if you can agree on an order for entry     |
| 14 | that will essentially say that until you get a permit,   |
| 15 | that you won't operate the business or advertise and     |
| 16 | that you understand all of that, okay?                   |
| 17 | MR. NEMYKIN: All right.                                  |
| 18 | JUDGE PEARSON: So once you are satisfied                 |
| 19 | that you understand all the terms of order, then you and |
| 20 | Ms. Jones can both sign it. And it will also most        |
| 21 | likely include an agreement about the amount of the      |
| 22 | penalty to be imposed, but if not, you can make your     |
| 23 | case about why the penalty should be different than what |
| 24 | Staff is recommending when we come back from the recess. |
| 25 | Do you have any questions about anything at this point?  |

| 1  | MS. NEMYKINA: No.  |

| 3  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So you can go ahead                 |
| 4  | and take a seat until we call a recess.                  |
| 5  | And the next docket is TV-161077, Jean                   |
| 6  | Assin.   |
| 7  | Good morning. Can you please state your                  |
| 8  | first and last name for the record and spell your last   |
| 9  | name for the court reporter.                             |
| 10 | MR. ASSIN: Good morning. My name is                      |
| 11 | JUDGE PEARSON: Is that microphone on? The                |
| 12 | red light should be on.                                  |
| 13 | MR. ASSIN: Good morning. My name is Jean                 |
| 14 | Assin, J-e-a-n, A-s-s-i-n.                               |
| 15 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And what's your                     |
| 16 | position with the company?                               |
| 17 | MR. ASSIN: I was trying to open a company                |
| 18 | with my friend then we didn't get along so we decided to |
| 19 | lose the company together and then decide to open my     |
| 20 | company. I was in the process of doing that and then     |
| 21 | the Commission came and send paper at my door.           |
| 22 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So why don't I go                   |
| 23 | ahead and swear you in at this point.                    |
| 24 | (Jean Assin sworn.)                                      |
| 25 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Go ahead and be                     |

1 seated.

So there is another gentleman's name with the company Strong Muscles Movers, Mr. Magnurs?

MR. ASSIN: Mr. Magnurs, I don't even know where he is. He was supposed to be my partner of Strong Muscles Movers. We went to get a business license then after one week, you know, we didn't get along with the company. So we decided to close the company. I went to the Department of Revenue to have a business license for that Tchaman Movers. I was in the process to get the Commission -- the Commission payments and then I was served by the Commission. I was even here with the Commission I remember in June, but I don't have the dates. I came here to find out what is the -- how can I get the payments.

JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So how would you like to proceed this morning? Would you like to -- do you plan still on applying for a household goods permit or are you just out of the business completely?

MR. ASSIN: I do. I do, but I don't know right now. I believe I am going to work for the next six months when I save up money and come back to Commission.

JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So it sounds like you also would like to enter into an agreement to cease and

| 1  | desist offering advertising and providing moves until    |

| 2  | you're able to get a permit?                             |
| 3  | MR. ASSIN: Yes, Your Honor.                              |
| 4  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So again, when we                   |
| 5  | take a recess, you will also have an opportunity to      |
| 6  | speak with Ms. Jones or other Staff members and see if   |
| 7  | you can agree to an order for entry and also agree on    |
| 8  | the amount of the penalty to be imposed. Do you have     |
| 9  | any other questions?                                     |
| 10 | MR. ASSIN: I am fine, thank you.                         |
| 11 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So at this point, we                |
| 12 | can take a recess. It's approximately 12 minutes after   |
| 13 | 9:00. Because Mr. Brewster has not appeared, we can      |
| 14 | take that up after the recess and there's a chance he    |
| 15 | will still show up, and we can deal with him at that     |
| 16 | point. Otherwise, I will entertain a motion for default  |
| 17 | after we I think it would be best to speak to the        |
| 18 | companies who have appeared today and get things worked  |
| 19 | out with them so they can be on their way and we don't   |
| 20 | have to hold them in here any longer than is necessary.  |
| 21 | So as soon as you have a chance, you and                 |
| 22 | also Ms. Nemykina, to review the cease and desist orders |
| 23 | and language with Staff, there will be some negotiation  |
| 24 | about the penalty, and typically a portion of the        |

penalty is suspended, which is meant to deter you from

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| 1  | further illegal operations. So you would pay a portion    |

| 2  | of it today and then the remaining portion of the \$5,000 |
| 3  | penalty would not become due and payable unless you've    |
| 4  | violated the order; does that make sense?                 |
| 5  | MR. ASSIN: Sure.  |
| 6  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So hopefully within                  |
| 7  | the next hour or so we will have all the orders           |
| 8  | prepared, and then I will call each of you back up, make  |
| 9  | sure you understand the order. I will sign it on the      |
| LO | record today, and you will leave here with a copy of it.  |
| L1 | So, Ms. Jones, is there anything else before              |
| L2 | we take a break?  |
| L3 | MS JONES: No.   |
| L4 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So I will be in my                   |
| L5 | office. Just please notify me when I need to come back,   |
| L6 | and we will be in recess until further notice.            |
| L7 | (Recess taken from 9:15 a.m. until                        |
| L8 | 10:03 a.m.)   |
| L9 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Let's be back on the                 |
| 20 | record at a little after 10:00 a.m.                       |
| 21 | Ms. Jones, were you able to reach agreements              |
| 22 | with both of the companies?                               |
| 23 | MS. JONES: Yes, I was.                                    |
| 24 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And were they both                   |
| 25 | cease and desist orders?                                  |

| 1  | MS. JONES: Yes, they are.                                |

| 2  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So I will call each                 |
| 3  | company back up to go over the orders and the agreements |
| 4  | that were entered into. So we will start again with      |
| 5  | Docket TV-161076, Ms. Nemykina.                          |
| 6  | Okay. Did you have a chance to walk through              |
| 7  | the order?   |
| 8  | MS. NEMYKINA: Yes.                                       |
| 9  | MR. NEMYKIN: Yes.  |
| 10 | JUDGE PEARSON: Both of you? Okay.                        |
| 11 | And do you understand everything that's in               |
| 12 | it and what you signed?                                  |
| 13 | MS. NEMYKINA: Pretty much.                               |
| 14 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And this one, I see                 |
| 15 | that you and Ms. Jones have both signed it.              |
| 16 | I didn't bring a pen. Do you have a pen?                 |
| 17 | That's the one thing I forgot.                           |
| 18 | So I see that you have both signed it, and               |
| 19 | just for the record, Ms. Jones, it looks like you've     |
| 20 | recommended two violations in this case, one for         |
| 21 | offering move and one for advertising?                   |
| 22 | MS. JONES: Yes.  |
| 23 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And the \$5,000                     |
| 24 | penalty will be imposed, but a \$4500 portion will be    |
| 25 | suspended; is that correct?                              |

| 1  | MS. JONES: Yes, that's correct.                          |

| 2  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And they paid the                   |
| 3  | full \$500 penalty today?                                |
| 4  | MS. JONES: Yes, they did.                                |
| 5  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So this suspension                  |
| 6  | period for the \$4,500 is two years from today's date    |
| 7  | which is October 25th, 2018, so that means that if Staff |
| 8  | finds an advertisement or you offer a move during that   |
| 9  | time without a permit, the remaining \$4500 would become |
| 10 | immediately due and payable; do you understand that?     |
| 11 | MS. NEMYKINA: Yes.                                       |
| 12 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And the order to                    |
| 13 | cease and desist is permanent, so that doesn't expire.   |
| 14 | So even if the penalty expires, the order to cease and   |
| 15 | desist does not expire. So even if after the two-year    |
| 16 | period of suspended penalty has run, if Staff discovers  |
| 17 | that you're still operating or advertising, Staff can go |
| 18 | straight to Superior Court to seek enforcement of this   |
| 19 | order, which would include significant additional        |
| 20 | penalties. So there is a very strong incentive for you   |
| 21 | to comply with the law, but it sounds like you are       |
| 22 | working on getting your application together and your    |
| 23 | intent is to operate legally and lawfully.               |
| 24 | MS. NEMYKINA: Yes.                                       |
| 25 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay So do you have any                   |

| 1  | other questions?  |

| 3  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Then I will sign the                 |
| 4  | order. And I think they are going to make a copy; is      |
| 5  | that right? So don't leave here before you get a copy,    |
| 6  | but once you get your copy, you will be free to go,       |
| 7  | okay? Thank you very much for coming down today, and I    |
| 8  | will give this to Ms. Paul. Thank you.                    |
| 9  | And next is TV-161077, Mr. Assin.                         |
| LO | Okay. Did you have a chance to walk through               |
| L1 | the order and do you understand                           |
| L2 | MR. ASSIN: Yes.   |
| L3 | JUDGE PEARSON: everything in it?                          |
| L4 | Okay. And I see that you and Ms. Jones have               |
| L5 | both signed it as well. And I assume that you heard       |
| L6 | everything that I just said to the other party?           |
| L7 | MR. ASSIN: Sure.  |
| L8 | JUDGE PEARSON: And, again, Ms. Jones, it                  |
| L9 | looks like you have also recommended two violations       |
| 20 | here, one for offering to move and one for advertising?   |
| 21 | MS. JONES: Yes.   |
| 22 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And the \$5,000                      |
| 23 | penalty will be imposed and a \$4500 portion of that will |
| 24 | be suspended and the company will pay \$500; is that      |
| 25 | correct?  |

| 1  | MS. JONES: Yes.  |
|----|--|
| 2  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And it looks like you               |
| 3  | made a payment of \$150 today.                           |
| 4  | MR. ASSIN: Yes.  |
| 5  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And you have the                    |
| 6  | remaining \$350 payment due on November 28th, which is   |
| 7  | next month. And do you understand that if you miss that  |
| 8  | payment that the \$4500 suspended will become due and    |
| 9  | payable immediately?                                     |
| 10 | MR. ASSIN: Yes, Your Honor.                              |
| 11 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So if, for some                     |
| 12 | reason, you are going to be late making the payment, you |
| 13 | should contact Staff and make an arrangement to avoid    |
| 14 | the suspended penalty.                                   |
| 15 | MR. ASSIN: Yes.  |
| 16 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And you do understand               |
| 17 | legally what you can and can't do after speaking with    |
| 18 | Staff?   |
| 19 | MR. ASSIN: Sure.   |
| 20 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. All right. Do you                   |
| 21 | have any any questions?                                  |
| 22 | MR. ASSIN: No.   |
| 23 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So I will go ahead                  |
| 24 | and sign this order and once you receive your copy, you  |
| 25 | are also free to go. Thank you for taking the time to    |

| 3  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And it appears that                 |
| 4  | Mr. Brewster failed to make an appearance today?         |
| 5  | MS. JONES: Yes, he did.                                  |
| 6  | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So have you had                     |
| 7  | contact with Mr. Brewster, did you attempt to contact    |
| 8  | him?   |
| 9  | MS. JONES: I attempted to contact, no                    |
| 10 | contact was made. His voice mailbox was full.            |
| 11 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So I have had a                     |
| 12 | chance to review the Commission's evidence in Docket     |
| 13 | TV-161078. There was an offer for an intrastate move     |
| 14 | and there was advertising. That meets the definitions    |
| 15 | under the applicable statute for engaging in business as |
| 16 | a moving company without a household goods permit. So    |
| 17 | what is Staff's motion at this point with respect to     |
| 18 | Dallas Brewster doing business as Pacific North West     |
| 19 | Moving?  |

| 7  | describe how and when service was accomplished.          |
| 8  | MS. JONES: Okay. So I received a move                    |
| 9  | under an assumed name on September 8th of this year by   |
| LO | phone from Mr. Brewster. He was served at his home       |
| L1 | September 28th by a legal processor and as of today, he  |
| L2 | is still advertising on Craigslist.                      |
| L3 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you. And you                  |
| L4 | verified that this morning?                              |
| L5 | MS. JONES: I verified that this morning.                 |
| L6 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And has this company                |
| L7 | ever applied for a permit with the Commission?           |
| L8 | MS. JONES: No, they have not.                            |
| L9 | JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So I will grant the                 |
