1 The Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (Commission), on its own motion, and through its Staff, alleges as follows:

I. JURISDICTION

The Commission has jurisdiction over this matter pursuant to RCW 80.01.040, RCW 80.01.060, RCW 81.01.010, RCW 81.04.010, RCW 81.04.110, RCW 81.04.380, and WAC 480-62.

II. PARTIES

- 3 The Commission is an agency of the state of Washington.
- 4 BNSF Railway Company (BNSF) is a "public service company" within the meaning of RCW 81.04.380.
- 5 BNSF is a "railroad company" within the meaning of WAC 480-62-310.

III. BACKGROUND

- 6 The following allegations are based on the Staff Investigation Report filed in this docket.
- WAC 480-62-310 requires railroad companies to report certain events, including accidents involving the release of a hazardous material. To comply with WAC 480-62-310, a railroad company must, within 30 minutes of learning of an event's

occurrence, report it to the Washington State Emergency Operations Center (EOC). The report required by WAC 480-62-310 allows the EOC to identify the critical response and remediation resources necessary to respond to the event.

- 8 On September 1, 2017, the Commission received an incident report notification from the EOC.
- According to the notification, BNSF reported to the EOC that one gallon of gasoline leaked from a loose valve on tank car UTLX201722 in BNSF's Spokane railyard.
- According to the notification, BNSF reported that the gasoline leaked onto the exterior of the tank car and onto some railroad ties.
- According to the notification, BNSF reported that the incident occurred at 5:00 p.m. on September 1, 2017.
- According to the notification, BNSF submitted its incident report to the EOC at 10:34 p.m. on September 1, 2017.

IV. CAUSE OF ACTION

- The gasoline release was an "event connected to the operation of the railroad company" that resulted in the "release of any hazardous material." WAC 480-62-310(1).
- The gasoline was a "hazardous material" within the meaning of WAC 480-62-310(1)(a).
- BNSF failed to report the gasoline release to the EOC within 30 minutes after learning of the incident, as required by WAC 480-62-310(2)(a).
- 16 BNSF committed one violation of WAC 480-62-310.

V. REQUEST FOR RELIEF

- 17 Staff requests that the Commission impose a penalty of up to \$1,000 for the violation of WAC 480-62-310 alleged above.
- Staff further requests that the Commission order such other relief as is appropriate under the circumstances.

Based on a review of Staff's investigation report and all supporting documents, and consistent with RCW 80.01.060 and WAC 480-07-307, the Commission finds probable cause exists to issue this complaint.
