NARRATIVE

On 09/14/2018 at approx. 1546 hours, I was on patrol as a Field Training Officer with N. Steinbach. We were traveling north on 179th when I noticed multiple calls being entered into dispatch. I could see both a, "Medx" and "colp" at the same location near North Kelsey Street at the Monroe Rite Aid and Denny's.

Due to the call type and multiple calls in the same matter, I then advised Steinbach to begin a code response to the location.

As we drove to the location, we were advised there had been a train vs. pedestrian at the location. We drove to the location and arrived quickly. We arrived from the south and stopped in the area of the railroad tracks on the Blueberry Lane side.

I could see there was a stopped freight train that had stopped at the crossing. I could see the railroad crossing arms were down, lights were flashing and the crossing bell was clearly sounding.

I crossed over a train car as there was no one I could see on the south side. I then could hear people telling me, "he's over there" and pointing east. I was able to cross over the train and I could see a person on the gravel on the north side of the tracks on the east side of Kelsey Street. I could see the person was lying with it's feet toward the train, I could see the train was on the north tracks. I approached and I could see the person was lying on it's back with it's head facing north. I approached and I could very clearly see there was what appeared to be brain matter on the ballast rock near the person. I could see the person appeared to be male and as I looked closer, I could see there was a significant head injury, extremely large open wound near the left hip area and other very severe injuries. The person was very clearly deceased with massive trauma.

We began coordinating response to the incident and began by keeping the scene secure. At that time, I noted Steinbach's camera was recording. I looked around and I could see items strewn about that appeared consistent with a pedestrian vs. train incident. I could see a shoe and noted the male appeared to have lost his. I could see a hat that appeared to have blood on it along with sunglasses and other bodily fluids that indicated the path of travel for the person.

Fire personnel arrived and came to assist. Medics confirmed the person was deceased and we covered the body with white sheets.

During this time, I noted there were many witnesses around the scene nearby. In the Rite Aid parking lot there was a large group of High School age children. Officer Erdmann went to speak with that group. There was a person in a truck, stopped at the railroad crossing arms. That male was contacted by Officer Tucker as it appeared the male had direct sight of the incident as it occurred.

After some time, I was asked by Sgt. Johnston to help identify the person. I returned to the body and assisted Steinbach with checking pockets of the individual. We were able to locate a slip belonging to 11B was a tenth grade student at Monroe High School. I was able to locate the male as 11B I notified Sgt. Johnston and advised him of the potential Monroe High School connection. Steinbach and I photographed the located items and placed them into a bag for later evidence booking.

A portable shelter was brought to the location and Steinbach and I assisted in placing the shelter over the body and then we placed black plastic to shield the scene from the public nearby.

I assisted in marking items on scene such as the personal items along the north side of the tracks. Items included a hat, broken sunglasses, shoe etc. I noted these items along with blood and other evidence demonstrated the path of travel of the male after impact. The impact appeared to have occurred at the west side of the crossing and his body traveled great distance after impact to the east. I helped secure the scene and then waited for further instructions.

Later, once the medical examiner was on scene, I helped move the portable shelter for the medical examiner and Detective Henderson to examine the body. Steinbach and I assisted the M.E. in bagging and removing the body from the area.

I was then advised I could clear the scene and completed this brief report of the incident.

NARRATIVE

I am Ofc Erdmann of the Monroe Police Department.

On September 14th, 2018, at approximately 1545 hours, I was in uniform, in an unmarked patrol vehicle. I heard Monroe units dispatched to a reported pedestrian train collision at the railroad track crossing at Kelsey St. Upon arrival, the train was stopped blocking the street. As I pulled into the Rite Aid parking lot, I saw an apparently deceased subject lying on the side of the tracks. As I exited my patrol car, I saw several teenagers standing nearby, asked if they had witnessed it, and when they said yes, asked them to wait over near the front of the store.

I went over to the body, and it ws immediately apparent that he was deceased, with massive injuries. I assisted in covering the body. A short time later, I went with Ofc Steinbach and Ofc Southard, to try to locate any identification. After finding nothing in his pockets, I noticed some folded papers nearby, with bloodstains on them. I unfolded the papers, and saw that they were a class schedule for a 10th grader at Monroe High School. Ofc Southard took the papers to Sgt Johnston.

I interviewed the teenagers that I had seen standing nearby. Four of them had witnessed tha collision. All of their stories were similar, stating that he had been crossing the railroad tracks with the train coming, and appeared to intenionally stop on the tracks and face the train. I obtained written statements. I was also advised that another tennaged male had been sitting on the concrete blocks near the tracks talking with the deceased, and left just before the collision. I passed off the statements and information of the other witness to Ofc Stamey.

NARRATIVE

I am Evidence Technician Acree of the Monroe Police Department.

On September 14th, 2018 at approximately 1630 hours, I was in my Monroe Police Department issued uniform when Director Willis dispatched me to the scene of the reported train pedestrian collision at the railroad track crossing at Kelsey St. Upon my arrival the train was stopped blocking Kelsey street, the railroad crossing arms were in the down position, the lights located on them were flashing and the warning bells were still ringing.

I parked my van, exited and walked over to Sergeants Johnston, Robinson, Officer Stamey and Detective Henderson who were on the south side of the Kelsey tracks. Detective Henderson then briefed me on where they were in processing the scene.

At this point Detective Henderson and myself walked down the length of the train looking for some indication of braking and anything of evidentiary value. Detective Henderson took photographs. When we arrived at the front engine we examined it for impact areas. The areas on the front of the train that had visible blood and human matter was measured and photographed, then the entire front of the train was photographed. It was noted that at this crossing, Lewis Street, the railroad arms were in the down position and flashing and the warning bells were still sounding.

Detective Henderson and I then went into the engine compartment of the train where he took photographs and asked about obtaining a copy of the video. The conductor blew the horn to verify it was in working order. We then exited the train and walked back down the opposite side of the track toward the Kelsey crossing. At this time we then began the process of Detective Henderson taking mid range and close up photos of the evidence and scene, I then collected each piece of evidence and properly stored it in an evidence bag.

The medical examiner arrived on scene and took photographs of the scene and body, prior to her moving the body to transport him, Detective Henderson and myself took the evidence back to his vehicle and transported it back to the police department. After we arrived at the police department I placed the evidence in temporary locker 31. Detective Henderson gave me the memory card from the camera and I downloaded the photographs into the I Drive under 18-15848. I then made a CD copy for the medical examiner. At this point Office Steinbach gave me a bag containing personal belonging of the victim, keys and some papers that she obtained initially at the scene for identification purposed. I then placed these items in the bag with the rest of the evidence in temporary locker 31.

On Monday September 17th, 2018, I entered all evidence into property in our records management system and tagged each piece with a computer printed label.

NARRATIVE

I am Officer Steinbach of the Monroe Police Department.

On 9/14/2018 at approximately 1546 hours I was dispatched to 18824 SR 2 for reports of a priority collision. Dispatch advised that a subject was hit by a train. At the time I was travelling northbound on 179th Avenue. I started a code response and quickly responded to the location.

I arrived with Officer Southard on the south side of the train. The train was stopped on the north set of tracks. There were multiple cars stopped for the train and pedestrians gathering and pointing toward the train. The crossing bars and warning lights marking the train crossing were flashing and there was an audible crossing signal. I crossed over the train cars with Officer Southard. I observed a body that appeared to be male lying north of the train, face up and feet toward the train. It was immediately apparent when we got closer that the male individual was deceased. I observed a large open wound on the male's left hip area and severe head trauma to the front and left side of the male's head. Dispatch was advised that the male was deceased.

I crossed back over the train and contact the incoming aid units. I advised aid that the individual was deceased and requested something to cover the body with. I covered the body with the blankets that were given to me by the aid unit.

After the scene was secured, Sergeant Johnston advised us to look for a name. Officer Southard and I started to look for identification on the body. I removed keys from the front right sweatshirt pocket of the individual. Officer Kornish located some papers next to the body. The papers were class schedules from Monroe High School and identified the individual as 11B . Sergeant Johnson, Sergeant Robinson, and Sergeant Ryan were immediately advised that the victim was a juvenile.

Additional units from Monroe arrived and placed crime scene tape. Officers started interviewing and obtaining witness statements. Officer Erdmann spoke to a group of juveniles in front of Rite Aid. Officer Michel spoke to a group that was on the south side of the train. Officer Tucker spoke to a male that was in his vehicle north of the train when it crossed.

Placards were placed to mark evidence. In the area between the intersection and the body, I was able to see a hat, a shoe, glasses, and many areas of blood spatter. I took photographs of the scene and of placards marking the evidence. The keys and two pieces of paper from the body were photographed and placed in a plastic bag which was secured in my car.

For an extended period of time during this call, I performed auxiliary tasks such as obtaining needing supplies. After the Medical Examiner had finished with the scene, I assisted in bagging and moving the body to the Medical Officer's van.

After the Medical Examiner removed the body, I observed a piece of paper and a small roll of bags that had been under the body. I photographed these items and bagged them. I returned to the Monroe Police Department and turned over the evidence items to Evidence Technician Renee Acree.

I booked all photographs taken at the scene into digital evidence at the Monroe Police Department.

NARRATIVE

I am Officer Patton, Javier A. Badge 1244 of the Monroe Police Department. This is my report.

On September 14, 2018 at approximately 1600 hours I received a phone call while off duty from Sgt. Ryan. He requested that I respond to a train vs. pedestrian fatal collision at the N Kelsey St crossing.

I arrived on scene at approximately 1627 hours. I contacted Officers on scene to get information about what happened, and what parts of the investigation have already been conducted. I was informed that Officer Stamey was the Officer in charge of the case. I was told that a teenage boy had been struck by the train, and had been killed by the impact. I could see where the body had come to rest on the north side of the tracks, a short distance east to N Kelsey St. A white sheet had been placed over the body, and later a tent had been assembled over the body to keep unauthorized observers away.

I contacted Officer Stamey and then met him at the front of the train. The train had come to a stop at the Lewis Street crossing. I viewed the outside of the train and saw there was blood and biological matter on the front and north side of the train. I photographed those, and later submitted the digital memory card to evidence.

I contacted the train crew. After I identified myself, I asked them to tell me what had happened. I was told that the train was traveling eastbound on the north track at 42 mph. There is a 45 mph train speed limit for this section of track. As the train approached the Kelsey St crossing, both crewmembers saw a person in a red sweatshirt cross in front of the train from south to north, stopping at the northern edge of the railroad, referred to at the foul point. The person then crossed again, southbound, directly into the path of the oncoming train. The crew said the brakes were applied and they heard the impact of the person against the front of the train. Due to the momentum of the train, it did not come to a stop until it reached the Lewis St. crossing. The crew were reluctant to provide written statements until an investigator from BNSF arrived. I provided them with statement forms, collected their contact information and gave them Officer Stamey's business card. The crewmembers were identified as Ernest J. Pries, Jr. and Luke A. Berg.

I then returned to the Kelsey St crossing to conduct a baseline measurement of the scene with Officer Stamey.

Railroad workers had arrived on scene and had turned off the crossing bell, making communication much easier. The crossing bars remained down and the lights remained flashing.

Using a PK Nail that was driven into the gap between pavement sections at the west edge of the N Kelsey St crossing as the reference point, I laid out a 300 foot measuring tape along the north edge of the tracks.

Officer Stamey and I took measurements, recording them on a measurement sheet. We took several measurements of biological matter on the ground, but not all, as there were many very small pieces that we saw as we took measurements of the larger pieces. We also measured the locations to a hat, shoes, sunglasses, and to the victim's head and feet.

When I was not actively engaged in measurements, I maintained security perimeter on the north side of the train at the N Kelsey crossing. During that time I was contacted by a reporter from the Monroe Monitor. I provided him with directions to meet Sgt. Johnston at the incident command center for an official information release.

Later, I assisted the Medical Examiner, along with a few other Officers, with removing the victim's body from the scene and onto a gurney.

I also assisted with securing the scene and removing equipment from the scene once the initial investigation was

NARRATIVE

The author of this report is Spencer Robinson; A Commissioned Police Sergeant for the City of Monroe.

September 14th, 2018 at about 1546 Sergeant Robinson was the oncoming patrol Sergeant for the shift. Dispatch advised of a pedestrian being struck by the train at N. Kelsey Street crossing.

Sgt. Robinson advised he was in route and arrived shortly after. Upon arrival patrol officers on scene advised the victim was deceased.

Sgt. Johnston also arrived on scene. A command center was made and Sergeant Johnston took over logistics and patrol operations while Sgt. Robinson managed the scene and investigation personnel.

Major Crimes Detective Paul Henderson was called to the scene as well as Traffic Investigations Unit Motors Officer Stamey and Patton. Evidence Technician Acree was also called to the scene.

Motors Officer Stamey was identified as the primary investigator, Detective Henderson assisted by Officer Steinbach took photographs and marked evidence.

Initially during first walk through of the scene, Sgt. Robinson used his evidence placards and placed them at critical points of evidence including clothing, body tissue and blood marks which indicated the path of travel post impact.

A tent was placed around the body to prevent on lookers from viewing and protect the scene of its final resting place post impact.

Witnesses in a vehicle on the South side of tracks were identified and a patrol officer was assigned to interview and obtain witness statements. Additionally witnesses were identified on the North side of the tracks as well and Officers Tucker, Erdmann, Kornish and Southard all assisted at the scene.

Sgt. Robinson assigned Motors Officers Javier and Stamey to contact the train engineers and conduct follow up investigation.

It was relayed to Sgt. Robinson the victim crossed the tracks, and then turned back towards the tracks, at some point waiving at the train before being struck. It was unknown at the scene why the victim was on the tracks or crossed while a track was coming.

Visibility was clear and sunny. Temperatures were mid warm to moderate. The visual distance for both directions is well over 300 yards. In addition the train track lights and warning system were visually working properly. Additionally witnesses all stopped and identified that a train was clearly coming and stayed clear of the tracks.

Follow up investigation with friends and other possible area witnesses were assigned to Motors Officer Stamey. Sgt. Robinson cleared the scene without incident.

NARRATIVE

I am Ofc Erdmann of the Monroe Police Department.

On September 14th, 2018, at approximately 1545 hours, I was in uniform, in an unmarked patrol vehicle. I heard Monroe units dispatched to a reported pedestrian train collision at the railroad track crossing at Kelsey St. Upon arrival, the train was stopped blocking the street. As I pulled into the Rite Aid parking lot, I saw an apparently deceased subject lying on the side of the tracks. As I exited my patrol car, I saw several teenagers standing nearby, asked if they had witnessed it, and when they said yes, asked them to wait over near the front of the store.

I went over to the body, and it ws immediately apparent that he was deceased, with massive injuries. I assisted in covering the body. A short time later, I went with Ofc Steinbach and Ofc Southard, to try to locate any identification. After finding nothing in his pockets, I noticed some folded papers nearby, with bloodstains on them. I unfolded the papers, and saw that they were a class schedule for a 10th grader at Monroe High School. Ofc Southard took the papers to Sgt Johnston.

I interviewed the teenagers that I had seen standing nearby. Four of them had witnessed the collision, and were identified as who were identified as 110 man, 110 man, 110 man, and 110 man. All of their stories were similar, stating that he had been crossing the railroad tracks with the train coming, and appeared to intenionally stop on the tracks and face the train. I obtained written statements.

I was also advised that another tennaged male had been sitting on the concrete blocks near the tracks talking with the deceased, and left just before the collision. That witness, Jamie Arellano (sp?) called one of the subjects I was interviewing, and I spoke with him briefly on the phone. He stated that he had spoken to the deceased, the stated that he saw him sitting on Kelsey St near the tracks. He stated that he did not make any statements that would lead him to belive he was depressed or suicidal. He further told me that his mother was best friends with the scene at that time. I told Arellano that someone would need to interview him at a later date. I passed off the statements and information of the other witness to Ofc Stamey.

NARRATIVE

On 09-14-18, at 1545 hours Monroe units were dispatched to a train/pedestrian collision at the Kelsey St crossing. When I arrived on scene the train cars were blocking the Kelsey St crossing. I saw the signal lights were flashing, the warning bell was sounding and the crossing arms were down. I was then directed by Sgt. Johnston to go to the locomotive and contact the train employees. I went to the locomotive which had stopped at the west edge of the Lewis St crossing and contacted the Engineer, Ernest PRIES. He told me he had already reported the collision and all of the train traffic had been stopped and the tracks were safe. At the time of the collision it was overcast and daylight. It had rained earlier in the day but was dry at the time of the collision.

I asked PRIES what happened, and what he had seen. He told me he was in the cab of the locomotive which was heading eastbound on the north mainline track at 42MPH. PRIES told me as they were approaching he sounded the whistle and bell and saw the crossing arms were down with the lights flashing. He told me about 150 feet from the Kelsey St crossing he saw a person run from the south side of the tracks northbound to the other side of the tracks. He told me the person stopped at the edge of the tracks, turned around, moved to the center of the north tracks, turned facing the train and held up their arms. PRIES told me at this point the pedestrian was now about 30 feet in front of the locomotive, and the locomotive hit the person. He told me he then put the locomotive into emergency mode and the train came to a stop just before the Lewis St crossing.

I asked PRIES if he could tell if the person was trying to get out of the way and he said he saw the person who he thought was a male clearly standing in front of the train with his arms and hands fully extended in the air. He said it did not appear like the male was moving at all just standing in the center of the tracks.

I talked to the Conductor, Luke BERG who was also in the cab of the locomotive and he told me the same as PRIES. He also told me he saw the male cross the tracks but then turned around and stood in front of the train with his arms up. Both PRIES and BERG provided written statements after the Train Master arrived on scene.

After talking to the Engineer and Conductor I went to the collision scene. The evidence had already been marked and Detective HENDERSON was on scene taking photos of the train and all of the evidence. Officer PATTON and I laid a base line tape on the north side of the north mainline track. I used a PK Nail that was already in place as RP#1 and marked the spot with paint. From RP #1 we measured all of the evidence moving eastbound taking measurements off of the baseline tape and I marked all of the measurements on a log sheet.

After the measurements and pictures were taken, the medical examiner was called. The medical examiner arrived and after she conducted her investigation she took possession of the body.

On 09-15-18, I contacted Chris NEUFANG who was 11B for several years. NEUFANG told me has known 11B since he was 4 years old and called him 11B even though he and 11C Ginger were never married. He told me he and Ginger were no longer together but he still has 11C come to his house on weekends so he can see NEUFANG'S other kids. He told me that lately 11C has been down a bit and has also been acting out. When I

asked him what he meant he said 11B has been upset because he has to do chores and would rather just play video games. He told me he has talked to 11C several times about the way he talks to Ginger and has told him that he needs to show Ginger more respect. He also told me that 11B has told his other son that he did not want to live with Ginger any more. NEUFANG told me 11B never said anything to him about wanting to live anywhere else. He told me when he comes to his house and leaves he has always been happy and has not seen or heard that he had been depressed just not happy doing chores or what his mom tells him to do. I obtained all of NEUFANG'S information and entered it into the case.

NARRATIVE

I am School Resource Officer Justin Springer of the Monroe Police Department, badge #1255.

On 09/14/18 at approximately 1359 hrs, Sgt. Paul Ryan called me at home advising there had been a fatal collision involving a train and a Monroe High School student identified as 15 year old male 11B on N. Kelsey St. at the intersection of the train tracks in Monroe.

Upon arrival, I helped with a variety of tasks including scene security, and as a liaison between Monroe School District personnel and Monroe Police Department with concerns the impact this would have within the school district.

At approximately 1830 hrs, I left the scene of the collision at the railroad crossing on N. Kelsey St. to attend the home high school varsity football game to provide security and assistance with any needs associated with upset students, school staff, and the general public as a result of the fatal collision.

On 09/21/18 at approximately 1200 hrs, I contacted 16 year old female student 11C and 16 year old female student 11C at Monroe High School 17001 Tester Rd. Monroe, WA 982/2.

I had contacted both earlier in the week, as they were part of a list of students who had potentially witnessed or been near the fatal collision.

During my initial contact with both 11C and 11C and, both confirmed they were at the location when the collision occurred. Both also told me they did not witness the collision, however they had just walked out of Rite Aid, which the collision occurred just south of their location.

Upon speaking with them, both advised they were at Rite Aid, along with a friend identified as 16 year old female student 11C was told all three were exiting Rite Aid, with 11C exiting first. Both 11C and 11C said as they followed 11C out of Rite Aid, she turned to them as they were exiting and asked them "...did you see that?.." 11C and 11C said they did not know what 11C was talking about and asked her "..see what?.." 11C informed them "...someone just got hit by the train..."

The main exit/entrance to Rite Aid is north of the train tracks. 11C and 11C said as they walked south through the parking lot towards the train tracks, they noticed three boys walking into the parking lot of Rite Aid. The boys were identified as 11C and 11C and

said as they walked towards the tracks, they could see 11B lying on the ground on the north side of the railroad tracks. 11C and 11C advised 11C has had first aid and CPR training. 11C and 11C informed me they stopped in the parking lot and did not go towards where 11B was lying on the ground, but 11C continued towards him to see if she could render first aid but stopped short by a few feet from where his body was. 11C and 11C told me it was clear had died and any first aid given to him would not help.

and 11C said a short time after, Police arrived and contacted them but did not obtain a written statement from them.

I obtained written statements from 11C and 11C. I forwarded the statements to the Detectives unit.

On 09/28/18, at approximately 0930 hrs, I made contact with 16 year old female student 11C at Monroe High School 17001 Tester Rd. Monroe, WA 98272.

Prior to meeting with 11C, I made phone contact with 11C Krista Chambers. I advised Krista I wanted to have a tape

recorded interview with 110 about the collision. Krista informed me she approved, and she told me she would notify 110 ahead of time.
Upon meeting with 11C, I told her I wanted to speak with her about the collision involving the train and 11B. I asked if she was comfortable with a tape recorded statement and she told me yes. 11C also informed me she had an interview with a BNSF Officer, which was tape recorded.
During the interview, 110 informed me she along with 110 and 110 were at the Rite Aid pharmacy at the time of the collision. 110 said as she exited the pharmacy, she noticed 11B get hit by the train. 110 said she walked over to to check on him to see if she could provide aid or CPR. 110 told me she checked his pulse and realized he did not have one. 110 also told me due to the extent of 11B injuries, first aid would not have helped him. 110 told me she did not know who 11B was at the time of the collision.

On 09/28/18 at approximately 1400 hrs, I met with Rhonda Spencer and 11C at their residence 11C .
Prior to meeting with Rhonda and 11C, it had been brought to my attention that Justin's father had been in a long term dating relationship with 11B father, but the two were no longer in a dating relationship. I was told 11C and 11B had remained friends and 11C might have information which could be helpful for this investigation due to the relationship.
I conducted a tape recorded interview of 11C with 11C Rhonda present. 11C advised he knew 11C well, and described their friendship similar to that of brothers. 11C said he was not aware of any events or changes in 11B life which were of major significance. 11C advised 11B and he spoke on a regular basis and 11B had not shared any incidents of bullying from others.







NARRATIVE

On 09-14-18 at about 1546 hours I was alerted by dispatch of a train pedestrian collision at the intersection of the railroad tracks 500 block of North Kelsey in Monroe. As I was enroute to the location I heard Officer Southard advise dispatch that the apparent victim was "Code Black" indicating obvious loss of life. I arrived at the intersection south of the railroad tracks. I could see that a Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad freight train was stopped on the tracks. The lead engine was between Kelsey and Lewis Street indicating that the train had been traveling east bound. A number of Monroe Police Officers were already on scene. Officer Southard and Officer Steinbach contacted me and advised that the apparent victim was on the north side of the tracks a short distance due east of the Kelsey Street crossing. I requested Southard to attempt to identify the victim. A few moments later Southard advised me that he had obtained Monroe School District student identification information from the body of the victim. The information led Southard to believe that the victim was Juvenil

As Monroe Officers arrived on the scene I advised Officer Stamey that he would be the lead investigator of the collision. I also requested Sergeant Robinson to be the supervising sergeant of the investigation. I asked Sergeant Ryan to assist by obtaining information about the deceased in preparation for family victim notification. I then began notification of key Monroe Police Department personnel including Interim Chief Dickerson and Director Willis. I spoke with Director Willis about contacting officials from the Monroe School District. She was able to reach Dr. Federica Smith, Superintendent of the Monroe School District. I remained on scene obtaining resources through City of Monroe Public Works for street closures as well as investigative needs. I also maintained substantive communication with Director Willis who was acting as the agency Public Information Officer and liaison with the Monroe School District.

NARRATIVE

I am Officer Devin Tucker with the Monroe Police Department.

On 9/14/2018 at approximately 1546 hours, I was on uniformed patrol for the Monroe Police Department. Monroe Officers were dispatched to a report of a train hitting a pedestrian at the railroad crossing on N Kelsey St at/near Blueberry Lane. Unsure if the injured pedestrian was on the north or south side of the tracks, I took SR 522 to go around the blocking train and arrived on scene north of the train tracks on N Kelsey St. I noted that as I arrived Officer Southard radioed that the individual was code black indicating the injuries were fatal.

As I exited my patrol vehicle I noted a male body was laying in the gravel north east of the main train crossing. I used my patrol vehicle to block off access to N Kelsey St from SR 2 and assisted in placing a white covering over the deceased male. I saw a truck that was stopped in the southbound lane at the rail road crossing and a male driver I identified as Andrew Yardley. When I asked Andrew if he could tell me what he witnessed, he appeared shaken up and told me that he stopped as the rail road crossing arms went down in preparation that a train was crossing. Andrew then said he saw the deceased male cross the tracks south to north, then cross again north to south as if he was playing chicken with the train. Andrew then said the male didn't make it off of the tracks and was struck by the train. Andrew described the male flying through the air and landing in the gravel. Andrew believed the male was deceased and again seemed shaken up saying the male shouldn't have been playing around with the train crossing.

Andrew provided a written statement and after gathering his information, Andrew left the area. I assisted in placing a pop up canopy and plastic covering around the deceased body in order to prevent onlookers from observing/photographing the body. I remained onscene until I was asked to relocate to the train crossing on N Lewis St. I remained in the area blocking off the road and ensuring the train conductor remained onscene for questioning. Once Detective Henderson arrived to speak with the train conductor I cleared from the area. This ended my involvement for this case.

NARRATIVE

On 09-15-18, I interviewed a witness, Jaime ARELLANO at the police department. I tape recorded the interview and this is a synopsis of that interview. I asked ARELLANO how he knew the victim, 11(b) Juvenile. He told me that it was his 11(b). I asked him how well he knew him and he told me they were friends but not super close. He said he would talk to him at school last year but that was about it. I asked ARELLANO about the incident yesterday, and seeing 11(b) at the railroad tracks. ARELLANO told me he was walking to Chase Bank to make a deposit when he saw 11(b) sitting on the cement blocks near the railroad tracks. I asked him which side of the tracks they were on and he said the same side as Blueberry Lane. He told me he stopped for a minute and was asking 11(b) how he was doing. He told me 11(b) seemed ok and didn't seem down or depressed. ARELLANO told me he asked 11(b) why he was sitting there and 11(b) told him he was just watching the trains. ARELLANO told me he had to go and said goodbye to 11(b) and told him he would talk to him again if he was still there when he walked back from the bank.
ARELLANO told me on his way back he stopped and bought a package of cookies and when he crossed the tracks 11(b) was still sitting on the cement blocks. He told me he stopped again to talk to 11(b) and shared his cookies with him. He told me they were talking about stuff in general when three guys had walked up. ARELLANO told me they were some friends he knew from last year at school. ARELLANO told me he talked to them about a couple different things. He told me one of the guys liked a girl he knew and was asking about her. ARELLANO told me he said good bye to them and they walked towards Fred Meyer. He told me he said goodbye to 11(b) and gave him a half hug and walked away towards Main St to go home.
ARELLANO told me at about 3:50 he received a call from his friend (one of the three he had just talked to) telling him the guy he had been talking too, 11(b), had been hit by a train. I asked him if he had ever known 12(b) to be depressed or talk about suicide and he said no. He told me they both went to Monroe High School, but that he had graduated last year so he doesn't see him as much this year. I asked him if he ever saw him run in front of the train and he said no. He then told me he had heard rumors of 11(b) being bullied but he said 11(b) had never told him he had been bullied. I asked him a couple of times if there was anything else he could tell me that he would help with the investigation and he said no. I then concluded the interview and had ARELLANO sign the taped statement interview form.
Later in the day I contacted ARELLANO again to clarify a couple of statements he had made and to get the names of the three friends he had talked to when he was with I I I I I I I I I I I I I I I I I I I

My name is Paul Henderson and I am a Commissioned Police Detective for the City of Monroe. 09-14-2018

At approximately 1620 hours, I was called out to assist with an active investigation of a collision on Kelsey Street at the railroad crossing. I was advised the collision involved a freight train and a juvenile pedestrian who was deceased. I drove to the scene and arrived from the south on North Kelsey Street.

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A freight train was stopped on the tracks and blocking the North Kelsey Street crossing. The crossing guard arms were down and the alarm bell was sounding. I spoke with Sergeant Robinson, who was coordinating the scene with Sergeant Johnston. He gave me a brief update to include what was known up to this point. There were many other officers on scene that had been delegated with different tasks. Officer Stamey and Officer Patton were assigned to work on the collision aspect of the case, while I was assigned to investigate the death. I was told the deceased juvenile had been identified as 100 Juvenile, who is a freshman at Monroe High School. I was also advised that other officers were contacting possible witnesses, to include three male high school students who had been walking nearby and some adults who had been in vehicles that were stopped for the train. I was also told that 11(b) had been talking to someone near the bus stop south of the railroad tracks prior to the incident (this person was later identified as Jaime Arellano). Since I had seen what appeared to be a news helicopter flying overhead on my drive to the scene, I requested a pop-up tent be placed over the body. Sergeant Robinson took care of this request while I made my way to the opposite side of the train to survey the scene.

After crossing onto the northern side of the railroad tracks, I was able to see the scene in its entirety. I noticed some placards had already been placed on the ground and later found out this had been done by Sergeant Robinson as an attempt to identify possible evidence so officers on scene would not destroy it. I began taking overall photographs and decided not to remove the already existing placards as they had been placed prior to my arrival. However, it should be noted the photographs taken with these initial placards in place should not be used to identify the numbering system associated with evidence that was collected. After taking the initial

and didn't have any classes

photographs of the scene, I placed my own set of numbered placards in relation to items that were deemed of evidentiary value. The next set of photographs and documented numbers associated with each piece of evidence corresponds with the correct set of placards. Some of these items were collected as evidence whereas other marked items (i.e. biohazard material) were documented and disposed of properly.

Officer Stamey pointed out the approximate impact point which he concluded from witness testimony. The location was at the west corner of the concrete that made up the railroad crossing area, on the northern most railroad track. The front of the train was now located just before the railroad intersects with North Lewis Street (aka State Route 203). The train had been traveling eastbound during the collision. I walked from the initial impact point to the front of the train on the northern side, documenting anything that was of evidentiary value. I also walked back to the initial impact scene on the south side of the train, but did not find anything of value on this side.

11(b) 's body was resting a short distance north of the railroad tracks and south of the Rite Aid parking lot. The force of the collision had thrown him across North Kelsey Street to the position he was currently at. In between the impact point and stains, brain matter, and other biohazard material.

After walking to the front of the train with Evidence Technician Acree, I located the area of impact on the lead engine. BNSF engine cars have distinct paint jobs with black on the bottom third and orange on the top two-thirds. At the front of the engine, there is a rim jutting out where the orange paint begins. Just below this rim is a square metal case protruding from the bumper area with a red lid. It was on the red lid and the bottom corner of the orange rim where a substantial amount of biohazard substance was located. It appeared to be blood and possible brain matter, mostly contained in a small area with some remaining remnants wrapping around the side of the train (north side). The area of the red lid was photographed with a measuring tape from the ground, which at this location was the concrete that runs along the intersection area.

I climbed up the stairs into the engine compartment. I spoke with Luke Berg (Conductor) and Ernest Pries (Engineer) who had been in control of the train during the collision. I was given a brief explanation of the data monitors and the braking system. Berg and Pries provided signed written statements which were collected by Officer Stamey. Pries explained to me how the locomotive had been traveling at 42 miles per hour while approaching the Kelsey Street intersection. He had activated the horn as per policy and could see the lights and crossing arms at the intersection were functioning properly. Pries saw a pedestrian run northbound from outside the crossing arms and across both sets of tracks before suddenly stopping just to the north of the tracks the locomotive was traveling on. Pries was sounding the whistle and bell when the pedestrian sidestepped onto the tracks and faced the train before disappearing under the nose of the locomotive. He immediately activated the emergency brakes but knew the pedestrian had been struck. After speaking with Pries, I took photographs of the monitors and the current position of the brake which was engaged in the "full" position. I also heard the horn as it was activated by the conductor. The headlights on the engine were also activated and all four were working.

Upon walking back to the initial impact point, I assisted Evidence Technician Acree with collecting evidence. After this was complete, Investigator Rebecca Shankles with the Medical Examiner's Office arrived on scene. She gave me their case number for reference, #180915-5. I photographed the body while Shankles was conducting her own investigation. Other officers assisted her with collecting the body while I assisted Evidence Technician Acree with transporting the evidence back to Monroe PD. Prior to leaving the scene, a BNSF representative informed me that video from the main engine would be requested but may take a few weeks to download. I gave my contact information for when the video was available. After arriving at the police department, I assisted with booking the evidence and also requested a copy of the photographs be hand delivered to the Medical Examiner's Office per Investigator Shankles' request. 09-19-2018

I spoke to Officer Springer who is the School Resource Officer at Monroe High School. He was aware of the case and was working with school officials to assist with the investigation, including students who needed counseling or other services due to the death of a fellow student. I was also notified of social media posts (specifically on Facebook) alleging fellow students had dared 🔟🕒 to jump in front of the train. Other posts alleged that [11(b)] had been bullied to the point of committing suicide. Many of these posts implicated the three juvenile males who witnessed the incident as being the people who either bullied or dared [1(b)]. I read through some of the comments, some of which alluded to hoping the juveniles, "could live with themselves" after being responsible for what happened. Due to the sensitive nature of these allegations, I decided to conduct an in-person tape recorded statement with all three of these juveniles. I also noted that each of them had already provided a signed written statement at the scene while cooperating fully with police during the initial investigation. One of the juveniles, 11(c) Juvenile Crime , had called 911 to report the collision. In both [11(6)] 's and written statements, they refer tothe deceased as "Leslie", as if not knowing what his actual name was. Upon a later veview of the 911 call by [1](c), it does not appear that he personally knew the deceased. Officer Springer advised that he had spoken with 11(c) Juvenile Crime , who agreed to speak with me at the Monroe High School. After meeting with 11(c), he agreed to have the interview taped, and signed the Monroe PD Tape Recorded Witness Statement form after our conversation was complete. School Resource Officer Springer was also present during the recorded interview. The interview began at 1355 hours and ended at 1412 hours. After the interview was complete, I noticed the recording device was no longer working properly. Upon returning to the police department, it was discovered the audio file was only around two seconds long and did not record any verbiage. Because [116] had previously provided a written statement and due to the sensitive nature of this incident, I have elected not to re-interview him but rather provide a synopsis of his recorded interview. The following is what the contraction of the contrac After getting out of school, he began walking home with two of his friends including 11(c) Juvenile and 11(c) getting a ride from another friend who dropped them all off at his house on Blueberky Lane in Monroe. A short time later, the three of them wanted some food and began walking to Fred Meyer. After turning northbound onto North Kelsey Street from Blueberry Lane,

he saw Jamie and 11(b) sitting at the bus stop. He said hi to Jamie and noticed that 11(b) was eating some chips from a bag. He

knew who Jamie was from school but only recognized 11(b) 's face. He was not friends with 11(b)

with him. He also didn't interact with 11(b) and couldn't remember ever speaking to him except maybe in middle school. said he remembered (11(b) s face from when both of them attended Park Place Middle School. The three boys walked past Jamieland (b) , continuing on their way to Fred Meyer for some food. 11(c) wasn't sure exactly what time this was, but believes it was around 3 pm. Upon returning from Fred Meyer, 11(c) and his two friends were walking south past Denny's when he saw 11(b) still sitting at the bus stop but Jamie wasn't there. The three heard the train whistle and knew the train was coming so decid<mark>e</mark>d to c<mark>r</mark>oss the street to the Rite Aid side. They begin to cross, not using the crosswalk because cars were already stopped for the train, but instead crossing between the train tracks and SR 2. While crossing the road, 11(c) noticed 11(b) stand up from the bus stop and begin walking really fast in their direction. He thought it was really strange because the train was really close and then told his two friends, "He's walking towards the train!". If Community was still walking across the street with his friends and had just made it to the sidewalk when **11(b)** was struck by the trai<mark>d. He t</mark>ouldn't remember many details right before the collision or afterwards. When I asked if 11(b) made any movements immediately prior to the collision, he could not remember. Upon Feturning to the police department, Sgt. Hatch informed me that he had received a voicemail from 11(b) I listened to the voicemail and called her back at the provided phone number (425-344-7647). Kizn advised she did not want being interviewed at the school and would bring him to the police department tomorrow so I could speak with him. She also told me that [11(c) Juvenile is mother was standing next to her and would bring her own son to the police department tomorrow at the same time. I contacted Medical Examiner Rebecca Shankles, asking when I could obtain 11(b) 's phone. She had previously collected the cell phone from the scene because it was still in his hand. Rebecca emailed me ba<mark>c</mark>k, inf<mark>o</mark>rming me the cell phone had been released yesterday with the decedent to Purdy & Walters at Floral Hills in Lynnwood. Prior to emailing me back, she had contacted the funeral home and informed them that I needed the cell phone as part of my investigation. I immediately contacted the funeral home at 425-672-1800 and advised them of the situation. I was told the cell phone was in their possession and would be waiting for me to pick up tomorrow. 09-20-2018 I requested Evidence Technician Renee Acree to collect the phone from Purdy & Walters. When Renee collected the phone, she was also given two pieces of paper that had been on the decedent's person when it arrived at the funeral home. She was informed that one of the pieces of paper had a drawing on it and said something about a Kermit suicide. Renee brought the items back to Monroe PD and took photographs of the pieces of paper. On the bottom right corner of one piece of paper is a small drawing of what appears to be Kermit the Frog along with writing just beside it saying, "Kermit suicide". Pictures of the paper were submitted to evidence. The cell phone was shattered and the battery compartment was extruding from the body, making it impossible to turn on or obtain data from the internal hard drive. came to Monroe PD with his mother and I conducted a recorded interview with his permission. The interview began at 1604 Hours and ended at 1619 hours. His account leading up to the collision was very similar to what 1160 explained the previous day. However, 116 remembered that upon returning from Fred Meyer and crossing the street from the Denny's side to the Rite Aid side, the railroad crossing arms were down and he could see the train coming from behind Denny's. He also remembered seeing walking fast towards the tracks but didn't think much of it other than he must be trying to "beat" the train. [11(0)] was walking with his hands inside the front sweatshirt pocket. Once he made it to the tracks, he stopped and faced the tr<mark>a</mark>in just before being struck. 11(c) also said he only knew of 11(b) because they went to the same middle school but he rarely if ever saw him at the high school. He never hung out with him and they didn't have any classes together or speak to each other. He also didn't have any knowledge of 11(b) 's personal life. was waiting in the police department lobby with his father. I conducted a recorded interview with his permission Which began at 1630 hours and ended at 1644 hours. 11(c) 's account of the day was exactly the same as 11(c) and 11(c). He also reiterated the first time any of them had seen [11(b)] that day was when Jamie and him were sitting next to each other by the bus stop just south of the railroad tracks. [116] didn't know [116] except that he went to school with him a couple years ago at Park Place Middle School but since starting wigh school he never saw him. After saying hi to Jamie, the three friends went to Fred Meyer where bought some groceries. They were walking back when he heard the train whistle sound and saw the crossing arms down dcrosst the roadway, so they decided to cross the street to waste time inside Rite Aid while the train crossed. He was paying attention to crossing the road when 11(c) pointed out how 11(b) was walking towards the train. 11(c) looked down the road and saw 11(b) walking really fast towards the tracks with his hands inside the front sweatshirt pockets. Then Wesley suddenly stopped and just before the train went by, he took a step over to be directly in front of the train and was facing the train when it struck him. 11(c) immediately got on his phone and called 911. He saw three girls from high school walking out of Rite Aid but only one had actually walked outside in time to see what happened. She ran over to 11(b) and checked on him to see if he was breathing while 11(c)continued to speak with the dispatcher. He stayed on the phone until police arrived. 10-02-2018 I received the 911 recordings from Snohomish County 911. I reviewed them and then booked the duplicate discs into evidence. I had previously been contacted by Joel Donohue who identified himself as being 11(b) Juvenile. During our initial phone call, we

I received the 911 recordings from Snohomish County 911. I reviewed them and then booked the duplicate discs into evidence. I had previously been contacted by Joel Donohue who identified himself as being 11(b) Juvenile. During our initial phone call, we agreed to meet on this date in order to discuss the ongoing investigation. I met with Joel at Monroe PD and he brought along two other adult males. Joel was concerned over the rumors of 11(b) being bullied or dared to jump in front of the train. Without giving specifics of the case, I explained to Joel how my investigation included the rumors on social media and how at this time there was no evidence to suggest these rumors were in any way true. I advised that he not trust anything on social media and wait until the police report was complete before coming to any conclusions. I also told Joel that video from BNSF would be viewed by me when available, but a copy was not being made available for the case; meaning nobody else could watch it. Joel showed me a text message conversation on his cell phone that he explained was between him and 11(b). The first message I saw was from Joel asking 11(b) how he was doing. This message appeared to have been in late June or early July of this year. Part of the reply by 11(b) advised that he was not supposed to be speaking with 11(b) until after he turned 18. Joel acknowledged the reply and there were a couple

of future sporadic messages sent by Joel to 11(b). In most cases, 11(b) would only reply with a thumbs up emoticon. Prior to ending the meeting, Joel explained he was going to the Monroe High School and wanted to speak with the principal regarding the rumors going around social media about the three students who witnessed the collision. Joel wanted to figure out a way to stop the rumors since they were not true.

10-03-2018

I met with Ginger Davies at Monroe PD, who had previously requested a meeting with me to discuss the investigation. Ginger was extremely frustrated with how the case was being handled because the Medical Examiner's Office had released 11(b) body to Joel Donohue. She explained that even though Joel was 11(b) Juvenile, they had never been married and Joel has been estranged for the past 15 years; never wanting anything to do with 100 . She further explained how Joel owes over \$60,000 in child support and just made her pay him \$4,000 to get 11(b) body back. She had been forced to have a funeral without 11(b) body present. Since the body was released to Joel, he wouldn't let her have the body until she paid him all the claimed expenses for the two funeral homes that Joel had taken 11(b) 's body to. Ginger said she was forced to hire an attorney to help track down where 11(b) body was at and to get it back so she could cremate his remains because Joel was refusing to speak with her.

Ginger also noted how Joel had begun communicating with 11(b) this past summer. It was at this same time when 11(b) 's attitude had suddenly changed. She had told 11(b) that he wasn't allowed to speak with Joel until he became an adult. Ginger didn't want the two of them speaking because she believed Joel was a bad influence and didn't want her son going down the wrong path. She wasn't sure if 11(b) continued to communicate with Joel, but believed this to be the case and wondered if the actions to end his life were directly related to the recent communication with Joel. Ginger also expressed her concern with Joel spreading rumors on social media suggesting she was at fault for 11(b) 's suicide. Ginger advised she was shown the social media posts by a friend of hers who was concerned with the rumors being spread by Joel. Prior to the end of our meeting, I let Ginger know that I was awaiting video from BNSF and would contact her again once I had a chance to view it.

I met with BNSF employee Greg Beam who had the video from the locomotive with him. Greg played the video on his department laptop and I was able to view it. The video clearly shows 1(b) jogging past the crossing arms (which were down with the lights flashing) and over the railroad tracks until coming to a stop on the northern edge of the most northern set of tracks. 11(b) 's hands are in his sweatshirt pockets as he faces the train and then sidesteps once to become more centered with the oncoming locomotive. Just after he disappears from under the front of the locomotive, a tennis shoe can be seen flying in the air and landing just south of the Rite Aid parking lot. On the north side of the tracks, a subject on a bicycle is seen waiting on the east sidewalk behind the crossing arms. The video also shows three subjects walking southbound on North Kelsey Street along the Denny's side. They begin to cross the road through vehicles that are stopped for the train. One of the subject's is seen moving his head towards the location where 11(b) is running and just before the three subjects finish crossing the road, all three of them are now looking in the direction of 11(b) just before the collision. There is a considerable distance between 11(b) and the three subjects walking southbound, and the video does not show any indications of acknowledgement between them prior to 11(b) already being upon the train tracks. Even at this point, the only indication of acknowledgement is one of the subjects looking in 11(b) 's direction. BNSF does not provide video copies, so one was not included as part of this case.

I called Ginger and we set up a meeting for later in the day to speak in person. At that meeting, I told her what was viewed on the video. I also explained that all of the witness testimony corroborated what had been seen on the video. Based on evidence from the investigation, there would be a press release explaining a final determination. Ginger asked to have a copy of the final report and 's personal belongings. I told her that when everything was complete, I would let her know so that she could make the appropriate request.

Later on the same day, Ginger called me back, expressing concern regarding contact between 11(b) and 11(b). She wanted police to subpoen the phone records so she could see any text messages. I advised this was not possible because at this point there was no crime and a subpoen would require probable cause of a crime in order for a judge to approve it. I advised Ginger to call the cell phone provider and find out if she could obtain the records on her own.

10-15-2018

Officer Springer informed me that he had conducted a tape recorded interview with Jaime Arellano. Jaime is the last known person to speak with 11(b). Officer Springer's report has been included in the case.

10-23-2018

I called Andrew Yardley and spoke to him over the phone. There was a written statement from Andrew, but it did not specify where he was at during the incident or what he was doing there. I asked Andrew to clarify and he explained that on the day in question, he was driving his truck and had driven south on Kelsey Street from SR 2. The crossing arms had come down and he was the first vehicle stopped for the train, heading southbound.

I called Adrianna McKenna and spoke with her regarding the relationship between 11(b) Juvenile Crime and 11(b). Adrianna explained how they currently live in Idaho but used to live near 11(b) and that is how the two kids became friends. 11 was supposed to visit 11(b) this past summer but it didn't work out and the two haven't seen each other in person for about a year and a half. Their relationship consisted mostly of online video games and social media chatting. After hearing about 11(b) 's death, Adrianna spoke to 11(c) and told him it was important for 11(b) 's mom to know what 11(b) was chatting about prior to his death. 11(c) looked up messages on Facebook and she read through them, finding some concerning remarks.

I asked Adrianna if she still had the messages. Adrianna explained she had saved them on her phone and could send them to me. I sent Adrianna an email and asked her to reply with the messages attached. I received an email reply from her a few minutes later. The email included numerous messages between 1(b) and 1, with the first message dated September 1st. The majority of messages were from someone using the moniker of "WOLFBOT". Adrianna said this is the moniker used by 1(b). The messages showed 11(b) sanger towards his mother for grounding him and on another occasion from his mother taking away the internet. One of the messages was 11(b) telling 11 what the voices in his head were telling him on a daily basis. This message showed a

I called the phone number listed for Joy Grigg; a name listed as a possible witness to the incident. Joy answered the phone and explained what her involvement was in the incident. She had just gotten off the Community Transit bus when she saw the victim hit by the train. Joy didn't have any more details because she had just stepped off the bus and looked up in time to see the collision. She had given her name to police at the scene and was later given a ride home by a police officer. Joy gave her address as 701 West Elizabeth Street, #5, Monroe.

I called Kerri Arellano and left a voicemail asking for her to call me back. 10-24-2018

Kerri Arellano called me in the morning and I spoke to her regarding the incident. I had spoken to Kerri before when she came to Monroe PD with Ginger Davies. Kerri explained that her son is Jaime Arellano who was the last known person to speak with 1(b). Jaime had been talking with 1(b) near the railroad tracks and afterwards, he walked back home to watch his younger brother while she went to Fred Meyer. Kerri was at Fred Meyer when she received a phone call about what happened. She rushed over to the scene and spoke with law enforcement. Kerri also went with police to Ginger's house for the death notification. She did not witness the incident, but as a good friend of Ginger's, she has been very involved with what has transpired afterwards. 11-01-2018

After the incident, Monroe PD posted a press release on their Facebook page. There were numerous comments, but one in particular was from Jeremy Bubna which stated the following:

"That is my sons good friend, Just had the boys vigile the other night. So so sad, make sure you talk with your kids about excepting dares. This could be any one of our kids apparently his buddys dared him to run across the tracks in front of train and he tripped." Through Facebook, a request was made for Jeremy to contact me. A short time later, he called and we spoke over the phone. Jeremy explained the initial conversation with his son was very brief and after making the Facebook comment, he learned that 11(c) was not actually friends with 11(b). Jeremy also said that 11(c) was the person who told him about the dare, but he believed it was just from rumors at the high school and nothing specific that his son knew about. I asked Jeremy if I could have the Monroe PD School Resource Officer contact his son at the high school to find out specifics of this rumor. Jeremy agreed and told me that 11(c) Juvenile Witnesses 10. He also gave me information for 11(c) Juvenile, Chelsea Guizzotti, at 425-345-4555.

I contacted School Resource Officer Springer and requested that he contact 11(c) to find out if there was a specific person who told

I contacted School Resource Officer Springer and requested that he contact to find out if there was a specific person who fold him about a dare or if it was just from generic rumors he was hearing at school.

I received a copy of the Snohomish County Medical Examiner's report. The report noted that toxicology samples were taken and a separate report would be issued with those results. The report listed the manner of death as suicide. This report was added to the case packet.

I called Officer Springer and spoke to him regarding his conversation with 11(c . 11(c explained that he had not heard anything from school and the information regarding a dare was from an assumption that his mother made. He had later mentioned this to 11(c), who misinterpreted it to be factual information. 11(c) was not aware that 11(c) had made the Facebook comment.

I attempted to call Chelsea Guizzotti at 425-345-4555 and received an automated message stating, "The person you are trying to reach is not accepting calls at this time". Monroe High School had one other contact number for Chelsea at 425-487-9561. I called this number and received another automated message stating the number was disconnected.

After investigation, this case is being closed without criminal charges. There is no evidence of foul play and 11(b) 's mental state at the time of his actions is unknown; as is his motivation for running onto the train tracks and facing the train.

Officer Stamey: Okay. And the date is September 15th, 2018. Uh, the time is now 1:46 in the afternoon. Um I am Officer Darryl Stamey of the Monroe Police Department. The statement is being recorded at Monroe Police Department. There are two persons present in the room. For the purpose of identification would each person besides you uh, Jaime, who is giving a statement, state your name and occupation one at a time. There are no other people in the, in the room so it's just you. Um, so Jaime do you understand this statement is being recorded?

Jaime Arellano: Yes.

Officer Stamey: Okay. Do I have your consent to record this interview?

Jaime Arellano: Yes.

Officer Stamey: Would you give your full name and spell it please?

Jaime Arellano: Uh, Jaime Arellano, J-A-I-M-E, A-R-E-L-L-A-N-O.

Officer Stamey: Okay. And what is your middle initial?

Jaime Arellano: Um, I don't have a middle name.

Officer Stamey: Okay. Oh, would you give your date of birth please?

Jaime Arellano: It's um, October 20th, 1999.

Officer Stamey: And your address?

Jaime Arellano: 740 Village Way.

Officer Stamey: Monroe?

Jaime Arellano: Monroe, Washington.

Officer Stamey: Okay. Uh, would you give your home telephone number?

Jaime Arellano: Um, 425-218-2104.

Officer Stamey: Okay. And do you have a work phone?

Jaime Arellano: I don't.

Officer Stamey: Okay, so I'm going to ask about the incident that happened yesterday uh, at Kelsey Street where the, the train person

that was on the tracks.

Jaime Arellano: Okay.

Officer Stamey: Um, first of all how do you know that person?

Jaime Arellano: Um, he's my mom's best friend's uh, son.

Officer Stamey: Okay.

Jaime Arellano: And so like we were always like—no, we weren't like super close, but like I, we were like friends and I would always

go out of my way to say hi to him at school at school and like...

Officer Stamey: Okay.

Jaime Arellano: ...cuz I knew he was and he was important to my mom so he was kind of like important to our family too.

Officer Stamey: Okay. And what's his name?

Jaime Arellano: Um, 11(b)

Officer Stamey: Do you know his last name?

Jaime Arellano: No.

Officer Stamey: Okay. So, so go ahead and tell me uh, what happened yesterday?

Jaime Arellano: Um, well I was—I left my house around like 3:00, cuz I had to go to the bank and to open up an account for college and um, I saw him sitting on a cement block by the train track and I just asked him what was going. He said nothing much and then I told him I'll be right back, cuz I have to go finish uh, I have to make my account. He said okay. And then I waved bye to him. I—we did that and I bought—bought some cookies and then I my way back I—I saw him peek his head over like around that metal pole, cuz

he was sitting down still (unintelligible) it was like blocking.

Officer Stamey: Okay.

Jaime Arellano: So I like looked and I waved and he waved and he smiled and I came over there and I offered him a cookie. I asked him what was going on. He said nothing much just watching the trains. And I didn't think that was weird, cuz I—I like—people watch—like people...

Officer Stamey: Okay.

Jaime Arellano: ...like to watch different things. And uh, I asked him how school was. He said fine. I asked him who his teachers were. He told me who his teachers were. Then my three friends from uh, on, from Blueberry Lane they came over and I was just talking to them about uh, school and a girl my friend liked and then I told them I had to go. I shook all their hands said good bye and then I gave like 11(b) a kind of a half hug and told him bye and that I'll see him later and I'll see him around and he said bye and then I walked home and then my friend called me around 3:50 telling me that the person that I was talking to got hit by a train.

Officer Stamey: Okay. So you weren't there when he got hit by the train?

Jaime Arellano: Uh-uhm (negative response), just I was the last person he talked to.

Officer Stamey: Okay.

Jaime Arellano: And he...

Officer Stamey: Uh, okay so let me back up just a little bit. So the concrete blocks that you're talking about are they on the Rite Aid side of the tracks or...

Jaime Arellano: Uh-uhm (negative response).

Officer Stamey: ...the other side?

Jaime Arellano: Uh the, they're on the other side. So if you're coming from Blueberry and you take a left they're like...

Officer Stamey: Right there, that, that bus stop?

Jaime Arellano: Yeah.

Officer Stamey: Okay. Okay.

Jaime Arellano: He, he seemed fine. Like he was, he smiled and he was talking with me and we were uh, eating cookies and he—like I didn't see anything wrong.

Officer Stamey: Okay he didn't—he didn't seem sad or...?

Jaime Arellano: No.

Officer Stamey: Okay. Uh, and he didn't say anything to you about, about the train other than he was just watching the trains?

Jaime Arellano: Yeah he said that he likes to watch the trains. He was just watching the train.

Officer Stamey: Okay. Um, have you've known him ever be depressed or...?

Jaime Arellano: Um. no I haven't.

Officer Stamey: Okay.

Jaime Arellano: I've never like I never knew that...

Officer Stamey: Okay.

Jaime Arellano: ...he was depressed or...

Officer Stamey: And I—and I don't know if he was or not that day.

Jaime Arellano: Oh

Officer Stamey: I'm just asking...

Jaime Arellano: Okay.

Officer Stamey: ...how he's been.

Jaime Arellano: Um, no not that I recall. Every time I talked to him in the hallways of school last year he always like would smile and he would talk to me and we'd walk and I'd walk with him like halfway to his class and then I have to go.

Officer Stamey: Okay.

Jaime Arellano: But he seemed normal.

Officer Stamey: And you both go to Monroe High School?

Jaime Arellano: Um, yes, but I graduated this last year.

Officer Stamey: Oh okay. Uh, so when you left him he didn't say anything about running in front of the train or anything like that?

Jaime Arellano: Um, he didn't.

Officer Stamey: Okay.

Jaime Arellano: He just said bye.

Officer Stamey: Have you ever seen him run in front of the trains or, or anything like that?

Jaime Arellano: I have not. I haven't seen him do anything like that before.

Officer Stamey: Okay.

Jaime Arellano: So...

Officer Stamey: Um, so you let—do you know what time you left him?

Jaime Arellano: Um, it was probably—it was around like 3:30.

Officer Stamey: Okay.

Jaime Arellano: 3:35

Officer Stamey: So a little bit before that?

Jaime Arellano: Yeah.

Officer Stamey: Okay. Um, so were you—were you walking when you saw him?

Jaime Arellano: Yeah I was walking.

same way back.

Jaime Arellano: Um, I mean I'd never like I never—I don't know if he was bullied or not. I don't—I never talked to anybody about that. He never brought it up to me. Um, but uh, I don't know like I guess it's like spreading that I think he was bullied a little bit, but I didn't know anything about that.

Jaime Arellano: I just asked him is he okay like if, 'you need anything?' He said no I'm okay.

Officer Stamey: Okay. Um, does he have very many friends...

Jaime Arellano: Um...

Officer Stamey: ...that you know of?

Jaime Arellano: I, well one time I saw him playing tag—hide-and-seek tag with like two/three of his friends at the high school after school.

Officer Stamey: Okay.

Jaime Arellano: So like I thought he has—like oh he has friends, that's cool like that's good.

Officer Stamey: Okay. But so last year when you went to school with him he was a freshman and you were a senior?

Jaime Arellano: Yes.

Officer Stamey: Okay. Okay. Um, I'll just ask you one more time. Is there anything else that you can think of that would help us try to figure out what happened yesterday?

Jaime Arellano: Um, honestly I—I don't know. I mean the only thing that I, may—possibly that he was bullied, but like I, again and I don't know anything about it.

Officer Stamey: But you don't—you were just seeing that on social media?

Jaime Arellano: Yeah.

Officer Stamey: Right, not...okay. Okay uh...so I asked you do you have anything else that would—you would like to add to this statement.
