GRADE CROSSING PROTECTIVE FUND 2019 – 2021 GRANT APPLICATION **OPEN CALL FOR PROJECTS**

The Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (UTC), through its Grade Crossing Protective Fund (GCPF), provides grants for projects that eliminate or mitigate public safety hazards at railroad crossings and along railroad rights-of-way in Washington State. Any public, private or non-profit entity may submit an application for a GCPF grant.

To apply for a grant to eliminate or mitigate a public safety hazard at a railroad crossing or along a railroad right-of-way, complete the following information and submit it and any attachments to the UTC. If you are proposing a change to the warning devices at a public railroad crossing, complete the GCPF petition form.

Please be sure to complete the entire form. Incomplete or missing information will delay the grant review process.

Project Information

Presently the signs at the Index avenue crossing are not compliant with the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices. The signs are 30 inches, the minimum requirement being 36 inches. One of the 3 advanced warning signs need to be replaced with a W10-4.

2. A detailed summary of the proposed project and how it will eliminate or mitigate the hazard. Include any drawings or construction plans for the proposed project.

The advanced warning signs will be six inches wider in overall diameter making them easier to see at longer distances allowing drivers to be better prepared for the railroad crossing. The 36 inch W10-4 sign will be a better representation of the upcoming right turn over the railroad crossing.

An increase in safety due to the increase in visibility of the signs at greater distances allowing drivers to be more prepared for the upcoming railroad crossing.

8. A description of the applicant's experience in grant management or completing grant projects of this nature, including years of experience, types of projects completed and project cost/scope.

I Sean Horst, in the last three years, have had multiple projects working for the Town of Index that have been funded by grant money. Some of the more basic grants have been for the replacement of Stop signs and posts costing \$500. One for the replacement of all of the towns fire extinguishers costing \$500. One for the restoration of a town garage. We lifted the building, poured a new foundation and slab, and reframed the walls. This completely rectified an otherwise doomed building. The cost approximately \$6000, \$5000 of it paid for by a grant, the remainder paid for by local fundraising. The most recent project was the replacement of a sliding glass door in our old fire hall as well as the refurbishing of its old barn style doors. Connected to this project was the repair of an old walkway costing approciamatel \$3900. The funds for all of these projects were granted through AWC Municipal Resources. All projects were completed in the time frame set forth by the granting agency.
