## NOTICE OF PENALTIES INCURRED AND DUE FOR VIOLATIONS OF LAWS AND RULES

# PENALTY ASSESSMENT: TV-200778 PENALTY AMOUNT: \$100

Mover For You LLC 1403 S University Rd. Spokane Valley, WA 99206

The Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (Commission) believes Mover For You LLC (Mover For You or Company) violated Washington Administrative Code (WAC) 480-15-570, Driver Safety Requirements, which adopts Title 49 Code of Federal Regulations (49 CFR) Part 391 – Qualification of Drivers.

Revised Code of Washington (RCW) 81.04.405 allows penalties of \$100 for each violation. In the case of an ongoing violation, every day's continuance is considered a separate and distinct violation.

On September 2, 2020, Commission Motor Carrier Investigator Francine Gagne completed a routine safety investigation of Mover For You and documented the following violation:

• One violation of 49 CFR § 391.51(a) – Failing to maintain driver qualification file on each driver employed. The Company failed to maintain a driver qualification file for driver Mason Morales.

The Commission considered the following factors in determining the appropriate penalties for this violation:

- 1. **How serious or harmful the violation is to the public.** The violation noted is serious and potentially harmful to the public. Household goods moving companies that fail to maintain driver qualification files on each driver employed put their customers' belongings and the traveling public at risk. This violation presents a safety concern.
- 2. Whether the violation was intentional. Considerations include:
  - Whether the company ignored Commission staff's (Staff) previous technical assistance; and
  - Whether there is clear evidence through documentation or other means that shows the company knew of and failed to correct the violation.

On August 8, 2018, the Commission received the Company's application for household goods moving authority. In the application, Mark Sacchetti, president of Mover For You, acknowledged the Company's responsibility to understand and comply with applicable safety laws and regulations.

On February 26, 2019, the Commission received the Company's application to reinstate its household goods moving authority. In the application, Mark Sacchetti acknowledged the Company's responsibility to understand and comply with applicable safety laws and regulations.

The Company knew or should have known about these requirements.

- 3. Whether the Company self-reported the violation. The Company did not self-report this violation.
- 4. Whether the Company was cooperative and responsive. Mover For You was cooperative throughout the investigation.
- 5. Whether the Company promptly corrected the violation and remedied the impacts. Mover For You has not provided Staff with evidence that the violation has been corrected.
- 6. **The number of violations.** Staff identified one violation type with a total of one individual occurrence.
- 7. **The number of customers affected.** Mover For You employed three drivers and operated two commercial motor vehicles in the last 365 days. The Company reported 18,480 miles traveled in 2019. This safety violation presents a public safety risk.
- 8. **The likelihood of recurrence.** Staff provided technical assistance with specific remedies to help the Company assess how well its safety management controls support safe operations and how to begin improving its safety performance. The Company was cooperative with Staff throughout the safety investigation. In light of these factors, Staff believes that the likelihood of recurrence is low.
- 9. The Company's past performance regarding compliance, violations, and penalties. On August 16, 2018, the Company's household goods moving authority was canceled due to lack of insurance in Docket TV-180882.

On February 25, 2019, the Company was classified as a household goods carrier and was penalized \$5,000 for operating without household goods moving authority in Docket TV-190022. The Commission suspended a \$4,000 portion of the penalty, subject to conditions, and the Company paid the \$1,000 unsuspended portion of the penalty in full.

Mover For You has no history of safety violations.

10. **The Company's existing compliance program.** Mark Sacchetti is responsible for the Company's safety compliance program.

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11. **The size of the Company.** Mover For You currently operates one commercial motor vehicle and employs one driver. The Company reported \$205,000 in gross revenue for 2019.

The Commission's Enforcement Policy provides that some Commission requirements are so fundamental to safe operations that the Commission will issue mandatory penalties for each occurrence of a first-time violation.<sup>1</sup> The Commission generally will assess penalties per type of violation, rather than per occurrence, for first-time violations of those critical regulations that do not meet the requirements for mandatory penalties. The Commission will assess penalties for any equipment violation meeting the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration's "out-of-service" criteria and also for repeat violations of critical regulations, including each occurrence of a repeat violation.

The Commission has considered these factors and determined that it should penalize Mover For You \$100, calculated as follows:

• One violation of 49 CFR § 391.51(a) – Failing to maintain driver qualification file on each driver employed. The Commission assesses a penalty of \$100 for this critical violation.

This information, if proven at a hearing and not rebutted or explained, is sufficient to support the penalty assessment.

Your penalty is due and payable now. If you believe the violation did not occur, you may deny committing the violation and contest the penalty through evidence presented at a hearing or in writing. Alternatively, if there is a reason for the violation that you believe should excuse you from the penalty, you may ask for mitigation (reduction) of the penalty through evidence presented at a hearing or in writing. The Commission will grant a request for hearing only if material issues of law or fact require consideration of evidence and resolution in a hearing. Any request to contest the violation or for mitigation of the penalty must include a written statement of the reasons supporting that request. Failure to provide such a statement will result in denial of the request. *See* RCW 81.04.405.

If you properly present your request for a hearing and the Commission grants that request, the Commission will review the evidence supporting your dispute of the violation or application for mitigation in a Brief Adjudicative Proceeding before an administrative law judge. The administrative law judge will consider the evidence and will notify you of their decision.

You must act within 15 days after receiving this notice to do one of the following:

- Pay the amount due.
- Contest the occurrence of the violation.
- Admit the violation but request mitigation of the penalty amount.

**If you do not act within 15 days,** the Commission may take additional enforcement action, including but not necessarily limited to suspending or revoking your permit to provide regulated service, assessing additional penalties, or referring this matter to the Office of the Attorney General for collection.
