**NOTICE OF PENALTIES INCURRED AND DUE
FOR VIOLATIONS OF LAWS AND RULES**

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YOU MUST RESPOND WITHIN 15 DAYS OF THIS NOTICE

The Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (Commission) believes that Grey Wolfe Construction, Inc. (Grey Wolfe or Company) violated Revised Code of Washington (RCW) 19.122.055(1)(a) by failing to notify the one-number locate service and causing damage to an underground gas facility.

RCW 19.122.055(1)(a) states, in part, that excavators who fail to notify a one-number locator service and cause damage to an underground gas facility are subject to a civil penalty of not more than \$10,000 for each violation.

Commission staff (Staff) conducted an investigation that included reviewing damage reports, investigation reports, the One Call Center database, and communications with the Company. The documents reviewed identified a natural gas event that involved Grey Wolfe damaging a natural gas facility while excavating without a valid locate ticket.

The Commission reviewed findings and recommendations made by Staff and hereby notifies you that it is assessing a \$1,000 penalty (Penalty Assessment) against you on the following grounds:

1. **Alleged Violation:**
On July 31, 2024, Grey Wolfe was excavating at 3710 South Sheridan Avenue, Tacoma, Washington. While excavating, Grey Wolfe workers struck and damaged an underground Puget Sound Energy (PSE) natural gas facility. The Damage Information Reporting Tool (DIRT) report submitted by PSE on September 11, 2024, indicated that Grey Wolfe was excavating without a valid request to locate underground utilities.
2. **Analysis:**
The alleged violation concerns RCW 19.122.055(1)(a), which states, in part, that an excavator must contact the one-number locate center before beginning excavation. In an October 17, 2024 email, PSE stated that Grey Wolfe was not working as a sub-contractor

for a utility company and did not have a valid locate ticket at the time of the damage to the gas line. PSE also noted that treble charges would be applied. PSE provided a copy of the Gas First Responder (GFR) report, which documented that the ½" gas line was 18" in depth when it was damaged. The GFR report documented that Grey Wolfe was operating a skid steer with an auger without having locates and hit a gas service line at a depth of 18". The ELM report confirmed the information in the DIRT and GFR reports that a ½" steel gas service line was damaged at 3710 South Sheridan Avenue, Tacoma, WA. The ELM report identified Andrew Parvi with Grey Wolfe as the company that damaged the gas line while digging early on locate ticket #24318927. PSE provided Washington One Call Center ticket #24318927, which shows that the locate request was called in on July 31, 2024, at 09:12 a.m., the same day the damage occurred.

Staff reviewed the Washington One Call System and confirmed that Andrew Parvi with Grey Wolfe called in ticket #24318927 on July 31, 2024, and identified Andrew Parvi as the homeowner. Staff did not locate any other ticket requests for the address where the damage occurred.

On October 21, 2024, Grey Wolfe responded to Staff via email and claimed it was exempted from the requirement of requesting a locate according to RCW 19.122.031. Grey Wolfe stated that it owned the property and was not working on a customer's behalf. Grey Wolfe noted that it was simply cleaning up the property and conducting minor landscaping utilizing hand tools. The Company stated that it only excavated 8" in depth. Another email from Grey Wolfe confirmed that Andrew Parvi is a partner in the Company and that he would be moving into the home on November 1, 2024. Another email from Grey Wolfe on October 30, 2024, denied that an auger was used in the digging and confirmed that Andrew Parvi called the locate hotline after the accident. Staff conducted a property owner search and confirmed Grey Wolfe owned the property. Grey Wolfe stated that it would provide pictures, but it was unable to do so. PSE provided photographs of the excavation site, which showed a hole that appeared to be significantly deeper than 8", along with a shovel and a bypass lopper. In another picture that PSE provided, there was an auger parked near the home behind a portable toilet and garbage can.

The Commission considered the following factors in determining the appropriate penalty amount for the violation:

1. **How serious or harmful the violation is to the public.**

This incident could have been significantly more harmful to Grey Wolfe workers, utility technicians, nearby homeowners, and the public, and it could have resulted in severe injury and/or loss of property.

2. **Whether the violation is intentional.**

The violation appears to be due to negligence rather than a lack of knowledge of Washington State's Dig Law. Over the past 12 months, Grey Wolfe has only submitted one request to the One Call Center for locates, which was ticket #24318927. Grey Wolfe was issued a warning letter on May 17, 2024, which outlined the requirements that the Company must follow and its responsibility to contact the one-number locate service before beginning excavation.

3. **Whether the company self-reported the violation.**

Grey Wolfe did not self-report the violation. The Commission became aware of the violation when PSE filed a DIRT report.

4. **The likelihood of recurrence.**

The likelihood of recurrence depends on the Company's actions going forward and its willingness to notify the one-number locate service every time before beginning excavation.

5. **The Company's previous Warning Letter.**

On May 17, 2024, the Commission mailed an Alleged Violation of Washington Dig Law letter to Grey Wolfe. The letter included detailed information about Washington State's Underground Utility Damage Prevention Act, requirements for submitting utility locate requests before excavating, and the possibility of penalties for each violation. The Commission mailed the letter after receiving a report of damage caused by Grey Wolfe on March 4, 2024, that occurred because the Company failed to submit a request to locate underground utilities before excavating.

The Commission has considered these factors and determined that it should penalize Grey Wolfe Construction, Inc. as follows:

- \$1,000 penalty for one violation of RCW 19.122.055(1)(a) with an offer to suspend an \$800 portion of the penalty for one year, and then waive it, subject to the conditions that:
 - 1) Grey Wolfe supervisors and field crew responsible for excavation complete Dig Safe Training provided through the National Utility Contractors Association (NUCA) within 90 days of this Penalty Assessment;
 - 2) The Company must submit documentation of that attendance to the Commission; and
 - 3) Grey Wolfe must not commit any further violations of RCW 19.122 within 12 months of the date of this Penalty Assessment.

These facts, if proven at a hearing and not rebutted or explained, are sufficient to support the Penalty Assessment.

Your penalty is due and payable now. If you believe the violation did not occur, you may deny committing the violation and contest the penalty through evidence presented at a hearing or in writing. Or, if there is a reason for the violation that you believe should excuse you from the penalty, you may ask for mitigation (reduction) of the penalty through evidence presented at a hearing or in writing. The Commission will grant a request for a hearing only if material issues of law or fact require consideration of evidence and resolution in a hearing. Any request to contest the violation or for mitigation of the penalty must include a written statement of the reasons supporting that request. Failure to provide such a statement will result in denial of the request. *See* RCW 81.04.405.

If you properly present your request for a hearing and the Commission grants that request, the Commission will review the evidence supporting your dispute of the violation or application for mitigation in a Brief Adjudicative Proceeding before an administrative law judge. The administrative law judge will consider the evidence and will notify you of their decision.

You must act within 15 days after receiving this Penalty Assessment to do one of the following:

- Pay the \$1,000 penalty amount due; or
- Pay \$200 and notify the Commission that you accept the offer to suspend an \$800 portion of the penalty amount subject to the following conditions:
 - Grey Wolfe management and field crew responsible for excavation must complete NUCA Dig Safe Training (<https://utc-9183.quickbase.com/db/bpkt6vndh>) within 90 days of service of this Penalty Assessment; and
 - **The Company must submit documentation of that attendance to the Commission;** and
 - Grey Wolfe must not incur any additional violations of RCW 19.122 within 12 months of the date of this Penalty Assessment; or
- Request a hearing to contest the occurrence of the violation; or
- Request mitigation to reduce the amount of the penalty.

 - o Grey Wolfe must not commit any further violations of RCW 19.122 within twelve (12) months of the date of this Notice.
- [] 3. **Contest the violation.** I believe that the alleged violation did not occur for the reasons I describe below (**if you do not include reasons supporting your contest here, your request will be denied**):
- [] a) I ask for a hearing to present evidence on the information I provide above to an administrative law judge for a decision.
- OR [] b) I ask for a Commission decision based solely on the information I provide above.
- [] 4. **Request mitigation.** I admit the violation, but I believe that the penalty should be reduced for the reasons set out below (**if you do not include reasons supporting your application here, your request will be denied**):
- [] a) I ask for a hearing to present evidence on the information I provide above to an administrative law judge for a decision.

OR [] b) I ask for a Commission decision based solely on the information I provide above.

RCW 9A.72.020 “Perjury in the first degree.”

- (1) A person is guilty of perjury in the first degree if in any official proceeding he or she makes a materially false statement which he or she knows to be false under an oath required or authorized by law.
- (2) Knowledge of the materiality of the statement is not an element of this crime, and the actor's mistaken belief that his or her statement was not material is not a defense to a prosecution under this section.
- (3) Perjury in the first degree is a class B felony.
