NOTICE OF PENALTIES INCURRED AND DUE FOR VIOLATIONS OF LAWS AND RULES

PENALTY ASSESSMENT: TV-250332 PENALTY AMOUNT: \$900

The Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (Commission) believes Heritage Moving Solutions, LLC (Heritage or Company) violated Washington Administrative Code (WAC) 480-15-555(1), Criminal Background Checks for Prospective Employees; and WAC 480-15-560, Vehicle and Driver Safety Requirements, which adopts Title 49 Code of Federal Regulations (49 C.F.R.) Part 395 – Driver's Record of Duty Status.

Revised Code of Washington (RCW) 81.04.405 allows penalties of \$100 for each violation. In the case of an ongoing violation, every day's continuance is considered a separate and distinct violation.

On May 12, 2025, Commission Motor Carrier Safety Investigator Tracy Cobile completed a routine safety investigation of Heritage and documented the following violations:

- Eight violations of WAC 480-15-555(1) Failure to complete a national criminal background check for every person the carrier intends to hire. The Company failed to acquire criminal background checks prior to hiring employees Adrienne Richmond, Ramona Robinson, Seth Wolf, Samuel Bergio, Elizabeth Robinson, Anthony Fletty, Brandon Peterson, and Thomas Gray.
- Eleven violations of 49 C.F.R. § 395.8(a)(1) Failing to require a driver to prepare a record of duty status using the appropriate method. The Company failed to require driver Thomas Gray to prepare a record of duty status on one occasion January 16, 2025, and Anthony Fletty on 10 occasions between March 6, 2025, and March 31, 2025. The Commission considered the following factors in determining the appropriate penalties for these violations:
 - 1. How serious or harmful the violations are to the public. The violations noted are serious and potentially harmful to the public. Household goods moving companies that: (1) fail to conduct criminal background checks prior to hiring their employees, and (2) fail to require drivers to create a record of duty status put their customers, their customers' belongings, and the traveling public at risk. These violations present serious safety concerns.

2. Whether the violations were intentional. Considerations include:

• Whether the Company ignored Commission staff's (Staff) previous technical assistance; and

• Whether there is clear evidence through documentation or other means that shows the Company knew of and failed to correct the violations.

On April 11, 2024, Ramona Robinson, office manager, completed online household goods training and acknowledged receiving training pertaining to motor carrier safety regulations.

On June 3, 2024, the Commission received the Company's application for household goods moving authority. In the application, Tara Kleinschmidt, owner, acknowledged the Company's responsibility to understand and comply with applicable motor carrier safety laws and regulations

On July 25, 2024, Heritage received temporary operating authority from the Commission.

The Company knew or should have known about these requirements.

- 1. Whether the Company self-reported the violations. Heritage did not self-report these violations.
- 2. Whether the Company was cooperative and responsive. The Company was cooperative throughout the safety inspection.
- 3. Whether the Company promptly corrected the violations and remedied the impacts. Heritage has provided Staff with a safety management plan for evidence of correction for violations. However, the company is required to submit a safety management plan to Staff for consideration.
- 4. **The number of violations.** Staff identified nine violation types with a total of 29 occurrences during the routine safety investigation of Heritage. Of those violations, Staff identified two violation types with 19 individual occurrences that warrant a penalty in accordance with the Commission's Enforcement Policy.
- 5. **The number of customers affected**. Heritage reported 1,203 miles on their investigation questionnaire for 2024. These safety violations present a public safety risk.
- 6. **The likelihood of recurrence.** The Company was cooperative throughout most of the safety investigation. Staff provided technical assistance with specific remedies the Company could use to assess how well its safety management plan operates and how to begin improving its safety performance. Considering these factors, Staff believes the likelihood of recurrence is low.
- 7. The Company's past performance regarding compliance, violations, and penalties. The Company has no history of penalties for safety violations.
- 8. **The Company's existing compliance program.** Tara Kleinschmidt and Ramona Robinson are responsible for the Company's safety compliance program.

9. **The size of the Company.** The Company currently employs three drivers and operates one leased commercial motor vehicle. The Company reported \$ 36,614.07 gross revenue in 2024.

The Commission's Enforcement Policy provides that some Commission requirements are so fundamental to safe operations that the Commission will issue mandatory penalties for each occurrence of a first-time violation. The Commission generally will assess penalties by violation category, rather than per occurrence, for first-time violations of those critical regulations that do not meet the requirements for mandatory penalties. The Commission will assess penalties for any equipment violation meeting the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration's "out-of-service" criteria and for repeat violations of critical regulations, including each occurrence of a repeat violation.

The Commission has considered these factors and determined that it should penalize Heritage \$900 (Penalty Assessment), calculated as follows:

- Eight violations of WAC 480-15-555(1) Failure to complete a national criminal background check for every person the carrier intends to hire. The Commission assesses a penalty of \$100 for each occurrence of these first-time critical violations, for a total of \$800.
- Eleven violations of 49 C.F.R. § 395.8(a)(1) Failing to require a driver to prepare a record of duty status using the appropriate method. The Commission assesses a \$100 "per category" penalty for these first-time critical violations.

This information, if proven at a hearing and not rebutted or explained, is sufficient to support the Penalty Assessment.

Your penalty is due and payable now. If you believe the violation(s) did not occur, you may deny committing the violation(s) and contest the penalty through evidence presented at a hearing or in writing. Alternatively, if there is a reason for the violation(s) that you believe should excuse you from the penalty, you may ask for mitigation (reduction) of the penalty through evidence presented at a hearing or in writing. The Commission will grant a request for hearing only if material issues of law or fact require consideration of evidence and resolution in a hearing. Any request to contest the violation(s) or for mitigation of the penalty must include a written statement of the reasons supporting that request. Failure to provide such a statement will result in denial of the request. See RCW 81.04.405.

If you properly present your request for a hearing and the Commission grants that request, the Commission will review the evidence supporting your dispute of the violation(s) or application for mitigation in a Brief Adjudicative Proceeding before an administrative law judge. The administrative law judge will consider the evidence and will notify you of their decision.

You must act within 15 days after receiving this notice to do one of the following:

- Pay the amount due.
- Contest the occurrence of the violation.
- Admit the violation but request mitigation of the penalty amount.

Please indicate your selection on the enclosed form and submit it electronically through the Commission's web portal at https://efiling.utc.wa.gov/Form within FIFTEEN (15) days after you receive this Penalty Assessment. If you do not act within 15 days, the Commission may take additional enforcement action, including but not necessarily limited to suspending or revoking your certificate to provide regulated service, assessing additional penalties, or referring this matter to the Office of the Attorney General for collection.
