MR. WISE: And that's the same way with oil in the ground too. It's absorbed to the clays primarily, which generates a different color. But yes, installations was my main thing, working with a whole bunch of the oil companies. Decommissions were requested. Started doing them in about 1982 as requests for the City of Seattle. They went from a \$50 a year permit to be able to have a tank in a right-of-way, to \$500 a year for that tank in a right-of-way. A lot of the places they would have these heating oil tanks,

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EVIDENTIARY HEARING - TESTIMONY OF TOM WISE

A. Well, I started out as -- as Tank Wise because I was kind of frustrated with the way people were representing the fact that heating oil is an environmental nightmare, and as I went ahead and started Tank Wise in 1995, working with the oil companies, there was about five different oil companies that I used to do tank replacements for as the heating oil tanks would be coming of age and then they would have a particular problem.

As heating oil was always considered as an irritant in the Department of Ecology here in Washington State, as an irritant that it is, then you need to take care of an irritant. If it is not an irritant where it does not flow across a property line or infect a day sloper, where you can have an odor, which could be a health issue or the environment where it bubbles up out of the ground over here and the screening as the irritant that it would be.
