This is Docket TV-180911, which is an 8 application for a household goods permit filed by 1st Choice Movers LLC. 9 10 My name is Rayne Pearson. I'm an 11 administrative law judge presiding over today's brief 12 adjudicative proceeding. 13 So let's start by taking appearances from 14 both parties, and we'll begin with Commission Staff. 15 MR. ROBERSON: Good afternoon. My name is 16 Jeff Roberson, R-o-b-e-r-s-o-n. My address is 1400 17 South Evergreen Park Drive Southwest. PO Box 40128, Olympia, Washington 98504. My phone number is, excuse 18 me, 360-664-1188, and my email address is 19 jeff.roberson@utc.wa.gov. With me at counsel table is 20 Mike Dotson, the Commission's transportation specialist. 21 22 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you. 23 And for the Company? If you can state your 24 first and last name, spelling your last name, and then 25 provide us with your address, telephone number, and

email address. 1 2 MR. COMELLA: Yes, my name is Matthew I live 3512 South Juneau Street, Seattle, 3 Comella. 4 Washington 98118. Also, my phone number is 206-480-7932, and my email address is 5 matthew@1stchoicemovers.co. 6 7 Okay. Can you come a little JUDGE PEARSON: 8 bit closer to the microphone and then could you spell 9 your last name? 10 MR. COMELLA: Yeah, my last name is C-o-m, as in Mary, e-l-l-a. 11 12 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you. So before we get started, I'd like to 13 14 provide an overview of this afternoon's proceeding. We're here today because the Commission issued a notice 15 of intent to deny the Company's application for a 16 17 permanent authority as a household goods carrier. And, Mr. Comella, you requested a hearing to 18 19 have an opportunity to respond to the allegations in the notice and explain why the application should be 20 21 granted. 22 So I want to just clarify your position 23 before we get started. Are you disputing any of the

24 convictions that were listed in the notice of intent to 25 deny?

Page 6 1 MR. COMELLA: No, Judge Pearson. I take 2 full responsibility for the crimes that I committed. 3 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So are you aware that the Commission rules bar from entry any individuals who 4 has been convicted of certain crimes in the past five 5 6 years? 7 MR. COMELLA: Yes, Judge. 8 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So the Commission 9 does have the authority to grant an exemption from any of its rules, and if you would like, you can request 10 11 that the Commission make an exception and grant you a 12 household goods permit despite your criminal history. Is that what you would like to do? 13 14 MR. COMELLA: Yes, Judge. 15 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So under WAC 16 480-15-035, companies are required to file with the 17 Commission a written request for an exemption from a rule and giving a full explanation of the reason the 18 exemption is requested. However, there's another 19 procedural rule that allows the Commission to grant an 20 exemption from any of its rules in individual 21 circumstances if the exemption is consistent with the 22 public interest and the purposes underlying the 23 24 statute -- or the regulations and applicable statutes. 25 And I am willing to grant you an exemption

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from the requirement that you file a written request for 1 2 exemption from the rule, because we can address your request from -- for exemption here today with all 3 parties present and with the ability to respond provided 4 that Staff has no objection to doing so. 5 6 MR. ROBERSON: Staff has no objection. Okay. So I know that was a 7 JUDGE PEARSON: 8 lot of convoluted legalese, but I wanted to allow you to speak to why you think the Commission should make an 9 exception to its rules in this circumstance without 10 11 having to file all the written paperwork that you would 12 normally have to file. Does that make sense? 13 MR. COMELLA: Yes, Judge. 14 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So let me get back to 15 describing how we'll proceed. So, Mr. Comella, 16 Mr. Roberson will first give a brief overview of Staff's 17 case and then you can present your case. Once you present your case, Staff will introduce its witness, 18 19 Mr. Dotson, and he will testify about Staff's investigation of your application, and then you will 20 have the opportunity to ask him questions when he's 21 22 finished testifying. And then once all of the witnesses have testified, both parties will have the chance to 23 24 make a closing statement. Do you have any questions 25 before we get started?

Page 8 1 MR. COMELLA: No, Judge. 2 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So, Mr. Roberson, you 3 can go ahead and proceed with your opening statement. 4 MR. ROBERSON: Good afternoon. As you've mentioned, we're here on an application by 1st Choice 5 6 Movers LLC. In the course of processing that 7 application, Mr. Dotson, acting for Commission Staff, discovered a number of criminal convictions from 8 Florida. 9 10 JUDGE PEARSON: Is your microphone on? 11 It is. I may --MR. ROBERSON: 12 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Can you just pull it 13 closer? 14 MR. ROBERSON: Sorry. 15 JUDGE PEARSON: Thank you. 16 MR. ROBERSON: Mr. Dotson discovered a 17 number of criminal convictions in Florida, the most recent of which was entered I believe on 18 February 23rd, 2016, which is within the five-year 19 period under which the Commission will not grant an 20 application under both WAC 480-15-302(8)(a) and 21 480-15-302 -- 305(2). Staff notified the Commission of 22 its findings. There was a notice of intent to deny and 23 24 here we are. That's basically it. 25 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So one other thing I

Page 9 forgot to address that I wanted to before we got started 1 is the exhibits that have been filed in this docket. 2 So Staff filed an exhibit list with proposed exhibits. 3 Ι believe each one is a criminal history? 4 5 MR. ROBERSON: It is, and Mr. Comella has 6 copies of that. 7 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. MR. ROBERSON: And if I understand him 8 correctly, if he's not disputing the convictions, then 9 if he's willing to stipulate to them, there's actually 10 very little reason for Mr. Dotson to testify. 11 12 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. 13 MR. ROBERSON: The convictions will be in 14 the record. 15 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Are you -- are you 16 fine with admitting those into the record? 17 MR. COMELLA: Yes, ma'am. Okay. And then Mr. Comella 18 JUDGE PEARSON: 19 also submitted six letters of character reference that 20 came in. Does Staff have --21 MR. ROBERSON: Staff has no objection to 22 admitting those into the record. 23 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And what I'd like to 24 do is actually consolidate them all into one exhibit and 25 mark it as MC-1. So we will put those letters of

Page 10 recommendation into the record as well, okay? 1 (Exhibit MC-1 admitted.) 2 3 JUDGE PEARSON: All right. Then, 4 Mr. Comella, it's your turn. Let me swear you in before 5 you get started. If you would stand and raise your right hand. 6 7 8 MATTHEW COMELLA, witness herein, having been 9 first duly sworn on oath, was examined and testified 10 as follows: 11 12 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So go ahead and take 13 a seat, and this is your opportunity to address what was 14 in the notice, give your reasons why you think we should 15 16 grant your application for a household goods permit, and 17 then also please specifically speak to why we should make an exception to the five-year rule in this 18 19 circumstance. 20 Okay. My name is Matthew MR. COMELLA: I'm from Melbourne, Florida. I recently moved 21 Comella. 22 here about a year and a half ago. JUDGE PEARSON: Could you speak up a little 23 24 bit --25 MR. COMELLA: Yeah.

Page 11 JUDGE PEARSON: -- and come a little bit 1 closer to the microphone? Okay. 2 Thank you. 3 MR. COMELLA: All right. Can you hear me? JUDGE PEARSON: That's much better. 4 Thank 5 you. 6 MR. COMELLA: Loud and clear? 7 JUDGE PEARSON: Yes. 8 MR. COMELLA: My name is Matthew Comella. 9 I'm from Melbourne, Florida. Currently moved from Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, to out here April 2017. I'm 10 11 here to take full responsibility for the allegation of 12 the charges. I did admit guilt in every single one, and I'm not here to minimize or justify these crimes. 13 I'm just here to lay some facts out for you guys as well 14 since that time frame of committing these crimes. 15 16 The first thing I want to say is that when 17 these crimes were committed, I was homeless. Also, I didn't have any money, and I was a heroin addict, an IV 18 drug user. Since then, my sobriety date was -- is 19 August 17th, 2013. I went to detox and then I went to a 20 program in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, called Primary 21 22 Purpose Sober House. It's a four-phase program based on the 12 steps of Alcoholics Anonymous. I was there --23 which I do have a letter. I don't know if I have to 24 submit this or not. 25

Page 12 1 JUDGE PEARSON: Is that separate --2 MR. COMELLA: But I do have a letter just confirming the time I was there and then the time I 3 left. Also, here's my completion of the program, 4 graduate certificate. 5 JUDGE PEARSON: So are those originals or 6 7 are those copies that you're willing to leave here? 8 MR. COMELLA: Copies. 9 JUDGE PEARSON: They're copies? Are you okay with that, Mr. Roberson? 10 11 MR. ROBERSON: Yes, we are. 12 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. If you want to bring those up to me, I will admit them and mark them as 13 14 Exhibit MC-2. I'll take those. Thank you. 15 (Exhibit MC-2 admitted.) 16 MR. COMELLA: Okay. So when I was there, I 17 was a part of the community. I learned a lot about the 12 steps of Alcoholics Anonymous. I can honestly say 18 all 12 right here in court if you'd like me to. But so 19 I do have practical experience in recovery. 20 Also, from the time I started working there, 21 22 I started working in the moving industry as an estimator or moving coordinator for different moving companies, 23 which I have my resume as well if you -- just to prove 24 25 where I worked, Judge, if you'd like that as well?

Page 13 JUDGE PEARSON: Mr. Roberson, are you fine 1 with that? 2 3 MR. ROBERSON: No objection. JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Yeah, you can bring 4 that up. That's fine. I will admit that and mark it as 5 6 Exhibit MC-3. Thank you. 7 (Exhibit MC-3 admitted.) 8 MR. COMELLA: And, again, I'm just 9 displaying the facts. 10 Also, so while I was in sobriety and at the -- at the sober house, I graduated, was part of the 11 12 community. Also, I took a break from the moving industry and decided to work in treatment as a manager, 13 and I went to court as a court liaison for one of our 14 clients that was looking at a prison -- five-year prison 15 16 term. 17 And instead -- I came on his behalf to get him to come to our treatment center instead. And when I 18 was -- went to pick him up the next day from the jail to 19 enter him into the treatment center, I realized I had a 20 warrant from 2013, the last crime that I did commit. 21 And I do have that information as well. I believe it's 22 probably in there. 23 24 But when I committed the crime, it was 25 May 17th, 2013. That was the last crime that I

1	committed, and that was before I got sober. Actually,		
2	three months prior to me getting sober. I handled that,		
3	because I have violated probation in the past, but the		
4	court record does show that I did complete and pay all		
5	the fines within three weeks of being on the probation.		
6	And because of that, I was early termed for for three		
7	months with that. So I did successfully complete		
8	when I did get sober, I did successfully complete a		
9	probation. Also		
10	JUDGE PEARSON: Can I ask you a question		
11	just real quickly?		
12	MR. COMELLA: Yes.		
13	JUDGE PEARSON: So the 2016 theft		
14	conviction, was the crime occurred in 2013; is that		
15	what you're saying?		
16	MR. COMELLA: I was originally charged		
17	with since I was in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, I wasn't		
18	in Brevard County or Melbourne, and I did I was		
19	unaware that I had a warrant, but I was originally		
20	charged with that crime in 2013.		
21	JUDGE PEARSON: But the conviction didn't		
22	occur until 2016?		
23	MR. COMELLA: No, ma'am.		
24	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. I just wanted to		
25	clarify that		

Page 15 MR. COMELLA: Yeah. 1 That was --JUDGE PEARSON: -- the 2016 conviction was 2 3 related to a 2013 crime. 4 MR. COMELLA: Yes. 5 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. 6 MR. COMELLA: And the only reason why I was 7 arrested on the warrant, because I was unaware and I 8 actually went into a jail to pick somebody up, and they 9 ran my name at the time. 10 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. 11 MR. COMELLA: So from there, I took -- I 12 took responsibility for the actions that I've made. Also, I have a really great relationship with my parents 13 that I never really had prior to getting sober. 14 My father, as one of the letters of reference, he's really 15 16 proud of me, and he's willing to stand by me through 17 And trust me, there was a time that he would not this. stand by me if I was out here doing the things that I 18 19 used to do. 20 Also, my intention of coming out here -- so I ended up leaving there. I still have friends in 21 22 recovery. One of the issues that I was having there, though, is that back in I would say early 2017, the 23 fentanyl epidemic was killing all my friends, and 24 25 because I was big in the recovery in South Florida, and

1	I decided that if I was going to have a family or kids,
2	I don't want them raised around that environment or even
3	have that opportunity. So I decided to move here. And
4	the reason why I decided or one of the reasons why I
5	decided is because my sister lives in Bainbridge Island,
6	and I came to visit, and I really like it here.
7	Also, like I said, if I was to have a
8	family, this is where I would want to have my family at.
9	Just it seems like a safe safe state and a really
10	good state. I took the a leap of faith and I when
11	I got here, I was homeless, I I stayed sober, I
12	stayed in a homeless shelter for six months, or actually
13	four months, and then I'm working with different state
14	agencies. Department of Vocational Rehabilitation has
15	helped pay for everything all the way up to this very
16	moment. Even paid for the application process for
17	this this license also, which is one of the letters,
18	since August 1st of 2017.
19	Also, I I work closely with a business
20	consultant, James McCafferty. He is appointed by the
21	State or the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation,
22	and he walks he pretty much helps me with every other
23	issue that I have, because I have never been to college,
24	and this is the first time I've ever done anything like
25	this. So I really need as much help as I can get.

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Also, I do go to therapy for -- Catholic 1 2 Community Services, CReW. It's called CReW. It is in 3 downtown Seattle. I've been going to therapy since I've 4 gotten here. I do have a home. I live in a Catholic Community Service low income home. I am on welfare. 5 6 I'm trying to break this issue right now hopefully. And 7 I work closely with a business mentor, her name is Katherine Coe, through the Small Business 8 Administration. I talk to her every two weeks to check 9 in and to quide me on what I need to be doing. And then 10 I also submitted a letter of where I live and the 11 12 character that's displayed to them as well. 13 And so that's pretty much my story since 14 those crimes were committed. I've done as much as I think I can possibly do or probably I could -- I could 15 16 probably do more, but at the same time, the person that 17 I used to be, I can't relate to that person as much because it's been a while, and I'm not here to justify 18 19 again or minimize it. I take full responsibility for those crimes. But I'm -- today I'm just trying to be a 20 different -- different person, and I've been working 21 22 hard on that, and I just need this opportunity to show people that I can do this. 23 That's it. 24 Okay. Thank you. JUDGE PEARSON: So 25 what -- are you practicing any sort of recovery program

9	Q. Do you know why you checked the box "no"?
10	A. Honestly I thought the the convictions I
11	didn't see the law where it stated that you guys could
12	go through your discretion past the five years. And
13	technically, which is weird, like I thought that since I
14	committed the crime in 2013, that it didn't fall in that
15	category of five years.
16	Q. Okay. But the application asked if anyone has
17	ever been convicted of a theft crime, correct?
18	A. Correct.
19	Q. And yet you still checked no?
20	A. Correct.
21	MR. ROBERSON: Okay. I think that's all I
22	have.
23	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. I have another
24	question. Do you have a moving truck?
25	MR. COMELLA: Yes, Judge.

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Page 20 1 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. 2 MR. COMELLA: I do pay monthly insurance on 3 that as well. 4 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. 5 MR. COMELLA: That I'm not using, Judge. 6 Okay. So are you conceding JUDGE PEARSON: 7 that you were dishonest on your application? When you 8 checked the no box, even though it asked if you had ever been convicted of a crime, were you hoping that the 9 Commission wouldn't find out or what was the thought 10 11 process behind that? 12 MR. COMELLA: It wasn't my intention. Ι 13 thought it was within five years. 14 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. 15 MR. COMELLA: And I -- I misread -- misread 16 it. 17 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. 18 MR. COMELLA: Because I knew you guys were 19 going to do a background check. 20 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. MR. COMELLA: Also, I do work closely with 21 22 the -- a lot of the investigators here. I've been working closely with -- in the -- in the beginning, I 23 24 did work with Jason -- Jason Sharp and Jason Hoxit, I've 25 been working closely with as well, and Eric sometimes.

A little bit of dialogue with Mr. Dotson as well. 1 2 So I've been trying to stay as transparent and as, what do you call that, compliant as possible. 3 Because I -- I know a lot, but I don't know everything, 4 and I just want to make sure that I'm following all laws 5 6 or regulations based on that. Because honestly, I have 7 took the class back in August for the, what is it, the 8 compliance or --9 JUDGE PEARSON: Do you mean the household goods training that the Commission sponsors? 10 MR. COMELLA: Yes, yes, Judge. So I took 11 12 that back in August, and that was one thing that they did say, like, you know, you know, we like to make 13 money, not spend it or something. To where like if we 14 mess up, they'll fine us. And right now, I can't really 15 16 afford being fined. 17 So I'm just trying to make sure that I -that I -- I follow every rule and regulation because 18 those can add up. And that's one thing that me and 19 Jason, Mr. Hoxit, have talked about a lot, and just to 20 make sure that I'm complying all the way. Because I 21 22 don't mind working closely with you guys at all. 23 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Mr. Roberson, did you 24 have anything else? Do you want Mr. Dotson to testify? 25 MR. ROBERSON: He -- Mr. Dotson is mostly

Page 22 here as an authenticator of the record --1 2 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. MR. ROBERSON: -- to the extent that they've 3 been stipulated to, the facts are the facts and the law 4 applies or it doesn't so --5 6 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. 7 MR. ROBERSON: -- which is up to you. 8 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. All right. So did 9 you want to make a closing statement? 10 MR. ROBERSON: Briefly I can, Your Honor. 11 JUDGE PEARSON: Can you come closer to the 12 microphone? 13 MR. ROBERSON: Yes. JUDGE PEARSON: Thank you. 14 15 I warned Mr. Comella about MR. ROBERSON: this and still failed to actually properly use the mic. 16 17 The Commission's rules governing exemptions are set out in WAC 480-07-110(2)(c). There are two 18 19 things that the Commission looks at. The first is whether the rule imposes an undue hardship on the 20 requesting person of a degree or kind different from 21 hardships imposed on similarly situated persons. 22 23 Second thing is whether the application of the rule to the person is inconsistent with the purpose 24 25 of the rule.

The Commission has recently, I guess, 1 2 expounded its understanding of how those things apply to an application for a household goods authority, whether 3 it's criminal history. That's Order 01 in Docket 4 TV-180213. And basically with regard to the first 5 6 criteria, the Commission says all persons convicted of 7 theft are basically similarly situated so you would have 8 to show -- that the requesting person would have to show that there's some kind of undue hardship that other 9 persons convicted of theft don't suffer. I'm not sure 10 that that has been shown here. 11 12 With regard to the second criteria, the Commission basically said it has moved to a bright line 13 rule, and exemptions of this nature undercut that bright 14 line rule. It doesn't seem inclined to grant them. 15 16 Given what it said that in that docket, it seems like an 17 exemption is unwarranted here, but, again, that is a factual determination that is up to Your Honor so... 18 19 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you. 20 Mr. Comella, did you have anything that you wanted to say in closing? It's okay if you don't. 21 Ι 22 just wanted to give you the opportunity. 23 MR. COMELLA: No, ma'am. JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So before we adjourn, 24 25 I'd like to request that the parties waive the

2	have the transcript available to me when I'm writing my
3	decision, and we usually receive the transcript within
4	seven to ten days. So I anticipate that I would issue
5	an order within five business days from the date I
6	receive the transcript at the latest. Does either party
7	object to waiving that requirement?
8	MR. ROBERSON: Staff has no objection.
9	MR. COMELLA: No, Judge.
10	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you. So is
11	there anything further that we need to address before we
12	go off the record?
13	MR. ROBERSON: Not from Staff's perspective.
14	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you all for
15	coming here today, and we are adjourned. Thank you.
