Also, so while I was in sobriety and at the -- at the sober house, I graduated, was part of the community. Also, I took a break from the moving industry and decided to work in treatment as a manager, and I went to court as a court liaison for one of our clients that was looking at a prison -- five-year prison term.

And instead -- I came on his behalf to get him to come to our treatment center instead. And when I was -- went to pick him up the next day from the jail to enter him into the treatment center, I realized I had a warrant from 2013, the last crime that I did commit. And I do have that information as well. I believe it's probably in there.

But when I committed the crime, it was May 17th, 2013. That was the last crime that I

MR. COMELLA: So from there, I took -- I took responsibility for the actions that I've made. Also, I have a really great relationship with my parents that I never really had prior to getting sober. My father, as one of the letters of reference, he's really proud of me, and he's willing to stand by me through this. And trust me, there was a time that he would not stand by me if I was out here doing the things that I used to do.

Also, my intention of coming out here -- so I ended up leaving there. I still have friends in recovery. One of the issues that I was having there, though, is that back in I would say early 2017, the fentanyl epidemic was killing all my friends, and because I was big in the recovery in South Florida, and

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committed, and that was before I got sober. Actually, three months prior to me getting sober. I handled that, because I have violated probation in the past, but the court record does show that I did complete and pay all the fines within three weeks of being on the probation. And because of that, I was early termed for -- for three months with that. So I did successfully complete -- when I did get sober, I did successfully complete a probation. Also -- JUDGE PEARSON: Can I ask you a question
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JUDGE PEARSON: Can I ask you a question just real quickly?

MR. COMELLA: Yes.

JUDGE PEARSON: So the 2016 theft conviction, was -- the crime occurred in 2013; is that what you're saying?

MR. COMELLA: I was originally charged with -- since I was in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, I wasn't in Brevard County or Melbourne, and I did -- I was unaware that I had a warrant, but I was originally charged with that crime in 2013.

MR. COMELLA: No, ma'am.

JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. I just wanted to clarify that --

I decided that if I was going to have a family or kids, I don't want them raised around that environment or even have that opportunity. So I decided to move here.
