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I. INTRODUCTION

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Q. Please state your name and business address.

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A. My name is George E. Marshall. My business address is 355 110th Avenue NE,

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Q. By whom are you employed and in what capacity?

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A. I am the Manager Transmission Policy and Contracts for Puget Sound Energy ("PSE").

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Q. What are your duties as Manager Transmission Policy and Contracts?

As Manager Transmission Policy and Contracts ("TPC"), I manage a ten-member

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service to eligible customers, performing complex engineering system impact

studies for new requests for transmission and generator interconnection, and

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managing billing and settlements for transmission customers, including accounts

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related to the California Independent System Operator Energy Imbalance Market.

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I oversee TPC's compliance with applicable NERC/WECC mandatory reliability standards. I also develop PSE's transmission strategy and implementation plans,

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lead negotiations of complex inter-utility agreements, and manage Bonneville

Power Administration ("BPA")/regional entity interfaces. I am PSE's representative at ColumbiaGrid, WECC Class 1 Members, the Colstrip Transmission Committee, and the AC Intertie Operating Committee.

Q. Briefly describe your education and relevant employment experience.

A. I graduated from the University of Montana with a Bachelor of Arts degree in economics, from the University of Washington with Master of Arts degree in economics, and from Seattle University with a Master's degree in business administration.

From 1973 to 1983, I was employed as a Regional Economist with the Seattle District Army Corps of Engineers where I supervised economic feasibility studies of major hydropower projects and port and harbor development projects. I developed a nationally-recognized economic model for evaluating deep-draft navigation projects. My professional publication, "Electrical Energy in the Pacific Northwest," compared a number of then-current regional forecasts of electrical energy demand growth and their underlying methodologies and assumptions.

From 1983 to 1996, I was a Senior Power Analyst at Seattle City Light ("SCL") where I negotiated highly complex long-term contracts for power purchase, seasonal energy exchange, transmission and joint project ownership, and had a lead role on the FERC Skagit River Hydro Relicensing Team. I led negotiations for SCL with five Irrigation Districts in the vicinity of Boise, Idaho for a power purchase agreement for a major hydropower project near Boise, and served ten years on the project's Board of Directors after project completion. I also led
