Today is October 9, 2024, and this is a public 5 comment hearing of the Washington Utilities and 6 7 Transportation Commission in Puget Sound Energy's general This is Consolidated Dockets UE-240004, 8 rate case. UG-240005, and UE-230810. 9 I'm Dave Danner. I'm chair of the 10 11 commission. And I'm joined by my colleagues, 12 Commissioner Ann Rendahl and Commissioner Milt Doumit. 13 On February 15, 2024, Puget Sound Energy 14 filed with the Washington Utilities and Transportation 15 Commission revisions to its currently effective tariff, 16 WN U-60, Tariff G, Electric Service; and its currently 17 effective tariff, WN U-2 for natural gas. On March 5, 2024, the commission entered an 18 19 order setting this matter for adjudication. In its 20 filing, Puget Sound Energy requests that the commission increase its electric and natural gas rates in 2025 and 21 22 2026. 23 For electricity rates, Puget is requesting a 24 total revenue increase of 192.2 million in 2025, and 25 259.9 million in 2026.

Page 5 For natural gas rates, Puget is requesting a 1 total increase of 196 million in 2025 and 25.4 million in 2 3 2026. For electricity customers, this request is 4 for a 6.74 percent increase in electrical revenues in 5 2025, and an 8.48 percent increase in 2026. 6 7 For natural gas customers, Puget's request is 8 for an 18.96 percent increase in revenues in 2025, and a 9 2.07 percent increase in 2026. The company cites the need for revenue 10 11 because of major capital investments to meet additional 12 mandatory regulatory obligations as set out in law and replace aging and damaged infrastructure. The company 13 notes that it has endured inflation, increased interest 14 15 rates, and increased energy costs. 16 They also propose to increase the returns 17 paid to investors from 9.4 percent to 9.95 percent in 2025, and to 10.5 percent in 2026. The proposals would 18 increase the average residential customer's bill by \$7.84 19 a month in 2025, and another \$11.20 per month in 2026. 20 For natural gas customers, this would be an average 21 22 increase to the monthly bill of \$13.96 in 2025 and another \$1.51 per month in 2026. 23 24 This matter is currently being adjudicated 25 before the commission, and we sit as judges in what is

1 essentially a trial.

2 The other parties to this proceeding are as Besides Puget Sound Energy, the utility 3 follows: commission staff, which operates independently from the 4 commissioners; the Washington Attorney General's Office 5 6 Public Counsel Unit, which participates under statutory 7 authority; and then the following intervenors: The 8 Alliance for Western Energy Consumers; Microsoft; 9 Walmart; Nucor Steel; Fred Meyer Stores; The Northwest Energy Coalition; Sierra Club; Front and Centered, which 10 is an environmental and low-income customer advocate, and 11 12 The Energy Project, which is a low-income customer These parties are formally participating in 13 advocate. the proceeding, and are either acting as intervenors or 14 under statutory authority to participate. 15

16 But we also in our proceedings want to hear 17 from members of the public on their views on the case before us. The comments we receive from you this evening 18 will be made part of the formal record in the case. 19 And for that reason, we will -- because the commissioners sit 20 21 as judges, we cannot answer questions from those 22 commenting tonight. We are here to listen to your 23 comments.

And so with that, I'm going to turn it over to Kris Irelan from our staff. And Kris will lay down

the ground rules, and then we will get started. 1 Kris? 2 KRIS IRELAN: Thank you, Chair Danner. Good evening. My name is Kris Irelan, and 3 I'm a public involvement representative with the 4 Utilities and Transportation Commission. I will be the 5 moderator for the comment hearing this evening. 6 If you did not sign up in advance to provide 7 8 comment at this evening's hearing and wish to do so, 9 please put your first and last name into the chat. If you're calling in, please press Star 9 to 10 raise your hand, and we will call on you for your name in 11 12 a few minutes. If you have already provided your name, there is no need to provide it again. 13 14 Now for some meeting logistics: Please mute your connection unless you are called on to speak. 15 16 If you are participating via the Zoom application, you can mute by clicking the microphone 17 A slash will appear across the microphone, 18 icon. indicating that you have successfully muted your 19 connection. Thank you very 25 much.

Page 10 Let me turn to my colleagues and see if they 1 2 have any comments. Otherwise, we will just get going. All right. We will start. There are a few 3 people who have signed in. They're not sure whether they 4 wish to comment. 5 I will call on Mike O'Grady. Do you wish to 6 7 speak to us tonight? 8 All right. Suzanne Hensler, would you like 9 to speak to us tonight? All right. Frank Damiano? 10 11 FRANK DAMIANO: Oh, yes. CHAIR DANNER: Welcome back. Good to see 12 13 you. 14 15 COMMENTS BY FRANK DAMIANO 16 THE WITNESS: Okay. I'm a little nervous. 17 I'll do the best I can. So Puget Sound Energy is requesting these 18 19 rate adjustments. If you look at these adjustments, they're not fair. These increases are not fair. 20 Inflation did not increase by the amounts they propose, 21 22 and they've been increasing rates for years. 23 Another reason that they've asked for 24 increases, Bullet Point Number 2 says -- and I'm 25 paraphrasing -- to deploy energy resources such as

2 projects.

3 Said another way, they want to charge us to 4 install rooftop solar to supply them with energy? I 5 mean, they want to charge us to provide them with energy 6 resources? This is ridiculous.

7 Lastly, they say they must set rates for a 8 multiyear rate plan that reflect their upcoming capital 9 investments and operating costs over the next two years. 10 Well, you know, it sounds like they want to increase 11 rates to us for them to make investments so they can make 12 profit so that they can raise our rates even higher. 13 This is price gouging.

And I'd like to add to the docket a proposal. I propose that the UTC create a bargaining unit agreement where companies compete for our business. They will have great impact on Washington, and so much so, Mr. Danner, I think that you'd be able to run for Congress, okay?

There. I've said my piece.

20 CHAIR DANNER: All right. Thank you very 21 much, Frank Damiano, and thank you for your participation 22 tonight and last night as well.

For the record, I do not have any interest in
running for Congress, but your points are well taken.
Thank you.

Page 12 I will go down -- let's see. I saw that 1 2 Suzanne Hensler, I believe that you had some comments in the chat. I hope my staff is responding to you so that 3 4 we can get your comments in the record. 5 Again, I will go back to some of the names that -- Mike O'Grady, are you on the line and do you wish 6 7 to comment tonight? 8 Is there anyone else on the call who wishes 9 to comment tonight? Andrea Smiley, are you there? 10 11 ANDREA SMILEY: Yes. 12 CHAIR DANNER: Go right ahead. 13 14 COMMENTS BY ANDREA SMILEY 15 ANDREA SMILEY: Thank you. 16 Good evening, Commissioners. My name is 17 Andrea Smiley, and I'm here to speak on behalf of the Building Industry Association of Washington, which 18 19 represents about 8,300 members in the homebuilding 20 industry. Our members are deeply concerned that Puget 21 22 Sound Energy's proposed rate hikes for both electricity and natural gas in the following two years will create a 23 more unaffordable environment for homeowners and renters. 24 25 These increases, while they may seem minor, represent a

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significant burden for Washington families that are
 already struggling with rising costs.

And the average residential customer would face an additional 228 annually for electricity and 186 for natural gas. Those cost increases for many could mean the difference between choosing between heating and eating.

8 Our community is already facing economic 9 hardship. 23 percent of middle income earners are cost 10 burdened by rents, and 64 percent of PSE's customers have 11 been known to be -- sorry; excuse me. 64 percent of 12 customers struggle to pay their utility bills. These 13 rate increases will only make the struggle even more real 14 for them.

We understand PSE's need to address operational costs, but we believe that there are alternative approaches that do not involve passing substantial costs on to ratepayers. PSE's role as a regulated monopoly requires accountability, not unchecked price hikes that harm families and businesses across our state.

We urge the commission to reject the proposed rate increases and explore more equitable solutions that balance the needs of Washingtonians with those that are PSE customers.

Page 14 Thank you for your time this evening. 1 2 CHAIR DANNER: Thank you very much for your participation. 3 4 And now let me turn to Melissa Petrini. Are 5 you there? 6 MELISSA PETRINI: Yes, I'm here. I don't know 7 if you can see me. 8 CHAIR DANNER: Go right ahead. 9 COMMENTS BY MELISSA PETRINI 10 MELISSA PETRINI: Hi. Melissa Petrini, a 11 12 director for Highline School Board. I'm not speaking on behalf of my board, but just as an elected official. 13 14 I have some concerns as we're seeing a lot of our prices rise through inflation with our insurance, and 15 16 also with electricity to all our schools. And so there's definitely concerns about the potential impacts for 17 school districts and what kind of impact that will have 18 19 for our kids. 20 It's interesting, as a personal note, just that over the last several years as we've watched gas 21 22 prices rise, we've had our own governor cite greedy corporations for those reasons. So there's then, you 23 24 know, do we draw a conclusion that there's greed 25 happening with these rate increases? If not, usually

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1	rates tend to go up when we have increased demand.
2	But if you're now diminishing a renewable
3	energy, natural gas, then you're essentially manipulating
4	that demand to increase. And we don't quite have the
5	infrastructure to take on all that extra demand through
6	pushing everyone towards electric.
7	So there's a lot of questions about are we
8	ready for this, that it should be a very slow you
9	should have incentives for people to want to switch over,
10	but we shouldn't be taking away natural gas, as we were
11	sold 20, 30 years ago that that was the clean renewable
12	energy of the future.
13	So it makes no sense for someone like myself,
14	who has several fireplaces and gas stoves, and our
15	heating is all contingent on that. And I had PSE come
16	out and do an assessment on my own home, like, how much
17	would it cost for us to fully switch over. Because our
18	fireplaces are at the end of their life, so we're trying
19	to decide do we do natural gas again, or do we go
20	straight into electricity and what would that cost? And
21	they said for my home, it would be anywhere from \$70- to
22	\$80,000 to replace all our utilities, which a lot of
23	homeowners cannot afford.
24	So just thinking about that, the potential

24 So just thinking about that, the potential 25 cost to homeowners having to switch over, the rates being

Page 16 increased is just really going to squash a lot of our low 1 to middle income families. 2 So I'd just like you to also recess those 3 4 rate increases. So thank you. 5 CHAIR DANNER: All right. Thank you very Appreciate your taking time out of your evening to 6 much. 7 talk with us. 8 That looks like everybody that has signed in Is there anybody else on the call who wishes to 9 so far. make a comment to the commission on this docket 10 tonight? 11 12 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes, I would. 13 CHAIR DANNER: Eduardo, what is your name, 14 please? 15 EDUARDO BAILEY: Eduardo Bailey. I think I 16 pressed -- I went too fast when I saw my name. 17 CHAIR DANNER: Okay. Well, here you are. So go right ahead. 18 19 20 COMMENTS BY EDUARDO BAILEY EDUARDO BAILEY: Okay. First, let me thank 21 22 you for facilitating this meeting. 23 And my question, it's just a single question. And of course, I'm not looking at a political point here. 24 25 I just want to know if PSE is charging us secretly for

Thank 22 you. 23 CHAIR DANNER: Thank you. 24 EDUARDO BAILEY: Yes. 25 CHAIR DANNER: All right. Is there anyone

I'm Jessica Johanson-Kubin here for public counsel. 15 CHAIR DANNER: Oh, I didn't see your name. 16 17 Yes, good evening. ATTORNEY JOHANSON-KUBIN: Good evening. 18 We 19 would ask that the deadline to file public comments would stay open until -- what is this -- November 19, which is 20 two weeks after the end of the hearing -- or excuse me; 21 the deadline for us to file the exhibit two weeks after 22 the conclusion of the hearing, and that the record be 23 24 open to comments until the hearing. 25 CHAIR DANNER: Okay. And the hearing is

scheduled right now for November 4? 1 2 ATTORNEY JOHANSON-KUBIN: 4th and 5th. CHAIR DANNER: 4th and 5th. So the deadline, 3 then, for comments would be the close of business 4 November 5. 5 And then the exhibit will be filed on 6 7 November 19; is that correct? 8 ATTORNEY JOHANSON-KUBIN: Yes, the 19th. 9 CHAIR DANNER: That's your proposal. 10 All right.
