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- 1 JUDGE MOSS: Let's be on the record. This
- 2 is Dennis Moss at the Washington Utilities and
- 3 Transportation Commission. I'm an Administrative Law
- 4 Judge and I have been assigned to preside in this
- 5 matter styled Benton County against BNSF Railway
- 6 Company, Docket Number TR-042083. The matter
- 7 concerns a proposal to build an at-grade crossing in
- 8 Benton County.
- 9 Previously, we had scheduled a pre-hearing
- 10 conference, and that was continued on the
- 11 representation that there were settlement
- 12 negotiations underway. After we take appearances
- 13 this morning, I'll want a status report on that so
- 14 that we can determine what further process may be
- 15 required and set a schedule for that, as needed.
- So let us first, however, take appearances,
- 17 and I believe, Ms. Fitzgerald, that you were on the
- 18 line for Benton County?
- MS. FITZGERALD: That's correct.
- 20 JUDGE MOSS: Could you please enter your
- 21 appearance?
- 22 MS. FITZGERALD: Kathleen Fitzgerald, I'm a
- 23 Deputy Prosecuting Attorney for Benton County on
- 24 behalf of Benton County Public Works Department.
- 25 JUDGE MOSS: And your physical address, your

- 1 telephone number, your facsimile and your e-mail,
- 2 please.
- 3 MS. FITZGERALD: 620 Market Street, Prosser,
- 4 Washington, 99350-0954. The Prosser office telephone
- 5 number is 509-786-5611; the Tri-Cities office is
- 6 509-736-3084; and the fax number is 509-786-5627.
- 7 JUDGE MOSS: Is that an 86?
- 8 MS. FITZGERALD: 786.
- 9 JUDGE MOSS: Okay. For some reason I had 73
- 10 down.
- 11 MS. FITZGERALD: My e-mail address, has that
- 12 been requested?
- JUDGE MOSS: Yes, please. We like to have a
- 14 record of that.
- MS. FITZGERALD: Okay. It's
- 16 Kathleen.Fitzgerald@co.benton.wa.us. It's a long
- 17 one.
- 18 JUDGE MOSS: What were the first two letters
- 19 there after the at?
- 20 MS. FITZGERALD: C-O.
- JUDGE MOSS: P.O.?
- MS. FITZGERALD: Yeah.
- MR. WALKLEY: C-O, Judge, County.
- JUDGE MOSS: C-O, ah, County, Benton,
- 25 Washington, U.S.

- 1 MS. FITZGERALD: That's right.
- JUDGE MOSS: How logical. All right. Thank
- 3 you for that information, Ms. Fitzgerald.
- 4 MR. DUNFEE: Judge, you might want to check
- 5 that phone for the Tri-Cities.
- 6 JUDGE MOSS: Oh, the Prosser is fine.
- 7 MS. FITZGERALD: The Prosser phone number is
- 8 786-5611 and the Tri-Cities office number is
- 9 736-3084.
- 10 JUDGE MOSS: We need to know who else spoke
- 11 on the bridge line just a moment ago.
- 12 MS. FITZGERALD: That would be Ross Dunfee.
- 13 MR. DUNFEE: I'm Ross Dunfee, I'm the Benton
- 14 County Public Works Director and County Engineer.
- 15 JUDGE MOSS: Okay. The reason we ask is our
- 16 reporter has to make a transcript and she has to
- 17 record who is speaking at any given time, so -- all
- 18 right. And that is a good point. I'm frankly not
- 19 accustomed to using this teleconference bridge line.
- 20 I don't really like it very much, but I must remind
- 21 you that, every time you speak, you need to identify
- 22 yourself, because the sound quality in this room is
- 23 not that great, and that's the reason I, frankly,
- 24 don't like it. But we can hear you so far, but
- 25 please do identify yourselves when you speak.

- 1 Let me take the appearance for BNSF, which
- 2 would be Mr. Walkley. If you would please enter your
- 3 appearance?
- 4 MR. WALKLEY: Yes, Your Honor, my name is
- 5 Robert E. Walkley, W-a-l-k-l-e-y. I'm an attorney
- 6 representing BNSF Railway Company. My address is
- 7 Montgomery, M-o-n-t-g-o-m-e-r-y, Scarp, S-c-a-r-p,
- 8 MacDougall, M-a-c-D-o-u-g-a-l-l, P.L.L.C., Law Firm
- 9 in Seattle. Its address is Seattle Tower, 27th
- 10 Floor, 1218 Third Avenue, Seattle, Washington, 98101.
- 11 The phone number is 206-625-1801; fax number is
- 12 206-625-1807; my e-mail is bob@montgomeryscarp.com.
- JUDGE MOSS: Thank you. And I don't believe
- 14 we have any other parties in this proceeding, but I
- 15 will ask if there's any other counsel on the bridge
- 16 line, and I don't mean to skip Mr. Thompson.
- 17 MR. WALKLEY: This is Robert Walkley, Your
- 18 Honor. We also have on the telephone John Shurson.
- 19 John Shurson is our public project engineer. John,
- 20 you might just identify yourself.
- JUDGE MOSS: That's really not necessary,
- 22 unless Mr. Shurson needs to speak, and we'll just
- 23 need his name. So all we need for appearance
- 24 purposes is counsel.
- MR. WALKLEY: Okay.

- 1 JUDGE MOSS: All right. So only counsel.
- 2 And I did skip Mr. Thompson. I didn't mean to say
- 3 that we had no other parties to exclude Staff, but
- 4 Mr. Thompson is the only one in the hearing room, and
- 5 that was the distinction I was trying to draw. So we
- 6 will have appearance, then, from Commission's
- 7 Regulatory Staff.
- 8 MR. THOMPSON: Okay. This is Jonathan
- 9 Thompson, Assistant Attorney General, representing
- 10 the Commission Staff. My street address is 1400
- 11 South Evergreen Park Drive, S.W., P.O. Box 40128,
- 12 Olympia, 98504. My phone number is 360-664-1225; fax
- is 586-5522; and my e-mail is jonat@atg.wa.gov and
- 14 also jthompso@wutc.wa.gov.
- 15 JUDGE MOSS: All right. I believe that will
- 16 complete our appearances. Let me ask. There was
- 17 some off-the-record discussion that I overheard
- 18 earlier concerning the status of settlement
- 19 discussions, I believe. And let me just ask if the
- 20 parties require a few moments off the record to bring
- 21 each other up to speed on where things stand before
- 22 briefing me or, if you're prepared to brief me now on
- 23 the status of things, I would be happy to hear that
- on the record. So do we need to go off the record?
- 25 MS. FITZGERALD: Your Honor, Kathleen

- 1 Fitzgerald speaking. We don't need to go off the
- 2 record. I do think there is an agreement on the
- 3 table.
- 4 JUDGE MOSS: Okay. Fine. Well, why don't
- 5 you or someone else give us a status report and we'll
- 6 see what we might need to do in the way of further
- 7 process.
- 8 MR. DUNFEE: This Is Ross Dunfee. John
- 9 Shurson and I had a conversation a couple days ago
- 10 about this project, and I'd prefer that if John would
- 11 do that, if he would speak to the resolution.
- MR. SHURSON: Certainly. This is John
- 13 Shurson, BNSF. Ross is correct. We had talked a
- 14 couple days ago about resolution, a resolution on
- 15 this, and BNSF will agree to the proposed new
- 16 crossing, as they have submitted to us, and with the
- 17 caveat that it will be entirely -- the costs will be
- 18 borne by either the county or somebody other than
- 19 BNSF.
- JUDGE MOSS: Okay. Mr. Shurson, I don't
- 21 mean to cut you off. Well, actually, I do mean to
- 22 cut you off, but not rudely, simply because I don't
- 23 really need to know the details. I only need to know
- 24 that the parties have, in fact, achieved a settlement
- 25 agreement and that that is something they will reduce

- 1 to writing and file with the Commission. And of
- 2 course, they would need to do that in coordination
- 3 with Mr. Thompson and Mr. Roswell with the Commission
- 4 Staff.
- If that is the status of things, then we can
- 6 move on to any further process discussion, but I
- 7 really don't need to know the details. I appreciate
- 8 your willingness to share them.
- 9 MR. SHURSON: This is John Shurson again.
- 10 You are correct. We have reached a settlement.
- JUDGE MOSS: Okay, good. Well, that's fine,
- 12 then. That being the status of affairs, what sort of
- 13 schedule are you looking at in terms of filing paper?
- MR. WALKLEY: Your Honor, this is Robert
- 15 Walkley. Exactly what paper do you need? We know
- 16 that probably there needs to be an order issued by
- 17 the Commission authorizing the crossing.
- JUDGE MOSS: We would need something to
- 19 memorialize the fact that the parties have achieved
- 20 an agreement. Mr. Thompson has, in the past, worked
- 21 with the parties on this. Perhaps he can illuminate
- 22 it for us.
- MR. THOMPSON: Yeah, in cases such as this,
- 24 I believe the rail staff has a standard form waiver
- 25 of hearing that just needs to have some blanks filled

- 1 in and then be submitted to the Commission. So we
- 2 can certainly supply you with one of those.
- JUDGE MOSS: I just need some sort of paper
- 4 to act on, Mr. Walkley. And what I would propose,
- 5 then, or suggest is that if the parties waive initial
- 6 decision in this matter, I can take it directly to
- 7 the three Commissioners, who are the head of this
- 8 agency, and we can get a final order out fairly
- 9 promptly once I have a piece of paper memorializing
- 10 that everything has been agreed to in a way that is
- 11 consistent with the public interest, and we can close
- 12 the docket.
- 13 MR. WALKLEY: This is Robert Walkley. I
- 14 have a question for the county. Do you foresee -- we
- 15 do need to enter into agreements with each other the
- 16 standard forms of crossing agreements with each
- 17 other. Do you anticipate needing time before the
- 18 county board or anything like that for approval of
- 19 such an agreement or what do you foresee? And John,
- 20 also, I'd like to know how long it might take the
- 21 railroad to prepare such agreement, and then we can
- 22 have the agreements all done and then waive the
- 23 hearing and that's the end of it.
- JUDGE MOSS: Okay. And let me suggest at
- 25 this point that we do go off the record. There's no

- 1 reason to transcribe all of this discussion. I'd
- 2 like to give you all a few minutes to discuss this
- 3 and get everything worked out, and once that has been
- 4 achieved, we'll go back on the record and I will
- 5 quickly make a record and we will be able to close
- 6 our proceeding this morning.
- 7 So with that, let's be off the record. And
- 8 I'll just listen in so I'll know when to summarize.
- 9 (Discussion off the record.)
- 10 JUDGE MOSS: All right. Let's be back on
- 11 the record. The parties have had an opportunity to
- 12 discuss matters off the record and I have listened in
- 13 on that discussion and it seems that the parties have
- 14 agreed to a process whereby they will file
- 15 appropriate papers with the Commission seeking -- or
- 16 waiving the initial decision and memorializing the
- 17 fact that they have indeed reached a settlement in
- 18 principle.
- 19 And Mr. Thompson, the Commission Staff's
- 20 representative, will be able to work with you to
- 21 ensure that the proper papers are filed, and I will
- 22 then take the matter in hand and see to it that it's
- 23 processed through the Commission with an appropriate
- 24 order. We'll close the matter without prejudice,
- 25 should things go awry for some reason unanticipated

- 1 today. Then there will be certainly an opportunity
- 2 for the matter to be brought back before the
- 3 Commission for whatever is required. So parties
- 4 should proceed with that sense of comfort.
- 5 On a matter for the transcript, if you will,
- 6 please, we need the spelling on two names, Mr.
- 7 Shurson, if you could spell your last name, please.
- 8 MR. SHURSON: Certainly. It's
- 9 S-h-u-r-s-o-n.
- 10 JUDGE MOSS: And Mr. Dunfree?
- MR. DUNFEE: There's no R. I'm not free.
- 12 It's D-u-n-f-e-e. But I don't charge much, either.
- JUDGE MOSS: You've had people mispronounce
- 14 your name before, I trust?
- MR. DUNFEE: Most of the time it's
- 16 mispronounced.
- 17 JUDGE MOSS: I apologize.
- MR. DUNFEE: Not a problem.
- 19 JUDGE MOSS: Is there any further business
- 20 we need to conduct this morning?
- MR. WALKLEY: No, Your Honor.
- MS. FITZGERALD: No, Your Honor.
- JUDGE MOSS: All right. I'm getting a
- 24 negative nod from Mr. Thompson, as well. So with
- 25 that, I appreciate you all being here this morning,

- 1 and it sounds to me that matters are well in hand and
- 2 that you will be able to proceed to close this matter
- 3 between yourselves, so with that, we'll be off the
- 4 record. Thank you.
- 5 MR. WALKLEY: Thank you, Your Honor.
- 6 MS. FITZGERALD: Thank you, Your Honor.
- 7 (Proceedings adjourned at 9:54 a.m.)
