Of particular interest in these proceedings are the housing assistance, energy efficiency, and energy assistance programs the agencies operate, which served more than 3000 households in 1999 with weatherization and energy assistance. As community action agencies, their boards consist of one-third elected officials, one-third low-income representatives, and one-third who represent the community-at-large.

The Energy Project has been advocating specifically for energy efficiency and energy assistance programs for Washington's low-income population on behalf of the Washington State Association of Community Action Agencies since March 1993. It has been engaged in the design of low-income energy efficiency programs at all three regulated electric utilities. More recently the Project helped negotiate the low-income stipulation worked out during the PacifiCorp/Scottish Power merger proceeding and is currently working with the company to design programs as a result of that stipulation.
