**Summary of Education and Professional Background**

In 1986, I received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Economics from the University of Vermont. In June of 1992, I received a Masters of Business Administration from the University of Washington with a concentration in environmental and natural resource management. I was also selected to attend the Advanced Program in Management at the Copenhagen School of Economics and Business from August through December of 1991.

I have been a member of the Commission staff since January of 1993 and have conducted analysis for utility tariffs, demand-side management (DSM) programs, and cost-effectiveness assessments. I recently attended The National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioner's 13th Annual Western Utility Rate Seminar. This is the first time I have testified in a proceeding of this type.

Prior to returning to school for my Master's degree, I worked for several years in the pension plan industry. I served as an advisor to individuals, the self-employed, and various medium-sized corporations. I oversaw the establishment of new pension plans, the termination of old plans, the selection of appropriate investment vehicles, and the filing of required IRS documents.

For nearly two years, I managed the 45 employees of the Retirement Services division of Fidelity Investments in Boston. In this capacity, I was responsible for adhering to budget constraints, for developing employee productivity and employee training programs, and for monitoring the quality of work within the division.
