The recording has started. So good evening, everyone. Today is February 8, 2014, and this is a public comment hearing of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission in Docket UE 220066, consolidated with Dockets UG 220067 and UG 210918.  I'm Dave Danner. I'm chair of the commission. And I'm joined by my colleagues, Commissioner Ann Rendahl and Commissioner Milt Doumit. Tonight we are taking public comment on a petition by Puget Sound Energy that was filed in August 2023 to amend the final order in this docket to change its credit and collection practices.  By way of background, the commission, in August 2022, approved a settlement of portions of Puget Sound Energy's last general rate case. And in that settlement, the company agreed to continue its existing credit and collection processes until the conclusion of a separate proceeding now being conducted in Docket U-210800.  That docket is considering possible changes to the utility disconnections credit and collection

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practices. The docket was opened in October of 2021, and at this time, in 2014, the docket is still -- is still open and is not yet concluded.

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In the petition, the company has noted that its arrearages; that is, the money the company is owed, but has not be able to collect from customers, has continued to grow in the aftermath of the pandemic, and the rulemaking proceeding addressing collection practices is not yet nearing completion.

Other parties in this proceeding, including the commission staff; The Energy Project; the Office of Public Counsel and the Office of the Attorney General; and the joint environmental advocates, comprised of the Northwest Energy Coalition, Front and Centered, and the Sierra Club, all opposed this petition to amend the settlement.

The commission held an evidentiary hearing in this matter on January 18, 2014.

And tonight we want to hear from members of the public. Your comments will be made part of the record in this proceeding and will be considered along with the testimony and exhibits in this case. Be aware that this is an opportunity for you to provide comment to the commission, but be aware that the commissioners will not engage commenters in debate or discussion or

They need to work hard for their family and their friends, and they need to pay their bills.

And I don't think it's fair for us to have these huge increases because other people didn't pay their bills or they needed a couple months' break. You know, I understand that, but if the company decides to give people a break and not have them pay their bills, that's the company's perspective. I didn't make that decision for those individuals, and I didn't give them a break on their bill.

I do want to acknowledge Puget Sound Energy's willingness to work with low income and vulnerable populations during the COVID-19 pandemic.

However, I argue now is not the time to return to past practices and restart disconnections or penalize further those in arrears.

According to the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program Clearinghouse, Washington state will receive \$59.4 million in support for 2024. That's down 20 percent from the 74.6 million allocated in 2023. And that means fewer customers will receive assistance.

At the same time, the National Energy
Assistance Director's Association reports that the number
of people behind on their electric bills and the amount
owed have reached record highs. Across the country, 21.2
million households, more than one in six American
households, owed money on their electric bills in
December of 2023, up from 20.1 million a year earlier.

Indeed, one of my close friends who is fully employed has admitted this week he's turned off the heat in his house this winter because he can't afford to pay his bills. He wears socks and his coat around the house and sleeps with his dog to keep warm.

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That being said, I think the company needs to either do collections protocols and take those people to court and do, you know, small claims court if they need to, and go after the money that was owed to them for services rendered; not do the services to those people, and/or they need to figure out how to figure it out on their own without charging other people to pay bills for people that they weren't themselves.

We're not low enough income to have someone pay ours, and I wouldn't want to accept that from someone else anyway. I'm very self sufficient and want to take care of my own bills. And I think that more people need to be doing that as well, instead of depending on someone else to pay them for them.

That's why Puget Sound Energy has gotten themselves into this. They're constantly sending in the but there are these fixed rates that are going up and up and up. And at what time is there a cap on that?

Between the taxes, property taxes, they talk about finding, you know, the homeless places to live, they're driving retired people out of their homes. You can't take on the whole world and pay everyone's bills. You know, I'm a compassionate person.

But like this other woman said, we pay our bills on time. You use what you have left to survive on. When we were young, we didn't have much either. We just worked harder.
