

GRADE CROSSING PROTECTIVE FUND 2011 – 2013 GRANT APPLICATION IMPROVEMENTS AT PUBLIC PASSIVE RAILROAD CROSSINGS

The Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (Commission), through its Grade Crossing Protective Fund (GCPF), provides grants for projects that eliminate or mitigate public safety hazards at railroad crossings and along railroad rights-of-way in Washington State. As part of this emphasis the Commission is also committed to improving safety at public, passivelyprotected railroad crossings in Washington. GCPF funds may be used for purchasing stop signs¹, yield signs, retro-reflective tape, posts (if required), retro-reflective cross buck signs, and emergency notification signs to a maximum of \$250 for each crossing. Under this program, GCPF funds may not be used for labor costs. All installations must be MUTCD compliant.

To apply for a grant to improve safety at a passive railroad crossing, complete the following information and submit it and attachments to the Commission.

Eastern Washington Gateway Railroad (EWG) submits the following information in support of its application for GCPF funding to improve public safety by upgrading signage at public, passively-protected railroad crossings within Spokane, Lincoln and Grant Counties in eastern Washington.

- 2. A list of each railroad crossing, by USDOT number, street name, and county, where the applicant plans to improve safety and indicate which type of warning sign or other measure will be installed.
 - See attached listing, EWG Rail Crossings for GCPF project 081911, which includes project cost estimates by crossing depending on which combination of high reflective cross bucks, yield signs or multi-track crossing signs each crossing requires.
- 3. A cost estimate, including:
 - a. An itemized list of the total costs of the project. The listing of crossings details the total project costs which are estimated to be \$45,392.91, including labor costs which range from \$192 to \$256 per crossing. Also attached is a quotation from US Signs and Safety, from which the pricing in the list of crossings was calculated. Total reimbursement requested, as detailed in the attachment, is \$23,075.17.
 - b. Names of parties contributing to the project, including the applicant, and the amount each is contributing.
 - Only EWG, the applicant, and the Commission, through funding of the application, are contributing to the project. Before reimbursement, EWG's contribution is 100%. After reimbursement, EWG's contribution is 49.1%, \$22,277.44, while the Commission's contribution is 50.9%, \$23,075.17.
- 4. An estimated timeline of the project
 - Project complete within 90 days of receipt of materials, but no later than December 31st, 2011.
- 5. Any other information the applicant believes would be useful to the Commission in considering the project.
 - Granting of funding will eliminate many outstanding current crossing safety defects and prevent new defects from occurring due to faded cross buck signs on the CW Subdivision, owned by Washington State Department of Transportation, and operated by Eastern Washington Gateway Railroad. With a renewed commitment on the part of the CW shippers, led by Central Washington Grain Growers, and a partnership with BNSF Railway, with whom EWG cooperates to operate 110-car coload trains, the "CW Sub" will remain active for many, many years. The

new signage will therefore be an important contribution to public safety for many years to come.
