Location: The incident occurred on the BNSF right of way between Bucoda Hwy SE and Crowder Rd SE. Three sets of railroad tracks run north/south on a straight stretch between Tenino and Bucoda and there is an easement road running parallel on the west side of the tracks. The location it occurred was based off the 17200 block of Bucoda Hwy. At the time of incident there was a BNSF train loaded with grain cars parked stationary on the center track.

Involved Vehicle/Locomotive: The involved vehicle was an Amtrak Cascades train, locomotive #90251.

Narrative: On 02/26/16 at 1609, I arrived on scene of a train vs. pedestrian collision in the area of the 17200 block of Bucoda Hwy SE. Fire Department personnel arrived on scene a few minutes prior to me and advised the pedestrian was an obvious DOA and the TC Coroner's Office was notified.

When I arrived I observed a BNSF train loaded with grain cars was sitting stationary on the center of three tracks. This train appeared to have been travelling northbound on the tracks prior to it stopping. I originally believed this was the involved train but was notified by fire personnel that an Amtrak train had actually been involved that had been travelling southbound, and it was stopped farther south. At that time I could see the Amtrak train stopped approx 1/4 mile or so south of the location on the west set of tracks. I was advised by fire personnel that the BNSF train had been parked at the time of incident. I could see that the deceased subject had been covered with a yellow blanket already.

I surveyed the scene and could see tissue from the deceased's body along the tracks and on the BNSF train starting approx 1 train car length north of where the body was. From the body more tissue was found along the tracks and BNSF train for approx 45 paces south. A matching shoe to what the deceased had apparently been wearing was also found approx 45

paces south lying next to the tracks. I photographed the scene at that time and then checked the body.

The deceased was a white male that appeared to be 35-45 years of age and his eyes were open. He had a dark but graying goatee and shorter dark hair. He was wearing a black leather jacket with a brownish colored shirt/sweatshirt under that. His upper body clothing was pulled up exposing his abdomen. He was wearing blue jeans with possibly black shorts under them and they were pulled down around his knees. Due to the way the clothing was pushed up and pulled down, his abdomen, groin, and upper legs were all exposed. He was found on his back lying between the west and center set of tracks, closer to the west track. He had a severe injury to the top of his head and I suspected that a lot of the body tissue I had seen was brain matter. There was also what appeared to be a green military "sea bag" lying just north of the body that had tissue all over it and it appeared to be related to the deceased.

I responded to the Amtrak train and noted it was locomotive #90251. On the front of the train was a large solid metal guard similar to a snow plow. On the left side of the face of the plow appeared to be more bodily tissue. This was also photographed and the train engineer was interviewed by Det Clark.

I was contacted near the scene by a female identified as Kathleen "Kathy" Parks. She asked me if I knew who had been struck and I told her that wasn't determined currently. She told me that she had seen her friend Gary Mann in the general area around 1500 hours. She had talked to him at that time and the last she knew he was heading to work on foot at a small alpaca farm nearby. She also said he was a transient in the area. She described Gary as wearing jeans and a black leather jacket and he had a goatee. This description matched that of deceased person. I obtained her contact information and advised her she may be contacted later if the deceased was identified as Mann. Detective Clark and I responded to Kathy's residence later in the night after the deceased had been positively identified as Gary Mann. Refer to Det Clark's report for further details.

Deputy Coroner Mike Ashton arrived on the scene for his investigation, during which time the deceased was positively identified as Gary F Mann. The TC Coroner's Office case number was #16-360-2.

A citizen named Seth Brown had called dispatch while units were on scene and requested a phone call. I called Seth, who lived just north of the location on Bucoda Hwy, and he told me that around 1515hrs he had seen a small amount of smoke over across the tracks on the Crowder Rd side. The smoke came and left fairly quickly but he then heard screaming from the area. He climbed onto a P/U truck so he could see further and observed a

male and female that appeared to be arguing over off Crowder Rd. It appeared the female just wanted to get away from the male and the male appeared very upset with the female. The female walked into a gravel access road on the east side of the tracks and the male appeared to leave southbound. A mid 2000's black SUV then pulled into the lot and started honking it's horn, so the female ran across to the west side of the tracks and went south. He lost sight of the two and the SUV also left southbound on Crowder Rd SE. He described both involved to be white and possibly in their mid 20's, but he wasn't sure because of the distance. The female appeared to be wearing a bright colored hat and a Vietnam era green or camo military jacket. He described the male as wearing a dark colored jacket and blue jeans. He thought he also may have had a goatee.

At the time of this report it was not determined if this was a suicide or an accident.

No further patrol action taken.

Refer a copy of this report to the TC Coroner's Office and to Detective Clark for follow-up.

Narrative:

On April 27th, 2016, at approximately 1050 hours, I met with Amtrak Detective Steven Travers and Deputy Coroner Michael Ashton at the main office of the Sheriff's Office. I had previously scheduled a meeting with Detective Travers and Deputy Coroner Ashton to view the Amtrak Train video after learning of its availability.

Upon viewing the Amtrak train video from the front of the train on February 26th, 2016, I observed Mr. Mann appear to jump from between two parked train cargo containers. I then observed Mr. Mann start to walk onto the first rail and is then struck by the train on his right side. According to Detective Travers, the Amtrak trains are fairly quiet as they are traveling down the tracks at 60mph.

According to the Washington State Laboratory toxicology report, Mr. Mann's blood alcohol level was approximately .20. Mr. Mann also had amphetamines, methamphetamine and marijuana in his system as well. The video and toxicology report supports the evidence on scene as well as witness statements. The case appears to be an accident.

Narrative:

On February 26th, 2016, at approximately 1615 hours, Lieutenant Ziesemer requested I respond to the scene of a train vs pedestrian collision that occurred in Tenino. Upon my arrival on scene I contacted Deputy Hoover who provided a synopsis of what he knew at the time. I was advised that a male subject was struck by a southbound Amtrak train and that it was currently stopped approximately a quarter mile from the scene. I observed a yellow blanket covering the deceased who was in between the middle tracks and the tracks closet to Bucoda Hwy SE. I also observed a parked freight train with numerous cars on the tracks closet to Crowder Rd SE.

I contacted Amtrak Local Motive Engineer Andrew Taylor who was seated in his engineer chair on Amtrak train #507. Mr. Taylor informed me that he was traveling from Seattle to Portland at approximately 60mph with people on board. Mr. Taylor referred me to the Amtrak train conductor for further details regarding the people on board. Mr. Taylor said upon traveling through Tenino toward Bucoda he observed a person appear from between two of the parked freight train cars attempting to cross the tracks his train was traveling on. Mr. Taylor advised that he believed he observed the person approximately 150 feet, or 2-3 parked freight train car lengths, before his train struck the person. Mr. Taylor informed me that he didn't have enough time to apply the brakes or sound the horn.

I asked Mr. Taylor if it appeared the person appeared to have intentionally been struck by his train or not. Mr. Taylor advised the subject stepped on the tracks his train was traveling on and appeared to be just trying to cross. Mr. Taylor said the person didn't look back at the train or appeared to do anything but try to cross. Mr. Taylor provided a recorded statement. I looked at the front of the Amtrak train and noted a snow plow type device attached to the front. I observed what

appeared to be small pieces of human remains on the front left portion of the plow. Deputy Hoover took digital photographs of the scene.

Upon speaking with Amtrak Conductor Sean O'Leary, he informed me that there are 238 people on board. Mr. O'Leary also informed me that Amtrak train #507 has 13 cars. Mr. O'Leary advised that he did observe the incident.

I contacted Michael Vanderhoof who was a first responder from the Tenino Fire Department. Mr. Vanderhoof advised that he responded to the scene, observed the victim and confirmed the death immediately after noticing obvious severe head trauma. Mr. Vanderhoof advised that the victim, Gary Mann, is a known transient who has a camp in the woods near the City of Tenino Park.

Upon viewing the deceased male I noted obvious trauma to the top of the victims head. It appeared at point that the victim's brain had been removed from deceased person's head as a result of the impact with the train. Thurston County Deputy Coroner Michael Ashton arrived on scene and conducted his investigation. Deputy Coroner Ashton located the victim's wallet on his person and inside was an identification card of a Gary F. Mann^{4b}. There was an associated green bag lying near the victim and upon looking inside, no items of evidential value were located inside. Deputy Coroner Michael Ashton took custody of the deceased person.

I informed Deputy Hoover that I would be contacting neighbors in the area to see if they heard or saw anything. Upon arriving at ^{4b} I contacted Sarah Schaffner. I noted Sarah's residence to be almost directly across from the portion of the tracks where the incident took place. I asked Ms. Schaffner if she heard or saw anything. Ms. Sahaffner said at approximately 1400 hours, she observed a female wearing a green jacket with a red hat walking southbound on the opposite side of the parked freight train. Ms. Sahaffner said the female appeared to be walking on the Bucoda Hwy side tracks. I asked if Ms. Sahaffner observed anyone with her and she said no.

According to Deputy Hoover, a female contacted him early on at the scene and obtained her name and address. I advised Deputy Hoover that we should attempt to contact her. Deputy Hoover and I arrived at ^{4b} in Bucoda and contacted Kathleen Parks. I asked Ms. Parks if she was the person walking southbound near the railroad tracks at approximately 1400 hours today and she said yes. Ms. Parks also confirmed that she was wearing a green jacket as well as red hood. Ms. Parks informed me that she had been walking with Gary Mann at one point however they separated at one point because he said he was going to work. Deputy Hoover and I informed Ms. Parks that it was Gary Mann that had been struck and killed by the train. I noted Ms. Parks to start crying and appeared to be upset. I asked Ms. Parks if she observed this incident take place and she said no.

I asked Ms. Parks if Gary had made any suicidal statements or had said anything about wanting to harm himself and she said no. I noted Ms. Parks to be upset and was having a difficult time trying to tell me exactly where she had been walking with Gary along the tracks. I asked Ms. Parks if I could follow up with her in the daylight and have her show me exactly where they were walking and she said yes.

On March 1st, 2016, at approximately 1200 hours, Detective Oplinger and I arrived at 4b in Bucoda for a follow up interview with Kathleen Parks. Ms. Parks agreed to show Detective Oplinger and I where Gary and her walked that day of the incident. I asked Ms. Parks if Gary and her were in a dating relationship and she said no only friends. Ms. Parks informed me that Gary was homeless and had been living in a tent in the woods near the Tenino City Park. I asked Ms. Parks if Gary was having any medical problems and she said yes. Ms. Parks said Gary had trouble digesting food because he didn't have an esophagus. Ms. Parks did say Gary was in a lot of pain however never made any direct statements about wanting to harm himself. Ms. Parks said he loved his two boys that lived with their mother in Tenino.

Upon arriving in the area of the 18000 block of Bucoda Hwy, Ms. Parks pointed out a house at 4b where she said Gary and her stayed the night of February 25th, 2016. Ms. Parks said the house belongs to her friend Nancy who allowed the two of them to stay that night. According to Ms. Parks, Gary and her left Nancy's house on February 26th, 2016, "early afternoon" approximately 1230 hours. I asked if they had been drinking alcohol or using drugs and she said Gary had been. She said Gary is an alcoholic and was intoxicated the night before. Ms. Parks said Gary is "intoxicated every day." Ms. Parks also informed me that Gary had been using methamphetamine as well.

Ms. Parks said Gary rode his bicycle while she walked northbound toward Tenino. Ms. Parks said they walked on the trail that parallels the railroad tracks on the west side of the tracks, closet to Bucoda Hwy. Ms. Parks said they walked to their friend Ray's house on Mc Arther Street in Tenino. Ms. Parks provided directions to Ray's house which I noted to be at 4b. According to Ms. Parks, Gary and her arrived at Ray's house around 1300 hours. She said Gary borrowed money from Ray and he went to the nearby convenience store and bought two tall 211 Steal Reserve beers and drank one at Ray's and then one when he left Ray's.

According to Ms. Parks, Gary and her left Ray's at approximately 1330 hours, and by this time Gary had drank both of the Steal Reserve beers. She said Gary then walked to the nearby Texaco fuel station and purchased another Steal Reserve beer and drank it as well. Ms. Parks said Gary and her then walked to the marijuana dispensary located near the intersection of 6th Ave and Park Avenue in Tenino and Gary purchased approximately \$10.00 worth of marijuana. According to Ms. Parks Gary was intoxicated prior to purchasing the marijuana.

Ms. Parks said Gary and her left the marijuana dispensary and walked on the trail southbound from the marijuana dispensary that parallels the rail road tracks on the Crowder Road side.

Ms. Parks said Gary informed her that he was going to walk to work which according to Ms. Parks is at a residence off of North Craft Road Southeast. Ms. Parks said Gary had been hired to take care of Alpacas at a residence in the area of North Craft Road. It should be known that the location of the incident was near the intersection of Crowder Rd and North Craft Rd SE. Ms. Parks said while her and Gary were walking, Gary insisted that they stop on the trail and smoke the marijuana that he had just purchased. Ms. Parks said they both smoked the marijuana. Ms. Parks said Gary told her he was cold so he took a sock out of his pocket and proceeded to light the sock on fire for warmth. According to Ms. Parks Gary started being rude to her calling her derogatory names because she wanted to leave and he wanted to stay. Ms. Parks said Gary was yelling at her and acting irrational because he was intoxicated.

Ms. Parks advised that she then decided to walk away from Gary southbound and had crossed the railroad tracks to the State Route 507 side. Ms. Parks said she last saw Gary at approximately 1430 hours, walking along the railroad tracks on the Crowder Road side. Ms. Parks showed Detective Oplinger and I the area of the railroad tracks where she last saw Gary which I noted to be approximately the 16800 block of Crowder Rd along the railroad tracks. Ms. Parks said she believes he was walking to work. Ms. Parks provided a recorded statement.

On March 1st 2016, at approximately 1237 hours, I contacted Nancy Hjarne at the Liberty Market in Bucoda. I identified myself and the reason for the contact. Ms. Hjarne informed me that she was visiting Kathleen just prior to coming to the store. I asked Ms. Hjarne if she had any information about Gary Mann and she said he was "very very ill." Ms. Hjarne said "he didn't have an esophagus, was trying to hold on to a job and lived of his two boys." Ms. Hjarne also informed me that Gary was homeless and believed he knew that doctors couldn't help him any further with his medical condition.

Ms. Hjarne informed me that Gary and Kathleen did stay the night at her residence the night before the incident. Ms. Hjarne said she recalls Gary being sick to the point of vomiting and had said, "I feel like I'm dying, I'm in so much pain." I asked Ms. Hjarne if Gary had made or made in the past, any direct statements about wanting to harm himself. Ms. Hjarne said no she hasn't heard Gary make any statements about wanting to harm himself nor can she see him wanting to harm himself. Ms. Hjarne was unable to provide any further information.

On March 3rd, 2016, I contacted Thurston County Deputy Coroner Michael Ashton regarding follow up to his investigation. Deputy Coroner Ashton informed me that an external examination was completed as well as specimens were sent

to the lab. I was informed that the cause of death was determined to be blunt head, chest and abdominal trauma.

Inclusion, after talking with witnesses and involved parties in the incident, it appears the victim may have been intoxicated at the time he attempted to cross the railroad tracks and was struck and killed by a south bound Amtrak Train. This incident appears to be an accident at this time.

15 A No, not for very long.
16 Q - at that point.
17 A We weren't there for that long.
18 Q Did you guys get up and leave together from that spot?
19 A Uh, well, I got up first. I just kept walking and he started and, and
20 Q Okay, and then -
21 A And then I could - you could hear him yelling "Well, you fucking bitch" and stuff, and -
22 Q Why was he saying that?
23 A I, because I wasn't going to put up with his, the way he was talking to me.
24 Q Okay. All right.
25 A I said I don't want to argue with you.
26 Q You got up and walked away from him. He wasn't walking with you at that point?
27 A No, no he wasn't.
28 Q How much separation would you say you had from him before he started walking as
29 well?
30 A Pretty far. Pretty much, I, I'm not for sure.
31 Q Would you say 150, 200 yards?
32 A Yeah, I mean I didn't see him anymore all of a sudden.
33

1 Q Okay. But did you see what side of the tracks was he on?
2 A I'm not for sure, but then it was raining. I had my hair down, and I was -

3 Q Did you ever see - was there a, a freight train that was parked on the tracks at this point?
4 A No. There wasn't.

5 Q There was not?
6 A No, there was not.

7 Q Well, were there any trains on the tracks?
8 A No.

9 Q At all parked there?
10 A Nope.

11 Q When you were walking through there?
12 A Nope.

13 Q There was none.
14 A There was one - that one came by, you know, after I was walking, but the, the -

15 Q Did it stop or?
16 A A couple. No, they were going real slow. One was going slow. One came by that wasn't
17 going that fast.

18 Q So what time was this? Was this about 3:30 -
19 A Yes.

20 Q 4:00.
21 A No, it was about 3:30. Yeah, it was around 3:00.

22 Q Around 3:00? Okay.
23 A Yes, because I, I - the last time I seen him I go well it might take me a half hour.

24 Q So you're walking on the 507 side of the tracks.
25 A Uh huh.

26 Q And he's walking where? Is he on the other side?
27 A Yes, I'm - not I'm imaging that. Yeah. Yes. I'm thinking -

28 Q Okay.
29 A - he's going to his job, and all of a sudden I hear my name being yelled -

30 Q And it must be -
31 A - and I turned around.

32 Q With what you're telling me though, you says he works at Alpaca's -
33 A Right.

1 Q - but you were telling me he's on the other side of the tracks.
2 A I'm not for sure.

3 Q Is he, is he walking toward your location too or where you're at?
4 A I don't know.

5 Q But you're going south. Right?
6 A I do not know.

7 Q Okay. You don't know?
8 A I don't. I, I just had my head down. It was raining, and I didn't want to deal with it. I
9 said, you know, he's going to his job, and fine. I don't care. I'm going, I'm going to
10 Nancy's and that's that.

11 Q Okay.
12 A Because if she would be my ride home.

13 Q And so - from what you're telling me - you ended up at Ray's, and which is Ray's,
14 initially. You left for Ray's from McArthur Street. That's in Tenino.
15 A Uh huh.

16 Q Now, correct me if I'm wrong, but McArthur Street um is, is it near Dave's Market.
17 A Yeah.

18 Q Is it?
19 A Uh huh.

20 Q It's near Dave's, Dave's Market?
21 A Yep, it is, but -

22 Q So you're -
23 A It's the second house from the corner.

24 Q Okay. And so if you're walking out of town toward Alpaca's, you're going to go down
25 toward 99, not go toward Bucoda. Am I right?
26 A Uh, well, we were just taking - we were taking the trail. That was it. We weren't on any
27 side was -

28 Q Were you taking the western trail?
29 A No, I'm not sure.

30 Q Which trail were you taking?
31 A I'm not, I'm not - I just -

32 Q Was it paved or not?
33 A No. No, no, no.

- 1 Q All right. Okay. So if I was to tell you that he was walking - appeared to be walking
2 south down Crowder Road area and would have crossed the tracks over toward 507, um -
3 A I don't know it's.
- 4 Q That's not the direction -
5 A I don't know.
- 6 Q - for Alpaca's would be.
7 A Well, I don't know for sure. I would be telling you -
- 8 Q Okay.
9 A I don't know.
- 10 Q Okay.
11 A This is just my theory of what he - that was his plan.
- 12 Q So you walked away from him. You started walking south.
13 A Yes.
- 14 Q And you could hear him yelling, but -
15 A Well for a little bit, and then, then I didn't see him.
- 16 Q And then you didn't see him anymore.
17 A Nope. I didn't -
- 18 Q And you just kept walking and came where?
19 A And I just kept walking, and I heard all of sudden uh - I heard him - I, I hear my name. I
20 hear somebody yelling, and I, I turn around looking, and it was him, and he's just
21 standing there and -
- 22 Q Where is he standing at this point?
23 A Well, I'm really, I, I, I could show you.
- 24 Q Is he on the tracks? Is he on -
25 A Uh, was he on the -
- 26 Q One the road?
27 A No, he was on the, he - no he was on the, the trail. Okay, I turned around, and then -
- 28 Q But is he on the trail?
29 A And, and then, and then -
- 30 Q Right in the -
31 A Right on the, on the. Yes. And then all of a sudden he goes from the trail to the, to the
32 street, and, and he don't - even like walking on the, the street, you know, where the cars
33 are going and stuff, and that's what, that's what, and that's what freaked me out, because -
34

1 Q Are you saying he was on - on the other side from you?
2 A And I said why are you doing that?

3 Q The, the trail you're talking about - is this trail -
4 A Okay.

5 Q Is it right, right, like right next to the tracks where a vehicle could drive down?
6 A Kind of, yeah. Yeah.

7 Q Okay.
8 A Might be able to - a car might drive down. Yeah, the train.

9 Q Literally the trail that you're talking about is, is in between where the tracks are, and then
10 you've got um Crowder Road on one side, and you've got 507 on the other. Right?
11 A Right.

12 Q Is that what you're describing?
13 A Yes.

14 Q Okay.
15 A I mean if you want to go to the right it goes into where -

16 Q So where was he last seen standing?
17 A Uh, well, uh that was on the road.

18 Q Which side of the tracks?
19 A On the road. Well at first we were on the road.

20 Q Right. Which road? 507 or -
21 A Yeah, uh -

22 Q - or Crowder.
23 A 50, 507.

24 Q Okay.
25 A Okay. And then I don't understand why he did because, you know, I'm on, I'm on the
26 trail. Why, why did he want to go out in the street? Why? And then he seen that car that
27 was parked out there that was broke down in the road, and he goes "Who's that?" Your
28 ride?", and I said I don't know who that is.

29 Q Okay. All right.
30 A He goes "Well, who was that? I uh - who's in there". I said I don't know. I said why do
31 you ask me questions. I don't know anybody in this town. Why would you ask, and
32 there's nobody in this car. It's broke down, but he's thinking, you know, and then he gets
33 all paranoid and asking me questions. I don't know.

34

- 1 Q Okay. Um -
2 A And then he gave me, he give me a kiss, and he just give me a kiss and he left, and I said
3 nothing. I was okay.
- 4 Q And which way did he walk? And you walked - you walked toward Bucoda.
5 A And then, and then he walked over across the tracks to wherever. I didn't turn around and
6 look.
- 7 Q Did you see him walking across the tracks?
8 A Uh -
- 9 Q You saw -
10 A No, I just seen him, you know, from the road, walk from the road uh back on to the, to
11 the trail, because I wasn't going to stand in the middle of the street.
- 12 Q I know but when you last saw him - where did he go?
13 A Across, well he didn't go across the tracks but I didn't see it directly. You know -
- 14 Q And you said he was -
15 A I was - I just didn't watch. I don't know exactly.
- 16 Q I know but you just said -
17 A I don't know where he was -
- 18 Q - he walked across over the tracks. Is that -
19 A I didn't see him. Well, he had to of.
- 20 Q Okay.
21 A Now that's my theory if he wants to go to where he's going for his work - he has to go
22 across that - he has to be on that side.
- 23 Q Okay.
24 A But -
- 25 Q But at no point did he make any mention of wanting to harm himself?
26 A Never.
- 27 Q Okay.
28 A And uh I don't know um what, what, where he worked - the street it's off of. Uh, I guess
29 it's uh, a, a man and his wife and uh they've got - it's a not a very big uh farm, but Gary
30 has been working there for quite a while.
- 31 Q Okay.
32 A And uh, you know, and he makes his own hours or does whatever and -
- 33 Q So, and so - while you were with him - you said he was yelling at you, but it was more
34 because he was intoxicated. It wasn't an argument with you. You guys weren't fighting?
35 A Well, no. Right. Right like. Just

1 Q Just as, just as -
2 A And I just -

3 Q Just his personality when he's drinking.
4 A Yes. I just didn't want to put up with it.

5 Q Okay. All right.
6 A And no I said I'm going.

7 Q And what was his last words to you?
8 A Uh, you know, he didn't really say anything. He just gave me a - he goes - no he goes
9 "Are you okay?" And he said "I just want to know if you're okay." I said yes I'm okay.
10 Well, I said why wouldn't I be okay. I'm, I'm walking. What? And he goes - and he
11 gave me a kiss and that was that. Didn't say goodbye, and I just kept walking.

12 Q Okay.
13 A So I'm thinking okay he's going to his work or whatever. I don't know.

14 Q And this, and this, and this last time you saw him was on the trail on the 507 side.
15 A Uh huh. Yes.

16 Q Of the tracks.
17 A Uh huh.

18 Q And you believe at that point when you, when you left him or he walked the other way -
19 he turned around and walked the opposite direction. Is that right?
20 A Yes.

21 Q You believe he crossed the tracks at some point?
22 A Yes. Um, yeah, well yeah. He had to - you know - that's the way I'm thinking he passed.

23 Q But you don't know.
24 A No, I don't.

25 Q You just, you just turned around, and you think he crossed it -
26 A I had my head down. He was yelling. It was raining, and I just kept my head down and,
27 you know.

28 Q All right. So you just believe you walked the opposite direction.
29 A Yes.

30 Q Okay. All right.
31 A My friend Nancy has, knows where he works -

32 Q Okay.
33 A - because she's taken him there.

34

- 1 Q All right.
2 A A few times to drop him off for work.
- 3 Q Okay. Is there anything else you would like to add to this statement that we haven't
4 talked about?
5 A No. I just don't understand why? He's in so much pain.
- 6 Q All right.
7 A And he just wanted to -
- 8 Q Tell me what kind of pain. I mean - what kind of medical problems does he have?
9 A Yes. Well, he has uh - boy he had no esophagus.
- 10 Q No esophagus?
11 A Yes. He had none of that. He has a lot of uh broken bones in his past. I don't know -
12 he's been in a lot, you know, I don't know exactly. But, yes, and his hands he, and he's
13 always - he's very uh - I want to say the word is destruct - not destruction but very uh -
14 his hands don't work hardly at all. It's hard for him to - and you know, and he's very hard
15 on things.
- 16 Q Okay. Okay.
17 A You know and -
- 18 Q Okay.
19 A - and he's very loud, and he just - and he just isn't -
- 20 Q Okay. So without -
21 A I think he says he has a speech impediment, but what of that.
- 22 Q So without actually being there -
23 A I know.
- 24 Q - to witness what happened -
25 A Well.
- 26 Q - with what you, with what you know so far - it appears to be - just be a, an accident. Is
27 that what you say?
28 A Yes. I would say yes I am.
- 29 Q Based on him ever saying -
30 A Yes.
- 31 Q - saying he wanted to harm himself.
32 A That's right.
- 33 Q Okay.
34 A I, none of this - it's not - I do not, I do not think it's like that.

- 1 Q Okay.
2 A A suicide. Unless he was in that much pain, pain, because he was telling me "Kathy, I
3 need you. I'm never, I'm in pain." I said well what is it I can do to help you with this
4 pain. See him drinking and smoking and all that.
- 5 Q Is this today's conversation?
6 A Uh yeah. Well yes. Yes it was.
- 7 Q Okay.
8 A But it's - we've had the conversation before.
- 9 Q Okay.
10 A Because he's felt like this since I've known him.
- 11 Q Okay. Okay. All right.
12 A And now it's just that - he used to have a lot of weight. Now he only weighs - I don't
13 know - uh he's real skinny. He has no weight on, and baggy clothes and just doesn't want
14 to take care of himself.
- 15 Q Okay.
16 A You know.
- 17 Q Okay. All right. Uh, do you swear under penalty of perjury and, and the laws of the
18 State of Washington whatever you told me was true?
19 A Yes.
- 20 Q Correct and to the best of your knowledge?
21 A Yes sir. Absolutely.
- 22 Q And do you have anything you would like to add?
23 A I have nothing - no he was my - I was in love with him.
- 24 Q All right. The ending time is approximately 1917 hours on February 26, 2016.

- 1 Q Andrew, do you understand this statement is rec-, is being recorded and is with your
2 consent?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 Q Okay. Uh, Andrew, I was dispatched out to a, uh, believed to be a suicide, um, by train
5 in the area of Tenino off Crowder Road and State Route 507. Upon my arrival and
6 talking with fire personnel and deputies on scene, I was informed that, uh, the, and
7 correct me if I'm wrong, but the Burlington Northern Santa Fe cargo, I'll call it a cargo
8 train, um, you can tell the technical term here in a minute, but the t-, that train was
9 actually on the east side of the tracks, it was actually stopped, it was not going at the time
10 of this incident. And that an Amtrak train had actually struck a, a, uh, subject who was
11 on the tracks. Um, and I was informed upon talking with you that you're the locomotive
12 engineer for Amtrak train #507. Is that correct?
- 13 A That is correct.
- 14 Q And you were traveling from Seattle, headed toward Portland?
- 15 A Correct.
- 16 Q Okay. And upon entering into, uh, uh, Tenino, can you tell me about what you recall and
17 what, uh, what happened?
- 18 A Uh, just in a very short few second period, I saw, observed an individual jump out from
19 between the cars of the stopped freight train. Uh, less than 150 feet ahead of me, I would
20 guess. Uh, there was, that's all I can remember.
- 21 Q Okay. And how fast were you traveling at the time you saw the subject?
- 22 A I would guess approximately 60.

- 1 Q 60 miles an hour, okay. And I'm going to call it a cargo, what's the technical term for the
2 Burlington Northern Santa Fe, uh, train that's on the, I'm going to call it the east side of
3 the tracks.
- 4 A Yes. We are, we are operating, this is main track #1. That train is on main track #2, it's
5 commonly known as a freight train.
- 6 Q Freight train, thank you. And that was, as you were approaching Tenino, and prior to
7 striking the subject, um, the train was stopped, is that correct?
- 8 A Correct.
- 9 Q Okay. Um, so you said at about 150, 150 feet, 150 yards out, um, you saw, and describe
10 again to me what you saw, um, where this person came from.
- 11 A Uh, from between the cars, uh, wearing very dark clothing. Uh, he was not immediately
12 visible, he didn't, you know, it took a second to realize exactly what was happening.
- 13 Q Okay. Describe to me what you saw the person do though. When he came between the,
14 uh, uh, the train, the two ca-, uh, trains.
- 15 A He, he stepped out, uh, jumped out off of the cars, approximately the coupler height,
16 about five feet over the rail, stepped, made one step between the tracks, made another
17 step over the rail of the east rail of the track we were operating on. At that point, he was
18 struck.
- 19 Q Okay, did it appear that he was trying to get off the train tracks or did you believe it
20 appeared to be that he was deliberating attempting to be struck by the train?
- 21 A I cannot say, all I can recall is that he appeared to be simply crossing through the train
22 without regard for any traffic on, any movement on our track.
- 23 Q Okay. Uh, prior to coming into this area, about 150 yard we'll say from, from striking
24 the person, um, had you had to use your, uh, warning device prior, coming into Tenino at
25 any time?
- 26 A Yes, that's, numerous crossings between here and Seattle.
- 27 Q Okay, but, but right in Tenino, there's also a couple crossings as well that you would
28 have had to use your, uh, warning device, am I correct or not?
- 29 A Um, no, there are no crossings in Tenino.
- 30 Q Okay.
- 31 A There is one, there is a private crossing at about Mile 42.5. That would have been the last
32 crossing.
- 33 Q Okay, alright.
- 34 A Public crossing prior to this.
- 35 Q So, uh, the direction, we're facing southbound, am I correct?
- 36 A That's correct.
- 37

- 1 Q So we're on the same page. Um, and I'm going to call where the person was coming
2 from, I'm going to call east to west.
- 3 A Correct.
- 4 Q Westbou-, west being 5-, State Route 507. Um, was the person coming from the east to
5 the west, is that correct?
- 6 A Correct.
- 7 Q Okay, and I'm going to call this first rail that we're on, main track one, as you earlier
8 said. I'm going to call the, the left rail, okay, so we're on main track o-, two or one?
- 9 A We are on one.
- 10 Q Okay, yes.
- 11 A The freight train is on 2.
- 12 Q Right, but I'm gonna, we're on one, I'm going to c-, the rail itself, two rails. I'm going to
13 say the rail, you said that he got, he crossed over the first rail, got in the middle, and then
14 crossed over to the second rail when he was struck or-
- 15 A N-, no. He stepped from the train to the center of the track, the two tracks.
- 16 Q Okay.
- 17 A I last observed him above the east rail...
- 18 Q Okay.
- 19 A ...of this track.
- 20 Q Okay, alright, alright. Okay. But he didn't lay down on the tracks, he just, he, did he
21 look back, do you recall?
- 22 A He was-
- 23 Q Facing?
- 24 A What I could tell, he was just going that way.
- 25 Q Okay, and didn't appear, um-
- 26 A He did not pause or stop with intent to, uh, be struck...
- 27 Q Okay.
- 28 A ...that I could tell.
- 29 Q But with, with the amount of space, which is there about four feet maybe...
- 30 A Hm-
- 31 Q ...from, from the side of the, the freight train, um, to the, to the tracks where you're at,
32 there's enough space there to, would have actually seen you coming, am I correct, was
33 when he came, when he would have darted out from those...
- 34 A Had, had he paused-
- 35

1 Q ...cars? Okay.
2 A Had he paused, there is room that we could have passed without striking.

3 Q Okay. Alright. And you said he was just wearing dark clothes, no other description
4 about the person? It was a male though, you believe?
5 A I guessed it was a male from the height and build. Uh, Caucasian.

6 Q Nobody else, uh, with this person that you saw?
7 A Not that I could tell.

8 Q Okay.
9 A Only saw him.

10 Q And then, uh, about how long would you say it took you to, uh, have the, made the, the
11 train completely stop?
12 A I'm not sure the length of stop. Um, immediately placed full braking effort in
13 emergency.

14 Q Okay.
15 A Um, 20 seconds, I don't know.

16 Q Okay, and this was a passenger train, correct?
17 A Correct.

18 Q Okay. And you have people on board?
19 A Yes.

20 Q Okay. Alright. Alright, is there anything else you'd like to add to the statement that we
21 have not talked about?
22 A No.

23 Q Okay, is everything you told me been true and accurate and freely and voluntary?
24 A Yes.

25 Q Do you swear under penalty of perjury under the laws of the state of Washington the
26 following you told me was true and correct to the best of your knowledge?
27 A Correct.

28 Q Okay. The ending time is approximately 1717 hours on February 26, 2016.
