#### **DIRECT TESTIMONY OF**

## KATHIE DUNN & JAMES (CHRIS) HALL

ON BEHALF OF RUPP, et al

ISSUE: Impact of the lack of 911 service on Skyko 2

**OCTOBER 12, 2005** 

- 1 Q. What is your name and home address?
- 2 A. (Kathie) My name is Kathie Dunn and my address is 15127 Index-Galena Rd,
- 3 Index, WA. (James) My name is James Hall and my address is Post Office Box
- 4 351, Index, WA.

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- 6 Q. In the last 2 years (if you had had telephone service) approximately how
- 7 many times would it have been used it to call 911 for emergency assistance for
- 8 yourself or others? Please state the approximate date and the general nature of
- 9 the emergency (e.g. heart attack, car accident, accident in the home, break-in,
- 10 assault, etc.)
- 11 A. (Kathie) I probably would have called 911 at least 15 times in the last 2 years,
- some for myself for break-ins that were taking place across the road from where
- 13 we lived and others were for people up the road who were having break-in
- 14 problems. This is mostly in the summer, a tremendous amount in the summer of
- 15 2004. We've had times where we've needed 911 to report car accidents that take
- place and we've also had people come requesting phone for weapons violations.
- 17 (James) Within the last couple years, I'd say 15-20 times we've had to call 911 for
- any range from anywhere from breaking and entering to car wrecks to needing
- 19 local authorities for domestic problems and a lot of the nature of these
- 20 emergencies, when we do need 911, is either ... most of it is for Sheriff's

- 1 Department and at times it's for the local rescue squads but there's no phone
- 2 lines or no cell service so we can't get a hold of anybody unless we travel almost
- 3 6 miles to the nearest store to call for 911 or send somebody to call 911 for help.
- 4 It's not uncommon to have people, especially during the summer time, stop at
- 5 our residence and ask us for a telephone because there's been either an accident
- 6 or a drowning or a shooting up the road or overdose. We've experienced this
- 7 numerous times throughout the years, but it's hard to get a hold of any
- 8 emergency services or law enforcement.

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- 10 Q. For each of the instances mentioned above, describe what you had to do to
- 11 receive or summon emergency assistance.
- 12 A. (Kathie) You have to drive at least into the town of Index and if the pay phone
- is operating, you call 911 and wait there until the Sheriff comes, which could be 2
- minutes, 2 hours, 2 days. They really want you to stay at the phone booth and
- wait, when you need to get back to the emergency. Where if you had a phone at
- 16 home you could be where the emergency was while you were waiting. (James)
- We have used a couple of different ways to notify 911 within the last 14 months.
- One was a roll-over accident in front of my residence which we had a man
- 19 trapped inside and no phone service and my neighbor come down from his
- 20 residence to find out what was going on. The only way we got a hold of 911

- 1 during this time, was with a satellite phone. And rest of the times we have to
- 2 drive to the town of Index, if the [pay] phones are working, if not we either ... if
- 3 the fire department is open or go to somebody's house in Index to call for 911.

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- 5 Q. What were the consequences to the health or well-being of the victim(s) or
- 6 victim(s) property, due to the delay in receiving emergency assistance?
- 7 A. (Kathie) Well, because there is no immediate response from 911 because of the
- 8 time that you have to go in and call and wait and come back. The cabins that get
- 9 broken into get broken into repeatedly because they know there is no way to call
- 10 for a Sheriff up here. (James) I agree on that, that you can call and it can be days
- 11 before anybody even shows up and at times we've had the experience that
- 12 nobody has showed up. (Kathie) Because they have no way to contact you back.
- 13 (James) Yes. (Kathie) No phone. (James) And they expect you to be by the pay
- phone, well we cannot stay at the pay phone because if you stay at the pay phone
- 15 that means the bad guys can be breaking into your home.

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## Q. Does this conclude your testimony?

- 18 A. (James) Yes, we just wish that we could get some type of emergency assistance
- 19 up here. I have a terminal disease and if I started going down hill, if I don't have
- a running vehicle, then somebody would have to walk 6 miles to call 911. So
