^{*} Note that once charged to the Washington Location code, 028. Utility Code 0 charges are assigned to Electric-Washington, while Utility Code 1 charges are assigned to Gas-Washington. Utility Code 9 charges being allocated between Washington Gas and Washington Electric using Allocation Note 9 of 18,025% and 81.975%, respectively. Utility Code 7 charges are first allocated by Allocation Note 7 to Electric 73.656%, WWP Gas 17.314% and WPNG 9.030% (this allocation does not appear above) before they are allocated above. Utility Code 8 charges are first split between WWP 66.235% and WPNG 33.765% using Allocation Note 8 before they are allocated above.

No 1	The Pacific Northwest Utilities Conference Committee provides a forum for dialogue and technical analysis on electric industry policy issues of regional importance.
No 2	This membership would be better described as "prepaid research" or syndicated research. A "membership" in the Corporate Strategy Board entitles the "member" to research services and access to data and studies in the area of corporate strategy.
No 3	The Western Electric Power Institute facilitates the exchange of information, develops members' skills and promotes the progress of the electric industry so that the public and its members are better served.
No 4	This membership would be better described as "prepaid training" as it entitles a member to send 2 people to each seminar offered by CSC Index Research & Advisory Services. CSC's corporate purpose is to be preeminent in the solution of client problems in information systems technology.
No 5	The Downtown Spokane Partnership is dedicated to planning and policies supportive of the quality and vitality of Downtown Spokane. The Company's participation in this organization is driven by its significant utility infrastructure invested in the Central Business District. (See also No 19 below.)
No 6	Membership in the Northwest Energy Coalition (NWEC) gives the Company immediate access to information exchange with stakeholders such as environmental, conservation and low-income groups. NWEC promotes energy conservation and renewable energy resources, consumer and low-income protection and fish and wildlife restoration.
No 7	The Association of Washington Business works to streamline regulation and reduce taxes and paperwork.
No 8	The United Telecom Council (UTC) assists electric and gas utilities, water companies and energy pipelines who provide critical telecommunications and IT systems in support of their core business – all united in their commitment to ensuring the best, most reliable systems and networks critical to their core business and the customers they serve
No 9	Washington Roundtable is a statewide CEO-level organization focusing on key issues affecting the economic well being of business and citizens (including our customers) across the state. The group focuses primarily on education, economic climate and fiscal policy issues.
No 10	The Montana Tax Foundation is a private non-partisan, non-profit organization directed and financed by citizens and business in Montana. It provides the Company with current, concise and accurate information regarding taxation issues. This is of particular value due to our generation plant in Colstrip and Noxon.
No 11	The Washington Research Council is a private nonprofit organization providing its members, the media, government leaders and the public with independent information on state and local government.
No 12	The International Trade Alliance, an affiliate of the Spokane Area Chamber of Commerce (See also No 19 below), is an information clearinghouse and contact point for the community and is host to the Department of Commerce, International Trade division.
No 13	The Nature Conservancy works collaboratively with citizens, communities and businesses to protect Washington's environment.
No 14	The Western Environmental Trade Association (WETA) updates the Company on natural ecology and economic issues in the state of Montana.
No 15	The Boston College Center for Corporate Community Relations provides the Company with best practices in corporate community relations, benchmarking, measurement and evaluation, surveys and professional development.
No 16	The Public Affairs Council is a nonprofit, nonpartisan professional organization of corporate public affairs officers. It provides the Company with information and resources keeping Avista Utilities current with trends in public affairs.
No 17	The Leadership Council, a lobbying organization, was mistakenly charged to dues and should have been charged to account 426.

No 18	The Pacific Coast Gas Association (PCGA) provides services and support activities
	designed to improve individual and corporate performance in the transmission,
	distribution and marketing of natural gas service. PCGA offers workshops and
İ	conferences that facilitate the exchange of information and technical expertise.
No 19	The Company's membership in the Spokane Area Chamber of Commerce (and similar organizations) gives our customers a voice in determining the quality of economic growth and development in the region. Responsible business growth provides the utility with the opportunity to efficiently utilize its existing infrastructure and to spread its costs over a broader customer base. As Avista is one of the largest businesses based in Spokane, our leaderships sets the tone and contributes to mutually beneficial outcomes.
No 20	The National Hydropower Association (NHA), a non-profit national association,
NO 20	champions hydropower as a responsible use of the nation's waters while serving a broad range of public interests. Our membership provides the Company with legal/regulatory support and research for relicensing and mitigation issues and access to educational materials and networking opportunities in the areas of dam safety, recreation liability and hydro upgrades.
No 21	The Inland Northwest Heating, Ventilating, and Air Conditioning Association (INHVAC) is a non-profit industry organization of heating/air conditioning contractors, distributors, and code officials. Our membership dues support development and enforcement of safety codes, specialized training and access to a contract labor pool for emergency gas re-lights.

No 23	The Spokane Valley Chamber of Commerce – See No 19 above.
