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1 petition to intervene. I am unaware of any other
 2 petitions to intervene in this matter.
 3 Let me ask, first of all, is there anyone on the
 4 line now, on the telephone, or virtually online, who
 5 wishes to intervene in this matter?
 6 Okay. Hearing nothing.
 7 About Kitsap County's petition to intervene, I'm
 8 unaware of any filed objection to Kitsap County's
 9 intervention.
 10 Is there any objection?
 11 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: No objection from
 12 staff, Your Honor.
 13 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Okay. I heard that there's
 14 no objection from --
 15 MR. STANOVSKY: No objection from Waste
 16 Management.
 17 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Okay. So hearing no
 18 objections, I will grant that petition to intervene.
 19 So a couple procedural matters before we get to
 20 the schedule.
 21 First of all, several of you have already been
 22 involved with a proceeding at the Commission, but just to
 23 remind everyone, we require all filing and service to be
 24 done electronically now according to Commission rule.
 25 And the Commission will serve the parties electronically

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1 as well.
 2 If any party has not yet designated a lead
 3 representative for service, please do so via an e-mail to
 4 me as soon as possible. And I'm aware that the parties,
 5 or at least most parties, already have my e-mail address.
 6 But for the record, it is andrew.j.oconnell. That's
 7 A-N-D-R-E-W, dot, J, dot, O-C-O-N-N-E-L-L, at utc.wa.gov.
 8 Also, if anyone would like to add names and
 9 e-mail addresses of other representatives or support
 10 staff who should receive electronic courtesy copies of
 11 all documents filed in this proceeding, please e-mail
 12 that to me as well.
 13 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: Your Honor --
 14 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Okay. Let's -- yes, Ms.
 15 Cameron-Rulkowski.
 16 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: Thank you.
 17 I heard Mr. Stanovsky saying something in
 18 response to your question about Kitsap County's
 19 intervention. But I couldn't hear what he said. And I'm
 20 wondering if you heard him say anything.
 21 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Let me address that.
 22 Mr. Stanovsky, I heard you say you did not have
 23 any objection. But let me go back and verify because
 24 perhaps I misheard.
 25 Mr. Stanovsky?

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1 MR. STANOVSKY: I'm happy to clarify. No
 2 objection. Correct. Thank you.
 3 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Okay. Thank you.
 4 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: Thank you, Your Honor.
 5 I --
 6 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Always best to be sure.
 7 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI -- I didn't hear him.
 8 JUDGE O'CONNELL: I am hearing a little bit of
 9 distortion from everyone. And I don't know if the court
 10 reporter is also, so this is not an unwelcomed question.
 11 So I would rather make sure it's clear for everyone here
 12 and on the record. So thank you.
 13 Okay. About a schedule. Have the parties
 14 discussed a procedural schedule prior to this prehearing
 15 conference?
 16 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: Yes, Your Honor, we
 17 have. And I believe we have an agreed procedural
 18 schedule to present to you.
 19 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Okay. Would you like to
 20 please go ahead and present it? Can you read it verbally
 21 into the record?
 22 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: Yes, Your Honor.
 23 It's a very simple schedule. And if we need to
 24 have more events in there, just let us know.
 25 So we would like to -- we would like to hold a

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1 settlement conference on Friday, January 7th. We would
 2 like to have the evidentiary hearing take place on
 3 Thursday, February 17th, at 1:30 p.m. And in advance of
 4 that hearing, parties would file and serve their exhibits
 5 and exhibit lists Thursday, February 10th.
 6 JUDGE O'CONNELL: File and serve the exhibit
 7 list for each party on February the 10th.
 8 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: Correct.
 9 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Okay.
 10 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: By close of business.
 11 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Is there any other date of
 12 note that the parties had contemplated?
 13 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: No. We hadn't
 14 discussed any other dates or events. Or I should say we
 15 hadn't discussed any other particular events. Yes, we
 16 discussed dates.
 17 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Okay. Is there going to be
 18 a need for discovery?
 19 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: Staff does not
 20 anticipate a need for discovery.
 21 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Okay.
 22 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: But I --
 23 MR. STANOVSKY: Nor does Waste Management.
 24 Sorry. That was crosstalk there.
 25 Just to be clear, Waste Management also does

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1 not.
2 MS. NICKEL: And neither does Kitsap County.
3 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Thank you, Ms. Nickel.
4 Thank you, Mr. Stanovsky.
5 If it is only me -- I hope it is only me that
6 I'm experiencing a delay from when I see all of you
7 speaking to when I hear you. So I hope that is just me.
8 I will -- or Ms. Cameron-Rulkowski, have you
9 looked at the Commission's calendar in regard to the
10 evidentiary hearing date to see if there's another public
11 hearing going on at that same time?
12 And Ms. Cameron-Rulkowski, you're muted. I can
13 see your lips are moving.
14 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: Thank you, Your Honor.
15 I haven't looked at the Commission's calendar.
16 I did ask the administrative law division about your
17 calendar. So I'm not sure if anything else was checked.
18 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Okay. I do know that that
19 day is free for me and that will not be a conflict for
20 me. I will check to see if there is any other conflict
21 as far as public hearings at the Commission. It's not
22 such an insurmountable obstacle these days because I'm
23 expecting that we're going to hold this evidentiary
24 hearing virtually.
25 Was that also the understanding of the parties?

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1 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: Yes, it was.
2 And, actually, when we had exchanged dates, I
3 had indicated it was virtual. It was my understanding
4 that all of the hearings were going to be conducted
5 virtually at the Commission in the coming months.
6 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Yes. I wanted to make sure
7 we all understood that that's what was going to be
8 happening. And because of that, it's not such a big
9 obstacle if there is another hearing that might overlap
10 just because we don't have to use the same hearing room.
11 Okay. I will double-check those dates. And I
12 will approve the procedural schedule presented by the
13 parties.
14 What else procedurally do we need to address
15 today, if anything?
16 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: This is Jennifer
17 Cameron-Rulkowski from Commission Staff. And I don't
18 think there is anything else procedurally that we need to
19 address.
20 If we need to move any of those dates, we'll try
21 to come up with an agreed proposal for amendment.
22 Other than that, I can't think of anything right
23 now.
24 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Okay. Anything else from
25 the Company or from Kitsap County?

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1 MR. STANOVSKY: One question, Your Honor,
2 about the potential for a protective order. I think from
3 our side, we don't see any reason that one is likely to
4 be needed.
5 But thought we would ask the question more
6 broadly if there were the likelihood of confidential
7 customer information or things that are customarily
8 protected under the Commission's rules.
9 If the other parties anticipate any of that
10 coming into play, we just thought we would ask the
11 question.
12 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Well, you can always request
13 for a protective order if the need comes up.
14 MR. STANOVSKY: Sure.
15 JUDGE O'CONNELL: You're not limited to asking
16 for one now. So if the need comes up --
17 MR. STANOVSKY: I understand.
18 JUDGE O'CONNELL: -- yeah, we will consider
19 that in the future.
20 The Commission does have rules about protecting
21 confidential information and the information of customers
22 already. And I know the parties don't expect any -- or
23 significant discovery. But those discovery rules are
24 available and they are in effect. I think that covers
25 it.

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1 Mr. Stanovsky, was there anything else that you
2 needed to hear from me as far as direction on the
3 protective order?
4 MR. STANOVSKY: No, no. Just on the chance
5 that one of the other parties had something in mind, I
6 thought I would ask for it. But don't know exactly what
7 that would be.
8 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Okay. Turning to Kitsap
9 County and Staff, I would like to hear if you do expect
10 it as Mr. Stanovsky is asking. It wasn't something that
11 I had anticipated. But I'll give you, both parties, the
12 chance to give your thoughts on that.
13 But let me turn last to Ms. Nickel for Kitsap
14 County.
15 Is there anything else from your perspective
16 that we need to address today procedurally?
17 MS. NICKEL: No, Your Honor.
18 JUDGE O'CONNELL: And I'll give you an
19 opportunity to respond to Mr. Stanovsky.
20 MS. NICKEL: No. Kitsap County doesn't think
21 of anything else we need to address today procedurally.
22 And if there is documentation or evidence that
23 we would provide that you would consider needed to be
24 redacted or something, we can work with you on that to
25 avoid release of confidential information.

1 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Ms. Cameron-Rulkowski, do
2 you have any response? I anticipate that you would about
3 the protective order, but I'll give you the opportunity
4 to state your position.

5 MS. CAMERON-RULKOWSKI: In fact, I don't have
6 anything substantive. I don't expect to see
7 competitively sensitive information in this proceeding.
8 And we don't have any customer lists, for example, in the
9 evidence. So I'm not anticipating we would need a
10 protective order at this point.

11 JUDGE O'CONNELL: Okay. Very good.
12 Well, at this point, I will give the parties the
13 expectation that I will issue a prehearing conference
14 order by the end of this week. And I will approve the
15 procedural schedule agreed by the parties with the
16 settlement conference on January 7th. And an evidentiary
17 hearing to be held virtually on February 17th at
18 1:30 p.m. With the parties to file exhibit lists,
19 witness lists, by February 10th, 5 p.m.

20 Okay. I do not believe we have anything left to
21 discuss today. So unless there's anything else, I'll
22 pause for a moment. Okay. Thank you all for being here
23 today and getting this schedule worked out. And we will
24 adjourn. Thank you. And we're off the record.
