6	JUDGE PEARSON: So good afternoon. Today is
7	Wednesday, January 29th, 2020. The time is now
8	approximately 1:45 p.m. This is Docket TV-190858, which
9	is an application for a household goods permit filed by
10	AmericaM Movers LLC.
11	My name is Rayne Pearson. I'm an
12	administrative law judge with the Utilities and
13	Transportation Commission, and seated to my left is
14	Judge Andrew O'Connell. He is the administrative law
15	judge that's presiding over today's brief adjudicative
16	proceeding. As we spoke about before we were on the
17	record this afternoon, Mr. O'Connell sorry, Judge
18	O'Connell woke up with laryngitis this morning. He
19	doesn't have a voice, so I am here to speak on his
20	behalf. He is still the presiding officer and the
21	decision-maker in this case.
22	So let's go ahead and take appearances from
23	both parties and then we'll talk about how we're going
24	to proceeding this afternoon. So let's start with

Commission Staff, and a short appearance is fine.

1	MR. FUKANO: Good afternoon, Judge Pearson,
2	Judge O'Connell. I am Harry Fukano, Assistant Attorney
3	General with the utilities and transportation division,
4	here on behalf of Commission Staff.
5	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And for the company,
6	if you can state your first and last name, spelling your
7	last name for the court reporter, and please provide
8	your address, telephone number, and email address.
9	MR. GAHAGAN: First, I'd like to thank the
LO	Court for having us here and for giving us this
L1	opportunity. My name is Camano Gahagan. My address is
L2	5206 South 2nd Avenue. My phone number is 425-496-4041,
L3	and my email address is info@americammoversllc.
L4	JUDGE PEARSON: Dot-com?
L5	MR. GAHAGAN: Dot-com, sorry.
L6	JUDGE PEARSON: Can you spell your last
L7	name?
L8	MR. GAHAGAN: My last name is my first
L9	name is Camano, that's C-a-m-a-n-o, and last name is
20	Gahagan, G-a-h-a-g-a-n.
21	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you.
22	So before we were on the record, the parties
23	reviewed the exhibits and stipulated to the admission of
24	most of the exhibits, which I will now memorialize for
25	the record So Staff's Exhibits MP-1 through MP-4 are

1	admitted into the record.
2	(Exhibits MP-1 through MP-4 admitted.)
3	JUDGE PEARSON: For the company,
4	Mr. Gahagan, because of the way that you've structured
5	this, I'm going to for Exhibit A, I'm going to number
6	those 19 exhibits as CG-A1 through CG-A19. Exhibit B
7	will be CG-B1 and CG-B2, Exhibit C will be CG-C1 and
8	CG-C2, Exhibit E will be CG-E1 and CG-E2, Exhibit G will
9	be CG-G1 through CG-G3, Exhibit H will be CG-H1 through
10	CG-H13, Exhibit I will be CG-I1 through CG-I17, Exhibit
11	J will be CG-J1, Exhibit K will be Exhibit CG-K1 and
12	CG-K2, L will be CG-L1, and Exhibit M we are reserving
13	for argument. Staff did not stipulate to those three
14	exhibits, so we will address those at the time they're
15	offered. Exhibit N will be CG-N1. I think that covers
16	everything.
17	(Above-referenced exhibits admitted.)
18	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So before we get
19	started, I'd like to provide a roadmap for today's brief
20	adjudicative proceeding. So we're here today because
21	the Commission originally issued a notice of intent to
22	deny the company's application for permit authority as a
23	household goods carrier.
24	Mr. Gahagan, you requested a hearing to have
25	an opportunity to respond to the allegations contained

1	in that notice and explain why your application should
2	be approved. The Commission originally scheduled the
3	hearing for January 7th and then granted a joint request
4	by the parties to reschedule the hearing for today.
5	So in these matters, the applicant has the
6	burden to show that the permit should be issued, but in
7	this case, Mr. Gahagan, as we discussed before we came
8	on the record, I think it makes sense to have Commission
9	Staff present its case first and then give you the
10	opportunity to respond to it.
11	So Mr. Fukano is going to give a brief
12	overview of Staff's case and Staff will introduce its
13	witness, Mr. Mat Perkinson, who will testify about
14	Staff's investigation and then, Mr. Gahagan, you will
15	have the opportunity to ask Mr. Perkinson questions when
16	he's finished testifying, and you will also have the
17	opportunity to ask questions of Mr. Dotson.
18	At that point, I'll swear you in and you
19	will be able to present your case responding to Staff,
20	including any additional testimony that you would like
21	to give or any witnesses that you would like to call.
22	Once all of the witnesses have testified, both parties
23	will have the chance to make a closing statement.
24	So, Mr. Gahagan, do you have any questions
25	before we get started?

1	MR. GAHAGAN: Not at the moment. I'm good.
2	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Anything from Staff?
3	MR. FUKANO: Just that Mr. Dotson is
4	available, but would would need to leave by about
5	2:30.
6	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
7	MR. FUKANO: And so if it were possible to
8	have him go perhaps first or have him be available for
9	questioning first, that would be Staff's preference.
10	JUDGE PEARSON: That's fine. Okay. We can
11	do that.
12	So before we start, Mr. Gahagan, this is
13	this hearing is all about your criminal history, you
14	know that? So Staff is going to explain how the nature
15	and extent of your prior convictions are a concern, and
16	then you will have the opportunity to explain why the
17	nature and extent of your convictions should not be a
18	concern to the Commission.
19	So, Mr. Fukano, you may proceed with your
20	opening remarks and call your first witness.
21	MR. FUKANO: Good afternoon. Under
22	Washington law, the Utilities and Transportation
23	Commission is charged with reviewing and granting
24	applications for household goods movers in the state of
25	Washington performing intrastate moves if they are

1	willing to abide by applicable statutes, Commission
2	rules, and their their operation's in the public
3	interest. Staff, in its official review of the
4	application submitted by AmericaM Movers LLC recommended
5	that the Commission deny the application.
6	Staff understands that the company intends
7	to provide additional evidence at this hearing bearing
8	on the company's fitness to provide service. Staff
9	welcomes the opportunity to engage in further review of
LO	the company's application based on the material provided
L1	today and will introduce its evidence through Mr. Mathew
L2	Perkinson. Thank you.
L3	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you. Would you
L4	like to call your first witness? And it can be
L5	Mr. Dotson if you would
L6	MR. FUKANO: I would like to call Mr. Mike
L7	Dotson.

20	Q.	I am I am showing you what has been			
21	prev	iously admitted as Exhibit MP-1. What is this			
22	exhil	oit?			
23	A.	This is the application received from AmericaM			
24	Move	ers.			
25	Q.	And are you familiar with it?			

1	A. Yes.
2	Q. How did you become familiar with it?
3	A. It was submitted for authority, and I did the
4	initial review.
5	MR. FUKANO: No further questions for
6	direct. I would make Mr. Dotson available for cross.
7	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Mr. Gahagan?
8	MR. GAHAGAN: I can can I just like speak
9	what I have to say or
10	JUDGE PEARSON: No.
11	MR. GAHAGAN: do I have to ask him direct
12	questions?
13	JUDGE PEARSON: You have to ask him
14	direct because you're not sworn in, it's not time for
15	you to testify at this point.
16	MR. GAHAGAN: Okay.
17	JUDGE PEARSON: So just you can ask him
18	questions.
19	MR. GAHAGAN: Okay.

4	A. Yes.
5	Q. Okay. And do you also recall that you had
6	stated where you believed that I had did fill it out
7	correctly?
8	A. At that time, I did believe that, yes.
9	Q. Okay. Do you also recall me I forgot what I
10	was going to say. Do you also recall me calling you
11	back after I was denied and stating that the court had
12	stated or UTC had stated that I was dishonest on my
13	application?
14	A. Yes, I recall that.
15	Q. Okay. And do you believe that I was dishonest
16	on the application when I had spoke to you regarding my
17	charges?
18	A. I suppose I can't speak to your honesty, but the
19	letter that you included with your application included
20	many things you did not put into the application itself.
21	So I believe there could have been some confusion
22	perhaps.
23	Q. And do you also remember a conversation we had
24	about that confusion?

A. Yes.

1	Q. Okay. And you had stated or how can I say
2	this. There was confusion around what I should be
3	putting down on the application based off of what it
4	states on the application to put down, correct?
5	A. I remember you saying that, yes.
6	Q. Okay. And so I had spoke to you about the
7	robbery charges that I had, and you believed only the
8	things that were on the application you should put on
9	the application, correct?
10	A. I do not believe that, because the application
11	States in question No. 10 (as read) violation of state
12	laws or Commission rules, name anyone named in this
13	application has been cited for violation of state laws,
14	and that would include other things beyond just those
15	five that are listed in question No. 9.
16	Q. Okay. But do you also recall I did ask you if I
17	should put the robbery charge down on there and then you
18	had stated no, you didn't think so?
19	A. I do not recall that.
20	Q. Okay. Do you also recall me speaking to you
21	about anything over five years that I wouldn't have to
22	list on there?
23	A. I remember we had a conversation that Commission
24	reserved the right to include things prior to five years

in our decision.

1	Q. Okay.
2	A. I don't recall saying do not put anything prior
3	to five years on the application.
4	Q. Okay. Do you
5	MR. GAHAGAN: Can I have a moment just to
6	look at my notes, please?
7	JUDGE PEARSON: Sure.
8	MR. GAHAGAN: Thank you.
9	JUDGE PEARSON: So, Mr. Gahagan, while
10	you're looking through your notes, I have a clarifying
11	question from Judge O'Connell for Mr. Dotson.
12	So just just to clarify, the application
13	came in first followed by the letter or was the letter
14	part of the application?
15	MR. DOTSON: I believe the letter was part
16	of the application.
17	JUDGE PEARSON: Initially?
18	MR. DOTSON: Yes.
19	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
20	MR. DOTSON: I think it came all in a
21	packet.
22	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you.

25	was you did state just a minute ago that there was

And I'm sorry, I'm not used to questioning, so this is difficult for me, so I apologize.

20	Q.	During what period of time was Mr. Gahagan	
21	inca	rcerated?	
22	A.	From January 19, 2010, to March 8, 2017.	
23	Q.	Does the email also state how long Mr. Gahagan	
24	was	on community supervision?

A. Yes.

1	Q.	During what period of time was Mr. Gahagan on	
2	subject to community supervision?		
3	A.	March 8th, 2017, to September 7th, 2018.	
4	Q.	After reviewing the application and conducting	
5	the b	ackground check, did Staff have any concerns	
6	rega	rding AmericaM's application?	
7	A.	Yes.	
8	Q.	What were those concerns?	
9	A.	Just the the length of the offenses, the	
10	seve	rity of the charges that had been listed on the	
11	Wato	h report.	
12	Q.	And what specifically in the Watch report was	
13	cond	erning to Staff?	
14	A.	I think I would say that all criminal charges	
15	can b	pe concerning, but a primary concern were probably	
16	the fe	elonies; unlawful imprisonment, assault, robbery,	
17	poss	ession of firearm, and then taking motor vehicle	
18	withc	out permission.	
19	Q.	And why are the firearm convictions concerning	
20	to St	aff?	
21	A.	The Commission is responsible for ensuring	
22	cons	umer protection. Obviously a charge involving a	
23	weap	oon is concerning for safety reasons for the	
24	cons	umers.	
25	Q.	And similarly, why was the robbery conviction	

1	concerning for Staff?		
2	A.	The application has an area that lists theft.	
3	Robbery is, I guess, more severe than theft, and		
4	obvic	ously un potentially unsupervised access to	
5	consumers' homes is concerning as it relates to robbery.		
6	Q.	And why was the unlawful imprisonment conviction	
7	cond	erning to Staff?	
8	A.	Again, consumer protection.	
9	Q.	And based on these concerns, how did Staff	
10	initia	lly resolve AmericaM's application?	
11	A.	Can you clarify the question?	
12	Q.	What was the outcome of Staff's review of	
13	Ame	ricaM's application?	
14	A.	Staff issued a notice of intent to deny the	
15	appli	cation.	
16	Q.	Did the fact that AmericaM stated that it is	
17	willir	ng to use body cameras influence Staff's review of	
18	the c	ompany's application?	
19	A.	No.	
20	Q.	And why did it not?	
21	A.	Essentially, the Commission doesn't require body	
22	cams	and thus couldn't not require them if an	
23	appli	cation were granted. It's not a it has no	
24	beari	ng on the on the decision.	
25	Q.	And so when you say the Commission could not

1	require, could you explain that a bit more?
2	A. The Commission has certain laws that it enforces
3	related to safety consumer protection such as estimates,
4	bills of lading, things of that nature, tariff and rate
5	requirements. It doesn't have the type of equipment,
6	for example, here that's a requirement.
7	Q. And so if the company decided to no longer use
8	cameras in the future, could Staff require the company
9	to use cameras?
10	A. No.
11	MR. FUKANO: No further questions for
12	Mr. Perkinson at this time.
13	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you.
14	Mr. Gahagan, do you have any questions for
15	Mr. Perkinson?
16	
17	EXAMINATION
18	BY MR. GAHAGAN:
19	Q. Regarding just like charges in general, does the
20	Staff allow companies to hire people with records?
21	A. So we would need to know about any person named
22	in the application that has convictions. That's
23	essentially what we ask and what we review.
24	Q. No, I understand that, but a company that is in
25	operation, any moving company that you guys give a

1	permit to, do they allow people to hire people with
2	convictions?
3	A. No. Our Staff would visit a company during
4	whether it be consumer protection intervention or
5	investigation or safety investigation and we'd review
6	all the company files and records. In that, we would
7	check for any individuals employed by the company that
8	have an offense listed in the Washington Administrative
9	Code 480-15-555.
10	Q. So is there is there individuals probably
11	currently right now with charges maybe similar to mine
12	that would be hired that are working for companies in
13	Washington State?
14	A. I'm not sure. Like I said, what we do is we
15	check when we visit companies, ask them to provide us
16	information about their employees.
17	Q. Okay. So it's a possibility, then?
18	A. Anything's possible, yep.
19	Q. Okay. Thank you.
20	A. Sure.
21	JUDGE PEARSON: Is that all?
22	MR. GAHAGAN: I believe so, yes. Thank you.
23	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So you're going to
24	have a chance to testify in just a moment, but Judge
25	O'Connell has some guestions for Mr. Perkinson. So

BY JUDGE PEARSON:

- Q. Okay. So, Mr. Perkinson, if you could refer to page 2 of Exhibit MP-2. Let me know when you're there.
 - A. Okay.

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- Q. So just want to confirm at the bottom of the page that the conviction for first-degree robbery was actually attempt?
- A. Yes, that's correct.
- Q. Okay. Thank you.
- Okay. And, Mr. Perkinson, what do you know about the events that occurred that led to Mr. Gahagan's charges and convictions, in particular the events surrounding the assault two conviction?
- A. My understanding, and I could probably let Mr. Gahagan state his case when he comes on.
- Q. We'll get to him. We just want to know what you know.
- A. Sure. Well, in this letter, he expressed that there was some things going on in his life that led him down a bad path and he made some bad decisions at the time, which ultimately resulted in -- in this case, a

group of felonies against him and that he's doing his
best to rehabilitate himself and get his life on track
is my general sense of

Q. Okay. Did you look into the case history or the facts surrounding the convictions?

A. I -- I did a Google search and read some news articles about the -- what happened. I took those somewhat as opinions of the news and relied solely on facts in the Watch report, which, you know, as you can see here lists the conviction, the title of the conviction, less about the events that actually took place other than what Mr. Camano [sic] introduced in a letter and what he spoke to.

Q. Okay. So can you tell us what is the -- about the specific convictions what is the nature and extent of those convictions that causes Staff concern?

A. So I -- again, I would go back to the Commission has responsibility to protect consumers. There is obviously concerns with the nature of some of the convictions and the offenses that happened in that the company, like any household goods company, has potentially unsupervised access into residents' homes, which could be vulnerable -- vulnerable populations, people that are alone individually. They were -- these particular offenses were quite egregious in my opinion.

1	They stood out as very serious.
2	And does that answer your question?

8	does Staff consider any letters submitted with
9	applications to be part of the application?
LO	A. I think they would. They would with any
L1	company that submits an application, if it's deemed to
L2	be incomplete, they would provide technical assistance
L3	and try to clarify. So yeah, they would accept that.
L4	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you.
L5	Mr. Fukano, do you have any redirect?
L6	MR. FUKANO: No, not at this time.
L7	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
L8	MR. GAHAGAN: Your Honor, may I ask a

20	JUDGE PEARSON: Of Mr
21	MR. GAHAGAN: Am I allowed to redirect?
22	JUDGE PEARSON: Perkinson?
23	MR. GAHAGAN: Yes.

1	JUDGE PEARSON: Why don't you go ahead and	
2	ask the question, and then if Mr. Fukano has an	
3	objection, he can voice it.

5	EXAMINATION	
6	BY MR. GAHAGAN:	
7	Q. Is it true that people with like theft charges	
8	and charges of that nature after five years are still	
9	allowed to work within a moving company?	
10	A. There's a so the Commission has five years	
11	that it looks at and then there's an exception to the	
12	rule that allows the Commission or Commission Staff to	
13	consider other charges outside of the five-year period.	
14	Q. So is that true, then?	
15	A. Is what true?	
16	Q. Is it true that after five years charges similar	
17	to theft are they're allowed to work for the moving	
18	companies?	
19	A. I'm not sure how to answer the question, I'm	
20	sorry. So Staff looks at the totality of the	
21	circumstances including all the violations that are	
22	within the five years. Any exceptions outside of that	

five years, is it possible that a moving company employs

somebody with a theft conviction beyond five years
 currently; is that the question?

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EXAMINATION OF PERKINSON / GAHAGAN

Q. Yes.

JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Hold on one second, Mr. Perkinson. Judge O'Connell wants to clarify something.

Okay. So what Judge O'Connell wants me to express is that he is familiar with the Commission's rules and the standards for entry, and that for certain specified crimes in the rule that occurred within the last five years, there is an absolute bar to granting an application for household goods authority. For those same crimes that occurred five years and one day or more in the past, then it's within the Commission's discretion on a case-by-case basis to decide whether or not to grant the application based on the nature and extent of the crimes.

MR. GAHAGAN: No, I -- I understand the application part. I apologize. I was referring to individuals who are working for the moving companies that are looking to be hired. As long as it's five years -- that's what was expressed to us when we went out to Yakima, anyone over five years as long as it's past five years, that they can go ahead and work for a moving company as long as it's been past five years for charges such as theft and those things.

JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. I understand your

1	question.
2	MR. GAHAGAN: I apologize. I probably
3	didn't eloquently state it correctly, and so I apologize
4	for that.
5	JUDGE PEARSON: That's fine. Is there
6	anything else?
7	MR. GAHAGAN: No, that's it.
8	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Is Staff ready for
9	Mr. Gahagan to present his testimony?
10	MR. FUKANO: Yes, Staff is prepared.
11	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. All right. So,
12	Mr. Gahagan, okay, go ahead and stand and raise your
13	right hand, and I will swear you in.
14	(Camano Gahagan sworn.)
15	JUDGE PEARSON: Please be seated. Okay.
16	So, Mr. Gahagan, you can go ahead and just explain your
17	side of the story whenever you're ready.
18	MR. GAHAGAN: Well, first of all, obviously
19	I can't make any excuses for the crimes that I've
20	already committed. That human being was very immature,
21	selfish, and at that time, I was an addict of either
22	alcohol or opioid use. Since then, I've done a lot, a
23	lot to rehabilitate myself. Started with education
24	while I was in prison. I took every minute I could to
25	educate myself. That's what part of these documents

1 here that I wanted to present, which would be Exhibit A, 2 was my education. 3 I first started with my GED in county jail. 4 From there, I moved over to Peninsula College, and then 5 I started small business management. And from there, I 6 started doing building maintenance technology, I did 7 bookkeeping, I did business marketing, I did QuickBooks. 8 From -- I also did building maintenance technology. 9 From there, I went to Walla Walla Prison and I got my 10 associate's of arts degree. I also got my welding 11 certificate and my degrees in that also. I also got 12 siding, and I also was certified in a forklift. 13 JUDGE PEARSON: So before you go on, I -- I 14 forgot to say at the beginning that I have removed the 15 confidential exhibits from the exhibits that you 16 offered, and I have set them up here on the bench. And 17 so when you want to refer to them, we will look at them 18 and then we will give them back to you. 19 MR. GAHAGAN: Okay. 20 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay? 21 MR. GAHAGAN: I just -- I just knew when I 22 went to prison I wanted to be a changed man. I knew 23 that the person that I was I did not like. I didn't 24 like who he was. I didn't like what I was, where I was

going with my life. I didn't want to be a

1	disappointment anymore to my mother, to my family, to my
2	friends, and most importantly to myself. So I took it
3	upon myself to take action, and instead of just standing
4	there and not doing anything and sulking and blaming
5	other people and never taking responsibility, I took it
6	upon myself to take action and do something. That was
7	the only thing I could do during that time.
8	So that's why I started educating myself.
9	And during that time, I fell in love with business. I
10	fell I fell in love with just the idea of being an
11	entrepreneur, owning something, waking up every day and
12	having something a new challenge to face you.
13	Something that you can make a change in your life and in
14	other people's lives, and that was something I really
15	wanted to do. So I just I I moved in that
16	direction.
17	After I was released from prison, I
18	maintained that. I stayed out of trouble. I was
19	released from probation early. I went to anger
20	management class. I took Thinking for a Change, I
21	completed that. I also did a drug and alcohol program
22	and I completed that. It's been almost three years now
23	since my release, and I have not had one interaction
24	with law. I have stayed completely out of trouble.
25	It's going over 11 years now that I've been sober from

1	any substances. And I maintain my sobriety because it's
2	more of a meaningful life to live, and I love it. I
3	love knowing who I am because before that, I didn't know
4	who I was. I always tried to fit in. I always tried to
5	belong in a crowd, and I always put myself in the wrong
6	place with the wrong people. And I knew that wasn't me.
7	And so I I worked. I worked hard to
8	change, and that's why I got into this because it meant
9	something to me. And I'm not that man. I'm not that
L0	man anymore.
L1	JUDGE PEARSON: We can give you a moment if
L2	you need it.
L3	MR. GAHAGAN: I don't know where to go next.
L4	I apologize. I'm not used to this.
L5	So from my education, I don't know if you
L6	guys have seen the various things that I have here.
L7	Obviously to see my certificates that I completed,
L8	sorry.
L9	JUDGE PEARSON: You don't have to apologize.
20	MR. GAHAGAN: I got personal letters showing
21	that I was an outstanding student. I finished with a
22	3.84 degree, which I was very proud of. I dropped out
23	of high school at the age of 14, and I didn't take
24	education seriously because at the time, I didn't care.
25	I didn't care about anything. I didn't care about

1	myself, my family, my friends. I was a very selfish
2	human being. But when I got back into it, I found out I
3	loved it, I loved learning, and so I continued it.
4	I'll move to the next thing. You can see
5	here that I also completed the anger management class,
6	which would be Exhibit B, Thinking for a Change. I had
7	Kara Norsworthy write in there for me about everything
8	that we went through. We went through social skills,
9	problem solving, how to deal with certain situations,
10	especially stressful situations. And I got a lot from
11	that class on how to like just coping skills and
12	things, how to just like break away. And like working
13	on yourself, just continuing to work on yourself, real
14	life situations. And I completed that class.
15	I also did a drug and alcohol class, which
16	was my actual second time of doing a drug and alcohol.
17	I had done that earlier in my life. About like 2004 I
18	had completed a class after I had gotten in trouble, and
19	I realized alcohol was just it was a major flaw in my
20	life. Like it made me do a lot of stupid stuff.
21	And so after that, I'd actually cleaned up.
22	If you see my record, it was very sporadic from the age
23	of 17 to like twenty I think it was -2 or -3. I had a
24	bunch of charges and then after that, I didn't have any.
25	Then I got injured, and during that injury, I got

1	prescribed Oxycontin. And I had quit drinking up to
2	that point. I was I was sober for I think it was
3	almost like four or five years from alcohol, and then I
4	got I got injured and the doctor prescribed me it was
5	Percocets at first and then from Percocets it went from
6	Oxycontin
7	JUDGE PEARSON: Can you speak into your
8	microphone?
9	MR. GAHAGAN: I apologize.
LO	JUDGE PEARSON: That's okay.
L1	MR. GAHAGAN: And I moved back from
L2	Colorado, and I seen another pain specialist, and he
L3	continued prescribing me Oxycontins. And that was the
L4	medical records that I provided there just to show
L5	proof. I was overly prescribed. I mean, he was giving
L6	me 80 90 80s a day along with 90 Perc 15s, I mean,
L7	for a month like for my back pain. Like and that's just
L8	unheard of, you know. Like and I didn't know the
L9	addictive state that it was. It was never told to me, I
20	wasn't informed. Along with a lot of other people, we
21	weren't told, you know.
22	And that was some of the other documents
23	that I brought was about the opioid cris the crisis
24	that, you know, struck our nation and especially
25	Washington State where Governor I think it was Ferguson

1	or Inslee. I can't remember which one it was to be
2	honest, but he actually had sued the pharmaceutical
3	companies because of the fact that they were
4	deliberately pumping it into our system and selling them
5	knowing the addictive qualities that they had.
6	So ended up getting hooked on those. And I
7	think it was in July it was in August, I believe, or
8	in July I asked to be weaned off of them because I knew
9	I had had a problem, I knew I was becoming dependent on
10	them, and so I asked them to wean me off. He ended up
11	cutting me off the next month and sending me to a pain
12	specialist for Suboxone. At that time, I didn't have
13	any insurance, so I couldn't cover the cost for the
14	Suboxone. So what I did is I started buying them
15	illegally.
16	And like a fool, I continued my use because
17	I was an addict and was I picking up my old behaviors.
18	And one thing led to another, I ran into an old crowd
19	from my past, and that individual led me into the three
20	charges that you see that are egregious, like he said.
21	I don't know where in the right mind I was to think it
22	would be okay to rob a drug dealer, but at that time, I
23	wasn't I wasn't in the right state of mind. I was
24	controlled by a substance.

And we went and -- went and robbed a drug

dealer and his girlfriend in a parking lot. Like who
does that? Who even I mean, who's I can't even
excuse that behavior. And it went wrong, you know, and
it was the worst decision of my life. I hate myself for
it. But and in a way I look at it, it was my saving
grace because I lost two friends to OD and who knows
about me. I could have followed behind them. But most
importantly it changed me. It sent me away and I needed
that. I needed that time away to find who I was, and
during that time I did.
l guess l'll I would like to make some
points that, one, yes, I do have those convictions. I
do have an assault four, I do have a gun charge, I have
the second gun charge involved with robbery. I did not
have a gun. I was an accomplice to a gun. I was with
him. It doesn't change anything because I was with him,
but I don't pack guns. I don't carry guns. I don't
want anything to with guns or be around them.
But I wanted to make some points and say
that none of my charges have ever involved a customer.

But I wanted to make some points and say that none of my charges have ever involved a customer. None of my charges are a fraud. Besides the robbery charge, I don't have any theft, I don't have any identity thefts. I've been entrusted throughout many of jobs doing remodeling, working for a medical supply company. Recently, I was working for Optimar as a

1	mana as a warehouse manager. I've been entrusted
2	with credit card information, Social Security card
3	information, banking information, expensive equipment
4	and never have I ever had an allegation, a charge, or
5	anything brought up about me in a negative way when I've
6	had that information. I would never do anything with
7	the client's information. That's not the person I am.
8	I'm not a I'm not a thief. I don't believe in that.
9	So I'd like I want to make that apparent
10	that if you guys did give me the opportunity, that would
11	be one thing you guys would not have to be concerned
12	about is I would never steal from a customer. I would
13	never take their identity, I would never do anything of
14	that nature.
15	I have statements here that I if you guys
16	wouldn't mind that I could read from people that wrote
17	character statements for me that I've worked with
18	recently that I've done work for as a handyman, that
19	I've also worked for the companies and for like
20	customers also just stating their experiences with me
21	and everything. I don't know if that's okay or is that
22	relevant?
23	JUDGE PEARSON: That's fine. They're
24	already in the record
25	MR. GAHAGAN: Okay.

1	JUDGE PEARSON: so if you just want to
2	highlight specific things.
3	MR. GAHAGAN: Yeah, I'm not going to read
4	the whole thing.
5	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
6	MR. GAHAGAN: I wouldn't read that I
7	wouldn't do that.
8	One this one right here is with Carso
9	[phonetic]. This was from Heidi. We actually before
10	we had got the permit, before I even found out that you
11	guys even existed, which I didn't even know, and once I
12	did, I went and applied for a permit. We had moved one
13	company and was actually it was commercial, which I
14	found out you can do. But she noted in here, she said
15	(as read) What I appreciated about most was Camano's
16	honesty. During the move, there was an incident where
17	one of our our cabinets got a small amount of damage
18	on the backside. The damage was minor, but Camano
19	offered to fix and reimburse Carso for the damage. I
20	informed him that there was no need for any
21	reimbursements since the cabinet was still usable and
22	the damage was not visible. I appreciate his honesty,
23	especially since we would have never known of the damage
24	unless he had mentioned it.
25	Becky Summers, (as read) Camano is always

1	warm, always there with a positive attitude and smile.
2	He's generous in the services he provides. He's
3	trustworthy, honest, and cares about the people, and his
4	quality of work has been appreciated. Camano has
5	success written all over his endeavors, and his
6	willingness to help and love in serving and helping
7	others is inspiring and appreciated.
8	She's a real estate agent who I do work for
9	from time to time doing handy work or whatever, and I'm
10	inside some of her clients' homes and stuff.
11	l also have Elizabeth or here, l'll read
12	Elizabeth Basir who owns Perso Properties. She
13	mentioned where is she at? (As read) I was out of
14	town. I sent pictures to my tenant and he said he did a
15	great job. And he had gotten done he had done
16	getting the place looking great again.
17	I can go on about these other ones, like
18	Ryan here, who was my logistics manager at at
19	Optimar, he wrote, (as read) Although we were aware of
20	Camano's past record, we still felt confident in
21	trusting him with access to expensive parts, vendors's
22	accounts, company credit cards, patents, and other
23	important company information. At no time did we ever
24	have an incident involving Camano in the workplace.
25	I worked there for about a vear or so.

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Jason Helen, he owns Westland Construction, and I work with him from time to time. He says, (as read) I trust Camano with my customers and inside their homes. I've given Camano the alarm code or keys to several of my customers' remodels and with the customers still living in most of those homes. Never have I received complaints about Camano nor has anything ever came up missing.

And also Chuck, my -- my PO officer, he wrote, (as read) We had the pleasure of working with Camano -- or he said, (as read) He was a pleasure to work with. Was always punctual for appointments and he made himself available for contacts. He had zero violations and he was released from probation early.

That was my probation officer, Chuck Carter.

I was scheduled for 36 months of probation and they released me after a year based off my behavior.

Marcy Smith who works at the Bothell Fire

Department, she said, (as read) When I found myself in
need to help move a large sectional couch that I was
donating to a single mom, Camano offered to serve me
free of charge, and even though it was a free service,
Camano and his staff were exceptionally professional and
treated their donation of time and -- and resources as
if it was of a high paying customer.

What I'm trying to say is that I have been entrusted with people's property, with their personal information, inside their homes, and never has an incident ever happened nor would it. I'm an honest man. I have made a lot of mistakes, that is true, but that person that I was is no longer. And I'm just -- I'm just trying to make an honest living for -- for my family and for myself. I want something I can be proud of. I want my family to be proud of me.

I don't want to -- to leave a legacy of just a man that was in the paper for a robbery charge, you know. When I'm -- my obituary is written, I want to be remembered for something a lot more, something that's rememberable for good that -- helping somebody or -- or helping others. I just -- I just want more than what was, and I still feel there's plenty of time to write a new story and tell that.

I don't know, I would like to maybe make also how important this company is to me, to Rianna, to Lupe, to Lady. We -- we've put our hearts into this. We've -- we've taken so much time just looking into all the little fine details. We took a truck -- we bought a truck, we stripped it, we took it to its bare bones, we repainted it, we put new vinyl decals on it, we put just all the love that we could into that truck. I built my

own website. I knew nothing about computers. I'm terrible when it comes to them, but it took me two months, but I built my open website, which I'm very proud of.

Some of these pictures, I don't know if you guys have them there, but you can see the truck here. The before pictures and the after pictures and how professional we tried to make it so that way we can, you know, offer the best service possible to customers out there. You can see us working on it here. You can see us here, you know, representing, you know, our love for the troops. You know, we -- we really would like to be able to offer service where, you know, we can give a good discount for the troops and reward them for serving our country. I mean, that's important to us.

We also offer service to seniors. The picture right here is of Lisa. We moved their chair upstairs for them free of charge because they needed help and they didn't have somebody, so we did that.

Back there is Heidi, that's who -- Carso, we moved them, and that's a picture of us.

And the body cams, that was an idea I came up with. I didn't -- I don't know how relevant it is.

I know the reason I thought about it was for, you know, upscale customers, I guess, people in like tech firms or

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people who have like merchandise that they want to keep a closer eye on, I thought it could be added on as an additional service, something that's new and innovative that's different that -- I mean, we can't -- we can't record voice or anything like that, but you can record still pictures and -- and everything like that in the state of Washington. But it would be something that they could watch live if they wanted to or go back if there was an incident with, you know, anything being broken or anything, we can just easily rewind and go over that and figure out what happened and then pay for it accordingly. And it's just transparent. It's open and in our market, in our world, we're moving toward a more technologically based market. So that was something, if possible, we would move forward with if we were granted the permit today. And backside there is the cameras again. We also have what is a cargo cam that we were going to install in the back of the cargo haul there so that way we could keep track of, you know -- for training purposes for new employees where we're training them and making sure that they're doing everything correctly and they're handling

the property correctly. Also for any incidents that

missing, God forbid, but that -- that's more of what

happen, anything like that, or even if anything came up

that is for.

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We also have GPS on our truck so that way customers can like track the arrival times of their stuff if they choose to. That was something else that we wanted to provide. We do home safety proofing. We -- when we enter the customer's home, obviously we come in there, we give the greeting, we assess everything, and then we go ahead and we start proofing their home. We lay mats down on the floors and -- which are these exercise mats that puzzle together really well. It's something I came up with, I thought would work well. And then we use these ram jam covers for the doorways, make sure that nothing gets dinged up or the doors don't get dinged up. That goes along with protecting their banisters and their walls and whatever else they do.

Also got a little language translator in case a customer ever had difficulty, you know, we -- we couldn't understand them all that well, then we have that available to be able to speak to the customer back and forth and so that way we could hear what they -- what their needs are and better understand them. We had bought a shirt press to press our own shirts, which we have with our logo, which is AmericaM. And that's us and you see everyone wearing them here today, you know,

showing their support.

We have eco-friendly bins. I mean, we've put so much time into this, our hearts. And then I have a packet here, it's our website, and that just offers everything in here. You can see in there that the services we offer, everything from residential and commercial to our shop room cams is what we call them, and we offer delivery pickups and stuff like that, just anything they need. And junk removal, you know, that's another thing that we offer. And it's very well detailed. Scored very well on the website, which I was surprised. I got a really good thumbs up. I was proud of that. So that's something else I was going to present to the Court there.

And then going back to -- I came across it
here. Going back to Mike Dotson, when I spoke to him, I
had sent him the letter and I -- I was trying to be
honest. I -- I honestly was. I believe you have to
take accountability and credibility for everything in
life. I had spoke to him about, you know, which I said
if it was past ten years, you need not to worry about
it. And I asked him, Well, if it's a robbery charge,
what about that?

And he's like, Well, then they're going to probably -- what they'll do is go back and look at your

1 other record.

I said -- and I said, Well, I have other charges.

And he's like, Well, it just -- it depends on what the charges are and everything.

And I was like, All right. So should I go ahead and move forward with putting in my application?

He's like, If you want to.

Because I could have easily just put it in her name, I guess, and tried to hide myself or whatever, but I didn't want to do that. I wanted to be honest, I wanted to be forthright, I wanted it to be in my name, I wanted to be a part of it. And so when I had spoke to Mr. Dotson, I had asked him did I fill this out correctly because it -- I had the charges, said list the charges, and I read him the charges and I said does it mean any charges. I did not mention about my unlawful imprisonment. I'll be honest about that. I did not mention that to him, but it was not on that list and that's why I did not mention it to him. But I look back at it now and I should have mentioned it to him, you

And -- and so he said, From what I can tell, you only need -- you only need to list your

know, but I really wanted to be a part of this, and I

was hoping that I could be a part of this.

1	second-degree assault charge. And he had that letter,
2	and he could have told me to list the robbery charge.
3	And admitted there was confusion and he admitted that he
4	didn't know why he didn't tell me not to list the
5	robbery charge, but I was honest with him. I was not
6	trying to hide anything from him. I knew what my record
7	was, I knew it would be shown.
8	And then there is also I know that they
9	were mentioning that there was a couple of charges of
10	gun charges. There was just the the two, that was
11	it. The other one was a brass knuckles charge. It
12	was I had it and he had listed as a firearms
13	dangerous weapon, but here nor there, it's still on my
14	rap sheet, I know.
15	And then the other documents I just I had
16	here, you guys see is my J and S because originally he
17	said something about that you guys had me listed as
18	kidnapping, but it wasn't kidnapping. An unlawful
19	imprisonment is just if you move somebody, you know,
20	three feet can be kidnapping or if you if you hold
21	someone for a minute, that could be unlawful
22	imprisonment. We we didn't do either. I'm not
23	excusing what I did, it was wrong, but I don't know.
24	Let me see what else I had in here. I just
25	put some other things also I added in here because of

1	the the weight in this permit and getting up here to
2	this point, I had had to take on another job as a
3	temporary means to make money for us, and that job is
4	working at Kitchen Plus right now. And, again, that's
5	working inside customer homes. I'm working for a
6	remodeling company, and we are left in homes all the
7	time unattended.
8	I think that covers everything here that I
9	had. I'm here to answer any questions truthfully and
10	honestly that you guys have. Anything after that, I
11	think that's it for right now.
12	JUDGE PEARSON: We're conferring about these
13	confidential exhibits. So you did refer to the medical
14	records already, the or Judge O'Connell was wondering
15	if you wanted to talk about what was in the other
16	medical exhibit, the UA results?
17	MR. GAHAGAN: Oh, yes, thank you. Thank you
18	so much. Yeah, I wanted to show that I have been clean.
19	As you can see, my probation officer listed I had zero
20	violations. We were randomly UA'd all the time. And
21	the last one I just recently took another UA just so I
22	could present that to the Court to show that I am clean.
23	I felt that that might be important just to let you guys
24	know and prove because everything needs to be proved,
25	especially with someone with a rap sheet like mine, you

1	need as much proof as possible to show that I've changed
2	and I'm doing the right things. So I wanted to bring
3	that to the Court's attention also.
4	JUDGE PEARSON: Is the random one the one
5	that's on November 19th, 2019, or is that one that you
6	did on your own?
7	MR. GAHAGAN: Which "random" as in with
8	my my probation officer, that was when I went to and
9	I did it on my own.
LO	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
L1	MR. GAHAGAN: I went and had it done, yes.
L2	JUDGE PEARSON: Are you still on community
L3	custody?
L4	MR. GAHAGAN: No, I'm not.
L5	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
L6	MR. GAHAGAN: I was released in September of
L7	2018, I believe.
L8	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
L9	MR. GAHAGAN: Actually, sooner than that. I
20	was actually released I was released of supervised in
21	like March, and then I still had six more months of
22	community custody unsupervised, and that was completed
23	in '18.
24	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
25	MR. GAHAGAN: In September '18.

1	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So how what for
2	what time period and how long were you taking random UAs
3	and were those for your probation officer?
4	MR. GAHAGAN: For the entire year that I was
5	with him, I had to take random UAs with him.
6	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. How often?
7	MR. GAHAGAN: I would take at least one a
8	month.
9	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. What year was that?
10	MR. GAHAGAN: That was 2017.
11	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So it was immediately
12	after your release?
13	MR. GAHAGAN: Correct.
14	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Is there anything
15	else within these confidential exhibits that you would
16	like Judge O'Connell to take note of before we return
17	them to you?
18	MR. GAHAGAN: Just I just wanted to show
19	the medication that was given to me and what led up to
20	that that night and why that was relevant I thought.
21	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Judge O'Connell sees
22	that the exhibits support your testimony, so we can hand
23	them back to you at this time.
24	MR. GAHAGAN: Thank you.
25	JUDGE PEARSON: If you want to approach the

1	bench.
2	MR. GAHAGAN: Okay.
3	JUDGE PEARSON: And then, Mr. Fukano, if you
4	just want to supply those back to him at the end of the
5	hearing.
6	MR. FUKANO: Yes, we will return those
7	exhibits.
8	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. And so
9	MR. FUKANO: Pardon.
10	JUDGE PEARSON: I was going to bring up the
11	group exhibits under that are labeled M that you
12	haven't referred to, Staff had an objection to their
13	relevance to this case. So I don't know if you wanted
14	to explain why you wanted to offer those or just leave
15	it alone. It's up to you.
16	MR. GAHAGAN: The reason I I thought
17	about it, it was just the fact that this day and age,
18	convicted felons, like myself, are automatically
19	disbarred of any opportunities without not always,
20	but majority of the time, they're disbarred of any
21	opportunities without looking at the person's character
22	and what he has really done to change himself. And with
23	that, I felt like it was relevant to the fact that
24	that they are starting to change those laws and are
25	starting to show that first look at the person, look at

1	what his track record is, what he has done before you
2	make a hire, before you look into his into his
3	history, past history and stuff.
4	JUDGE PEARSON: Mr. Fukano, did you want to
5	respond to that now that you know the purpose for what
6	they're being offered?
7	MR. FUKANO: While Staff understands the
8	purpose, Staff would still maintain that they are not
9	strictly relevant to this proceeding insofar as the
10	Commission is not purporting to employ AmericaM or any
11	of the individuals listed in the application. So while
12	Staff would not object to some discussion of the perhaps
13	intent behind those measures, Staff does not believe
14	that they're appropriate evidence for the purpose of
15	this hearing.
16	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So Judge O'Connell
17	agrees with Staff, that this is not relevant to this
18	proceeding, so we're not going to admit the exhibit into
19	the record; however, he he wants me to let you know
20	that he understands the point that you're making with
21	respect to rehabilitation efforts for convicted
22	criminals. So your point is taken.
23	MR. GAHAGAN: Thank you.
24	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Mr. Gahagan, do you
25	have anything else that you want to present before we

1 ask Mr. Fukano if he has any questions for you? 2 MR. GAHAGAN: Just the fact that I know 3 moving companies, they hire a lot of people that do have 4 criminal records. There is a lot of gentlemen out there 5 that are working currently that are inside customer 6 homes that do have criminal records. I know one 7 company, I'm not going to name them, that is another 8 moving company, but he hires people with criminal 9 records. Just because your record reflects something 10 doesn't mean that that same person is going to commit 11 those crimes over and over again obviously. 12 So I -- I just wanted to say that, just 13 wanted to mention that. And I know that you guys have 14 the standard of five years and then to allow someone to 15 work within the companies after they've committed those 16 type of offenses. And so that's why I just wanted to 17 mention too that I would hope you guys would give me 18 that opportunity because mine has been over ten years 19 and I've done a lot to rectify my life. 20 JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you. 21 Mr. Fukano, do you have any questions for 22 Mr. Gahagan? 23 MR. FUKANO: I do. Just for the purpose of 24 clarity, I wanted to confirm which exact exhibits we

should ensure to return to the company at the conclusion

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JUDGE PEARSON: So that was everything labeled under Exhibit D, medical records, and everything under Exhibit F, urine analysis.

MR. FUKANO: Thank you.

- Q. Mr. Gahagan -- oh, sorry. Would you agree that the application as submitted due to confusion, potential confusion or otherwise, was incomplete?
- 12 A. As in listing the charges?

 - Q. And you would agree that you have a fourth-degree assault conviction?
 - A. I do. And, again, when I had spoke with Mr. Dotson, I honestly thought he said anything after five years wouldn't need to be listed unless it was something of a serious nature like my felonies. So that's why I didn't list that also, I apologize.
 - Q. And turning to your Exhibit B, Thinking for a

2	have addressed?
3	A. Let me find it again. Hold on. It's provided
4	necessary life skills oh, sorry. Providing necessary
5	life skills to participants in order to reduce
6	recidivism.
7	Q. Thank you.
8	Would you also care to explain with just perhaps
9	in a little bit little bit more detail Exhibit C
10	regarding the letter from Clint Gruger and the
11	completion of the drug and alcohol program?
12	A. Yeah, it was part of part of it was for my
13	DOC obligations. So I went in there as part of my DOC
14	obligations, I had to complete a drug and alcohol class.
15	So I completed a six-month course with them.
16	Q. And were there I know you've gone through
17	several of the character statements, but were there any
18	particular character statements that you would invite
19	kind of Staff's attention to?
20	A. The ones that I read just notating the fact that
21	I was inside other customers' homes, never had an
22	incident, always been honest. Like I had stated, I
23	don't have any crimes of dishonesty outside of that
24	robbery charge. So that was kind of what I was trying

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to get from there and just based off of what they feel

about me and my character.

MR. FUKANO: Thank you. No further questions.

JUDGE PEARSON: So, Mr. Gahagan, can you provide more detail about what happened on December 29th, 2008, that led to the 2010 conviction?

MR. GAHAGAN: I would rather not. Yes, I can. So like I alluded to earlier, I stopped getting my supply of narcotics or whatever, the opioids back in August of 2008, and so I started buying them illegally at that time. I ran into some old people that I had stopped hanging out with during that because those people travel in those circles. One of those individuals was RK.

After hanging out with him for a little while, he had approached me about the idea of robbing a drug dealer. And he was someone that he knew and he would set it up, and he said it would go easy and no one would get hurt and, you know, sold me on this spiel or whatever, and I wasn't thinking straight. I was thinking like an addict, and I didn't have any drugs at that time, and I was in need. I mean, drugs steal your soul. It takes everything from you, and it controls you, and it makes you do things you would never do.

So I agreed, and he set up the deal, and it

was at a Top Foods store. And we watched the individuals leave their vehicle, they went inside the store, and while they went in there, he was like let's climb in the back seat of the car. We climbed in the back seat of the car and waited for them to come back in. And that's when they opened up the door, his girlfriend, Laura-whatever, she jumped in the driver's side, and RK grabbed her and had his gun and told him, Devin, to get in the vehicle, which at that time Devin wouldn't get in the vehicle and -- which I wouldn't either.

Ran away from the scene, and she at the time

Was -- had a warrant for her arrest. He was calling the cops. She was high and she had drugs on her, and she started driving off with us in the vehicle. And so we started driving, and she's like where do you guys want to go, and the whole time we're like where's Devin, where does he stay at, you know. Like we were still like trying to get a way, a means to try to get the drugs, which is just crazy. Like the whole thing is just insane.

And so we continued to drive. She agreed to drop us off at the apartment complex down the road where we were kind of staying, and in the midst of all that, we -- they set up roadblocks all around for us, pulled

EXAMINATION OF GAHAGAN / FUKANO

JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So Judge O'Connell wants to know that if he looks at the public records and the case history, is it going to confirm the version of events that you just told him today or is there anything else you would like to add?

MR. GAHAGAN: Yeah, if you look at the events like within like the actual newspapers, the newspapers will read differently, because when they had the actual story come out or release before they had any inclination of what happened, they thought it was some woman just leaving the store buying her groceries that we kidnapped and tried to take her money for. But if you go back and you read the story -- or if you actually go into the dockets and see it, you will see exactly what I had stated is what happened.

JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Mr. Fukano, do you have any additional questions based off of Judge O'Connell's questions?

EXAMINATION

22 BY MR. FUKANO:

Q. Just to clarify, there was a firearm involved in the course of events that involved the robbery?

A. Correct.

1	Q. And how in what capacity was that involved?
2	A. RK and that's one thing also that I need to
3	mention. In the events of it, RK had the gun, and when
4	he was screaming at Devin to get in the vehicle, he was
5	telling him to get in the car, he fired off a round,
6	discharged a round inside the vehicle to try to scare
7	him to get in the car, and he didn't do that. Why would
8	you, but yes.
9	MR. FUKANO: No further questions from
10	Staff.
11	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Do you have any other
12	witnesses that you would like to call?
13	MR. GAHAGAN: If any of them would like to
14	speak on my behalf.

L9	helps me to become a better person with my family and
20	everything, personal, business-wise, everything.
21	He always looks for the positive no matter
22	what the outcome is. He's trying to get everyone around
23	him better. And I think if you guys grant this, it's
24	going to really show how good change can be in someone,
25	and he would be a perfect mascot for change. If you get

1	a picture for it, it would be a perfect one because he's
2	a real good person to have in the community. Everybody
3	has a past, yeah, but he learned from his.
4	JUDGE PEARSON: Did you know Mr. Gahagan
5	prior to his incarceration or did you meet him after?
6	MR. RIVAS: I met him afterwards.
7	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. How about, how many
8	years do you think you've known him?
9	MR. RIVAS: Feels like forever, but maybe
LO	three, something like that. It's hard to remember a
L1	time.
L2	JUDGE PEARSON: Sure.
L3	MR. RIVAS: I have six kids.
L4	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay.
L5	MR. RIVAS: So time just kind of goes in and
L6	out, you know.
L7	JUDGE PEARSON: Understood.
L8	How did you meet Mr. Gahagan?

4	girl, me and my my kids, my wife, and a friendship
5	built after that, a real strong one.
6	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Is there anything
7	else you want to add?
8	MR. RIVAS: No, that's it.
9	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Mr. Fukano, do you
LO	have any questions?

people can wake up every morning and be proud of what

And I don't want that taken from me. I don't know. It would be so hard. I know I'll recover and I'll still fight forward, but I know what I'm capable of, and I know I'm capable of doing a lot more.

And like I said, my story isn't finished, and I still

16 have a lot to write. And so I'm just asking you guys to

I play fantasy football. Every winter I do that, and in I'm two leagues. I work out. That's why I added that in there. I love going to the gym and just pumping some iron, getting some stress out and doing that.

And I'm a big family man. I was away from my family for a long time. So I have nieces and nephews. Recently, my brother just passed here in November, and so now I've taken kind of over the male figure role in his children's life. And so I'm a big part of all of their lives, and so I just try to be there as much as possible.

Also, my mom is disabled. She is partially blind, cataracts, she has diabetes and can't get around. So at least twice a week, I'm over there helping her clean up her house, I'm taking her grocery shopping, I'm running her errands and doing those things. So I have a

There is reference -- or a letter from his corrections officer talking about early release probation. There's documents relevant to him furthering his education while in prison.

He did provide some clarification about the firearm. One of the firearms charges was brass knuckles. While that's still important and significant, I think it's different than having a gun. He was -- he immediately replied after being contacted by the Commission. He's expressed a willingness to be open to any audit investigation. I think he's been honest today. There's several lists of other documents that support he's trying to improve himself, and he admits that he's made a mistake.

So from my perspective, I appreciate him being transparent today, and I understand that there is -- was a miscommunication with the application, and I guess with that, you know, I would put forth the

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Q. And what would your recommendation regarding the application be having reviewed the additional material?

A. So essentially, Staff would like a little bit more time for Mr. Gahagan to establish sort of a law enforcement or incident-free period of time. Two years from unsupervised provision would -- basically, our recommendation would be to stay -- deny the application currently, and after two years of unsupervised probation, which would be in September, allow the company to reapply.

MR. FUKANO: No further questions from Staff.

JUDGE PEARSON: So, Mr. Gahagan, we have a clarifying question for you.

Oh, start with Staff?

Okay. So Mr. Perkinson, clarifying question for you. When you talked about two years from the time that he was off of community custody, but you said supervised community custody, and Mr. Gahagan testified that he was on unsupervised community custody. Do you know the dates -- I think we're confused about which period was supervised and which period was unsupervised and -- and which date you want to count the two years from going forward.

MR. PERKINSON: So in Exhibit MP-4, the dates are listed to reflect that Mr. Gahagan was on community supervision until September 7th, 2018, at which point I take that to mean that he's no longer on community supervision and would like a period of two years from that date. So September 7th, 2020, would be two years not on community supervision.

JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So another clarifying question, Mr. Perkinson. Is Staff requesting that the company submit a new application in September or that the Commission hold off on finalizing consideration of the pending application until six months have passed? Is that -- is that your only concern with the application? So would you need him to refile and pay another fee or could Staff make its decision based on the application that's already been submitted after the six months?

MR. PERKINSON: Yeah, I think Staff would be willing to waive a fee. Not necessarily need the company to reapply. It is time that Staff is looking for to be able to further provide evidence that the company has a trustworthiness and no other infractions.

JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Mr. Gahagan, do you want to respond to Staff's recommendation and do you have any additional questions for Mr. Perkinson?

1	MR. GAHAGAN: No, it that that's a
2	fair recommendation, and I appreciate it. My only
3	the only problem is, is that we've put in a lot of money
4	to get this company started, so we have a lot of debt
5	accumulated from that. And during that time is going to
6	be like the hot season when you can make the most money.
7	On top of it, I also have insurance that we had to have
8	in order to even apply for the application, which has
9	already been almost six months that we've been paying
10	for, which is almost roughly, I don't know, two, three
11	grand, and then we would have to have to let go of that
12	insurance, and then we would have to reapply again for
13	the insurance, which then we would have to pay double
14	for the insurance again.
15	JUDGE PEARSON: Do you have any questions
16	for Mr. Perkinson?
17	MR. GAHAGAN: No, there's no questions for
18	Mr. Perkinson. I would like just outside I would
19	maybe ask maybe I could be on supervised or be on
20	probation for those six months and you guys allow us the
21	permit and we can be under some type of probation by you
22	guys monitoring us, just because of the insurance
23	reasons and how much money we have invested in this
24	company and everything. And then like I said, if we had

to wait for that time, then I would have to stop my

1	insurance, reapply, and it would just be an exorbitant
2	amount more money that we would have to put forward for
3	insurance.
4	JUDGE PEARSON: One moment. So,
5	Mr. Perkinson, Judge O'Connell wants to know what you
6	think of Mr. Gahagan's proposal. It sounds like what he
7	is seeking is a provisional permit under 480-15-302?
8	MR. PERKINSON: While I understand that
9	there are costs associated with having a business and
10	insurance and that the summer would be the best time to
11	get moves done and jobs secured, I guess Staff's
12	position would still be that there's a period of time
13	that they'd be more comfortable allowing it to pass
14	with.
15	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Mr. Perkinson, just
16	to clarify, is Staff's position that if nothing occurs
17	between now and September 7th, 2020, that Staff would
18	recommend granting the application at that time provided
19	that there are no further incidents?
20	MR. PERKINSON: I mean, I would like to
21	reserve the right to reevaluate the application, but
22	yes, assuming that there is no reason to deny the
23	application.
24	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So just to clarify
25	then, Staff is not ready to say for sure right now, you

1	would want additional review in September of 2020?
2	MR. PERKINSON: Yeah, we would review the
3	application as a new application, I guess. So we talked
4	about using the current application, correct, not
5	needing to
6	JUDGE PEARSON: Correct, so you would check
7	to make sure that everything was still in place as it is
8	today such as insurance and and all the other
9	requirements that have to be met?
10	MR. PERKINSON: Yes.
11	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. So in light of
12	Staff's changed recommendation, Mr. Gahagan, we want to
13	give you another opportunity to make any closing remarks
14	at this time.
15	MR. GAHAGAN: Like I said, I would just hope
16	that the Court takes into consideration first of all,
17	I would like to thank Mr. Perkinson and Fukano for
18	giving us that opportunity to at least review our
19	application. That means a lot. I really do appreciate
20	that. Thank you.
21	The hardship of waiting six more months
22	would be tremendous. Like I said, I'm in debt right
23	now. I've put my life savings. Me and Rianna put a lot
24	of money into this. The hot season is during that time.
25	I completely understand where they're coming from, and

1	it's just it would be such a hardship. I'm just
2	trying right now we're struggling, and to be able
3	to to be able to start this business, that means my
4	website would have to shut down, phone lines,
5	everything. I'd have to restart everything. We're
6	talking thousands of dollars to get it up and running
7	again. It's just that's a lot of money to get started
8	up again and try to pay for my bills on top of it to get
9	that money. I mean, all our money is into the business
10	right now plus debt.
11	So it would be it would be extremely hard
12	for us to get the the costs for the insurance because
13	then we have to put another big down payment, which is
14	like almost like a thousand dollars for just for the
15	insurance itself just to get that going. Which we've
16	already paid for insurance all the way back since we put
17	in the application, which was on I don't recall.
18	When was it? That was a while ago we put in the
19	application.
20	I've been paying insurance to keep it up and
21	running just so that way we could still get the
22	application because I know if you don't have the
23	insurance, then they can deny your application. So I've
24	been paying that out of my pocket every month in the

hopes that we would be granted that. And so that is a

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1	lot of money that we've already lost, which I'm willing
2	to eat because I want this business to succeed. It
3	would just be an extreme hardship to have to wait all
4	the way until September. That's when the season's over
5	and then we're going right into winter and not a lot of
6	jobs, harder to compete, and then to have to come up
7	with all that money again would just be really hard. I
8	would hope that there was another remedy that the Court
9	would come up with, but I leave it in your guys' hands
10	because that's all I can do.
11	JUDGE PEARSON: Mr. Fukano, did you want to
12	make a closing statement?
13	MR. FUKANO: Yes, I'll make a brief brief
14	closing.
15	As an initial matter, Staff would also like
16	to thank Mr. Gahagan and Ms. Davis for their
17	participation and patience through this process. Staff
18	greatly appreciates the ability to review to review
19	the additional material provided by the company today.
20	As you've heard from Staff, after reviewing
21	the materials, Staff still has some concerns regarding
22	the application. Staff's two primary concerns regarding
23	AmericaM application or has two primary concerns.
24	First, there was concern about the lack of certain
25	disclosure in the application form itself. Staff

1	acknowledges that there may have been some possible
2	confusion in various communication with Commission
3	Staff, but Staff would also still maintain that the
4	language of the application is clear enough to
5	understand what is required in terms of disclosure.
6	Second, Staff is also concerned by the
7	nature and extent of some of Mr. Gahagan's convictions.
8	Staff would again kind of note the assault convictions
9	and the firearm and dangerous weapon convictions. You
10	also heard Staff express concern regarding the rob
11	the attempted robbery conviction, which while not an
12	enumerated conviction, under Commission rules that will
13	cause the Commission to examine it more closely, does
14	have certain aspects of assault and property crime
15	contained within it. And so it does heighten Staff's
16	concern of that conviction.
17	And finally, Staff is additionally concerned
18	regarding the unlawful imprisonment conviction insofar
19	as a household goods company may have unsupervised
20	access to a person's home or in a home where there are
21	either a single person or otherwise vulnerable
22	individuals. Both of these concerns ultimately relate
23	to consumer protection goals, namely safety and security
24	of customers and their belongings.

Staff is also con- -- you've also heard

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1	Staff is concerned about the amount of time that
2	Mr. Gahagan has been out of custody and out free of any
3	community supervision or other post-incarceration
4	status. By Staff's calculation, Mr. Gahagan Gahagan
5	was under was incarcerated or under community
6	supervision for about eight years, seven months. He has
7	since been free of any incarceration or supervision for
8	approximately one year, five months. And that is at
9	least in partially informs Staff's recommendation
10	that the Commission should have the applicant wait until
11	two years after any post-incarceration supervision to
12	September of 2020.
13	And so in summary, Staff believes that based
14	on the concerns identified through this hearing and the
15	review process, that the Commission should deny the
16	application at this time.
17	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you.
18	Okay. So Judge O'Connell is going to take
19	official notice of the case history regarding the
20	convictions in 2010 to aid in his assessment of whether
21	the nature and extent of the crimes will interfere with
22	Mr. Gahagan's operation of a household goods company.
23	And then before we adjourn, Judge O'Connell
24	would like to request the parties waive the requirement
25	to issue an order within ten days. He would like to

1	have the transcript available to him when he's writing
2	the decision, and we usually receive the transcript
3	within seven to ten days. He anticipates that he would
4	issue an order within five business days from the date
5	that the transcript is received at the latest. Does
6	either party have an objection to waiving the ten-day
7	requirement?
8	MR. FUKANO: Staff waives.
9	MR. GAHAGAN: I have no I have no
10	problem.
11	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you.
12	Okay. Does either party have anything
13	further before we go off the record today?
14	MR. FUKANO: Nothing further from Staff.
15	MR. GAHAGAN: Nothing further.
16	JUDGE PEARSON: Okay. Thank you for coming
17	here today. We appreciate you coming and telling us
18	your side of the story, and I know that that was
19	emotional for you, so thank you for that. We appreciate
20	it. And we are adjourned and will be off the record.
21	Thank you.
22	(Adjourned at 3:55 p.m.)
