Thank you, everyone. Good evening. This is a hearing of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission to hear comments from the public on a proposal filed by Puget Sound Energy on May 25, 2022, for a new tariff schedule to cover to recover costs associated with the Tacoma liquefied national gas facility in compliance with the requirements of the commission's final order 24/10 of its general recent general rate case in Dockets UE-220066, UG-220067, and UG-210918. My name is Dave Danner. I am chair of the commission, and I am joined by my colleagues, Commissioner Ann Rendahl and Commissioner Milt Doumit. To give you a little background on what we're going to be discussing tonight, in the petition that Puget filed, they're seeking additional annual revenue of 47.6 million. And again, by way of background, the Tacoma LNG facility is a dual use project located at the Port of Tacoma. And it liquefies natural gas that can be vaporized and injected into PSE's gas distribution service to serve as a peaking resource for regulated gas

customers.

The LNG is also sold by Puget LNG, a wholly owned subsidiary of PSE's parent company, Puget Energy, to shipping customers on a nonregulated basis.

PSE states that at the end of 2022, the total capital costs of the Tacoma LNG project were 489 million, of which 243 million is proposed to be allocated to PSE's regulated customers.

In the last general rate case, the commission ruled that -- and I'm quoting -- PSE acted prudently in developing and constructing the Tacoma LNG facility up through the initial decision to authorize construction of the facility on September 22, 2016.

But it also -- the commission made clear that the parties may review and challenge the prudency of later construction operating costs in a future proceeding.

PSE seeks a determination from the commission that the costs it incurred after September 22, 2016, were prudent, and requests an additional 47.6 million in annual revenue to recover depreciation expense, return on their investment, and operations and maintenance expenses associated with the regulated portion of the facility.

PSE is also requesting recovery of capital costs, return on investment and operations and

I have been opposed to the LNG facility since before it was built. I really wish I didn't have to be a PSE customer, but unfortunately, I do. I am very against having to pay a rate increase to pay for the LNG plant that I am extremely opposed to.

I'm an environmental science major in school right now. And the effects of methane on our system is something I don't think is talked about enough. Methane is an extremely potent natural gas and greenhouse gas, and we should be doing everything in our power to stop any of it getting into our atmosphere, compounding on to the carbon that we're already putting in there.

The LNG plant is also built on Puyallup land. It's still in appeal from the Puyallup Tribe and Earthjustice because it's controversial and they didn't have the proper permits for it.
