# NOTICE OF PENALTIES INCURRED AND DUE FOR VIOLATIONS OF LAWS AND RULES

PENALTY ASSESSMENT: TV-170543 PENALTY AMOUNT: \$200

Quad Cities Moving & Storage, Inc. 1420 S. Main Street Moscow, ID 83843

According to Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (Commission) records, you have violated Washington Administrative Code (WAC) 480-15-480, which requires household goods carriers companies to file their annual report and pay regulatory fees each year by May 1. You did not file a complete annual report by May 1, 2017.

Revised Code of Washington (RCW) 81.04.405 authorizes the Commission to assess a penalty of \$100 for each violation of a Commission rule. In the case of a continuing violation, every day's continuance is a separate and distinct violation. The Commission interprets noncompliance with WAC 480-15-480 beyond May 1 as a continuing violation, and assesses penalties of \$100 for each day a company fails to file its complete report or pay its regulatory fees after that date.

As a result, the Commission has assessed penalties against you in the amount of \$200 on the following basis:

On February 28, 2017, the Commission sent the 2016 annual report forms and the 2017 regulatory fee packets to all household goods carriers companies registered in Washington. The instructions page for the annual report form instructed these companies to file complete annual reports and pay regulatory fees by May 1, 2017. The instructions page also stated that failure to file the complete annual report by May 1 would result in penalties. The deadline for requesting an extension to file your annual report was April 15. You did not request an extension.

On Monday, May 1, 2017, Quad Cities Moving & Storage, Inc. filed an incomplete 2016 annual report and paid its 2017 regulatory fee. Commission Staff contacted Quad Cities Moving & Storage, Inc. on Thursday, May 11, 2017 and advised Quad Cities Moving & Storage, Inc. that the annual report was incomplete. On Tuesday, May 16, 2017, Quad Cities Moving & Storage, Inc. filed its 2016 complete annual report. Tuesday, May 16, 2017 is more than 10 business days from May 1, resulting in a potential penalty of \$1000. The Commission, however, recognizes that the company made a good faith effort to file on time and to promptly submit a complete annual report. Accordingly, the Commission will assess a mitigated penalty of \$200.

Your penalty is due and payable now. If you believe the violation did not occur, you may request a hearing to contest the penalty assessment. The Commission will grant that request only if material issues of law or fact require consideration of evidence and resolution in a hearing. A request for a hearing must include a written statement of the reasons supporting that request. Failure to provide such a statement will result in denial of the request.

If there is a reason for the violation that you think should excuse or reduce the penalty, you may ask for mitigation (reduction) of this penalty through evidence presented at a hearing or in writing. The Commission will grant a request for a hearing only if material issues of law or fact require consideration of evidence and resolution in a hearing. Any request for mitigation must include a written statement of the reasons supporting that request. Failure to provide such a statement will result in denial of the request. See RCW 81.04.405.

The Commission will only grant requests for mitigation if the violations occurred due to circumstances beyond your control. Such circumstances include, but are not limited to: death or serious illness of the person responsible for filing the report, or a member of that person's immediate family; destruction by fire or other casualty of your place of business or business records; or an act of fraud, embezzlement, theft, or conversion on the part of your employee.

The following are examples of circumstances that are <u>not</u> considered be to beyond your control, and thus are not acceptable bases for requesting mitigation: financial hardship; a misunderstanding or lack of knowledge of Commission rules; failure to receive an annual report form from the Commission; mistakes or misconduct on the part of your employees; employee termination or turnover; personal events such as weddings or graduation ceremonies; and vacations or business trips.

If you properly present your request for a hearing and the Commission grants that request, the Commission will review the evidence supporting your dispute of the violation or application for mitigation in a Brief Adjudicative Proceeding, before an administrative law judge. The administrative law judge will consider the evidence and will notify you of his or her decision.

## You must act within 15 days after receiving this notice to do one of the following:

- Pay the \$200 due.
- Request a hearing to contest the occurrence of the violations.
- Request mitigation to contest the amount of the penalty.

**If you do not act within 15 days,** the Commission may refer this matter to the Office of the Attorney General for collection, which may file suit in state court to collect the penalty. The Commission may also initiate proceedings under WAC 480-15-450 to cancel your permit to operate as a household goods carrier in Washington.
