Per your letter of October 29, 1999, this is to confirm the interest of Door To Door Storage, Inc. in participating in the new rulemaking. As your files will reflect in the previous docket in this matter, TV-971477, Door To Door Storage, Inc. is a containerized self-storage business which provides transportation as an integral part of moving self-packaged commercial or household goods from a business or residence to a central storage location. Door To Door Storage utilizes conventional flatbed equipment to transport the containers which allows the transportation of customer-packed and sealed containers from various locations to Door To Door's central warehouse.

As the Commission would acknowledge, the exclusion of this specialized type of service has had longstanding recognition in Commission regulations and rulings. Indeed, previous regulation

As noted, no specialized household goods equipment is needed to move our customized containers.

Door To Door Storage thus feels that any change in WAC 480-15-020 to include "customer packed and sealed self-storage type containers" would reverse a longstanding precedent at the Commission and would be entirely contrary to the intent of the original rulemaking and the Governor's Executive Order mandate to make more customer choices available and would subject to regulation a new segment out of the industry which, under traditional definitional analyses, was always outside the ambit of Commission household goods regulation.

Door To Door Storage submits there is absolutely no justification for "repairing an unbroken wheel" by implementing an about-face on a definitional regulation that has served innovation in the industry so well. There is absolutely no evidence, other than what Door To Door believes are anecdotal conclusions by the traditional household goods industry that they are losing business to support any change in the regulation. Indeed, it appears that the motivation for advocating a


