RESPONSE:

As used in the context of Mr. Lazar's testimony, "discretionary uses" of natural gas means usage in excess of the amount of natural gas required to meet essential space heating and water heating needs of a small residential housing unit, assuming that efficient appliances are installed, cost-effective structure efficiency measures are employed, and reasonable conservation practices are used. The lowest-usage quartile of residential customers might be an appropriate measure of this.
