- (3) That during the 2018 calendar year, the Company maintained the ability to function in emergency situations under the standard found in WAC 480-123-030(1)(g), as such standard relates to functionality of wireline carriers in emergency situations; and
- (4) That during the 2018 calendar year, the Company publicized the availability of its applicable telephone assistance programs in a manner reasonably designed to reach those likely to qualify for service and in a manner which, in the Company's judgment, included advertisements likely to reach those who are not current customers of the Company within the Company's designated service area.

Kalama Telephone Company (the "Company") herby submits the following reports in accordance with WAC 480-123-070 and WAC 480-123-080.

1. <u>Report 1</u>: Report on use of funds: WAC 480-123-070(1)(a):

The Company used support from the federal high-cost fund in the calendar year 2018 as follows: To support investments made by the Company in telecommunications plant used to provide voice services, broadband services and other telecommunications services, and to defray operating expenses incurred by the Company in its provision of those services.

For the calendar year 2018, the Company's gross capital expenditures and operating expenses paid, in whole or in part, with support from the federal high-cost fund were \$496,238 and \$2,226,347, respectively. Major projects undertaken and completed in the calendar year 2018 include the following:

- 1) The Company installed exchange line circuit equipment at a cost of approximately \$44,800. This project will provide VDSL2 service or ADSL2+ service to 48 customers. This project will improve broadband speeds and increase data capacity in the area served.
- 2) The Company installed exchange line circuit equipment at a cost of approximately \$45,200. This project will provide VDSL2 service or ADSL2+ service to 48 customers. This project will improve broadband speeds, increase data capacity and will provide growth capacity in the area served.
- 3) The Company extended fiber optic facilities to one its remotes at a cost of approximately \$125,000. This project improved service and increase data capacity for approximately 125 customers and will provide growth capacity in the area served.
- 4) The Company installed inner duct into its conduit system in preparation for fiber optic cable installation at a cost of approximately \$17,600.

Per instructions from Commission Staff a copy of the Company's NECA-1 Report¹ for the calendar year 2018 that, as of the date of that report, the Company will have reported as the basis for support from the federal high-cost fund, will be provided to the Commission when it becomes available and no later than August 1, 2019.

2. Report 2: WAC 480-123-070(1)(b): The Company reports that the investments and expenses reported under Report 1, above, benefited the consumers as follows:

Consumers served by the Company benefited from the use of high-cost fund support by continuing to receive high quality telecommunications services.

Through the expenditure of federal high-cost support funds, the Company was able to continue to provide services at a level that the Company believes meets the intent set forth in 47 U.S.C § 254 of providing quality telecommunications services to customers in the service area for which the Company is designated as an ETC.² The Company has made substantial investments over the past several years which allow it to provide quality telecommunications services to its customers in its designated ETC service area. Those expenditures and investments, including those reflected in Report 1 above, generally benefit all customers receiving the federal high-cost fund supported services from the Company within its designated ETC service area. The Company has expanded its network over the past several years so that it is capable of providing access to broadband services throughout most of the Company's designated ETC service area. The Company offers services that are comparable to services offered in urban areas at rates that are comparable to rates for such services in urban areas.




As they are known to the Company at the date of this Report, the Company's planned gross capital expenditures and operating expenses related to Washington State to be made, in whole or in part, with federal high-cost support to be received by the Company, during the calendar year 2020 are projected to be \$410,000 and \$2,302,168, respectively.

Major projects are planned to be undertaken or completed in the calendar years 2019 are as follows:

- (1) The Company installed exchange line circuit equipment at a cost of approximately \$25,100. This project will provide VDSL2 service or ADSL2+ service to 48 customers. This project will improve broadband speeds and increase data capacity in the area served.
- (2) The Company installed exchange line circuit equipment at a cost of approximately \$31,250. This project will provide VDSL2 service or ADSL2+ service to 96 customers. This project will improve broadband speeds and increase data capacity in the area served.
- (3) The company extended fiber optic cable facilities to one of its exchange line circuit equipment at a cost of approximately \$72,300. This project will improve broadband speeds and increase data capacity for 48 customers and provide capacity for growth in the area served.
- (4) The company extended fiber optic cable facilities to one of its exchange line circuit equipment at a cost of approximately \$126,900. This project will improve broadband speeds and increase data capacity for 24 customers and provide capacity for growth in the area served.
- (5) The company extended fiber optic cable facilities in preparation for a fiber to the premise project at a cost of approximately \$13,600.
- (6) The company installed cable and wire facilities to a new law enforcement location at a cost of approximately \$10,900. This project provided service to one customer.





The Company has not determined the major projects to be undertaken in the calendar year 2020.

The Company expects that levels of expenses in 2019 and 2020, respectively, will remain relatively the same as those it experienced in calendar year 2018, subject to the effects of inflation, other commonly experienced changes in cost of labor and materials, and increased depreciation on new investment placed in service. The Company does not anticipate major adjustments in staffing levels for the relevant period.

7. Report 7: Plan of Investments and Expenditures: WAC 480-123-080(2):

As they are known to the Company at the date of this Report, apart from major projects, the planned investment and expenses to be made with federal high-cost support related to Washington state for the calendar year 2020 are planned to remain relatively the same as those it experienced in calendar year 2018, subject to the effects of inflation, other commonly experienced changes in cost of labor and materials, and increased depreciation on new investment placed in service. The Company does not anticipate major adjustments in staffing levels for the relevant period. The Company has not completed its budgeting process for 2020, so the investment and expense figures presented in Report 6, above, for the calendar year 2020 are not yet final. The Company expects that the continued receipt of federal high-cost support will allow the Company to continue to provide the supported services at rates that are comparable to the rates for such services in urban areas. All customers in the Company's designated ETC service area will benefit from the expected level of support by continuing to have available to them services that are comparable to the rates for such services in urban areas at rates that are comparable to the rates for such services in urban areas.
