The Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (Commission) believes that Prairie Electric, Inc., (Prairie Electric or Company) has violated Revised Code of Washington (RCW) 19.122.055 by failing to request a dig ticket prior to excavation and damaging an underground natural gas facility. RCW 19.122.055 states, in part, that any excavator who fails to notify a one-number locator service no less than two full business days before excavating and causes damage to a hazardous liquid or gas facility is subject to a civil penalty of not more than \$10,000 for each violation.

Commission staff (Staff) conducted an investigation that included reviewing damage reports submitted by NW Natural (NWN) that identified a natural gas damage event involving Prairie Electric. Accordingly, the Commission hereby notifies you that it is assessing a penalty of \$2,500 against the Company on the following grounds:

On May 1, 2019, the Commission assessed a \$1,000 penalty against Prairie Electric for damaging an underground natural gas facility without a valid dig ticket on November 12, 2018.

On July 27, 2019, Prairie Electric was excavating near SW 25th Way & SW 11th St., Battle Ground, Washington. While excavating a trench to install utilities, Prairie Electric workers damaged an underground NWN gas facility. The Damage Information Reporting Tool report submitted by NWN on August 7, 2019, indicated that Prairie Electric was excavating without a valid request to locate underground utilities. Staff's subsequent investigation confirmed that Prairie Electric did not have a valid dig ticket for the excavation that caused the damage.

Staff recommends the Commission assess a \$2,500 penalty against Prairie Electric for one violation of RCW 19.122.055 for failing to provide the required notice to a one-number locator service before excavating, as follows:

- \$2,500 penalty for the violation of RCW 19.122.055 that occurred on July 27, 2019.

The Commission agrees with Staff's recommendation and assesses a penalty of \$2,500.

These facts, if not contested or if proved at a hearing and not rebutted or explained, are sufficient to support the penalty assessment.

Your penalty is due and payable now. If you believe the violation did not occur, you may deny committing the violation and contest the penalty through evidence presented at a hearing or in writing. Or, if there is a reason for the violation that you believe should excuse you from the penalty, you may ask for mitigation (reduction) of the penalty through evidence presented at a hearing or in writing. The Commission will grant a request for hearing only if material issues of law or fact require consideration of evidence and resolution in a hearing. Any request to contest the violation or for mitigation of the penalty must include a written statement of the reasons supporting that request. Failure to provide such a statement will result in denial of the request. *See* RCW 81.04.405.

If you properly present your request for a hearing and the Commission grants that request, the Commission will review the evidence supporting your dispute of the violation or application for mitigation in a Brief Adjudicative Proceeding before an administrative law judge. The administrative law judge will consider the evidence and will notify you of his or her decision.

You must act within 15 days after receiving this notice to do one of the following:

- Pay the \$2,500 penalty amount due; or
- Request a hearing to contest the occurrence of the violation; or
- Request mitigation to reduce the amount of the penalty.

Please indicate your selection on the enclosed form and send it to the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission, P.O. Box 47250, Olympia, Washington 98504-7250, **within FIFTEEN (15) days** after you receive this notice.

If you do not act within 15 days, the Commission may refer this matter to the Office of the Attorney General for collection. The Commission may then sue you to collect the penalty.

a) I ask for a hearing to present evidence on the information I provide above to an administrative law judge for a decision.

OR b) I ask for a Commission decision based solely on the information I provide above.

RCW 9A.72.020:

“Perjury in the first degree. (1) A person is guilty of perjury in the first degree if in any official proceeding he makes a materially false statement which he knows to be false under an oath required or authorized by law. (2) Knowledge of the materiality of the statement is not an element of this crime, and the actor’s mistaken belief that his statement was not material is not a defense to a prosecution under this section. (3) Perjury in the first degree is a class B felony.”
