Petitioner,	GRANTING PETITION TO MODIFY ACTIVE WARNING DEVICES AT A PUBLIC HIGHWAY-RAIL GRADE CROSSING AT BROWNSTOWN ROAD AND AUTHORIZING EXPENDITURE FROM THE GRADE CROSSING PROTECTIVE FUND
Seeking Approval to Modify Active Warning Devices at a Public Highway- Rail Grade Crossing and Requesting Disbursement from the Grade Crossing Protective Fund	USDOT: 099239N

BACKGROUND

- 1 On October 13, 2023, Yak Rail LLC, (Yak Rail or Petitioner), filed with the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (Commission) a petition (Petition) seeking approval to modify active warning devices at a highway-rail grade crossing identified as USDOT 099239N. The crossing is located at the intersection of Brownstown Road and the Petitioner’s tracks in Brownstown, Yakima County. The track at this location is owned by Yakima County and operated under contract by Yak Rail. The Petitioner further requests the Commission authorize an expenditure of \$8,459.07 from the Grade Crossing Protective Fund (GCPF) to replace the crossing signal batteries and battery chargers.
- 2 Respondent Yakima County consented to entry of an Order by the Commission without further notice or hearing.
- 3 Brownstown Road is a two-lane county roadway with a speed limit of 35 miles per hour. Estimated average annual daily vehicle traffic through the crossing is 370 vehicles. Brownstown Road is part of an established truck route with 16 percent commercial traffic and is part of a school bus route with four school buses using the crossing each school day. Up to three freight trains operate over this crossing daily at up to 10 miles per hour. No passenger trains operate over the crossing.
- 4 Railroad warning devices at the Brownstown Road crossing consist of advance warning signs, pavement markings, crossbucks, ENS signs, two warning bells, mast-mounted flashing LED warning lights, and vehicle gates. The Petitioner proposes to install new

crossing signal batteries and battery chargers. These upgrades will improve reliability and serviceability of the signals, thereby increasing safety for roadway users of the crossing. The total cost of the materials is \$8,459.07. GCPF funds are available for this project.

- 5 Commission staff (Staff) has investigated the Petition and recommends that it be granted subject to the following conditions: (1) expenditure from the GCPF must not exceed \$8,459.07, (2) payment will be made upon presentation of claim for reimbursement for materials and verification by Staff that the work has been satisfactorily completed, (3) the Petitioner must sign and return the attached project agreement, (4) the project must be completed by December 31, 2024, (5) traffic control devices must comply with all applicable standards specified in the U.S. Department of Transportation *Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices*, and, (6) the Petitioner must notify the Commission immediately upon completion of the modifications authorized herein. Acceptance of the changes is subject to inspection by Staff, who will verify that the crossing is in full compliance with applicable laws, regulations, and the conditions specified herein.

DISCUSSION

- 6 RCW 81.53.261 requires that the Commission grant approval prior to modifying a public railroad-highway grade crossing within the state of Washington. RCW 81.53.271 authorizes the Commission to disburse funds from the GCPF to pay for improvements to highway-rail grade crossings. We find that the proposed modifications will improve overall safety for roadway users. Accordingly, the Commission grants the Petition subject to the conditions Staff recommends.

FINDINGS AND CONCLUSIONS

- 7 (1) The Commission is an agency of the state of Washington having jurisdiction over public highway-rail grade crossings within the state of Washington, and authority to approve and administer disbursements from the GCPF.
- 8 (2) The grade crossing at Brownstown Road, identified as USDOT 099239N, is a public highway-rail grade crossing within the state of Washington.
- 9 (3) RCW 81.53.261 requires the Commission to grant approval prior to any changes to public highway-rail grade crossings within the state of Washington.¹

- 10 (4) RCW 81.53.271 allows the Commission to disburse funds from the Grade Crossing Protective Fund to pay for the installation of a grade crossing protective device without requiring the Petitioner to share the cost.
- 11 (5) Commission Staff investigated the Petition and recommends that it be granted subject to the conditions set out in paragraph 5, above.
- 12 (6) After reviewing the Petition filed by Yak Rail on October 13, 2023, and giving due consideration to all relevant matters and for good cause shown, the Commission should grant the Petition and request for disbursement of funds, subject to the conditions set out in paragraph 5 of this Order.

ORDER

THE COMMISSION ORDERS:

- 13 Yak Rail LLC's Petition to upgrade warning devices at the highway-rail grade crossing located at Brownstown Road is granted subject to the conditions specified below. The cost of the materials for this upgrade shall be paid from the Grade Crossing Protective Fund. Approval of the Petition is subject to the following conditions:
- (1) Expenditure from the Grade Crossing Protective Fund must not exceed \$8,459.07.
 - (2) Payment will be made upon presentation of claim for reimbursement for materials and verification by Commission Staff that the work has been satisfactorily completed.
 - (3) Yak Rail LLC must sign and return the attached project agreement.
 - (4) The project must be completed no later than December 31, 2024.
 - (5) Traffic control devices must comply with all applicable standards specified in the U.S. Department of Transportation *Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices*; and,
 - (6) Yak Rail LLC must notify the Commission immediately of the completion of the upgrades authorized in this Order. Acceptance of the upgrades is subject to inspection by Commission Staff, and verification that the crossing is in full compliance with applicable laws, regulations, and the conditions specified in this Order.

The Secretary of the Commission has delegated authority over this matter pursuant to Order 01 in Docket A-180762. The Secretary finds this Order to be consistent with the public interest.
