As I understand it, today is the *last* day for public comment before you renew your 20-year Integrated Resource Plan as it relates to Puget Sounds partial ownership of the Colstrip Coal Plant in Montana and therefore the continuing power generation from that plant.

I live in Whatcom County. As I understand it, most of the PSE customers receiving electricity get it directly from and because of the Colstrip Coal Strip Plant in Montana. I never knew this before, but now that I do, I cannot state strongly enough how WRONG it is to continue providing our power from the dying, dirty coal industry.
