- 1 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: We'll call this meeting of
- 2 the Washington Utilities Transportation Commission to
- 3 order. It's September 28th at noon, and we're at the
- 4 Spokane Valley City Council Chambers. And for the
- 5 record, this is a public hearing for a formal docket
- 6 with the Washington Utilities Transportation Commission
- 7 regarding Avista Utilities' request for a rate
- 8 increase. The docket is UE-120436 and UG-120437, and
- 9 also for the record, that's consolidated with an
- 10 earlier phase of an earlier proceeding on revenue
- decoupling in docket Nos. UE-110876 and UG-110877.
- 12 So getting those formalities out of the way, I
- 13 want to welcome everybody who took time out of your
- 14 schedule to come today. My name is Jeff Goltz. I'm
- 15 the chairman of the committee. To my left is my
- 16 colleague Pat Oshie, and to my right is my colleague,
- 17 Phillip Jones, a Spokane native by the way.
- 18 Some of you I know I recognize who've given
- 19 testimony in past public hearings on rate cases. We're
- 20 going to do something a little bit different this time.
- 21 We have prepared a video that gives a little bit of the
- 22 background, so it eliminates the need for me to have to
- 23 give the background. It gives a background of what the
- 24 Commission does and the rate making process and what
- 25 goes into it and about this proceeding today.

- 1 And as some of you that have been here before
- 2 recall, there's formal evidentiary proceedings, where
- 3 we hear from accountants and economists and others from
- 4 both the company and other parties, and those will be
- 5 in Olympia starting on November 27th and continuing
- 6 through November 30th if necessary.
- 7 But these proceedings have a different
- 8 purpose. If there's accountants in the room and they
- 9 want to give accounting testimony, we'll hear you,
- 10 that's fine, but this is a time not to hear from
- 11 accountants generally. It's a time to hear from
- 12 members of the public about what they view and what
- 13 they see and about the proposal -- proposed rate issues
- 14 and rate increase. Before we get to the video, I did
- 15 want to allow, there's attorneys for at least three of
- 16 the parties in the rate cases. Usually in rate cases,
- 17 there's a number of participants besides the company.
- 18 There's the Commission Staff, Office of Public Counsel,
- 19 they have representatives here, but also there's some
- 20 who, probably to save money, didn't want to come all
- 21 the way to Spokane, and they will read the transcripts,
- 22 but we have representatives of industrial customers and
- 23 representatives of low income customers and sometimes
- 24 we'll have some others as well.
- 25 So starting with the company, I will ask them

- 1 to introduce themselves for the record, and also
- 2 introduce if they have other people with them they
- 3 would like to introduce. Mr. Meyer?
- 4 MR. MEYER: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, and
- 5 members of the Commission. I'm David Meyer. I'm the
- 6 lawyer for the company. And with me today we have our
- 7 CEO and Chairman of the Board, Scott Morris; and Kelly
- 8 Norwood, who is vice president in charge of rates and
- 9 regulations. And at the conclusion of the hearing, we
- 10 have others, several others here that can answer
- 11 questions, if you have them, and we will be happy to
- 12 stick around and visit with you. So thank you for your
- 13 time.
- MR. GOLTZ: Mr. Fassio?
- MR. FASSIO: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, and
- 16 members of the Commission. My name is Michael Fassio.
- 17 I'm the assistant attorney general, and I represent the
- 18 Commission Regulatory Staff and we have some people at
- 19 the table as well that came in and I will be available
- 20 if you have any questions. Thank you.
- 21 MR. GOLTZ: Mr. ffitch?
- 22 MR. FFITCH: My name is Simon ffitch, I'm with
- 23 the Public Counsel Section of the State Attorney
- 24 General's Office, and our responsibility is to
- 25 represent the customers of Avista, residential and

- 1 small business customers. I have a handout also, I
- 2 passed it out to some of you, and I put it on the
- 3 table. I will be here afterwards --
- 4 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: Mr. ffitch also, I could
- 5 barely hear you, I hope the court reporter heard you.
- 6 You said you have a handout?
- 7 MR. FFITCH: Yes.
- 8 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: And he's handing out -- And
- 9 what Mr. ffitch has done is summarize the case,
- 10 including what the company has asked for and what the
- 11 various other parties have posed in response to the
- 12 company's request. So sometimes I go through all that
- 13 orally. I won't do that this time to save time, and
- 14 you can see what the various proposals are from that
- 15 handout.
- 16 Also, I want to introduce Mr. Roger Kouchi,
- 17 who is the gentleman you saw when you came in. He's
- 18 with the Commission's Consumer Affairs Staff. So if
- 19 you have questions about various things, you know,
- 20 don't come to us. We're here to hear the evidence. If
- 21 you have questions about the company, your bill or
- 22 something else, Mr. Meyer said there are company
- 23 representatives here. If you have questions about
- 24 various proposals, talk to Mr. Meyer, Mr. Fassio, or
- 25 Mr. ffitch at the conclusion of this, and also our

- 1 Consumer Affairs Staff represented here by Mr. Kouchi,
- 2 is part of the purpose -- or much of the purpose is to
- 3 help customers resolve disputes with the company.
- 4 So if you do have a dispute, a billing
- 5 dispute, not just with Avista, but with any utility
- 6 that we regulate, so a telephone company for example,
- 7 go ahead and please see Mr. Kouchi, and he'll make sure
- 8 he gets the right people to you. So with that, what we
- 9 would like to do now, before we hear public testimony
- 10 is we do have this video. It takes about 12 minutes,
- 11 and it gives you some background and I hope it's useful
- 12 in formulating whatever comments you may make. After
- 13 that, we will get to the public comments.
- 14 MR. KOUCHI: This video is actually on our
- 15 website, so we will take you there. And to get to it,
- 16 you type in www.utc.wa.gov, and that gets you to the
- 17 Commission home page. You would click on the Consumer
- 18 tab, go to the Energy Navigation, and go down to
- 19 Consumer News and What's Up and Down with Energy Rates
- 20 and click on that. That's the video. And then when
- 21 that comes up, you click on that picture.
- 22 (A video was shown.)
- 23 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Kouchi.
- 24 Now, what we would like to do is turn to the public
- 25 comment portion of this. As I said, this is a formal

- 1 proceeding, so this, what we hear now will be evidence.
- 2 As a result, I will ask everybody who wishes to
- 3 comment, to stand and raise your hand and we will
- 4 administer an oath. And again, I just want to
- 5 re-emphasize, that you can make comments -- If you
- 6 leave here and say I wish I said this or I wish I had
- 7 said that, there's still plenty of options and time to
- 8 provide comments by e-mail and in writing or even by
- 9 telephone. If you have a written statement today here
- 10 as well, we're happy to accept that and that will be
- 11 included as part of the record.
- 12 So we'll wait until Mr. Kouchi comes in with
- 13 the extra sign in sheet. The gentlemen who just came
- in, did you wish to give comments today?
- 15 RESPONSE: No.
- 16 COMMISSIONER GOLTZ: So we have five people
- 17 who have signed up indicating -- and if we other people
- 18 who have signed up, that's great. Only five people
- 19 have for sure indicated they want to give comments.
- 20 I'm going to ask those, plus anyone else who now says,
- 21 I think I do want to give comments, to stand, raise
- 22 your right hand, and I'm going administer an oath and
- 23 if you agree with that, you just say I do. Would you
- 24 please stand. We lost one person. Oh, there's five.
- 25 Okay.

- 1 Do you swear or affirm under the penalty of
- 2 perjury that the testimony you're about to give is the
- 3 truth?
- 4 (Public responds in the affirmative.)
- 5 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: So I will take these in order
- 6 unless there's somebody among you who has a time
- 7 commitment. I know this is the noon time frame,
- 8 sometimes people run out on their lunch hour. Does
- 9 anyone have a time crunch and they want to go first?
- 10 So we'll start with Caroline Pickett, and what we would
- 11 ask you all to do is to come up to the podium there and
- 12 adjust the microphone and state your name and spell
- 13 your last name for the record. We have a court
- 14 reporter here, and so it helps the court reporter if
- 15 you speak slowly and clearly and --
- MS. PICKETT: If I talk as slow as I walk,
- 17 maybe it will be slower.
- 18 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: And frequently, we get larger
- 19 crowds and we try to limit people to three minutes.
- 20 I'm not going to have a stop watch on this obviously,
- 21 but if somebody speaks before you, makes the same point
- 22 that you did, that's fine, just say that I agree with
- 23 the previous speaker. So Please proceed, and thanks
- 24 for coming.
- 25 MS. PICKETT: My name is Caroline Pickett -

- 1 P-i-c-k-e-t-t, and I was joking when I say I picket
- 2 everybody. I'm from Spokane Valley. My address is on
- 3 that paper as well.
- 4 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: That's fine. One more thing,
- 5 if you could just say are you here representing
- 6 yourself or sometimes people represent a group or a
- 7 business or a neighborhood association, so if you could
- 8 indicate that, and also if you're an electric or gas
- 9 customer of the company or both.
- 10 MS. PICKETT: I'm electric patron, but I
- 11 rather think of myself as an independent advocate for
- 12 persons of development disabilities. That's what my
- 13 training was in the past, and I've been watching out
- 14 for what's going on with the fact that people don't
- 15 come to these meetings because they either can't make
- 16 it or they don't have the background to talk and that's
- 17 about what I've got now is the ability to talk. I'm
- 18 going to have to put my glasses on.
- 19 I started out writing page after page of
- 20 comments, and one of the things that I came up with was
- 21 this, the strong request to deny rate increases of
- 22 electricity and natural gas for Avista, stop the
- 23 continuance of inflation. The people who have recently
- 24 received a cost of living increase -- and the
- 25 corporation such as Avista -- food industry, clothing,

- 1 school supplies et al, are eating it up before they
- 2 even get to cash that first cost of living check.
- 3 There are a lot of people that are homeless due
- 4 to abuses from the economic corporations and the
- 5 unemployed due to corporate downsizing or movement of
- 6 import to products being sold at higher prices even
- 7 though they're created at child labor and slave labor
- 8 or persons without who are unaware of how hazardous it
- 9 is to work with certain chemicals, such as the CFL
- 10 light bulb that most people are unaware are very
- 11 dangerous and they burn up the ground wire in our
- 12 house. What if they burn up the ground wires and then
- 13 eventually turn the house into to a flaming pile of
- 14 nothing because it's weakening the wiring systems in
- 15 your home, and I'm using information from downsize of
- 16 CFL --
- 17 COMMISSIONER GOLTZ: Could you speak a little
- 18 bit slower? Our court reporter is doing a great job,
- 19 but she might appreciate a little bit --
- 20 MS. PICKETT: I'm trying to hurry because I
- 21 only get so many minutes.
- 22 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: We'll give you extra minutes.
- 23 MS. PICKETT: Okay. I will slow down then.
- One of the other reasons that I'm very concerned is
- 25 that the natural gas company, they're telling us that

- 1 they're going to allow people to refract, refract
- 2 basalt rock and a couple of other companies tell you
- 3 that they're going to make it possible for you to get
- 4 better amounts of gas, natural gas. This is a
- 5 deception that is along with the water fluoridation
- 6 issue.
- 7 They're dumping hazard waste into water
- 8 resources. They're dumping hazardous materials into
- 9 the refracting system process, and they can't do
- 10 anything else but sell it for high amounts of money to
- 11 people who are unaware of how toxic and hazardous this
- 12 stuff is. This is one of the things that I'm really
- 13 concerned that maybe Avista is going to be investing
- 14 their monies into refracting processes without obeying
- 15 the environmental laws.
- 16 Environment laws are supposed to check on
- 17 what's going on to keep our country safe and our
- 18 environment safe. And a lot of times they super --
- 19 they refuse to do ethical practices because it means
- 20 that they're going to have to dump their hazardous
- 21 waste material into a landfill rather than -- and/or
- 22 other waste rather than use it for a product. I will
- 23 slow down. You can catch up with me.
- 24 What if the consumers, many unemployed, often
- 25 dealing with loss of homes due to known manipulations

- 1 by unethical activities of corporate banks, syndicates
- 2 abusing contribution to political persons. I talked at
- 3 length with someone who told me that the information
- 4 that I had found in checking up on elected officials
- 5 getting contributions from Avista that their employees
- 6 have a pact. Now, maybe it doesn't come directly from
- 7 Avista, but when their employees are looking for a way
- 8 to -- the pact is supposed to be to attain Avista
- 9 employees for an effective government, the remark was
- 10 that there was only \$5,000 dollars that the employees
- 11 paid voluntarily into a pact.
- 12 I'm saying that a lot of people who,
- 13 especially since I've talked to some that weren't aware
- 14 of how dangerous the CFL light bulbs were, even those
- 15 who work at Avista, I'm saying that how can they really
- 16 afford to think that the public wants to elect the ones
- 17 that have gotten high amounts of money from a pact. We
- 18 as citizens need to protect our political structure
- 19 ourselves. We don't always agree with everything that
- 20 the people who will answer to pacts and they may
- 21 misrepresent the majority of the people because they
- 22 don't understand what they're doing. The investment is
- 23 costing unsuspecting consumer persons, uninformed with
- 24 full disclosure by Avista about the CFLs, the hazards
- 25 of refracting, and I think -- not I think, I'm

- 1 suggesting that they really get carried away with their
- 2 rate increases.
- 3 I was out here I think two years ago, I'm not
- 4 sure how long it's been, but as soon as we get a COLA
- 5 or even before, the rate increases are being asked for.
- 6 And the amounts that I had here were amazing to me that
- 7 a company that has billions of dollars coming in feel
- 8 that they need to raise it to 41 million for a rate
- 9 increase at 10.9 percent and gas is 10.1 million at
- 10 10.2 percent. These amounts are unacceptable to a
- 11 person who gets a 50 cents for a two dollar amount on
- 12 their COLA.
- So I believe that they should not get a rate
- 14 increase. Of course, that may be a little harsh to the
- 15 people listening that want the rate increase, but it's
- 16 about time we stop the inflationary action. If every
- 17 time a COLA comes through, they blame the government
- 18 for giving people money that don't have high incomes
- 19 and don't have homes and places to live and clothes to
- 20 wear, they call us on the phone or they put television
- 21 ads, give coats, give clothes, give things for
- 22 volunteers to give for children's school work, and yet,
- 23 then they turn around and tell us they want to raise
- 24 the Avista bills. This is unconscionable. Thank you.
- 25 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: Thank you very much, Ms.

- 1 Pickett. Next I have Ms. Shirley Rademacher.
- 2 MS. RADEMACHER: That's fine. Thank you.
- 3 Yes, my name is Shirley Rademacher,
- 4 R-a-d-e-m-a-c-h-e-r, and the address is 19303 East
- 5 Riverwalk Lane, Spokane Valley, Washington 99016.
- 6 Thank you very much.
- 7 I'm here for the second time, plus I've
- 8 written letters, and it seems like no one's listening.
- 9 The greed of Avista is, to me, is way beyond belief.
- 10 It is so grossly offensive to the sense of right versus
- 11 absolute disregard for the customers they serve. The
- 12 desire of executives to become multimillionaires on the
- 13 backs of people who are struggling just to make ends
- 14 meet is reprehensible. Gas and electric absolutely is
- 15 essential for health and well-being of all people, and
- 16 many are being really taxed with all of these rate
- 17 increases. I doubt any of these executives are wearing
- 18 three and four layers of clothes each winter to keep
- 19 warm and I doubt whether they're children are either
- 20 and many people are.
- 21 And this is an absolute and deliberate
- 22 freezing of citizens for the benefit of a few, and why
- 23 it has been allowed and approved by your Commission is
- 24 beyond my comprehension. It is pure insanity, and the
- 25 epitome of the worst kind of greed. ENRON played this

- 1 same game and raped the citizens for the benefit of the
- 2 top executives. I feel like we have another mini
- 3 ENRON.
- 4 Unfortunately, I don't know how or why Avista
- 5 became our utility company. All I know is it was a
- 6 huge and horrible mistake. My husband and I went to
- 7 Alaska for a few years after our children were raised,
- 8 and upon returning in 2002, I learned that Washington
- 9 Water Power no longer existed. In all our years as
- 10 their customer, I can't recall a rate increase, but if
- 11 there was one, it must have been negligible, nor did we
- 12 ever have a rate increase in Alaska or any other city
- 13 across the United States while my husband served in the
- 14 military.
- 15 But the horrendous greed of corporate
- 16 executives have not fully raised its ugly head. The
- 17 salaries have become a cancer in our society and have
- 18 exploded with fury. Every executive of every company
- 19 feels entitled to be a multimillionaire and claim that
- 20 their salaries are comparable to others in the industry
- 21 and I'm sick of hearing that one. Just to keep the
- 22 salaries escalating, we have to be comparable. I'm so
- 23 tired of that. They're all over paid. The more they
- 24 make for the stockholders, the more they should be
- 25 paid, no matter how bad the consumer suffers or how bad

- 1 the economy is.
- Since moving into my home in 2002, Avista has
- 3 requested a rate increase at least once a year and
- 4 sometimes twice. I can't remember them being turned
- 5 down. I may be in error about that, but I can't
- 6 remember them being turned down. Maybe you gave them
- 7 less than they requested, but I don't recall you ever
- 8 turning them down. I may be not correct on that, when
- 9 I took an oath to say the truth, I'm not sure about
- 10 that.
- I have written the Washington Utilities
- 12 Commission and I have appeared at a previous hearing
- 13 declaring these constant rate increases an outrage.
- 14 The CEO has gone from a salary of over one million to
- over three million in just the time I've been back.
- 16 Until recently, I had no idea that the top five
- 17 executives were paid the maximum golden parachutes of
- 18 almost \$24 millions dollars. And if you all don't
- 19 think that's greed, I'm sorry, and others at three
- 20 million each, nor was I aware that the three-year
- 21 shareholder return was 53 percent. Well, that's pretty
- 22 doggone outrageous right there.
- 23 So all of these salaries, plus golden
- 24 parachutes are beyond my comprehension. Let us not
- 25 forget the millions Avista spends of rate payers' money

- 1 to ingurgitate themselves in the community with
- 2 donations to big money pockets and politics in the
- 3 guise of public service. No, it's rate payers' money.
- 4 The most disturbing aspect of this monumental greed is
- 5 that the Utilities and Transportation Commission, plus
- 6 the Attorney General, have paid no heed to our
- 7 complaints, nor taken steps to halt the excessive rate
- 8 increases. If not you, who, as a good friend of mine
- 9 says. If not you, who? Who's going protect us? Who's
- 10 going to help us?
- 11 Greed is a sickness and more is never enough
- 12 and compassion for those less fortunate, is a lost
- 13 emotion. Personally, I couldn't accept these
- 14 exorbitant salaries in good conscious and sleep well at
- 15 night knowing that thousands of people were struggling
- 16 to maintain their heat and electricity. That is
- 17 something else missing in our society of greed,
- 18 conscious. We see it everywhere, federal government,
- 19 state government, city government, county government
- 20 and corporations. I am requesting that you, the
- 21 Commission and the Attorney General suspend and deny
- 22 approval for all and any rate increases indefinitely.
- 23 Most Americans have had to scale back
- 24 tremendously to make ends meet. For Avista to make
- 25 ends meet, they need to scale back their salaries, no

- 1 golden parachutes and serve the average rate payer, not
- 2 themselves and stockholders. Their greed almost feels
- 3 evil to me and the plundering of citizens must stop.
- 4 Thank you very much.
- 5 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: Thank you very much. Next we
- 6 have Julie Honekamp from SNAP.
- 7 MS. HONEKAMP: So good afternoon, Chairman,
- 8 members of the Commission, my name is Julie Honekamp.
- 9 H-o-n-e-k-a-m-p, and I am the CEO at SNAP. Our
- 10 corporate headquarters is 3102 West Fort George Wright
- 11 Drive, Spokane, Washington 99224. As you may be aware,
- 12 in Spokane County, SNAP is the provider of LIRAP, on
- 13 behalf of the Avista rate payers and also we administer
- 14 the LIHEAP program on behalf of all taxpayers and the
- 15 Department of Commerce.
- 16 In our limited time together, I just wanted to
- 17 touch on three points. The need for heating assistance
- 18 in Spokane County remains very high and very stable.
- 19 While we all await a brighter economy, the reality on
- 20 the ground is that Spokane is still struggling. The
- 21 most recent census data shows that 15 percent or 68,000
- 22 of our neighbors in Spokane County are still living
- 23 below the poverty line. 18,000 of those are children,
- 24 and 5,500 of those in Spokane County are seniors. That
- is 68,000 people in Spokane County.

- 1 At our current funding levels, we estimate we
- 2 can only serve a portion of those in need. As of
- 3 August of 2012, SNAP took 48 percent more LIRAP
- 4 applications than at this time last year, and we spent
- 5 57 percent more in funding dollars in the LIRAP
- 6 program, and that is even given that LIHEAP was
- 7 decreased in that same period. For those who are
- 8 struggling with whether LIRAP should be increased, I
- 9 think of the 68,000 people below the poverty line, and
- 10 that need remains strong. And given the demand and the
- 11 challenging circumstances, we are concerned about the
- 12 increase both to the rates, and also to the base rate
- 13 that customers will be paying.
- 14 My second point is that LIRAP, as a program,
- 15 is an incredibly flexible and responsive program. It
- 16 meets the needs of our local community very well,
- 17 particularly in an environment where the federal
- 18 government and the LIHEAP program is so uncertain and
- 19 the timing is so irregular, LIHEAP is critical to our
- 20 ability to meet the needs.
- 21 And lastly, I really would like to offer my
- 22 sincere appreciation to Avista. They've been amazing
- 23 partners last year through every program design change
- 24 and every hiccup we met. We felt free to call them and
- 25 work with them on this design. They've been a partner

- 1 in the truest sense of the word. I provided today some
- 2 documentation outlining the difference in the number of
- 3 households we served in the LIRAP program and I hope it
- 4 will be submitted for the record.
- 5 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: It will be.
- 6 MS. HONEKAMP: Thank you for being here today
- 7 and listening to our community's needs. And I
- 8 appreciate your time and patience coming over.
- 9 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: Thank you. I do have a
- 10 couple of questions, as we always do with you folks
- 11 because you have such good information. And the last
- 12 year, the last time we were here, I remember it was one
- 13 of your colleagues that gave the statement.
- MS. HONEKAMP: And he's with me today.
- 15 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: Okay. The question is, at
- 16 that point, the LIHEAP funding was very uncertain, and
- 17 so we just didn't know if it was going to be reduced,
- 18 increased, what. So where are you now? Is the budget
- 19 still is not passed or what does it look like?
- 20 MS. HONEKAMP: The prognostication, at least
- 21 at the federal level is, we will have six months at a
- 22 continuing resolution at last year's current amount.
- 23 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: So that gets you from October
- 24 1st through March?
- 25 MS. HONEKAMP: Correct. What happens after

- 1 that is yet to be determined. And again, as you well
- 2 know, without having LIRAP, that's what we use to start
- 3 the season with, until we get that kind of final news
- 4 about whether LIHEAP will come forward.
- 5 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: So that gets you through the
- 6 heating season though, or the bulk of it?
- 7 MS. HONEKAMP: Well, this year we ran nearly a
- 8 year-round program, so the need continues.
- 9 Traditionally, the highest need is in those fall and
- 10 winter months, but we continued. In fact, in September
- 11 we were still serving LIRAP clients.
- 12 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: When you say 48 percent more
- 13 LIRAP applications this year than last, do you mean
- 14 calendar year? Is that what you're talking about?
- MS. HONEKAMP: You know, it's August --
- 16 October 1st, through August 31st. And actually that
- 17 program is still running into September.
- 18 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: So, is -- But I'm assuming
- 19 your funding level is level? It's not increasing or is
- 20 it?
- 21 MS. HONEKAMP: LIHEAP actually decreased.
- 22 LIRAP is up slightly, given that you all, in your prior
- 23 rate case, helped us to increase LIRAP a small amount.
- 24 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: With the increased
- 25 applications, are you basically telling the new people

- 1 no or are you basically saying, okay, we're going to
- 2 give to everybody, but we're just going to stretch our
- 3 funds thinner? What's the response to the 48 percent
- 4 applications -- 48 percent increase in applications?
- 5 MS. HONEKAMP: We are able to serve more
- 6 households, and part of this, that increase, I would
- 7 say is also due to, you may have historically
- 8 remembered that when we had a large amount of economic
- 9 stimulus of our dollars, we had to get those funds out
- 10 the door and that left us with a large amount of LIRAP
- 11 dollars. So we were able to push that forward, so some
- 12 of that increase is due to a LIRAP amount that we were
- 13 carrying forward.
- 14 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: But I guess, we no longer
- 15 have that. Right?
- MS. HONEKAMP: We no longer do.
- 17 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: So the -- I guess my question
- 18 is, if someone comes in your office tomorrow and says I
- 19 want to apply, what's the response?
- 20 MS. HONEKAMP: The response right now is we
- 21 will start the program at the end of October and we
- 22 will be using LIRAP dollars and we will spend through
- 23 those until we know we have LIHEAP dollars.
- 24 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: So you -- Do you serve just
- 25 the people you can serve and there's some people that

- 1 are going to be unserved?
- MS. HONEKAMP: Correct.
- 3 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: So as opposed to saying, this
- 4 is the amount of dollars, we're going to spread it
- 5 thinner and every month assistance is reduced?
- 6 MS. HONEKAMP: No. We serve everyone we can
- 7 serve until the money is gone, and the remaining people
- 8 are unserved.
- 9 COMMISSIONER JONES: You mentioned the federal
- 10 poverty level in Spokane County, and 15 percent is the
- 11 number. Has that been trending up, down, stable since
- 12 the recession began in 2008?
- MS. HONEKAMP: You know, I'm happy to get you
- 14 that trend. I don't have that off the top of my head,
- 15 and I don't want to speculate, but I will submit that.
- MR. JONES: That will be helpful.
- 17 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: Thank you very much. I
- 18 appreciate it.
- MS. HONEKAMP: Thank you.
- 20 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: Mr. Duane Statler.
- 21 MR. STATLER: Duane Statler, 2002 North Vista
- 22 Road, Spokane Valley, and I will be representing myself
- 23 and my family. Anyways, first of all, I would like to
- 24 thank Attorney General Rob McKenna and Mr. ffitch for
- 25 representing us and finally stepping forward to speak

- 1 and putting the power of the Attorney General's office
- 2 against this increase as proposed.
- 3 Second of all, I would like to thank the
- 4 commissioners for coming, and apologize to you for
- 5 ridiculing you last year about your wages.
- 6 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: I remember that.
- 7 MR. STATLER: The fact of the matter is that
- 8 your 150K a year is nothing compared to three million.
- 9 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: It's not 150K a year either,
- 10 but that's okay.
- 11 MR. STATLER: I beg to differ, but so anyways
- 12 on that. So there we go. Now, I heard some people
- 13 over here comment about Avista's tactics, and they
- 14 called it a couple of other terms. I would like to
- 15 call it unethical. The way that they come after us and
- 16 the way that they've held down our economy and the way
- 17 that they eventually, I don't know -- They haven't done
- 18 anything to help our local economy here in Spokane,
- 19 because as one person said, when they get a cost of
- 20 living, they don't get a chance to go out and buy a new
- 21 refrigerator, they're too busy paying their bill.
- 22 That's me, which by the way, as a state employee, I
- 23 have not seen a raise in four years, and I'm giving
- 24 back days.
- I was told two years ago, by Avista's vice

- 1 president I believe it was, that they were going to ask
- 2 for one more increase, one. And they stated they were
- 3 going to do it, and they needed the money. We were
- 4 negotiating water rights with the tribes and Coeur
- 5 d'Alene Lake and water flows, and I can understand
- 6 that. I can understand the need for Avista to ask for
- 7 more money when it's necessary. Unfortunately, this is
- 8 not necessary. This last increase is just unethical.
- 9 I don't even know where to start with that \$41.1
- 10 million dollars. What are you going to do with the
- 11 money? That's my first question to Avista and their
- 12 CEO.
- 13 Second of all, I want to discuss with you guys
- 14 and the UTC about my bill and the way that I'm double
- 15 billed for my electric service and my gas service. The
- 16 same person comes by and he reads both meters at the
- 17 same time. The same person that sends my bill in the
- 18 mail sends both portions of it on the same piece of
- 19 paper at the same time. I'm being charged two basic
- 20 service charges side by side, which are about to go up.
- 21 I think it's 40 or 60 percent, and that's a bill that
- 22 will not go down. Once you grant that increase to them
- 23 on my basic service charge, I'm set with that for my
- 24 life. That will not go down. So please, please,
- 25 please do not grant the basic service increase.

- 1 Third, I see all these new trucks running
- 2 around town, and, you know, I really appreciate Avista
- 3 for buying American rigs, first of all. It's nice to
- 4 see that. But what I don't appreciate is when I see
- 5 all these rigs that are turning back out that still
- 6 have a lot of life left in them. I wonder with the
- 7 timing with the way our economy is, maybe they
- 8 shouldn't be buying all these new trucks right now.
- 9 And they're building new infrastructure and
- 10 seeing new poles go in all over the place. I commend
- 11 them in keeping their employees working, however, when
- 12 you see the scope and the scale of what they're doing
- 13 and the poles that they're replacing, the new
- 14 infrastructure over on Dollar Road that they're
- 15 building, you wonder why they are doing it and moving
- 16 their facilities from one point to another, when
- 17 basically they're costing -- and they just haven't
- 18 changed.
- 19 Their water flows are up, everything's still
- 20 good for them, the price of gas is down, and they want
- 21 increase, after increase, after increase. Then I get
- 22 in the news -- First of all, I get this notice in the
- 23 mail, and I'm sure everybody did, that is a customer of
- 24 theirs. They're asking for 6.9 percent, 6.3 percent,
- 25 and then a week later -- and by the way, there's

- 1 nothing in the news about this, nothing. There was
- 2 nothing advertised, no press releases, no nothing. A
- 3 week later in the news, we get this really feel good
- 4 announcement in the news that Avista is going to drop
- 5 their gas rates by 4.2 percent. They manipulated the
- 6 costs so much that the basic public doesn't even know
- 7 what to believe anymore. You don't know if you're
- 8 going up, we're going down, we're doing this, we're
- 9 doing that.
- 10 My whole question to Avista on this latest
- 11 request to decrease the gas amount is what happened to
- 12 last year? Your gas prices were down last year,
- 13 shouldn't they be refunding us 4.2 percent last year on
- 14 top of the 4.2 that they're talking about this year?
- 15 So where did that 4.2 percent go? We drag our feet to
- 16 give the money back, but when we want it, we want it
- 17 now. And now with part of this \$40.1 million dollar
- 18 request, I see they want to be paid up front for the
- 19 money that they're waiting for for state regulators to
- 20 say okay. I guess that's my take on it. So I will
- 21 leave that alone.
- 22 Next, I just wanted to touch basis just really
- 23 quick on what we can do, and what we can do as rate
- 24 payers working together to end this. Our state has
- 25 been nice enough to address this before on the west

- 1 side of the state and we have legislation and the fact
- 2 that we, as rate payers and citizens, can do to ban
- 3 together and stop this by creating a public utilities
- 4 district in Spokane County. Unfortunately, we don't
- 5 have a PUD bordering Spokane County that we can just
- 6 crawl onto and ride in and make this real easy on
- 7 ourselves. But now is the time for us, as customers
- 8 and consumers, to get together and get this in order
- 9 and get it moving so we can get it on the ballot on the
- 10 next cycle, which would be 2014.
- 11 So if anybody would like to get together with
- 12 me and discuss this, along with possibly the Attorney
- 13 General's Office, Mr. ffitch here, I will be sticking
- 14 around after the meeting and maybe we can take some
- 15 names and get our asset list started and start working
- on this. And I guess that's about all I have to say
- 17 other than I strongly, strongly suggest that we deny
- 18 all this increase this time. It's just not a good
- 19 time. I told you last time that there's never a good
- 20 time for an increase, but it was somewhat justified
- 21 with what they were asking. And I appreciate you
- 22 settling for a lesser amount than what they had
- 23 originally asked for also. And I'm sorry I ridiculed
- 24 you.
- 25 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: That's okay. That comes with

- 1 the territory.
- 2 MR. STATLER: Thank you, everybody. And like
- 3 I said, if anyone would like to talk to me after the
- 4 meeting, I will stick around and we can talk a little
- 5 bit about RCW 54 and how to implement it.
- 6 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: Thank you very much, Mr.
- 7 Statler. So Mr. Voelker -- Ms. Dawn Voelker, I'm
- 8 sorry.
- 9 MS. VOELKER: Hi, my name is Dawn Voelker, "V"
- 10 as in Victor, o-e-l-k-e-r, and I live at 2619 South
- 11 Raymond Road in the Spokane Valley and we're gas and
- 12 electric customers and I'm just representing myself.
- 13 My family is the typical middle class family. We have
- 14 done improvements to our home to try to make it run
- 15 more efficiently. But the bottom line is that during
- 16 the winter months, we wear sweatshirts and jackets in
- 17 our house, and during the evening, we sit under
- 18 blankets to keep warm. We do this to keep our heating
- 19 bill affordable. What is affordable? Under \$200
- 20 dollars.
- 21 I could quote you numbers about the excessive
- 22 salaries and bonuses the executives at Avista make, but
- 23 I'm sure you already know those figures and many have
- 24 already expressed those figures. I'm not really sure
- 25 if anyone is worth a salary of a million dollars. The

- 1 President of the United States doesn't even make that
- 2 much money. So in my mind, I'm wondering why would the
- 3 job of the president of a utility company be so much
- 4 more important than running our country?
- Well, it is greed. Greed at the cost of
- 6 others who have no choice if they want utilities in
- 7 their home. I cannot go shopping for another utility
- 8 company. I understand that they need to upgrade and
- 9 improve their equipment, but that should first be
- 10 coming out of their profits before bonuses are paid to
- 11 their executives. Are they really trying to save money
- 12 at Avista? I can tell you that I watch the meter
- 13 reader drive a gas guzzling, large pickup from driveway
- 14 to driveway and he zigzags through the neighbor instead
- 15 of going from house to house, all the while leaving
- 16 that gas guzzling truck running as they get out and go
- 17 read the meter. He may go to our house and then he
- 18 goes three houses down and back to the house next to
- 19 us. How is this saving money? Why aren't they driving
- 20 electric cars that they could plug in for free?
- 21 The question is, do they really want to save
- 22 money. No, they don't, because they know the
- 23 commissioners will always grant their rate hike. Our
- 24 country is still in a recession, and it's going to make
- 25 it hard to get out of if middle class people don't have

- 1 extra money to spend on goods, if we are spending all
- of our money to heat our homes, there won't be any
- 3 extra money to spend in our stores. So I ask you to
- 4 please not grant the rate hike. Thank you very much.
- 5 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: Thank you very much. There's
- 6 one last person who signed up, who came in a little bit
- 7 after we started, Steven Chanter. Mr. Chanter, were
- 8 you here when we swore the witnesses in?
- 9 MR. CHANTER: No.
- 10 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: I will ask you to raise your
- 11 hand, and I will give you an oath. Do you swear or
- 12 affirm under penalty of perjury that the testimony
- 13 you're about to give in this proceeding is the truth?
- MR. CHANTER: Yes.
- 15 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: Please proceed.
- 16 MR. CHANTER: My name is Steven Chanter, last
- 17 name is C-h-a-n-t-e-r. I live at 21412 West Bannock
- 18 Avenue, Medical Lake. Basically, what I came here for,
- 19 I got the notice just like everybody else did with my
- 20 bill, and I read it and as soon as I read it, it raised
- 21 a lot of flags to me. The first thing they said is
- 22 they wanted capital improvements and maintenance costs,
- 23 and I thought about that for a minute and I said, well,
- 24 wait a minute now, Avista is a public trade company.
- 25 Capital investments, that's what shareholders buy stock

- 1 for so they take that money and they make capital
- 2 investments because when they get their new efficient
- 3 machinery going, they are the ones that benefit with
- 4 the savings. That's where the money goes. That's how
- 5 it works supposedly.
- 6 What a lot of people feel though is that I
- 7 think Avista thinks they're a Fortune 500 company, and
- 8 they're not. They're a utilities company. They have
- 9 to provide stable power to us. If GE raises its rates
- 10 on a TV, then I will buy Sanyo or whatever other brand
- 11 that suits my needs and my pocketbook. I can't do that
- 12 with the electric company. I'm a captive audience.
- 13 That's why you gentlemen are here. But I believe the
- 14 capital expenditures should go to the stockholders.
- 15 Last year, from what I understand, the second
- 16 quarter of last year, they had, what, \$23 million
- 17 dollars in profits in the second quarter of 2011.
- 18 They're still paying over \$1.19 I believe it is in
- 19 dividends. I believe that these should be used first,
- 20 but even before that, I've seen some waste in Avista
- 21 that I've seen either in the newspaper or on
- 22 television. The first thing on television was a
- 23 commercial they went and produced, and basically it
- 24 stated every time you flip your switch, 125 people are
- 25 backing you up. And they showed linemen, they showed

- 1 workers at the plant, they showed administrative
- 2 people. The commercial to me was useless. I have
- 3 Avista. What do I need to know? But they spent the
- 4 money to make and produce and then to air this
- 5 commercial. To me, that's money that is not needed to
- 6 spend.
- 7 The second thing I saw in the newspaper is
- 8 Avista has been giving money to minor political
- 9 campaigns and to PACT committees. In fact, there's
- 10 three that I was able to find within about, I don't
- 11 know, 20 minutes. In one article, Avista gave, I think
- 12 it's somewhere around \$4,700 dollars to house two
- 13 politicians in a primary in Idaho, under the Financial
- 14 Campaign Disclosure, there's another man that received
- 15 money from Avista. Now, if they've got money to back
- 16 political candidates, and we're talking minor, we're
- 17 talking state representatives. We're not talking
- 18 federal or U.S. senators, of which leads me to believe
- 19 how much they're getting.
- 20 What Avista is doing is not illegal, they can
- 21 contribute. But if they're going to contribute all
- 22 this money to political change, they've forgotten about
- 23 the customer, they really have. And a third thing, of
- 24 course they do grants, and they're very good. The one
- 25 lady from SNAP, she -- that's a good thing. But then

- 1 again, they gave money to, let me see here, who did
- 2 they give money to, the Othello Centennial Trail,
- 3 Colville County Celebration, okay, and an animal
- 4 shelter in Montana. I believe that Avista spends money
- 5 on things that, yes, they might be worthwhile, but when
- 6 they turn around and stick it to the customer, and we
- 7 don't have a place to go. We have to have power. We
- 8 have to have electricity.
- 9 Water power is the cheapest in the nation. I
- 10 originally lived in Florida. They had coal fired
- 11 plants. Coal is expensive, and, you know, there isn't
- 12 any in Florida. It has been to be railed in. So we
- 13 have one of the cheapest power systems in the country
- 14 in the Northwest here, and so I don't think that Avista
- 15 should be granted this increase. I believe there are
- 16 ways they can trim their budget, raise their capital,
- 17 and get their machinery or maintenance costs that they
- 18 need without giving it to the customer. Thank you.
- 19 CHAIRMAN GOLTZ: Thank you very much, Mr.
- 20 Chanter. So that concludes the number of people that
- 21 have signed up. Did anybody who didn't sign up get
- 22 inspired to say anything? If not, and you get inspired
- 23 later on, and we adjourn, which will be in just a
- 24 minute, please feel free to go on our website and you
- 25 can navigate and contact that way, contact the

1 Commission and file comments. We will be taking comments through November 27th, which is when the 2 3 hearing starts, so we will give plenty time to think 4 about this and get more comments in. 5 Again, if you have any questions about the 6 various proposals and Mr. Ffitch's handout shows you 7 what the different positions are of the company, Public Counsel and Commission Staff. The Commission Staff 8 9 takes a position different than both Mr. ffitch and the 10 company, feel free to look at those. And if you have 11 any other questions, ask Mr. Fassio, Mr. ffitch, or Mr. 12 Meyer. 13 If you have a consumer complaint of some sort, 14 please see Mr. Kouchi after we're done. Anything else 15 from my colleagues? Thank you very much for coming. 16 We really appreciate this. This is very important to 17 us, and we've been making notes of things we will look 18 further into during the evidentiary part of this 19 proceeding. Thank you. We're adjourned. 20 (The hearing was concluded at 1:03 p.m.) 21 22 23
