- NATURE OF PROCEEDING. On October 1, 2010, Puget Sound Energy, Inc. (PSE), filed with the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (Commission) certain tariff revisions designed to increase rates for gas service to customers in Washington. The proposed revisions provide for a rate increase of approximately 2.3 percent. The Commission suspended operation of the tariffs by Order 01 entered in this docket following the October 28, 2010, open meeting.
- PREHEARING CONFERENCE/PRESIDING OFFICER. The Commission convened a prehearing conference in this proceeding at Olympia, Washington on November 19, 2010, before Administrative Law Judge Dennis J. Moss, whom the Commission appoints as presiding officer in this proceeding.
- PARTY REPRESENTATIVES. Sheree Strom Carson and Donna Barnett, Perkins Coie, Bellevue, Washington, represent PSE. Simon ffitch, Assistant Attorney General, Seattle, Washington, represents the Public Counsel Section of the Washington Office of Attorney General (Public Counsel). Robert D. Cedarbaum, Senior Assistant Attorney General, Assistant Attorney General, Olympia, Washington, represents the Commission's regulatory staff (Commission Staff or Staff).¹

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¹ In formal proceedings, such as this, the Commission's regulatory staff participates like any other party, while the Commissioners make the decision. To assure fairness, the Commissioners, the presiding administrative law judge, and the Commissioners' policy and accounting advisors do not discuss the merits of this proceeding with the regulatory staff, or any other party, without giving notice and opportunity for all parties to participate. *See*, *RCW* 34.05.455.

Spencer, Graham & Dunn PC, Seattle, Washington, represents Seattle Steam Company (Seattle Steam). Ronald L. Roseman, Attorney, Seattle, Washington, represents the Energy Project. John A. Cameron, Davis Wright Tremaine LLP, represents Cost Management Services, Inc. (CMS). Damon E. Xenopoulos, Brickfield, Burchette, Ritts & Stone, PC, Washington, DC, represents Nucor Steel Seattle, Inc. (Nucor Steel).

5 **PETITIONS FOR INTERVENTION.** The following businesses and organizations filed petitions to intervene or petitioned orally:

Seattle Steam Company Cost Management Services, Inc.

Nucor Steel of Seattle, Inc. The Energy Project

PSE and Staff objected to intervention by Cost Management Services, Inc., stating similar reasons for their objections. CMS states in its Petition to Intervene that its specific interest in this proceeding is PSE's conservation-grant program, which originated in 2001 as a negotiated component of a general rate case settlement in Dockets UE-011570 and UG-011571 (consolidated). CMS contends this program, as currently administered, creates barriers to competition and is otherwise unlawful. Because PSE did not place its conservation tariffs in issue and they are not subject to the Commission's suspension order in this docket, both the Company and Staff expressed concerns that granting CMS's petition would unnecessarily and inappropriately broaden the issues in this proceeding. The Commission, sharing these concerns, denies CMS's petition.²

² The Commission notes that a regulated company's filing of a rate case does not amount to an opportunity for any and all persons who have one dispute or another with the company to raise it and have it adjudicated. There are other procedural vehicles that may be available to CMS to pursue its claims that PSE's conservation program is unduly discriminatory, or otherwise unlawful. These include the possibility of filing a complaint under RCW 80.04.110, to the extent CMS is PSE's competitor in the sale of natural gas to industrial customers in Washington.

- There was no objection to the remaining petitions to intervene. The Commission finds that these petitioners each demonstrated their substantial interest in this proceeding and that their participation will be in the public interest. The petitions to intervene by NWIGU, Seattle Steam Company, Nucor Steel, and the Energy Project are granted.
- **PROTECTIVE ORDER.** The Commission has entered simultaneously with the entry of this Order, a protective order under RCW 34.05.446, RCW 80.04.095, WAC 480-07-420 and WAC 480-07-423, to facilitate discovery.
- pulses, WAC 480-07-400 425. The response time for data requests is five business days. In addition, to expedite the exchange of potentially relevant information, all parties are required to provide all work papers, including model runs and source documents, at the time they prefile testimony and exhibits. The Commission urges the parties to work cooperatively together to avoid having to bring discovery matters forward for formal resolution. After the date for response testimony, February 7, 2011, the time for responses will be five calendar days.
- PROCEDURAL SCHEDULE. The parties agreed on a procedural schedule. The Commission adopts this procedural schedule as set forth below and in Appendix B to this Order. The Commission will provide due notice of any change in this schedule.

NOTICE OF HEARING. The Commission will hold evidentiary hearings in this matter beginning March 14, 2011, at 9:30 a.m., in the Commission's Hearing Room, Second Floor, Richard Hemstad Building, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Drive S.W., Olympia, Washington. The Commission may alter this schedule by subsequent notice.

- PUBLIC COMMENT HEARING. The Commission will hold a public comment hearing in this matter on March 14, 2011, at 6:30 p.m., in the Commission's Hearing Room, Second Floor, Richard Hemstad Building, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Drive S.W., Olympia, Washington. The Commission may alter this schedule by subsequent notice.
- DOCUMENT PREPARATION AND FILING REQUIREMENTS. Parties must file the original plus nine (9) copies of the unredacted versions of all pleadings, motions, briefs, and other prefiled materials. Parties must also file the original and one (1) copy of any redacted version(s). These materials must conform to the format and publication guidelines in WAC 480-07-395 and WAC 480-07-460. The Commission prefers that materials be three-hole punched with *oversized* holes to allow easy handling. The Commission may require a party to refile any document that fails to conform to these standards.
- All filings must be mailed or delivered to the Executive Secretary, Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission, P.O. Box 47250, 1300 S. Evergreen Park Drive, S.W. Olympia, Washington 98504-7250. Both the post office box and street address are required to expedite deliveries by the U.S. Postal Service.

Absent such objection, this Order will control further proceedings in this matter, subject to Commission review.
