4		have the Commission classify a water company as a regulated entity and
5		impose penalties for operating without having first filed a tariff with the
6		Commission. WUTC v. Lowper Corp., Docket UW-110213. The company
7		was classified as such, and penalties were imposed.
8		2. In evidentiary hearings in eight formal complaints where Staff was seeking
9		to have the Commission classify carriers as household goods movers
10		requiring a permit to operate, and impose penalties for operating without a
11		permit. WUTC v. Daryl Munn d/b/a Innovative Moving Systems, Docket
12		TV-111368; WUTC v. Spencer Tracy d/b/a BestGuys Moving & Labor,
13		Docket TV-111367; WUTC v. Richard Dengah d/b/a Empire Moving &

19	•	Services, Docket TV-111343. The companies were all classified as such,
20		and penalties were imposed.
21		3. In an evidentiary hearing in a formal complaint where Staff was seeking to
22		have the Commission revoke the registration of 20 telecommunications
23.		companies that failed to file annual reports and pay regulatory fees. WUTC

1	v. Affordable Voice Communications, Inc. et. al, Docket UT-111529. Each
2	of the companies' registrations were revoked.
3	4. In an evidentiary hearing in a formal complaint where Staff was seeking to
4	have the Commission cancel the operating permits of two household goods
5	carriers that failed to file annual reports and pay regulatory fees. WUTC v.
6	Anda Moving, LLC, 5 Star Movers and Delivery, LLC, Docket TV-111530.
7	Both of the companies' permits were cancelled.
